8 THOUSAND MORE GERMANS KILLED

RUSSIAN FORCES HAVE BEGUN THE INVASION OF AUSTRIA

AUSTRIAN INVASION OF ALSACE OFFICIALLY REPORTED

ENTHUSIASM IS GROWING AMONG WOMEN WHO HAVE UNDERTAKEN SHIP FUND

ONTARIO HYDRO LINES NOW BEING PROTECTED

Militia Have Been Put on Guard at Niagara Falls to Patrol Power Plant and Transformer Station.

Special to The Toronto World. NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Aug. 11.—The source of Ontario's electric supply is to be well protected by the government. Major Hugh Ross, commanding the protective force of the 44th Regiment along the Welland Canal, received instructions from brigade headquarters to send twenty men and an officer to protect the power plants and transformer plant of the Ontario Power Company and the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission.

OCEAN ROUTE DECLARED CLEAR FROM MONTREAL TO LIVERPOOL

300,000 RUSSIAN TROOPS START INVASION OF AUSTRIA GERMAN ARMY PLANS CHANGED

LOOKING AHEAD Hands Off the People's Food BY H. G. WELLS

Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Aug. 11.—This is a war tone article; a convalescent article. It is characteristic of the cheerful gallantry of the time that after being left for dead on Saturday evening this article should be able, in an only very slightly damaged condition, to take its place in the firing line again this morning.

It was written late Friday night; written in a mood of righteous excitement and it was an extremely ineffective article. In the night I could hardly sleep because of its badness and because I did so want it to hit hard and get its effect. I turned out of bed about 2 o'clock in the morning and redrafted it. The next day I wrote it all over again differently and carefully and I think, better. In the afternoon it was blown up by the discovery that Mr. Runciman had anticipated its essential idea.

Exactly His Demand. He had brought in and the house of commons had passed through all its stages a bill to give the board of trade power to requisition and deal with hoarded or reserved food. That was exactly the demand of my article. My article, about to die, saluted this most swift and decisive government of ours.

Quick Action Needed. The powers that Mr. Runciman has secured so rapidly for the board of trade have now to be put into operation. There must be equally rapid development of local committees and commanders to carry out his ideas.

Not Enough to Eat. So far the poorer English have displayed an amazing and exemplary patience in this crisis, a humility and a courage that make one prouder for being also English. Apart from any failure of employment at the present time, it must be plain to anyone who has watched the present rise in prices and who knows anything either at first-hand or the experiences of the poor householder or who has acquired the knowledge by reading the reports of such investigations as those of Mrs. Pamber Reeves upon the family budgets of the poor, that the rank and file of our population cannot now be getting enough to eat.

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An Inglorious Panic. It has given way to an inglorious panic; it has broken its ranks and stampeded to the stores, and has made the one memorable exception in the splendid spectacle of our national solidarity. While the attention of all decent English folk has been concentrated upon the preparations for our supreme blow at Prussian predominance in Europe, villadom has been swarming to the shops, buying up the food of the common people and carrying it off in the family car, adorned, of course, with fluttering little Union Jacks.

LUSITANIA IS SAFE. LONDON, August 11, 10.41 p.m.—The Cunard liner Lusitania, which sailed from New York early Wednesday morning, arrived safely in the Mersey this evening.

Combined Armies of British, French and Belgians Will Assume the Defensive Against the Germans—French Army is Outnumbered by Half Million Germans Marching Towards French Border on Different Route—Ten Thousand and German Prisoners Already Taken by Belgians—Hospitals Filled to Overflowing With Injured—Women of Herstal Defended Village Against Germans and Wounded 2,000—French Forced to Evacuate Muhlhausen and Big Battle Will Be Fought on Plains Surrounding City.

PARIS, August 11.—The French have been compelled to evacuate Muhlhausen in Alsace. This initial victory of the German forces in the war has been admitted by the war office, whose official statement adds that the Germans, in overwhelming numbers, after the army assailing Neu Breisach had been repulsed, advanced against Muhlhausen, forcing back the French.

Earlier reports had said that the German advance had been stopped by the French troops whose lines had been reformed outside Muhlhausen.

It is now reported that a battle is raging on the plains that surround the city. The war office makes the admission that the army, under command of Gen. Joffre, had met with a force which greatly outnumbered it, approaching from Neu Breisach.

General reports give the approximate number of the German attacking army as about 500,000 men. This number comprises part of the army that was massed at Strassburg. It was first planned to start on invasion of France from a point near the boundary line of Switzerland.

It was announced officially today that skirmishes had been fought between the German and French troops at Longwy, a short distance within the French border, the junction point at eBligian, Luxemburg and German Lorraine. Engagements, also, between the French and Germans are reported to have taken place at Virton, Belgium, southwest of Arlon and along the Franco-Belgian frontier, extending into French territory. On the Franco-Belgian frontier to the north of Mont Medy, also, German cavalry patrols were met.

The conflict there would seem to indicate that the Germans have massed to force an entrance into France across the river Meuse. While details as to the strength of the invading army are lacking, the expression "in force" in connection with the admission made by the war office, is regarded as significant.

Women Defended the Town. An interesting story of heroism on the part of the women of Herstal, outside Liege, comes in a special newspaper despatch, which says that when the German troops attacked the town, the women workers in the Belgian National Arms Factory, defended the village while the men were away with the army. These doughty amazons, armed with revolvers, and whatever weapons they could glean from the factory, successfully fought off the furious charges of the German Uhlans until their ammunition was exhausted. Then they quickly barricaded themselves in their houses and poured boiling water upon the German soldiers in the streets, disabling by wounds and scalds some 2,000 men. Even the little children and tottering old men helped to defend Herstal and on Friday the Belgian colors were still floating over the factory. The gallant defense of Herstal will be recounted at firesides thru long years to come.

Word has come that Lieutenant Baron Marschall Von Bieberstein, formerly German ambassador at Constantinople, was slain in a battle in the Environs of Genaville, French department of Murthe-et-Moselle on August 5.

Main German Army Advances. BRUSSELS, August 11.—Moving toward historic Waterloo and Brussels, the army of the kaiser approaches, but as yet has not passed over into Belgian territory west of Tongres, at which point two cavalry divisions, supported by artillery and infantry, are operating. Plans of the war campaign taken from captured Uhlans officers indicate strongly that this is the main army of the German invasion of Belgium. They are also accepted as confirmation of the fact that Germany was completely taken by surprise by the resistance of Belgium. The plans, made public at the war office, show that the Germans intended to occupy Brussels on August 3 and proceed at once to Lille, which it had been their hope to invade two days afterwards. The reserves at Liege spoiled this plan.

The French artillery is hurrying on to the front thru Brussels at the present writing and as they march, the populace is greeting them with wild acclaim. German Losses, 2,000; 9,700 Prisoners. According to official announcement the German loss in Belgium was two thousand dead, twenty thousand wounded and nine thousand seven hundred prisoners.

GRAPE FESTOONS WERE REMOVED

Strassburg Monument in Paris Bedecked With Flowers and Palm Branches.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—The grape festoons which for 40 years have hung from the monument of the City of Strassburg, capital of Alsace-Lorraine, which stands in the Place de la Concorde, were torn down today and replaced with flowers and palm branches, while a tri-colored sash was draped about the figure.

GERMANS FAILED IN FIERCE ATTACK

Among Dead Are Said to Be Prince William of Lippe and Son.

Canadian Press Despatch.—BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.—The Germans made a desperate attack on Fort Serrail, south of Liege, Sunday night, and were repulsed with heavy loss. It is estimated that 800 Germans were killed within an area of half a square mile. A bridge which the Germans were crossing was shattered by the fire of the fort which had an exact range. The Germans attempted the assault with great courage. Some of their dead were found directly in front of the barb wire fencing that surrounds the fort. It is reported that Prince William of Lippe and his son, who were killed, were charging at the head of 1000 German soldiers. Their bodies were buried near the fort.

NO NAVAL BATTLE IN BALTIC SEA YET

Russian Fleet Has Not Met German Fleet, But is Waiting Its Chance.

Canadian Press Despatch.—STOCKHOLM, via London, AUG. 11.—The Swedish steamer Rubeberg, which arrived here from Raumo, Finland, reported that she had not seen a single warship in the Aland Archipelago, or anywhere else. Her captain was told that the Russian fleet had not met the German fleet at all, but was waiting in the inner part of the Gulf of Finland for a suitable opportunity to start an action. The Russians are concentrating their troops at all important points along the Gulf of Finland, especially at Ekensas, on the north side of the entrance to the gulf, and Sveaborg, and keeping in reserve a considerable force, reported to number 100,000 men.

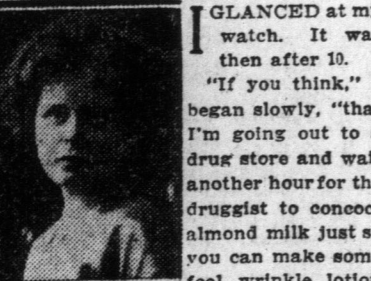

Anything with a tendency to break your physical equilibrium, any long illness that may crush your stability, any injury or invasion of your well-poised anatomy may throw the scales of intellectual health and will power upon the down grade.

Paranoia and a few other types of the incurably insane often conceal the delusions which ultimately drive some of them to murder or to suicide. Most of these, however, with unrecognised hallucinations, delusions and lunacy, manifest their defective physiques by constantly threatening to go away with themselves. Whenever you hear of a madman, or a mad woman, or a mad person, talk even jestingly of possible suicide, if you love him or her set a close watch upon her for the signs of his natural insanity. Sanity may be seemingly certain in every other way; he or she may be

be even extraordinarily intelligent and well educated. Nevertheless, if any mention is ever made of suicide, be on guard forever afterwards to save such a victim from his obsession. Remember, no perfectly sane person can either seriously or with amusement discuss or carry out suicidal thoughts.
