.- The C.P.R. Co., is asking for tenders for the clearing of the right of way of the Revelstoke and Arrow Lake Railway, from Revelstoke to the head of Arrow Lake, also for the construction of a station at Agassiz.

-The St. Louis Journal of Agriculture puts the world's probable deficiency of wheat at 100 million bushels. It figures out that the United States crop and surplus will leave only 80 millions for export, which is a bad lookout for the States, but good for Canada. Much uncertainty exists however, as authorities differ widely.

-Statistics gathered by the German Imperial commission on labor show that in many parts of the empire the duration of work exceeds fifteen hours daily. In northwest Germany the percentage of work people laboring these hours is 36.8 of the whole.



-The Boston Herald, July 20, gives the following prices for round lots of butter: Western creamery, extra, 20 and 201-2c; imitation creamery, 17 and 18c; factory, 17 and 18 1-2c; northern creamery, 20 1-2 and 21c; northern dairy, 18 and 19c. Eggs are quoted at from 15 to 16 cents.

-Building and Loan Associations are said by a New York paper to be a new feature in the States, and it speaks of them as though they were a recent American invention. The people down South are sadly behind Canada in this, as in other evidencies of financial skill and progressivemess.

-The average yield of the wheat crops in India since 1883 was 250 millions of bushels, and average export 34 millions-The highest yield was in 1884-5 over 302 millions, the largest export was in 1890-91 over 56 millions. The proportions between the total yield and exports show remarkable variations.

-In May this year a total of 2,186,341 tons of shipping entered at the various piers and basins of New York. Of this the North River, which gets nearly all the transatlantic liners, had 197,664 tons foreign, and 1,345,786 tons local, while the East River had 64,337 tons foreign and 569,554 tons local.

-The Dominion coal company have award ed a contract to McDonald & McManus for a tea mile section of railway from their colliery at Glace Bay, Unrough Cow Bay and "toward Louisbourg." Within fifteen days after the contract was awarded, work on the road commenced and now one hundred men are engaged.

1 -The Canada Paint Company, Limited, of Montreal, Toronto, and Victoria, have

issued a circular inviting their friends and patrons to look out for their exhibit at the World's Fair. It occupies a prominent position in the main corridor of the Manufacturers and Liberal Arts Building and has been very much admired.

The Government of Prince Edward Island has gone into the drug trade, having bought Paris Green wholesale, which it retails by its own officials at 18 cents. per 1b. Sush meddling with store keepers' business is highly censurable, a government may as reasonably open a grocery or dry good store and sell below the regular trad-



ities of a Court Martial, chivalrously assumed all responsibility in order to protect his officers from blame.

-Referring to the sale of land in Essex, Dagland, which a city morning paper took to be the Oatario county of same name, at \$9 per acre, it turns out that the sale alluded to was of some land for £9.10.0 per acre, or \$38, which is a marvellously low price, and was doubtless for some boggy, or otherwise worthless land, or a property not freehold.

-The British service of the Dominion Liae has been strengthened by the chartering of the steamship "Mexico," Captain Taylor, which arrived in port from Cardiff on Saturday morning. Besides her general cargo the "Mexico" brought out from the Old Country five prize Ayrshire heifers, which will be forwarded to the Chicago Exhibition as soon as they are released from quarantine.

-Complaints are made that foreign tobacco is being smuggled into the States via Canada. Tris seems to be "none of our funeral," it is not our business to protect the U.S. from smugglers. It is said that, "Customs officers from the States are watching this port closely." They should transfer themselves to some U.S. port of entry. This city is neither a front nor back door into Uncle Sam's premises.

-The last census Bulletin deals with religious affairs. It states that there is a church building for every 500 of the people of Canada. As one half the population are too young to use them, that gives an average supply of 250 persons for each church. If the sick are deducted, and those who never attend churches, it leaves such a number as indicates a very liberal supply of such accommodation.

-A number of the widows of U.S. soldiers, who were killed, or disabled, in the civil war, have been receiving war pensions up to a few days ago. Their husbands were Canadians, who took service in the northern army. Their pensions have been stopped on the plea that these widows reside in Canada. Tais is, by all odds, the meanest act ever perpetrated by a government.

-The Witness of 24th speaks of the years 1874 to 1893 as a "protections record of 19 years." Our neighbor thus makes the MacKenzie-Cartwright regime a protectionist one, as those years include the period when its party was in power. Sir Richard will rul his spectacles, and deliver himself of his favorite explctives after reading that he also is, or was a protectionist, when Finance Minister in the opinion of the Witness.

-Shippers are advised that the Yorkhill market at Glasgow will be in future open to receive Canadian cattle. This will do away with the trouble caused by the Canadian unimals being sent to another market far removed from the centre of trade. Henceforth they will be sold and slaughtered with American cattle, and though they will have the same chance as the latter everything points to the

unlikelihood of the existing restrictions being removed for some time to come.

-The Belgiam Chamber of Deputies recently adopted a resolution providing for the payment to its members of \$800, each a year. The payment of members which is constantly spoken of as a modern innovation was the rule in England in not very remote days. If we remember aright it was the illustrious opposent of ship-money, Sir John Eliot, who broke thro' the custom by offering to pay all his own expenses in attending Parliament.

-Provincial Manganese Mining company, limited, was organized at Windsor, on 12th inst. Its officers and directors are: D. C. Fraser, M.P., president; Geo. E. Boak, vicepresident; W. F. Jennison, manager; J. T. Burgess, sccretary and treasurer; and Lewis W. DesBarres. The company has secured about three hundred acres in the heart of the manganese belt near Walton, and the ore is said to be very fine. The capital of the company is \$75,000, in \$200 shares.

-The struggle of the Central Counties Railway Company, which is an ally of the Canada Atlantic against the Canadian Pacific Railway for an Ontario bonus of \$92,000 for the Ontario part of a railway link to Ottawa, from Montreal, on the south shore of the Ottawa, has ended in the C.P.R.'s favor. The Ontario Government heard both parties and decided that the C.P.R. gets the bonus if they begin work inside a year. Their line is already built from Vaudreuil to Point Fortune.

-The town population of Ontario and Quebec is 31.20 per cent. of the whole, this is less than half the population of England, which for years has been decreasing its rural, and adding to its urban population. There are more farms vacant in England to-day than ever before known. The predictions of the old Corn Law advocates are coming true,, and Cobden's confident assertions that Free Trade would be of benefit to English agriculture are utterly falsified.

i -The North Bay Dispatch reports that lumbermen in the western part of the district are busy just now, and will contime so all summer. The Imperial Lumber Co., at Warren have two camps, with one hundred men; Holland and Emery Co., Wahnapitae, three camps with 180 men; Chew Bros., Chelmsford, one camp with 20 men; Moiles Bros., Pogamasing, have one camp with 45 men. The Holland & Emery Co., expect to cut about 11,000,000 feet for their fall drive; the Imperial Lumber Co. about 3,000,000 feet; and Moiles Bros., also about 3,000,000 feet.

) -The drouth in England sent up the price of milk in London to 25 cents a quart. Fresh meat is, however, lower than ever known as animals are being killed, owing to lack of fodder. Hay selling at \$50 a ton is said to be unprecedented. That is not correct, as over \$70 a ton was realized some years ago. A farmer, known to us, kept his hay when that figure was reached hoping to sell it for more, and was rewarded for his greed by having to take \$30. The enforced slaughtering of cattle will be of advantage to the cattle trade of Canada ultimately.

←The report of the "Soo" Canal for year ending 80% June shows that, "The brumber of vessels have increased 5 per cent., or from 11,557 to 12,160. The actual freight earried shows a great increase or from fl0,107,603 to 10,816,404, a gain of 738,801 tons, or 17 per cent. The greatest single increase is grain other than whent which has junged from 952,391 bushels to 2,446,159 bushels, an increase of 1,493,768 bushels, or a gain of 157 per cent. Theg reatest decrease is in wheat

-The Chicago Inter-Ocean has generous praise for the Canadian school exhibits Touching those from Quebec it says: "The pupils show heatness, aptness, and general proficiency in the samples of their exercises that are here on exhibition. The evidences of their carefulness are shown by the score and hundred; in fact, it is difficult for the uninitiated to choose from the mass of materials any particular work or exercise or sample more deserving of mention than another. The average of the work seems high, and that standard tells the story better than a detailed description."

-Mr. James Gibb Shaw, for the past five years Port Warden of this port, has sent in his resignation to the Board of Examiners. The resignation was not unexpected, as it was understood last year that Mr. Shaw was soon to sever his connection with the office Mr. Shaw became Deputy Port Warden in 1875, and five years ago, at the resignation of Captain T. R. Kerr, he became Port Warden. Mr. Shaw will be succeeded by Captain Archibald Reid, the senior deputy warden. Captain Reid was appointed to the Port Warden's office last year, it being understood then that he was to succeed Mr. Shaw. Captain Reid was for many years connected with the Dominion Line.





The analysis gives it alcoholic strength at sixty-seven one hundredths of one per cent., which is so small that the Controller decided that it was not dutiable as ale or beer, but should be allowed to enter under section 547 of the customs tariff, at 20 per cent. ad valorem, as coming under unenumerated articles. Hop Bitter water would be a better name for this beverage.

-At the International Reciprocity Convention recently held, President Hill, of the Great Northern Railway, spoke in favor of improving the Lake and river navigation. His language was significient; and it shows, despite what has been said to the contrary, that the United States fear, and with good cause, the competition of Canada, he said: "I see no reason why the commerce that now seeks an outlet at Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York and

Boston, should not be divided-certainly equally divided-between these cities and a city on the St. Lawrence River. I see no reason why the city of Montreal should not be the commercial rival of the city of New York, to an extent that is far beyond anything that most of us would think possible."

-The Tobique Valley Railway was opened with much rejoicing and celat on 10th inst It is 28 miles long, and extends from Perth, N.B., on the line of the C.P.R., to Plaster Rock, or the celebrated Tobique gypsum deposits. Tais line will become a part of the C.P.R. system, as the latter corporation have leased it for a period of minety-nine years. It may be mentioned that the road opens up and makes accessible one of the most valuable districts in the province. Its resources are varied and of the most substantial character. It is admittedly the best district avail-





-The Tobacco Leaf reports that from all the tobacco producing sections comes the complaint that buyers do not put in an appearance, and as a consequence no sales of leaf tobacco are being made. The transactions in the country during the past six weeks have amounted to little or nothing. So long as the present condition of the money market continues, buyers will give the producing sections a wide berta. "The Hartford Times feels called upon to say that the reason why there is now no sign of tobacco buyers as there was last year, is because of the Sherman law. The truth about tobacco buyers is that they do not propose now to load up with domestic tobacco till they see how much its price is depressed by the Democratic tariff bill. The farmers this year will have to sell low or ease." The chances are that they will have a couple of years to wait for that tariff bill.

- The Globe's special correspondent, whose mission seems to be to spy out, and make the most of, any nakedness he finds in the Maritime Provinces, has to admit that New Glasgow has a number of foundries and iron-working establishments and other minor industries, and just now the hammers of the workmen upon the government's new steel ferry steamer for the Straits of Canso make an incessant chaging at the flock in the river. It is a busy little town, with a healthy trade and a sturdy spirit, owing a good deal to tariff-protected industries. The writer succes at New Glasgow as having "less of a spirit of independence than is found in many towns of like position." This slap at New Glasgow is given because, "whatever policy promises most for the coal and iron industries carries the people with it." The prople of that place and district would be worthy of a sneer at their lack of sense if they condemned a policy by which they prosper.

found on the Athobases and may be an extension of the beds existing there, or it may be merely a mass detached from the tar sands of the Athabasca and transported to its present location by glacial action, ages ago. The lie of the country gives no indication in support of either theory, and there are no rock exposures to assist in deciding the point. The only way to decide the matter is by actual boring. Dr. Selwyn is desirous of seeing this commenced as soon as possible. If this deposit should turn out to be an extension of the tar beds of the Athabasca it could hardly fail to be of the very greatest economic value. The indications here are just such as are found in petroleum producing regions the world over. But even these indications are not infallible proof of the existence of oil in paying quantities. That question can only be settled by actual test.

-The Comadian Gazette regards the Evening Schools Code drawn up by the British Minister of Education a gratifying sign of the growth of a healthy Imperial spirit, and asks where shall we find a trace of the old Manchester school doctrines in this section of the Code ?-II.-The Empire. Great Britain and Ireland. "Greater Britain."-The Colonies. Variety of Races in Colonies and dependencies. Self-governing Colonies. Crown Colonies. Protectorates. India and its Government. Imperial coinage and Imperial postage. Appointment of Governors General, and Governors. Obligation' to cultivate knowledge about our brethren "across the sea." Native races within the Empire, and our duties to them Extension of friendly feeling and of courtesy and fair dealing towards foreign nations. Appointment of Ambassadors, Envoys, and Consuls. Thanks to the activity of the High Commissioner and other Canadian agencies here, Canada is kept well to the front in British public schools by excellent maps and reliable publications well adapted for use as text-books.

—Official examination of the estate of the late Jay Gould, made necessary by his death, disclosed the fact that he had long succeeded in evading payment of taxes upon far the greater part of his personal property. Since his death it has gone into the heads of his heirs, and the board of assessors has placed its value at the sum of \$10,000,000. The heirs object to this assessment on the ground that it is excessive, and make the extraordinary plea

that they should pay nothing since the property was not in their possession at the time the assessment was made. The plea is worthy of the remorseless ingentity of the parent. It overreaches its purpose. If the property did not belong to the heirs at the time of the assessment it belonged to no one but the State. If it belonged to the State the present holders must show how they acquired it. If it belonged to the heirs they should be made to pay the taxes. Sir Oliver Mowat will probably have to tackle a similar question ere long.

-The Circuit Court, Boston, has decided that a manufacturer can only claim the right to trade marks which he originated. At the last session of the Legislature of New York State the following amendment to the penal code was passed, and having been signed by the Governor, has become a law: "Sec. 438a. Using false marks as to manufacture. A person who with intent to defraud or to enable another to defraud any person, manufacitures or knowingly sells or causes to be manufactured or sold, any article, marked, stamped or branded or encased or inclosed in any box, bottle or wrapper, having thereupon any engraving or printed label, stamp, imprint, mark or trade-mark, which article is not the manufacture, workmansaip, or production of the person named indicated or denoted by such marking, stamping or branding, or by or upon such engraving, printed label, stamp, imprint, mark or trade-mark is guilty of a misdemeanor." A misdemeanor is punishable with fine or imprisonment, or both.

-The presence of persons from Bermuda at Washington who are seeking a reciproc ity trenty between the States and that island has moved the New York Sun to say that: "There is a short, simple, and easy method by which the Bermudans can effect for themselves not merely a reduction in the American tariff, but a total abolition of our customs duties upon the products of their agriculture. They need not pay a cent to get their potatoes and their onions and their tomatoes into the markets of the United States. Free trade between Bermuda and our Atlantic ports would be worth millions of dollars to the people of the Atlantic Islands. Free trade can be had by Bermuda through the same process and under the same conditions as by Canada. Annexation is the road. There is plenty of room for Bermuda, under the

to secure disinfection, or internment where a bath is compulsory.

Although suspicion of there being something wrong ought to have been excited much earlier, the Department responsible for this work acted with highly commendable promptitude when its eyes were opened.

The evidence up to the appearance of Mr. Collingwood Schreiber as a witness, was very damaging to those in charge of this work. Materials were proved to have disappeared, and monies charged, which cannot be honestly explained. We can understand that these irregularities might go on to a great length when the Department placed implicit confidence in the integrity of the engineers in charge. But it is to be regretted that such confidence prevented some independent oversight being exercised which would have been an effectual deterrent of wrong doing.

A work estimated to cost \$150,000 should have been inspected as soon as the expenditure reached any way near that sum, in order to see whether the nearness of the work to completion tallied with the nearness of the appropriation to exhaustion.

Mr. Schreiber testified that the progress estimates, or pay lists, were held back an unusual length of time, "they were usually a month late" he said, This though not necessarily suspicious should have been enquired into, and more prompoitude demanded, and explanations. Probably had the reins been held tighter the horse would not have run away. It is usual on such works to have the pay lists ready in a day or two after the end of the month and their delay for a month was certainly an indication of loose management. From a letter quoted below we learn that the pay lists for January, February, and March amounted to \$210-000, which was \$20,000 in excess of

the total estimated cost of the works. Now, had the March pay list been piresented, as it ought to have been, on 2nd or 3rd of April, there would have been, almost certainly, an instant stoppage put to the outlays. The delay then in presenting the pay rolls, which ought not to have been tolerated, seems to be responsible for an enormous loss of public money.

One of the strangest facts in this affair was stated in a letter from Mr. Schreiber to the Hon. Mr. Haggart dated 10th May last. That letter reads; "Another rather starting state of affairs has come to light in connection with the Lachine canal. You will no doubt remember that there was an appropriation of \$37,500 for the rebuilding of lock No. 1. Tenders were received for stone and labor by my pre; decessor. Subsequently early in March you instructed me not to rebuild this lock, and on the 14th March last I wir. ed Mr. Parent that the lock was not to be rebuilt. Mr.Parent informs Mr. Douglass that he at once gave verbal orders to labor contractor St. Louis to stop cutting stone, but on April 25 Mr. Douglass found men still cutting stone and at once gave orders to have it stopped. Early in May, inst., I received pay rools, etc., for this work, amounting to over \$9000, duly certified by Mr Parent and Mr., Kennedy for work up to March 25. Now it appears strange that Mr. Parent should have certified for this work, inasmuch as he had ordered it not to be done. Further, Mr. Douglass Informs me that Mr. Parent is preparing pay rolls for over \$12,000 for the month of April for this same work, which he states he stopped on the receipt of my telegram of the 14th of March last."

Here then we have two pay rolls, one for \$9,000, a second for \$12,000 for work which was ordered not to be done.

It will be interesting to discover whether anything was advanced on those pay rolls, and by whom, as it is manifest from the letter of Mr. Schreiber that the Government ought not to pay one cent for that work, the prosecution of which had been forbidden.

An earlier letter by the Government's Chief engineer to the Minister states that, he was "startled" in April by receiving pay rolls and accounts for March, and that on enquiry by a special messenger, sent to Montreal, he found that the pay rolls were as follows; "December, January and Feburary pay rolls in round figures \$79,000, March \$132,000, April \$110,000, extras for superstructure \$61,000,total \$382,000 I

So that for an unfinished work, which was to have cost \$190,000, there were pay rolls for three months only amounting to \$382,000!

What we do not understand, and what needs explanation is, why the Chief Engineer of the Government that was building this work should have to send a deputy at the end of April to obtain information about the expenditures in December, January and February?

It is much to the Hon. Mr. Haggart's credit that instantly on receipt of the Engineer's startling letter of 10th May, he wired; "Suspend Parent and Kennedy immediately. Put Marceau acting with Douglass to assist him. Hold an investigation, and obtain counsel if necessary.

(Signed) John Haggart."

The result of the investigation will be anxiously awaited by some of the persons implicated, as not only is a large sum claimed by them held over, but the charge of having falsified cert tain bills, will have to be met.

Following so quickly upon the scandals that recently disgusted the country in connection with other public works; this affair is most deplorable, and points to the urgent necessity for some radical reform in the system of expenditures by the Government on public works.

THE BANK STATEMENT.

After pooking over reports of banking and limited affairs in the States, to turn to the bank statements of the Dominion is like passing out from the wild hurry-scurry excitement of the New York Exchange into a business house where there is great activity, prosperity and progress, but all conducted quietly.

For some time past U.S. bankers have been under painful tension, fearing lest the disturbance of confidence would result in some momentous disaster.

It is surprising indeed that, the machinery of business is working even as well as it is in the States when banks are failing every day, the record for this year showing over 200 that have closed up.

An American paper ridicules the banking system of this country, and points to the Winnipeg bank as a proof of its being defective. It says also that banks are not kept solvent by a system but by capable managers. There is some truth in this

But there is the fact before us that Canada has had no small bank failure for 5 millions of its people, and the States have had a pank failure for every 210,000 of population.

A good system of banking acts like a good code of laws in developing administrative talent. Where no code exists, or one that is defective, there may be good judges, as Eastern cadis often administer justice wisely by the light of nature.

But the more scientific is a code of laws, the abler, as a rule, are those who interpret and enforce them and the more stable and trusty is the machinery of justice and equity. So, a good banking system develops good bankers, and ensures steadiness and uniformity in financial administration, which inspire public confidence, and lead to orderly business methods amongst business men.

In spite then of the sneer at our banking system, we claim that, the stability of our banks compared to those in the States, is to a very large extent attributable to the admirable, indeed, incomparable, panking system of Canada.

The bank changes in June were somewhat out of the ordinary course for that month. Girculation went up one and a half millions, the increases for June in previous four years were: 1889 and 1890, \$1,200,000; 1891, \$460,000; 1892, \$1,230,000. In contrast with this we have official returns showing that there is \$10,

000,000 less currency in circulation in the States than there was last summer.

In the same way discounts last month differed from the record of previous years. In 1889 the increase was \$330,000, in 1890 they fell off from the May total, in 1891 they remained as in May, and in 1892 they declined \$800,000, during last month the increase in discounts was \$1,-100,000.

The increase in deposits was \$400,000. A further decline took place in amount of call loans, and in balances due by foreign agencies and banks, aggregating \$800,000, which means a diversion of funds from the Stock Exchange to the warehouses and marts of trade.

The trouble between France and Siam will, we hope and believe, be settled without hostilities, which would lead to grave financial disturbances. Siam alone would have no chance in such an unequal con-

test, and it would be extremely difficult for England to keep out of the row. Indeed the feeling in England is that the policy of France is directed against her interests in that country, the trade of which is almost monopolised by Britain. It is probable that France is all the more aggressive because of the present rulers of the old land being regarded by European powers as a "peace at any price" Government.

Now that Australia is settling down, it is evident that those banks which have weathered the storm are equal to the banking requirements of the country, until Imancial affairs are re-organised under a more prudent system, one feature will be the restriction of banks to the policy of minding their own business, the divergence from which is the chief cause of banking troubles.

MUNICIPAL OFFENCES.

peoie for month......

The municipal laws abound with direct prohibitions of certain acts, and very positive injunctions that others shall be the rule in civic management. In most of these cases the law is quite explicit, but there are some which would puzzle the proverbial "Philadel-

phia lawyer" to explain, or unravel.

But while the course to be pursued by municipal officers is laid down with a fair amount of precision, there is no provision made for enforcing its obervance. A Mayor, Reeve, Councilman, must have certain qualifications. But if such officials secure appointment without such qualifications, as is frequently the case, it is no ones business to interfere, and if a Court of law is appealed to by a ratepayer, he must bear the costs, which are enough to deter any man from vindicating the law.

But these irregularities, though illegal, have no criminal character. Occasionally however the looseness of the law leads to the election of persons to office, who secure that position in order to carry out some personal scheme that is essentially fraudulent.

There are, however, offences committed of a civic character, which are as criminal as burglary, or pocket-picking, opportunities for which are made open by the absence of penalties for breaking the municipal law.

An instance of this class of crimes is shown in the following case, which we have reason to know is not an isolated one.

A few years ago a certain point on a railway where no village existed, was selected by a public company for establishing works that would employ a large staff of men, for whom houses would be required.

On this becoming known to two land speculators, they bought up the land adjacent to the proposed works for the price of an old song, as it had no value, being a bed of sandy gravel. As soon as the village grew up, they determined to secure its incorporation. To secure the necessary number of assents by property owners, they hawkedf round a plan of the proposed area which was to form the new anuncipality.

When the boundaries were settled upon, and the plan accepted, a certain tract of several acres was included in that plan. That plot of land was included in that plan. That plot of land was the most valuable in the whole area, as it alone was capable of being reached by a switch from the railway that passed through the village, and it became occupied by one of the organizers for business purposes.

The land is wholly within the boundaries of the village as it was laid out, and practically as they exist today. But, when the bounds of the village were finally settled, that valuable property was found to have been cut out, and left in the County, where the taxes are nominal.

That plot enjoys every privilege of the Village, but by a trick was exempted from village taxes. It has streets on its sides, it is close to the village fire station, it enjoys the lighting of the village the constabulary oversight of the village, and in every particular forms a part of the village, in in evry respect but one—it is exemple from the village taxes.

This exemption was not contemplated by any of those who assented to the village boundaries, except the owner of the land and his real eastate partner, and the exempton went on for years before even the fact became known to the tatepayers!

Thus, by a deliberate falsification of the plan assertd to by ratepayrs when the new municipality was first organized, the most valuable area in the district was exempted from the taxation involved by the formation of the new village, and the owner of those acres enjoys all the advantages of its organisation without paying one cent of taxes!

! If that is not a crime then swindling is innocent!

Another form of offence which carries no penalty, although forbidden by Statute, is the not uncommon one of a Reeve or Councillor, supplying the Municipality with materials, for the purchase of which, regarding the prices to be paid for which, he has himself voted, and lobbied amongst his colleagues.

A case is known to us of this having been done to a very great extent, to an extent large enough to give profits to a Municipal officer equal to his taxes. To him as a merchant, orders were given without asking for tenders from the trade, at prices not specified, and in excess of what the articles could have been procured for had competition been invoked. The Council consisted of only five members, the person who supplied these goods and his speculation partner made two, and the third who made a majority was a person they had "on a string." So these two conspirators voted away the village taxes in buying goods of one of them, in improving his and their own properties, and in extending the works of the village at the cost of the ratepayers solely to give value to lands held for

Thus very large sums have been wasted in opening up empty streets, and the owners of small lots, working men have been and are taxed, and for years will be taxed, for the cost of village works which are of no public use, or

private benefit to any ratepayers, but the two or three speculators who for years have had their hands in the village pocket.

If such crafty, illegal, and self-seeking devices, to use a Corporation for private purposes, are not, punishable as crimes, it is high time the law was made to reach, and to severely punish such flagrant offences.

It will be asked why such men are in office? The answer is two-fold. In the first place, the guilty parties are money lenders, the majority of the rate-payers are poor men, who have bought small lots from them on time, and fear to give offence by kicking; and, in the second place, there is only a handful of residents who are able to give their time to municipal duties. Our municipal system is admirable in theory, but rotten in practice.

IMPRISONMET FOR DEBT.

Justice Taschernau has given judgment which will render detention of a prisoner for debt against his will, no longer possible. Under article 798 of the Civil Code an imprisoned debtor can secure liberation by making an assignment.

It has been thought however, and tried to be upheld that, if such assignment is contested by creditors, the prisoner can be detained. The Court in dealing recently with such a case held that by Act 12 Vic., cap. 42, abolishing imprisonment for debt, perpetual detention of a debtor was no longer possible and, if defendant was to be kept in gaol until he should have settled a certain judgment, after all his property had been taken from him, he might be detained perpetually. The Court, therefore, granted an order for defendant's immediate liberation.

The continued incarceration of a person in Toronto for debt is arousing much sharp criticism. To detain a man in jail because he owes money which he cannot pay is the very height of absurity, as it deprives him of all chance of carning the where withal to discharge his debts.

The law is a clumsy one If it is desired to punish a debtor for getting into debt fraudulently, that offence ought to be specifically stated in the indictment. A person convicted of that offence is not a prisoner for debt, but for fraud.

When the law then seeks to punish that offence, by imprisoning debtors indiscriminately, it makes the unfortunate, but honest debtor, liable to the punishment only intended to fall upon the dishonest one, which is not only cruelly unjust but stupidly foolish.

It is doubtless very desirable to have some statutory provision for punishing fraudulent debtors other than any that now exists. A Dominion Insolvency Act would need to embrace such a provision, and if properly drawn would be of the greatest service in checking such abuses of the credit system as, though essentially fraudulent, are not recognised by the criminal law.

A WRECKED INSURANCE ENTERPRISE. The Chronicle of New York gives what it terms "A glimpse at the inside of a 'Lloyds.'"

" The Guarantee and Accident Lloyds of New York," was organized in 1890. As its name indicates it was organized to transact a casualty insurance business on the "Lloyds" plan, in other words to make an experiment. Concerning the result of the experiment, the advisory committee, of which Mr. Charles S. Fairchild, ex-secretary of the United States Treasnry, is chairman, naively says: "The experience gained is undoubtedly of very great value." Just what that experionce is the following figures show:

\$1,897 29 by each subscriber - - -The misfortunes of the Guarantee and Accident Lloyds are instructive in at least two directions. In the first place there is instruction of a general kind tending to show business men the folly of connecting themselves with "Lloyds" concerns. If they desire to make money in the insurance business it is much better for them to organize a stock company. They will occupy a more respectable position as stockholders in a regularly constituted company than they can ever occupy as subscriber to a "Lloyds" concern. As stockholders their interests and liability will be measured; their names will not be paraded before the public; their personal wealth will not be count-

ed as an asset of the company and they will be saved from the possible humiliation of being shown up some day as parties to an unbusinesslike, wagering sort of business.

In the second place the misfortunes of this Lloyds show that men comparatively inexperienced in the casualty insurance business are unlikely to achieve success, and may even make a mad, headlong rush into disaster and carry their subscribers' money with them.

The Guarantee and Accident Lloyds was formed to astonish the world. A pamphiet was issued directing the attention of the public to sundry "strong points" it claimed to possess. Its subscribers, collectively, were said to represent over 400 millions of dollars. As is customary with similar organizations in America, it banked upon the name and reputation of the ancient "Lloyds" of London. It proposed to issue model policies, remarkable for liberality—and evidently it did. It proposed to accept lower rates than any other organization-and we guess it did It proposed to outdo every competitor in the prompt payment of claims, but in rather a short career it managed to pile up 175 lawsuits and still has 100 unpaid claims on hand. In numerous other respects, particularly with regard to the profits calculated for stockholders, it proved a dismal failure." The Chronicle concludes from the history of this "dismantled wreck" that, "The day is last approaching when to invite a man to subscribe to a Lloyds will differ very little from inviting him to play fare or poker. The men who subscribe and place their subscriptions in the hands of "attorneys," are usually completely at the mercy of the latter. When the deluge comes_they_cannot run away."

FLAT BROKERAGE CONDEMNED.

Commissioner Merrill, of the Massachusetts Insurance Department, condemus the "flat brokerage" system unreservedly.

It has been stated as a fact that among some of the agencies not only has the entire first premium been given to the agent as his commission, but in addition a bonus of three, four or even five dollars per thousand of insurance has been added, as inducement to remarkable results. effect of these hot-house processes is that a vast mass of the business thus procured has proved merely temporary, and the companies, instead of being benefited, have been clogged with transactions looking well on paper, but in great measure soon disappearing from the books at a serious sacrifice to the continuing members.

The condition in this State, owing largely to the stand taken by the better class of the agents themselves, is less subject to this charge than in many of the other States; but the Massachusetts policyholders must suffer from whatever affects adversely the welfare of the companies in which they are insured, and very seriously are their interests affected when large sums are taken from their dividends and given in bonuses in other localities for mere spectacular effect.

The work of the agent is important and essential, and, if successful, is often ar-

duous, and performed under discouraging and disagreeable circumstances. Without his efforts in bringing together and keeping up the membership the company would be impossible. His services are, therefore, indispensable, and should be adequately remunerated. Whatever is a reasonable compensation for his service he should justly have.

But there are two or three considerations that make it quite improper that such large flat brokerage should be paid in a lump sum: First, the whole of the premium is not intended to pay expenses with; an average of at least two-thirds of it is expressly calculated to pay cost of insurance and provide for the reserve. If, then, he receives from the first premium an amount greater than the loading, obviously some one else must be made to meet these other charges, and the amount is unjustly taken from the dividends of the old members. Next, this business is only valuable to the company if it stays on the books and pays premiums enough to make up for its cost to get and the other charges due from it. The only part of the premium that can be righteously used for expenses in any one year is the loading. If, then, the agent receives the entire first premium for his commission, and the policy lapses after only one payment is made, the transaction is not only useless to the company, but is a positive loss and injustice to the old members. Under such flat brokerage system, moreover, the interest of the agent in the transaction ends with its payment, and he can look on with complacency afterwards while a rival agent twists the policy into another company; while, if he were to receive his compensation in equal amount, but only in instalments from the renewal premiums as paid, each not greater than the loading, which is all the company has the right to pay in any year, not only would the company be spared any loss on the policy in case of lanse, but the agent would have a strong interest in encouraging the persistence of the membership, and would not be apt to regard the operations of the aforesaid twister with composure.

Nearly every agent would undoubtedly prefer this method of compensation, as the company could safely make it more liberal than a flat brokerage, and he would be providing himself an income for future years. The company would also have a powerful factor in securing persistency of its membership.

Every prudent reason would seem to urge such a method of compensating and encouraging the agents, promoting esprit de corps, loyalty and zeal, and at the same time removing a practice certainly unjust and wasteful in its effects, if not wholly illegal. :

SIR CHARLES TUPPER ON IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

In a recent speech Sir Charles Tupper. replied to those who reproach Canada with enjoying the protection of the Imperial power without contributing to the costs of defence. He said: "Before Confederation British North America used to be dependent upon the British navy for the protection of her fisheries, and almost

every town of importance had its garrison of British troops. Now Canada protects her own fisheries, and, except at Halifax, sees a British red-coat only as a visitor. The construction of the Canadian Pacific railway and the development of the Canadian militia has relieved Her Majesty's forces of the expense of preserving the peace throughout the wide western area of the Dominion. Moreover, Canada had expended on her canals and her railwaysworks absolutely vital to the defence of the Empire-no less than \$141,000,000; in deepening the St. Lawrence she has spent \$3,384,000; in the construction of graving docks, \$2,700,000; for the aequisition of the Hudson Bay Co.'s rights in the Northwest and the organization of that country for settlement, \$7,000,000, and a further sum of \$13,500,000 in connection with Her Majesty's Indian subjects. In all, Sir Charles claimed, Canada has spent \$174,000,000 for the empire, in addition to \$3,000,000 more for mounted police protection and subsidies to war steamers. "And," said Sir Charles somewhat significantly, "Canada is also ready to-morrow, to pay \$750,000 per annum to obtain a fast steamship service across the Atlantic." One other point in Sir Charles' speech is worth noticing. was very emphatic in his disapproval of the suggestion that the colonial authorities should be consulted as to the nomination of the Governor or Governor-General. TA more disastrous step than this," said Sir Charles, "could hardly, I believe, be conceived. It is the pride and boast, and it is to the advantage of the British colonies, that their Governors-General are not the head of any party, are not under obligations to any party, but are beyond the reach of all party considerations in their capacity as the representative of the Sovereign-the embodiment of majesty itself. Thus it comes about that a Governor-General has the support, not of any one party alone in the colony, but of all men of every grade of opinion, and this is a happy condition of things, with which no wise man would wish to tamper."

RAILWAY RATES BEFORE THE PRIVY

At a meeting of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council held on 20th inst., a charge brought against the Grand, Trunk Railway by Mr. Thomas Conant, of Oshawa, was heard, and decided. He charged the G. T. R. with discriminating in its passenger rates in the sale of long distance tickets. He alleged that tickets of this description were issued from Chicago to Suspension Bridge at 2 cents to mile, and that the company had refused to grant him the same rate from Hamilton to the bridge. Mr. Conant further complained that the charge of \$1.15 for single fare from Oshawa to Toronto was excessive. A copy of Mr. Conant's letter had been sent to the Grand Trunk railway company, and Mr. Seargeant, the general manager, in his reply, stated that the 1000mile tickets at 2 cents a mile applied only between Buffalo, Suspension Bridge and Chicago, and intermediate points common to the G. T. R. and Michigan Central

railways. Another mileage ticket common to the C. P. R. and G. T. R., and available between Detroit, Port Huron and east as far as Portland, Me., was available to any person for 2 1-2 cents per mile. In regard to the local fare from Oshawa to Toronto, Mr. Seargeant pointed out that the company charged, in accordance with its legal status, at the rate of 31-4 cents per mile, fractions of five cents being charged in full, or else not charged at all, . portions of a mile being reckoned as one mile. Mr. Seargeant thought this explauntion covered the complaint and accounted for the rate of \$1.15. After hearing some technical legal objections raised by Mr. Bell, Q. C., solicitor of the company, the chairman, the Hon. John Haggart, stated that the Committee considered that Mr. Scargeaut had made an effectual reply to the charge of discrimination. While it is quite possible that in railway may, in some instances, act unfairly, unjustly and unwisely, in charging higher rates for short distances than long ones, it is quite unreasonable to regard such discrimination as, in itself, unfair and unjust. Our railways are business corporations, not charitable institutions. They make "an allowance to those taking a quantity," as it were, just as merchants will sell a chest of tea, or barrel o. sugar, or bale of cloth at a lower price per pound or per yard, than he would require for a single pound or yard. As traffic increases by additional population and business, there will come a reduction in short haulage rates for passengers and freight, as the lowering of fares and rates will then develop traffic sufficiently to make such reductions profitable to the railways.

THE OFFICIAL RETURN OF YEAR'S EX-PORTS AND IMPORTS.

The Canada Gazette gives the total of exports and of goods entered for consumption for the year just closed as \$236,651,-282, which is \$5,708,964 in excess of 1892. The increase over the last year under the old tariff is \$84,818,419, which is a larger amount than either the imports or exports of that year. The following is a comparative statement of the exports for the 12 months ended 30th June, 1892 and 1893:

Of these total goods the produce of Canada amounted in 1891-92 to \$96,013,843, and in 1892-98 to \$102,400,485, an increase of \$6,386,642, while goods, the produce of other countries, amounted in 1891-92 to \$14,781,529, and in 1892-93 to \$12,787,180, showing a decrease of \$1,994,-349, leaving the net increase for 1892-93 \$4,392,293.

The following are the items of increase in 1898 over 1892:

THE_VICTORIA BOARD OF TRADE.

The annual report of the Board of Trade of Victoria condemns the granting of railway charters to persons incapable of carrying out such works. The salmon pack this senson is spoken of as likely to exceed any previous one. The parcelling out of small mining lots in the Kootenay district is censured. The Board strongly urges the need of a Dominion Insolvent Act. In reference to agriculture the report says: "Until within the past few years the impression prevailed that British Columbia was a 'Sea of Mountains.' It is, therefore, a revelation to many to learn that there are within the Province grazing and agricultural lands sufficient to sustain a population many times greater than it now contains. That more of these lands are not utilized results from the difficulty in transporting to the cities the crops and cattle that could be raised thereon. But these difficulties are year by year being lessened, and one result is shown in the falling off in the imports of wheat flour. The Shurwap & Okanagan railway has opened up a portion of the Province very suitable for wheat growing, the average yield being forty bushels per acre of the finest grade flour wheat, and if the available lands in this district only were brought under cultivation, all the provincial requirements could be supplied, and yet leave a surplus for a large export trade. British Columbia offers inducements to the small farmer rather than to the capitalist who seeks a large and unbroken tract of land suitable for cultivation; where one of the former could. make a selection, hundreds of the latter could find suitable homesteads. The opening up of the lands near the cities would be a great benefit to the province, and the small farms, if properly worked, would give highly satisfactory, results to the owners. The markets for fresh dairy produce, poultry, fruit and vegetables, etc., that could be raised thereon, will not be overstocked for years." ,

THE MILLING WORLD ON RECIPROCITY

The way in which American papers snub those Canadians who make out that reciprocity with the States is the only salvation of Canada, can be judged by the following characteristic, and typical utterance by the Buffalo Milling World. That paper, though usually unfair towards Canada, has a way of speaking its mind with a frankness which is quite refreshing.

"Says a Winnipeg, Manitoha, Canada, paper: 'The opinion seems to prevail to quite an extent in the United States that reciprocity with this country would be a very one-sided affair, that is, that Canada would receive about all the advantage from such an arrangement, and with but indifferent advantage to the Republic. Those people who talk that way are really very ignorant of the true situation. Indeed! And the 'really very ignorant' people, who have built up this Republic can learn from the very wise people, who have failed to build up Canada to any marked extent, that it will aid the farmers and millers of the United to have the formers and States millers of Canada unload their farm and mill surpluses on our markets! Well, well I Probably our 'really very ignorant, men will refuse to absorb the wonderful wisdom that oozes out and slops over from Winnipeg and other Canadian towns. We certainly do not need or, wish either free trade or reciprocity with Canada. When will the Canadian; cease to whine over what they are not in any way entitled to, and what they cannot get?"

A copy of "Commerce," a new illustrated English weekly paper, is just to hand; with it is incorporated "The Chamber of Commerce Journal." The illustrations are well executed, and varied, ranging from portraits to interiors of factories, etc. The typography is particularly good, and the editorial, and other reading matter, valuable and interesting.

-At the recent meeting of the creditors of R. J. Bowes & Co., Kingston, Mr. Langley, the assignee, was confirmed in his oflice. There was a good representation of the creditors both of Montreal, Toronto and Kingston. The assignee submitted an elaborate statement of the insolvent's affairs. Stock had been taken at each of the three branch stores as well as a the pricipal house of business at stock we shown to be of the nominal value of \$32,000; liabilities about the same, of which \$1,200 is preferred for rent, etc. Mr. Bowes offered 67 1-2c on the liabilities which was favorably enter. liabilities, which was favorably enter-tained. Finally the meeting adjourned sine die, leaving the acceptance of this offer and 'the disposition of the estate in the event of its failure in the hands of the Assignee and three inspectors viz., James Minnes, bl Kingston; Charles Darling and John Kennedy, of Toronto.

Beautieu & Frere, general store, St. Elizabeth, Que., a firm of long standing, recently burnt out with small insurance, have settled at 50c on the dollar, cash.—Mrs. H. Tanner, who has been endeavoring to earn a living by running a small saw mill at Brompton Falls, in this province, has assigned.—Noel Forget, general store, St. Lucie de Doncaster, is offering 25c on the dollar, cash.—P. J. Bedard, printer, city, has held a meeting of his creditors when he explained that his assets were locked up in plant, etc. He offered 30c. payable in 1, 2 and 3 years, insecured. He was formerly with B. Bruaet & Co.,

who dissolved last January.—S. Bouvrette, grocer, city, recently damaged by fire, has effected a settlement at 371-2c on the dollar, cash. Liabilities \$3,000.—John Ballantyne, trader, Havre aux Maisons, Magdalen Islands; A. Lebeau, hotel, Sault au Recollect, and H. O. Fortier, grocer, Sherbrooke, have assigned.

—S. Duckett, general store, Maxville, Oat., has called a meeting of creditors. He has been in business since the summer of '82, and was never in trouble before, but never did a large trade. His liabilities are \$3,900 and assets \$3,100.—Maria Splatt, milliner, Dunnville, has assigned.—Benj. Rothwell, boots and shoes, Toronto, is offering a compromise of 35c on the dollar, cash. He commenced many years ago, but never made more than a living.—The stock of McSweyn Bros., tailors, Kincardine, has been sold at 55c on the dollar.—J. G. Ponps, saw mill, Osnabruck centre; Geo. Thompson, tailor, Toronto; G. A. Jacobs, jr., hotel, Newcastle, and Wm. Calhoun, grocer, Toronto, have assigned.—The latter owes \$1,100.—The stock of O. J. Mitchell; furniture, Engersol, has been sold at 59c on the dollar.—John Scully, contractor, Toronto, has assigned.—S. W. Chivrell, restaurant, Toronto, is asking an extension.

-W. H. Cochrane, boots and shoes, St. John, N. B., has had anything but a fortunate business experience. He acted as clerk to his father until some 5 years ago when an assignment was recorded and he bought in the stock. The load appears to have been-too heavy as he has never been in easy circumstances. He has worked hard to keep things going but has been obliged to spend too much of his time on the street financing, when he should have been in the store attending to customers. Liabilities \$8,000 and assets \$6,000.

-Cornelius Millan, proprietor of the City Hotel, Kingston, who lately made an assignment to the sheriff of the county, was a member of the firm of Millan Bross, who took over the business of the City Hotel when the firm of Sloan Bross absconded. Millan Bross subsequently disagreed and Cornelius Millan continued the business. There are large claims under a chattel mortgage for rent and for city taxes. The prospects are not bright for unsecured creditors.

—A Norwood, Ont., letter states that John Baskin has gone into a railway contract with McGuire, of Ottawa, on the Ottawa and Parry Sound Railroad and closed his store.—J.S. McConkey has sold his grocery and feed business to J. W. Wason, farmer of this vicinity.—J. Finlay & Son, manufacturers of hubs, wheels, etc., are about building a large store house for carriages and implements to be exported.

...W. H. Stephenson, general store, Norwood and Havelock, Ont., is offering 50c on the dollar, 18 months secured. He has suffered from the exactions of family connections, and all the bad debts seemed to fall do him. He failed two years ago and has scarcely settled old claims. Latterly he has paid more attention to farming than store-keeping.

-G. H. Bissonnette, dry goods, Sharbot Lake and Arden, Ont., whose assignment is announced was a member of the old firm of Bowes & Bissonnette, Kingston, and became involved through the recent failure of Mr. Bowes, already referred to. Liabilities are probably \$7,000, but as member of the old firm may reach \$10,000. Assets nominally \$15,000.

-Mrs. A. Lindsay, Apsley, Ont., a small place 40 miles distant from Peterboro, in business since her husband's failure, a few

years ago, has assigned. They bought mostly in Toronto. A letter just to ham says:—The lumbering has been bad, the crops inferior and money scarce, so that an assignment is the natural result.

Henry Pepin, contractor, city, has assigned with liabilities of \$25,000. The haviest creditors are the Banque du Peuple (notes) \$4,300; W.P. Braudin, (notes) \$2,869; J. Robert & Fils, mortgage, \$6,000; Sisters of the Congregation of Ville Marie, mortgage, \$8,300; N. Desjardins, \$971; Shearer & Brown, \$870.

-Nova Scotia gold miners are calculating on a boom, owing to anticipated effect on value of gold by repeal of the Sherman silver law. They had better not be too sure. It is by no means certain that gold will be increased in value by the stoppage of silver purchasing.

-Grand Trunk Railway Company. Return o' traffic week ending July 22, 1898; Passenger train earnings, \$180,784, 1892 \$156,063; freight train earnings, \$220,762, 1892 \$242,335. Total train earnings, 1893, \$401,546; 1892, \$398,401. Increase, 1893, \$3,145.

-Too much credit and a bad season for his customers, chiefly fishermen, were the main causes of the failure of W. Geddes, Sober Island, N. S. Stock in trade, boats and fishing gear are his principal assets, which are all valued at \$2,750. The liabilities are about \$5,000.

-W.H. Fortier, mfr., of boots and shoes, Toronto, has assigned and shows liabilities of \$5,000. He has been in business 14 years, but bought his present plant from John Taylor, who failed less than a year ago. He was in too small a way to compete with larger manufacturers.

-The assets of G. G. Ewart, fancy goods and notions, Walkerton, Ont., consist of stock not in very good condition. He harely made a living. Liabilities are computed to be \$250 or \$300 and assets \$200.

-W. L. Sterns, grocer, Souris, P. E. I., is offering to settle at 35c on the dollar.—In Nova Scotia, Isaac McNaughton, mir., of harrows in a small way, has assigned.—Mrs. J. C. Beattey, millinery, Moncton, N.B., has assigned.

-A Winnipeg correspondent states that the liabilities of Jos. A. Rogers, hats and furs, are \$48,688. The total assets reach \$20,914 and of these \$18,514 are made up of stock and the balance book accounts.

Recent assignment in British Columbia, are Mdams & McEnenera, hotel, Kasko; A.G. Horn, trader, Nanaimo; J.A. Johnston, hotel, Victoria, and W.P. Sanigar, jeweller, Victoria.

which were not correctly given and were amended afterwards. I am sure you will not mind my giving you the figures of the output of gold for last year. Instead of it being five milions of dollars it was as near as possible £5,000,000, diamonds figuring almost to the same amount. The production of the latter is manipulated so that it just supplies the world's demand and I believe if, the world could take ten millions of pounds sterling worth of diamonds, they could be produced in South Africa.

could be produced in South Africa.
As regards gold the output this year will not very much exceed last, for the simple reason that most of the mines are improving their machinery and the process limits the supply, but even the output of South Africa will be ten million pounds sterling and can be increased to any extent. I believe the possible output in the near future, will be fifty millions sterling; for this reason Canada should make every effort to draw closer her trade relations with a country that requires so many of the articles we produce and will be so well able to pay for everything.

Moneyed people appear afraid to invest and parties holding stocks on margin have thought it best to sell and incur no more risk at present. Notwithstanding this general feeling, however, it is said some permanent buying has been done by local and English investors. Bank of Montreal has sold as low as 205 and the best bid price, at writing was 200, but it could not be bought at that, holders asking 208. Cable came down to 110, which is quite a drop since the year began. Pacific fairly steady. The active stocks showed a fall of 2 to 10 per cent. on the week while Cable declined 17 per cent. MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Thursday Evg., July 27, 1898.

The heavy rain storms of the past week have been largely instrumental in causing a quiet state of trade. Although considerable hay has been gathered in, it is certain that a portion of the late crop will suffer. As to the cereal crops they are

now likely to benefit more from sunshing than anything else, and it is scarcely probable that we shall have a longer succession of thunder storms. The weather now appears to be clearing and prospects have brightened. Rural storekeepers are buying sparingly and wholesale firms are not pushing out too much stock, so that the policy of caution is current all round. In some parts of Ontario the recent rains came too late to help out the growth of grain in the ear, but generally speaking the reports are encouraging. Staple goods have varied but slightly in price.

Butter and Cheese.-Business in butter is quiet as stocks continue moderate and sellers high in their views. Creamery may be quoted at 21c to 22c, Townships dairy 19c to 20c and western 17c to 18c. Cheese also firm. Pretty full prices are being paid and some of the business is doubtless speculative. A few lots of colored were bought up here for this week's steamers. Liverpool cable came lower at 45s and English reports do not encourage advanced prices. Finest Ontario colored on spot is quoted at 9 3-8c, white 9 1-8c to 1-4c. Townships 8 7-8c to 9c, French grades 8 3-4c to 9c, medium 8 1-2c to 5-8c. At Woodstock 3,523 boxes first half July were offered, 9 3-8c bid and 9 1-2c asked. No sales. Offerings at Picton 545 colored. Sales of 100 at 10 1-16c, 35 at 9 1-8c and 60 at 9 1-4c. At the Napance cheese hoard 280 white and 1,342 colored offered; 1,102 colored sold at 91-4e to 8-8e and 60 white at 91-4e. Salesmen at ungersoll claimed that dry weather had at ungersoil claimed that dry weather had reduced the make and wanted 91-2c but some sold at 91-4c. There were boarded at Belleville 1,715 white and 45 colored; 225 white sold at 91-8c, 90 at 9,3-16c, 540 at 91-4c; colored, 20 at 91-4c. Advices from Brockville state the flow of milk has not shown much reduction and the flet chewrors has freshound in the ruse. the late showers has freshened up the pastures and will bring on the after grass. on the hay fields.

ence for the cheap La Platas now offering at 26s 6d to 26s 9d c.i.f. Millers find that these wheats in working are equal to the Canadian wheats, for which more money is asked. Wheat dull at Chicago with recent business at 63 5-8c July, 63 7-8 Aug., 16 3-4 Sept., 73 1-4 Dec. The visible supply of wheat in the United States and Canada is returned at 58,903,000 bushels, against 26,068,000 a year ago. There is on passage to Britain 25,736,000 bushels, against 16,584,000 a year ago, and on

passage to the continent 12,696,000, against 6,408,000 last year. These figures go far towards explaining the depression in wheat and flour. The weakness in Chicago of late has been accentuated by the failures of United States western banks, largely interested in wheat. Recent estimates of the French what yield were higher than was thought possible. The crop of Russian wheat cannot be estimated, but rye and barley are heavy crops. Austro-Hungary will pro-



The break in the speculative sugar markets of Europe appears to be due to the financial disturbances. Canned tomatoes, which were being "boomed" in New York are easier. The new pack in Canada is likely to be large.
