## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

## ontakio

The reports which come to hand from mills throughout the province tell of more activity in the lumber business. Stocks which were sold in the early spring for first open water are now being shipped out, and Unted States dealers are buying more freely in anticipation of the duty. Manufacturers appear to be more hopeful, and are holding stock at firm prices, in the belief that the worst has been passed. In the Ottawa district shipping is quite brisk, the entire fleet of the Oltawa Transportaton Company being employed loading lumber. The Canada Atlantic Ralway also reports a steady call for cars for the timber trade. Several of the mills have commenced sawing, including those of W. C. Edwards $\&$ Co., Bronsons $\&$ Weston, Hawkesbury Lumber Cu., Oltawa Lumber Company; J. R. Booth, and the Mclaren Estate. Good lumber is constantly asked for, while there is litue demand for the common glades. Culls have been in faur request, also pine and hemlock bill umber. Of hemlock some farr sales are reported for local work. Cedar also meets whth some favor. Comparatively, hardwoods are in greater demand than pine. Sales have been made at better prices than last year, and stocks are smaller. Elm, maple and oak are the leaders, and in some sections these woods are commanding advanced prices. Wholesale dealers in Toronto report business fart, wath prospects brightening.

## qukbec asb shw brusswhe.

Preparations for shipping are now engaging the attention of the shipping houses at Montreal and Quebec, where indications give promise of a busy season. Nearly everythos. sutable for the British market has been contracted for, at prices equal to or in advance of last year's quo. tatuons. The stocks of tumber at the coves in Quebec are smail, and are given in another column. The sale of about one thousand nules of government umber homis, which is bein; held to-day at the Crown Lands Department, is atractung some atuention. A report of the result will be given in our next issuc. New Brunswick and Nowa Scoua spruce conunues in actuve demand, wid the requirement oi the British market has placed mannfacturers practically in an independent postion so far as the Unted States is enncerned. Such cargoes as have been sent to American ports have realized faur prices, the average being
about $\$ 12$, while the same stock last year sold at $\$ 10.50$. The cedar shingle wade is actuve, and large quantities of stock have been shipped from provincial mills across the border.

In the British Columbia market very litule change has taken place. The mills are busily engared on export and local orders, and in some sections it is impossible to obtan the lumber as required for building purposes. The situation as a whole presents an encouraring oullook. Weather condtuons in Manitoba and the North-west account for the depression in North-west account for the depress time. the lumber trade at the present rime.
Recent flood, hatve paralyzed business in Recent floods have paralyzed business in
some parts, but as soon as the waters subside there is certain to be a brisk demand for lumber for repars. In the chy of Winnopes more building is projected than last year.

## uniled siates

The lumber trade of the Unted States has not yet returned to normal conditions, and generally there is less busmess doing than usual at this season of the year, when the spring demand should present iselt. Deaters are somewhat backward abult making contracta, and only purchase when there is a fair prospect of chase when over the stock. The holdings by retal and wholesale dealers have become redaced to a very low point, and the season's business can only be carried on by a replenishment of heir stocks at an carly date. There is a juoyant fecling shown in the west, and agrocultural improvements are looked to as likely to consume a farr quantity of lumber. In the northern states the mills are preparing for the season's work, and to make piling room are shipping some stock in uholesale points. Wholesale dealers at Buffalo and Tonawanda have experienced somewhat of a revival of demand. espectally for white pine for shipment to the cas:. Burn boards, siding and hord thick boards are becoming searee in hick biron with the stocks which bave been held of lave. There is also a shou been held of late. There is also a shont supply of 5,4 and $2-1 n c h$ fine common. A better busmess is reported from Philadelphia and New York, and at the hatter chy spruce lumber and lath are strong. Orders are coming in ircely for hardwonds, and the requests for momediate shipment show that socks ha e been allowed to tho low Oak leads in the requirement. bun prices arc below thaye ruleng in more but prices are berous years. Birch has i, iken on new life, and several momufacturers are reported to hase made larae s.les, at far prices. Basswood, prplar and rock cim ate in moderate request.

## FORELG:

The demand in Gieat Britan for wood poods encrally contumes far, and contricting on that side durmg the past winter has been exceedingly heavy, being tully one-half greater than last year. The :mpnorary structures to be erected in emporary structures fubice celebration connection wih the Jubice celebration
have materially sumulated the demand for the lower grades of de.ds, particularly pine and spruce culls and 4 th quatity, and
busmess throughout the summer is certain to be brisk. The first-open-water stocks have all been sold, and offerings are now confined to late arrivals, but buyers do not feel disposed to contract so fa in not feel dispo. On the west coast pine and advance. On the west coast pine and
spruce are gaining ground, the number of spruce are goining ground, the number of
ingurnes increasing each week. At Hull shippers are holding out for high prices. The arrivals at the Clyde conmue light, and stocks have been freely sold. The consumption of St. Jolin spruce deals has absorbed the mport as well as reduced the saroled stock. High prices are obtainable for $7 \times 3$ in. and $8 \times 3$ in. spruce. Deals are in favor at London, especially large lir.es of $21 / 2 \times 7$.

Shippers have this year been somewhat disappointed in the South American market, which so far has been very dull. Several manufactures have considerable stock which was cut for that market on their hands, which they find difficult to dispose of. The Australian and South African markets are improving.

## canada.

A couple of American boats are loading lumber at Penetangushene, Ont.

Three large schooners are loading lumber at the mill at Chemainus, B. C., for export.

The Rathbun Company is shipping large quantues of shangles and ties from Lindsay, Ont.
Nearly $8,00,00$ feet of lumber were shipped from St. John, N. B., to British ports last week.
Alfred Dickie, of Lower Stewiake, N. S., has $10,000,000$ feet ot logs ready to be floated to his mill.

The steamer Coquet Eleared from Parrsboro, N. S., last week, for Garston, with 1,036 standards of deals.
John Kilburn, of Kingsclear. N. B., has 250 men at the headwaters of the river watug to commence stream driving.

John Carew, of Lindsay, Ont, has 20,000 preces of umber in his Gull river drive and 5,000 pieces in the Burnt river waters.

Thomas Mackay, of Outawa, is reportec to have srld to W. C. Edwards, M. P., of Rockland, a quantity of board umber valued at $\$ 10,000$.
A quantity of logs are heid at Georgian Bay poms, for whoth the owners are askirigi $\$_{11}$ per thousand feet. There is sad to be very lutle demand.

The C. Beck $\mathrm{Mig}_{\mathrm{g}}$. Co., of Penetanguishene, Ont., are shippine $2, \infty \infty, \infty \infty$ feet of hemlock and mixed grades of pme. This stock was sold some weeks apo.

The Spanish steamer Santanderino will load 31 St . John, N. B., for Liverpool. Her careo will consist of umber from Jarus Wilson and deals shipped by W. M. Muckay.

The Otawa Transportation Co., of Othawa, have an exceptionally large number of barges loaiting at the different mills at Ottawa, Hull, Hawkesbury, Calumet, ecc., for Quebec and Monireal,
and as the quantity of lumber to be moved for first open water shipment is very large, a scarcity of barges is among the probabilites.
The Calvin Co. dispatched their first raft of the season from Garden Island, Ont., on the 2oth inst. This should reach Quebec, with favorable weather, about the first week in May.
Carew \& McDonald, of Lindsay, Ont,
have shipped over 70 car loads of rock have shipped over 70 car loads of rock
elm blocks to elm blocks to the Amerian market. These blocks are used for the manufacture of harness ha ees.
The city of Winnipes invites tenders until May 5 th for supplying from, 500,000 to $1,250,000$ feet of pine lumber. Terders are in be addressed to H. Wilson, Chairman Committee on Works.
The steel barge Segun, owned by the Pary Sound Lumber Company, is loadmg a cargo of lumber at the Conger Lumber Co.'s docks at Parry Sound for Tonawanda. She will load from 900.000 to 950.000 feet.
rwo and one-half milltion feet of pine are beins supplied for the C. P. R. elevator at $O$ wen Snund by Johal Harison and Maitland, Rixon \& Co. The latter firm have in slock $3,000,000$ feet of pine. and $1,000,000$ feet each of hemlock and cedar.

"Che steamships "Eleanor" and Both these boats will load a caryo of deals and timber, the shippers being Dobell, Beckell \& Co. These will prob. ably be the first oce:in steamers to arrive in port this season.
For the week ended April 17 there cleared from St. John, N. B., for the United Stares, $1,500,000$ feet of long lumber, $5,715,060$ cedar shingles and 2,235,00 lahhs. To British ports :here were shipped $5.315,000$ teet of deals, battens and boards.
The Scott umber limits were sold at Peerboro', Ont.. last week to the Dickson Company, of that toins, for $\$ 298,200$. This company oryinglly owned the limits, which were sold a few years ayo to J . W.
Howry $\&$ Sons, who took therefrom some =owry \& Sons, who took
Io, 00,000 feet of tumber.
The Rathbun Company are this season driving all of Gilmour $\&$ Co.'s tumber on the Trent water and its tributaries to Trenton. Their men are now at work driving on Scuare river, Deer river and Beaver creek, of the Trent waters, and on the Madawaska river and its iributaries.
The Tourville Lumber Mills Company, who have large mills at both Louiseville, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, and Pierreville, on the south shore, in Quebec, have sold their 1897 cut of spruce and pine deals to Dobell, Beckett \& Co., of Quebec. These deals are usually loaded on ships and steamers at Pierreville anchorape, and are shipped direct to United Kingdom.

The different timber coves along the river fron: at Quebec are getting ready to resume operations for the season. They start spring business with stocks much below the previous year. The quantities on hand are about $2,000,000$ feet of white pine, $\$ 2,000$ feet ied pine, 637,000 fect oak, 78,000 feet ash, 124,000
feet merchantable pine and 524,00 fect feet merchantable pine and 524,000 fect spruce deals, 70,000 leet culls, $7,500,000$ feet of spruce plank and 104,000 feet of hardwood plank, besides small lots of
other woods. other woods.

purcinsed to,00,000 feet of lous from A. purcinsed $10,000,000$ feet of logs from A. A. Bigelow \& Co, of Chir igo The
imber is in Wisronsin.

Since the opening of navipation there has been shyped from Alpena, Mich., $13,061,000$ feet of lumber, 870,000 shingles and 19,600 preces of cedar.
Hemlock is in better demand at New Yoik, and some good sales are reported, including one of $1,500,000$ fect. At lloston this wood $i$ also mproving.
Estimates of the Penobscotand Kenne. bec cuts, in Mane, place their combined totals at $300,000,000$ feet. A large percentage of spruce will be required for pulp B.

Bliss \& Van Auken, of Saginaw, Mich., will shortly commence lumbermg operarons in the vicintly of Vienna, Mich. which, when completed, will clean up heir pine in that district.
It is reported that Messrs. Swan Bros., wholesale lumber de.lers, who will handle the cut of lumber maile at Fenelon Falls under the name of the Bank of Toronto, have decided to locate at Tonawanda.
At Saginaw, Mich., log run is held at $\$ 14$ and upwards, box at $\$ 8.50$ to $\$ 9$, and bill stuf at $\$ 810 \$ 9$. White pine shingles are quoted at $\$ 1.50$ to $\$ 2.50$, with cedar 20 cents below. The shingle output on the Saginaw ruver is likely to be less than
last season. last season.
At Minnefpolis, Minn., 12 -inch No. 3 and 10 -inch No. 212 -foot stuff are in short supply. Very litile dimension is obtainable, and shingles are scarce, both pine and cedar. Pacific coast shingles are now selling at $\$ 1.85$. First and second basswood sells at $\$ 15$ to $\$ 17$, shipping culls, $\$ 7$ to $\$ 8$; box-boards, 12 -inch and up, are worth \$io to \$20.
A laree sale of lumber was recenily effected in Marnette, Wis. The II. Nitbeck Company sold to Perley, Low \& Co., of Chicago, the season's cut of white pine, amounting ic $35,000,000$ feet. This stock has in former years been handled by Holland, Graves \& Montgomery, of Buffalo. The constderation is given as $\$ 400,000$, and it is intended to cut the lumber for the eastern market.

## THE COOPERAGE STOCK MARKET.

The Sutherland, Innes Co., Chatham, Onn, write as follows regarding the condutuon of the cooperage stock market :
It is a long time snce the cooperage stock market was in such good condition as it is at the present ; the demand is far in excess of the supply for all classes of gooils, and it is only a question now of coopernge stock manufacturers hustling to gel our all the stock they can so as o be able to fill the orders which are pouring into them by every mail.
