GENERAL CABLE NEWS. Paris, Dec. 29.—The Duke of Orleans has written a letter stating that, knowing the French Republic is engaged in diplomatic negotiations of a delicate nature, he does not wish to excite international discussion by his public statements.

Twenty Men Drowned. Santander, Dec. 28.—The Spanish steamer Carranza, Capt. Martinez, was wrecked in the Bay of Biscay off this point. She carried a crew of 22 men, 20 of whom were drowned.

Philippine Rebellion Spreading. Madrid, Dec. 29.—A despatch from Manila, the capital of the Philippines, says the rising of the natives has extended to the Province of Bulacan, in the north-westerly direction from Manila, and a large number of rebels have been arrested.

Special Mining Instruction. A special course for prospectors and miners will begin at the School of Practical Science on Jan. 11. The instruction will be thorough and of great benefit to those who wish to practically follow the vocation of mining and prospecting.

DEATH OF ADMIRAL MILNE. One of Britain's Senior Naval Officers Passes Away.

HE WAS NINETY YEARS OLD And Had Been Engaged in Many Branches of Service.

He was in Command of the North American Squadron when the Prince of Wales visited Halifax in 1866—Was Commended by the Admiralty for Services Rendered During the American Civil War—Gladiators is 87 Years of Age—General Cable News.

London, Dec. 29.—The death is announced to-day of Admiral of the Fleet, Sir Alexander Milne, S. Bart., G.C.B., and K.C.B. (civil), F.R.S.E. Admiral Sir Alexander Milne was born in 1806 and first entered the service in 1827, was actively employed as lieutenant-commander and captain on the Brazil, Home and North American and West Indian stations, promoted to commander in 1836, and captain in 1839; was flag captain of the "Crane" in 1842, and in 1844 he commanded the Caledonia, and was employed at Tangier, the coast of Portugal, and as flag captain to Admiral Bowles in Ireland; was also flag captain to Sir Charles Napier in the Channel Squadron. In 1847 he was appointed a Junior Fourth-rate, and in 1848 served with successive governments until 1854, during which period he was Superintendent of the great store victualling and transport departments and (1855), after the Crimean War was created a C.C.B. (civil) and was instrumental in introducing many important measures for the benefit of the service. Sir Alexander was again appointed to the Admiralty as the Senior Naval Lord in 1868-69, and as a subsequent period in 1872-73, when he retired, having served with nine First Lords of the Admiralty, and was then created a Baron.

In 1869 he was appointed to the North American and West Indian Command, with the temporary rank of vice-admiral and received H.R.H. the Prince of Wales at Halifax. At the termination of his command he received the approval of the Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty, and his command was extended for a period of one year. Sir Alexander was the only admiral on the station who had ever officially visited any ports of the United States since the war of 1812, he arrived in New York in October, 1863, at the time of the Civil War, and his visit, as expressed by Lord Lyons, Sir Alexander's Minister at Washington, to the Foreign Office, appeared to have proved satisfactory. On his return to England he received the commendations of the Admiralty.

In 1869 Sir Alexander was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean station, with his flag in the "Princess of Wales," and he was present at the opening of the Suez Canal by the Empress Eugenie in November. He visited various ports of the Mediterranean, and in August, 1870, assumed command of the combined Mediterranean and Channel Squadrons at Gibraltar, for exercise on the coast of Portugal. In September he returned to England and struck his flag, receiving the approval of the Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty for the able manner in which he had performed his duties in the Mediterranean, with silver medals of merit-of-war. Sir Alexander was a magistrate for Berkshire. He was married in 1850 Euphemia, daughter of the late Archibald Cochran of Ashkirk.

GLADIATORS IS 87. The Grand Old Man of England Passes Another Milestone. London, Dec. 29.—Mr. Gladstone celebrated his 87th birthday at Hawarden to-day, surrounded by a family. There was the usual demonstration by the villagers in honor of the occasion, consisting of the firing of the church bells and the assignment of deputations to proceed to the castle and congratulate the venerable statesman. Throughout the day there was an enormous flow of congratulatory messages into the castle from all parts of the United Kingdom, the United States and the Continent.

IRISH TAXATION. A Protest to be Submitted Against the Excise on Beer. Dublin, Dec. 29.—A meeting was held at the Mansion House to-day for the purpose of formulating a protest to be submitted to Parliament against the excessive share of taxation which Ireland is compelled to bear toward the total contribution to the United Kingdom.

DOCTORS IN NO HURRY. Thomas Sloan, a Driver of a Coal Cart, Dies Suddenly on the Esplanade. Thomas Sloan, 27 King-street, driver for Robert O'Connell, dealer, 54 Edward-street, was taken suddenly ill at Conger's wharf yesterday and died shortly afterwards. His cart had just been loaded, and he was about to start on his way to the wharf. Medical aid was summoned, and notwithstanding the best possible care before the doctors arrived. The body was taken to the morgue, where an inquest will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon by Coroner Sloan.

FURTHER FIGHTING IN CUBA Spanish Forces Attacked by Rebels With Great Fierceness.

A Personal Friend of President Cleveland Arrested as a Political Spy—Cuban Forces Concentrating in Santa Clara Province—The Three Friends Filibusters Landed on a Desolate Island, Where They are Not Any Too Comfortable.

New York, Dec. 29.—The Herald's Washington correspondent says it is rumored an important despatch has been received at the Spanish Legation from Santa Canova, the Spanish Premier, in which certain propositions are made looking to the mediation of the Cuban difficulties.

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Dr. Gaspar Eizenbaum, a well-known Havana dentist, an American citizen and a personal friend of President Cleveland, was arrested yesterday as a political suspect. Consul-General Lee has taken up his case.

Official confirmation is given to the report that the rebel leader, Juan Rus, is dead.

It is reported that Salvador Rios, another rebel leader, has been seriously wounded.

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Filibusters in Hard Luck. New York, Dec. 29.—The Herald says the 50 filibusters who started for Cuba on the steamer are, according to advice received yesterday by the Junta, smoking cigarettes on a desolate lake of the Florida coast. The filibuster steamer, as graphically stated by the staff correspondents, who were on hand, lost no time, after her engagement with the Spanish gunboats, in leaving the Spanish main. She put the men and her cargo ashore on a barren island, which does not show on an ordinary map.

The Three Friends, an ocean tug, returned from an extended expedition after shells and sponges a few days ago, and the United States officials at Key West seized her for violation of the customs laws in that she had taken out no clearance papers. The Three Friends was taken to Jacksonville Sunday in charge of a customs officer.

Meanwhile it fares uncomfortably for those men on the remote and lonely key. The expedition is a failure. It is only a question of a few days when the filibusters will disperse to their homes. Certain it is that they are very cheaply in any junk dealer who may have him in view.

The Junta here feels thoroughly discouraged at the result of an expedition which they had hoped would contribute much to the success of the Cuban cause.

A WONDER IN SURGERY.

By Means of the X Rays a Penny Was Recovered From a Child's Intestine. Rochester, Dec. 29.—At the laboratory of Dr. Rudolph Schmidt of this city, today, Dr. Frederick W. Zimmer performed the startling operation of removing a penny which had lodged for its full term in the port of the oesophagus of a child by the application of the Roentgen rays.

The matter of the child was laid out on an operating table, and the operator, above the child noted the approach of the metallic foreign body. This was done by the physician's movements. The means the surgeon succeeded in removing the coin safely. The patient will recover. This is the first time the kind of record, and interests local surgeons intensely.

The Late George E. Brown.

The membership of Independent Forestry throughout the world will learn with deep regret the demise on Monday evening of the late Mr. George E. Brown, Chief Forester at the head office of that order in this city, being 111 years of age. The deceased came direct to Toronto seven years ago from Maidenhead, Eng., and was engaged ever since at the supreme office of the Independent Foresters. Mr. Brown was a general favorite, of genial disposition, being respected by all with whom he came in contact, and his friendly presence will be missed from the annual gatherings of the High Court of Ontario as well as at the sessions of the Supreme Court. The deceased was a member of the Masonic fraternity, which, with the Foresters, will be represented at his funeral, at 2 o'clock, this afternoon, from his late residence, 125 North Bond-street. A widow, two sons, who live at home, and one daughter, Mrs. Wilson of Roseland, R.C., are left to mourn his loss.
