### THE MILITIA BILL.

The Militia Bill which Mr. Cartier late ly submitted to the consideration of Par-liament, will, if it should become law, render every male inhabitant of the Dominion, between the ages of 18 and 60, not otherwise exempted, liable to take part in the defence of his country. exemptions under the new law differ in no respect from those under the old.— Hitherto the supreme command of the densive force of Canada has been vested in the Governor General, but a provision of the Confederation Act renders it neces sary that this authority should henceforth be vested in Her Majesty.

The rose was then entrusted to a court chaplain, by whom it was exhibited, and tendered to the devout kisses of all the officers of the household and dignitaries of the realm.
