Governor, on the requisition of the County Council, to grant power to any one to hold a fair, with the privilege of demanding and receiving fees at rates fixed by the Justices of the Peace in General Sessions. The toils so collected, it was provided, should be expended within two months from such receipt on the fairstead, and any sum remaining over should be paid to the County Treasurer. Bill reported.

The United States and the Red River Territory.

A resolution previously offered by Senater Ramsay asking for information concerning the presence of Wm. MoDougall in Dacotah Territory, and his assumption of office of Governor was taken up in Congress on Wednesday. Senator Howard said he thought the resolution unnecessary inasmuch as the interests of the United States were not involved in the local disturbance which had arisen in the Red River Country. The disturbance was confined to one of the zemote possessions of the Dominion of Canada He had been informed that Mr. McDougall had received no appointment to exercise authority in the Red River Country but was acting as a private citizen, though having an assurance of future appointment as Governor of that portion of British America, known as the Red River Country. Senator Ramsay said that the people he represented enjoyed considerable trade with the Red River Country, and that the people of the hatter represented there by a Collector of Revenue and other officials, and it seemed important that the exact condition of affairs there should be ascertained. The resolution was agreed to.

CONFEDERATION IN NEWFOUND-LAND.—A correspondent of the St. Johns. N. B., Telegraph refers the defeat of the course of Confederation in Newfoundland to the efforts of Roman Catholic clergy. Seven priests took the field against Mr. Shae, Confederate leader, appeared on the hustings, and harangued the people. "I may say" he adds, "that the Roman Catholics of the province have voted, as one man, against Confederation, having seen the chance of regaining their lost ascendancy by opposing the measure. Unhappily, a considerable number of Protestants have leagued themselves with this party. They will find that their yictory is a great misfortune to themselves and the country. That a reaction will speedily come, and that Confederation will be carried ultimately, I have not the smallest doubt."
