weighed. What is credit? It is the right, perhaps ,to draw cheques. What are cheques? Orders to pay money. Suppose that money is bank notes; what are they? In the last resort they are the promise of some bank to pay you gold if you ask for it. Without that they would be worthless bits of printed paper. And again, what are silver and copper? They are handy tokens, which by force of habit we hand to and fro in order to split up the dollar, but they are not legal tender except for a very small sum, for they have little value in themselves. A fifty cent piece probably does not contain anywhere near fifty cents worth of silver and a copper is worth, as copper, only a very small fraction of a cent. We take all these things confidently by force of habit because we assume them to be exchangeable in the long run fer gold. 'As long as everybody is easy in his mind nobody tries to exchange them. All goes on as usual; but they are only promises and tokens. When all else fails, only gold is money; but as long as everybody feels that at any moment a bank note can be exchanged for gold, then it is for the time being "as-good-
