

GRAND DUKE PUNISHED. Cyril Receives Full Weight of Nicho-las' Displeasure.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.-The Grand St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.—The Grand Duke Cyril arrived at Peterhof this evening, having been summoned from Germany to receive the full weight of the imperial displeasure on account of his marriage to the divorced Grand Duchess Victoria of Hesse, which occurred recently at Munich. He will be deprived of his rank as aide-decamp to the Emperor, of his commission in the army, of his uniform and his orders and other honors, and will be excluded from Russia. The Grand Duke will suffer more heavily than the Grand Dukes Paul and Michael Michaelovitch, as he not only defied the reaelovitch, as he not only defled the re-iterated commands of the Emperor, but broke the canonical laws in marrying a divorced woman and his first cousin, and also because the Grand Duke of Hesse is the Empress' brother.
