## Paper No. 3.

A recent writer of our sister Church in the C. S. after a most exhaustive examination of the symbols and figurative language applied to Christian Baptism in our N. T., sums up the result of his examination thus:
"Iherefore, after a rigid examination of all that the New Testament contains on the sulject, we allim, that there is not a precept, example, or allusion from which an undoubted inference for immersion as the mode of Christian Baptism ean be deduced. Not one that any impartial or legal mind will admit, can be male the basis of an invarialle law to bind the judgnent and conseciences ot men."

I proceed to examine the testimony of history. Baptists are in the habit of making the broad as. sertion that "immersion was the universal practice of the Church for fifteen hundred years."

Let us see. Let us start from the time of the Reformation, and work backward to the $A$ postolic age.

In A. D., 1536, Calvin drew up a $a$ formula for the administration of the Sucraments in the Church at (ieneva: In the Order of Baptism, we find this direction: "Then the Mimister of Baptism pours water on the infant, saying I baptize the in the Name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

In his " Institutes " Calvin writes
"The difference is of no moment, whether he that is baptized be dipped all over, and if so, whether thrice or onee, or whether he be only wetted with water poured on him."

In 1422 , one hundred years before the lieformation, Iynwood, the Dean of Arches under Henry $V$ in his account of the English Constitutiou, speaks of Baptism by pouring, and sprinkling, as alike valid with dipping.
In 1850, Wickliffe, Rector of Lutterworth, and commonly called, "The Norning Star of the Reformation" says, "Nor is it material whether they be dipped once or thrice, or water be poured on their heads: but it must be done according to the custom of the place where one dwells."

Advancing onward another century towards Apostolic times, we come to the Symod held at Angiers in France, in A. D. 1275 , wheh on the subject of Baptism directs that "The infant be dipped thrice, or the water poued on him three times, according to the general cus. tom of the Church."

In a d. 12:5, Thomas Aquinas. the great Scholastic Doctor in Italy, writes, "Water is used in the Sacrament of baptism for the purpose of corporeal ablution by which the interior ablution from sins is sigcified: and ablution with water can be made, notonly by immersion but by aspersion, or affusion"

As sculpture, carvings, and paintings, cannot be affected by translations, but speak the same language to every age and to overy nation, it may be well to see, as
we travel upwards through the Apostolic age, what the representations of Chrisian art teach respecting the mode of administering Holy Baptism.
In the work of the Rev. Dr. Hodge of Mary land. on " Baptism, its subjects and modes," several representations of the mode of administering the Sacrament of Baptism are given: They run from the tenth up to the third century.
[n a plate, preserved at Rome, the work of Greek artists of minth century, there is a :epresentation of the baptism of a boy outside the Church: the boy is nearly unclothed, and the priest is represented as pouring water from a e er, on the boy's head.

The next plate in Dr. Hodges' work represents the mode of ardministering Baptism in the eighth and serenth centuries. On one side of the plate we see the candidate kneeling down and praying by a bath of water ; and a hand issues from the cloud alove him to denote the acquiescence of heaven in his petitions. Un the other side of the plate we see Baplism administered by pouring water out of a pitcher on persons who are kneeling on the ground, and not im. mersed at all.
The third plate in Dr. Hodges' work takes us back in the stream of Church history to the sixth and fifth centurnes-The picture represents the Baptism of a heathen King and Queen. They are kreeling in a large bath, partially unclothed, and with their crowns on. The minister who is baptizing them is represented as pouring water on their heads from a pitcher.

This monuntent of early Christian art is found on a tomb near Naples in South Italy, and represents the Baptism of the King and Quesen of the Longobardi who occupied that part of Italy in the sixth century.

I must rescrve the testimony of S. Augustine, S. Chrysustom and others for the next paper.

On Easter morning Mr. Bryan appropriately acknowledged the address and thanked the congregation for the magnificent git, which will of course be much appreciated by
one of so literary a turr. of mind, several of whose poems have appeared in newspaper and magazine.
The Church and Rectory of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, are among the finest and most beantiful of the Maritime Provinces. Both are of red stone and the church is exquisitely finished in wood. Its rector is one of the youngest in Canada to rule the destinies of so large and influential a congregation, being not yet 30 years of age; but the crowded congregations that attend St Paul's sunday after Sunday show that the Rector has learned the secret of giving the church, both in service and sermon, her proper place in the lives of the people. The seats are iree and the rector will have no one asked for what he does not, after his duty is shown from the $\mathfrak{i}$;ulpit, voluntarily offer as a gift to Guil, se that the money fur the support of the congregation is given directly, bazars and theatricals being left to those who live by them. The social life of the congregation is provided for by frequent "At Homes:" tw. which all, cld and young, rich and poor are invited. The people are taught the meaning of prayer and work and the church mever wants for support. On Easter Sunday the Rector asked for $\$ 240$ to pay off a small deit on the painting and the sum of $\$ 2 \$ 4$ was placed in the uffertory. A congregation run on such scriptual lines, will, of course live the missionary life. The contributions to that object this year were $\$ 1,284$, being nearly $\$ 200$ more than the year before and the largest of any parish in the diocese except one. The Rector of St. Patul's is to be congratulated in having the confidence of his people and on the great blessing that has attended his two years work in Cinarlottetown.-C. Examiner.

## Eatly Commmuton.

Its value is thus benutifully expressed by the late Canon Liddon: "A Christian of the first or socond century would not have understood a Sunday in which, whatever else might be done, the Holy Commun. ion was omitted; and this great duty is best complied with as early in the day as possible, when the natural powers of the mind have been lately refreshed by sleep, when' as yet the world has not taken the bloom of the soul's first self delication to God. when thought and feeling and purpose are still bright and fresh and unembarrassed; then is the time for those who would reap the full harvest of grace, to approach the altar. St. Lukes Camplrah.
The Easter Festival at St. Luke's is always one of the brightest and most joyous days in the year, and Easter. 1898, was no exception to the rule. Mr. Webster replied in appropriate and feeling terms.

The English Methodist Times recently published four prize essays from Methodist Ministers on the great leakage from their denomination. The statistics given by themselves are significant. In 1881 there were $376,67 S$ members. In 1597 they had increased to 435,420 . The essayists say that from 1881 to 1897 the society lost 645,000 members. The average yearly loss was 35,000 sculs. Putting the statement in another way, the leakage in twelve years has amounted to more than the total membership. The essayists generally agree on the causes of the leakage. "The Anglican Church has been a huge gainer from us" writes one. "A few" writes another "whose piety is undoubted, leava in order to seek a more ornate and stately form of worship." The essayists are also agreed that the class meeting with its experiences is unpopular and
declining. and that definite conceptions of tixed religious principles are wanting. These points are worthy of notice by zenlous men who wish to establish something similar in the Anglican Communion, and who lo not yet sce the absolute value of fived principles of religion. Among the other causes noted are weak prearhing, the competition of sccial movements. pleasures and cycling.
