Hansell, formerly a farmer, of Nashville, Tennessee, who with his wife and family joined the colony in 1912 and labored in it without wages until the "monarch" ejected them last autumn on charges of inciting disaffec-tion among their co-believers. The court awarded Mr. Hansell £3,000. Evidence was given of the practice of "group marriages" among young men and women of the colony. Brides






