NINETEENTH YEAR

THE BOMBARDMENT OF SANTIAGO HAS BEGUN

Cannonade Commenced on Sunday at 4 p. m.—Reinforcements for Shafter's Army Have Reached the Seat of War.

The Liberal newspapers at Madrid say the Cabinet is considering the signing of a ten days' armistice to facilitate the peace negotiations. It is understood that Washington has offered to capitulate upon conditions which have not been accepted.

THE BATTLE BEGUN.

Shafter's Artillery and Sampson's Great Guns Are Pouring Destruction Into Santiago. The Journal's special says the bombardment of Santiago by the artillery of General Shafter and the great guns of Sampson's fleet began shortly after noon to-day.

A Siboney special to The Journal says: Refugees from Santiago report Spanish soldiers busy digging trenches and erecting barbed wire in the streets, and piercing houses with loopholes, indicating an intention to die hard, and make a house to house and street to street fight.

Shafter for Military Governor. New York, July 10.—(Special)—A Washington despatch to The Journal says the statement telegraphed from the front that the Cubans had selected Col. Castillo, of Garcia's army, as Governor of Santiago.

LATEST WAR BULLETINS.

Shafter Began the Attack on Santiago Yesterday Afternoon—Reinforcements Have Arrived. Washington, July 10.—(6 p.m.)—The War Department has just been informed that the bombardment of Santiago has begun.

Shafter's Total Loss 1503.

"Playa del Este, Camp near Santiago, July 8. Adjutant-General, Washington: "Complete report received to-day of loss on July 1 and 2. Killed, 22 officers, 208 enlisted men. Wounded, 51 officers, 1233 men. Missing 70 enlisted men. The reports giving the names of the killed and wounded are being rapidly prepared and it is hoped to get them in to-morrow."

The Enemy Opened Fire. Washington, July 11.—Shortly after midnight the department gave the following despatch from Gen. Shafter: "Playa del Este, July 10, Adj.-Gen., Washington: Headquarters, Fifth Corps, July 10.—Enemy opened fire a few minutes past 4 with light guns, which were soon silenced by ours. Very little musketry firing and the enemy kept entirely in their entrenchments. Three men slightly wounded. We have considerable forces to-morrow, enough to completely block all the roads on the northwest. I am quite well. Shafter."

THE TORONTO-SUDBURY LINE.

Surveyor Lumsden Says It Looks Very Much as if the Road Will Be Built—Western American Farmers and the Klondike—Woodsen-Legged Man Arrested and Released—Montreal News.

Montreal, July 10.—(Special)—"It looks very much as if the road would now be built," was the remark made to-day to The World correspondent by Mr. H. U. Lumsden, who has for the last few months been in charge of Canadian Pacific surveying parties between Toronto and Sudbury. Mr. Lumsden states that a very good line has been secured, and that the engineering difficulties will not be at all heavy.

Mr. W. J. McGuire of the Quebec Mercury, has returned here from a trip to Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, and has a remarkable story to tell of the Northwestern States. Hundreds of people mortgaged their farms for sums varying from \$500 to \$1000, and leaving their families to get along the best way possible, they started for the north. A year has now passed and little has been heard from the bread-winners. In many places whose sections are deserted in this manner, the women can hold out no longer, they are allowing their farms to go and coming east to battle for themselves.

SOME PRETTY SHARP COMMENTS

Manchester Guardian Points out a Few Things in Regard to the Seizure of Hawaii—Pope Very Ill—Some Cable News.

London, July 10.—The Manchester Guardian says: "One can imagine the way in which Washington or Franklin would have regarded the series of actions concerning the seizure of Hawaii, by an act of the United States Government, with a population of 100,000 persons of a government in which only 3000 had a share and the transfer of the islands and people, like a farm, with the stock and cattle, from the hands of the Hawaiian monarch, to an oligarchy, which seized them. The foreign government that acted in this manner, rather than apostrophe compassion for its parents, who cling to the highest ideals, does not deserve Washington or Franklin, but makes great allowance for them, and is persuaded as firmly as any Englishman, or Frenchman, or German, that he intends to do about doing good to any people whose land comes in his way and has not yet been appropriated by other philanthropists."

HIS HOLINESS IS ILL.

So Serious That a Fatal Termination May Come at Any Time—Weakness of the Heart. New York, July 10.—A London special to The Sun says: "The Pope's health has been confidentially advised that the Spanish forces should be unopposed and go in any direction they wished with arms and flying colors. The letter concluded with the bold statement that the Spaniards would not be considered."

CAPT. CLARK'S REPORT.

A Graphic Description by the Commandant of the Oregon of the Naval Victory. Of Guantanamo, Saturday morning, July 9, per Associated Press despatch took Wanda, via Port Antonio and Kingston, July 10.—Capt. Clark of the United States battleship Oregon, which took part in the destruction of Admiral Cervera's squadron, says in his official report of the engagement to Rear Admiral Sampson: "The Spanish fleet turned to the westward and opened fire, to which our guns responded vigorously. For a short time there was an almost continued flight of projectiles over the ship, but when our line was fairly engaged the enemy's fire became defective. As soon as it was evident that the enemy's ships were trying to break through and escape to the westward we determined on carrying out to the utmost your instructions: 'If the enemy tries to escape the ships must close and engage them as soon as possible and endeavor to sink them or force them to run ashore.' We soon placed all our vessels, except the Brooklyn. At first we used only the main battery, but when it was discovered that the enemy's torpedo boats were following the ships, we used our rapid fire guns as well as our six-inch guns upon them with telling effect."

BRITISH STEAMER ASHORE.

Two Million Dollars Is the Value of Ore Shipped From Rosland in Six Months—Shipments of Goods for Last Week. Rosland, B.C., July 10.—(Special)—Following is a statement of ore shipments for the week: War Eagle, 1005 tons; Centre Star, 100; Iron Mask, 90; Monte Orioso, 75; Sunset No. 2, 15. Total for the first six months of 1898, 40,706 tons. Estimated value, \$2,000,000. This total would have been largely increased had Le Roi not discontinued shipments. A. R. M.

BRITISH COLUMBIA GENERAL ELECTIONS.

Very Incomplete Returns of Saturday's Voting—"Fighting Joe" Martin and His Whole Ticket Elected in Vancouver—No Government Possible.

The British Columbia elections took place on Saturday and from the very incomplete reports received it is impossible to state definitely which party in Vancouver, with three Opposition colleagues. The city of Victoria has returned Premier Turner, Messrs. Holmcken and Hall for the Government, and Mr. Gregory, Opposition. Westminster elects one Government supporter and Natimmo one Opposition. In Esquimalt the result is not yet known and in North Yale, Dean, Opposition, is elected. Rosland returns Martin, an Oppositionist, while South Victoria has elected Mr. Eberst, a Government supporter. From the latest accounts it appears that neither party has secured an electric tramway from Daney, two miles from Verner, to the waters of Lake Triana, a distance of 28 miles. This lake is surrounded by fertile land and is to be drained. Father Paradis states that the water power is all that can be desired and he hopes that with a little aid from the Ontario Government the road can be completed in the near future.

SEVERAL BIG FIRES.

Pittsburg, Chicago, St. Joseph and Philadelphia Suffer Considerable Loss. Pittsburg, Pa., July 10.—Fire to-night, which originated in a stable in the rear of the World's Theatre on Federal-street, Allegheny, destroyed the theatre, and from there rapidly communicated to adjoining buildings. The Boyle Block was soon in ruins, entailing a loss of \$175,000. The insurance will probably reach two-thirds of the loss. Chicago, July 10.—Fire destroyed the plant of the Western Starch Manufacturers' Association at West Hammond to-day. The buildings covered 17 acres of ground and had a capacity of 100,000 pounds of starch a day. Loss, \$250,000; well insured. One Life Lost at St. Joe. St. Joseph, Mo., July 10.—The Hotel St. Joseph was destroyed by fire this morning. Of the 40 guests and employes in the building, all escaped except I. B. Benson of Logansport, Indiana, who lost his life while trying to save office books. Loss, \$100,000.

WAPANESE BANK ROBBERY.

The Mystery May Now Be Cleared Up—French-Canadian Woman Arrested by Pinkertons. Montreal, July 10.—(Special)—The Dominion Bank robbery at Nanaimo may now be cleared up. The other day the Pinkerton agency made an important capture at St. Thomas de Montagny, which will probably bring about the solution of this mystery. Three weeks since the Pinkertons were informed that a good many of the stolen Dominion Bank notes were being circulated in Montreal, and, after some time, one of the agency's men succeeded in getting a description of the person who was passing these notes in circulation. This party was a French-Canadian woman born in Montreal, but who had lived in the States for a number of years. When the woman was taken the detectives were on her tracks and she left the city, but was followed as far as St. Thomas de Montagny, where she was arrested and brought back to this city. So far her name has not been divulged.

RULES OF PRACTICE.

Barriester Wicketed of Ottawa Ad-dresses a Letter of Grievance to Sir Oliver and Judge Ross. Ottawa, Ont., July 10.—R. Wicketed, barrister, has addressed a lengthy communication to Sir Oliver and Judge Ross, Governor and to the Hon. J. E. Ross, Justice of the High Court, respecting decisions in the codes of England, United States and the Province of Quebec. The gentlemen to whom the communication has been addressed are singled out as being commissioners for consolidation of the rules of practice of the Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario, and will probably be so again, or have a voice in the selection of commissioners.

Two Million Dollars.

Canadian Championships Great Tennis Tournament at Niagara. Tournament week at Niagara-on-the-Lake is one of the most enjoyable of the Queen's Royal season. The Canadian tennis championships begin to-morrow (Tuesday) afternoon with a large attendance of leading players. On Wednesday evening there will be a large concert and dance, on Thursday evening an Anglo-American cotillon, on Friday evening a tennis smoking concert, and on Saturday a presentation of prizes and tournament ball special excursion tickets will be issued by the Niagara Navigation Company.

Sunday Ball and Rowing.

Buffalo, July 10.—As a result of instructions issued by Sheriff Kilgallon to-day, Sunday ball given in Erie County to-day, while endeavoring to stop a dance, following a ball given in the suburban town of Cheektowaga to-night, Deputies Kaiser and Miller were set upon and vanquished by the participants. Kaiser was thrown from a window and his leg broken, and Miller was jumped upon and internally injured.

THE COUNCIL OF PHYSICIANS

Talked About Their Finances at Their Saturday Session.

The Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons met again Saturday morning and continued all day in session, with a short meeting at night. The opening exercise in the morning was the forming of the Executive Committee, composed of Drs. Luton, Moore and Foster. An objection was taken against President Luton being included, but the motion of Dr. Rogers carried.

Dr. Hanley called the proceedings of the Discipline Committee to be covered, and announced that the motion was carried by a majority of one. The motion was intended more as a warning to medical men to beware of lapsing into unprofessional conduct.

Dr. Sangster's Motion that has been so much discussed, which was that the motion of Dr. Sangster should be carried, and so approved. The resolution provides that educational bodies which do not teach medical science should be entitled to further representation on the council, and that legislation to that effect be procured as early as possible.

Dr. Sangster said he had no wish to offend Dr. Gellie, Thorburn and Fowler, and to have the question settled once for all, and he thought it was the duty of the council to do this. The resolution was carried by a majority of 10 to 7.

Former arguments, which have been extensively referred to, were repeated. Dean Gellie pointed out that as the Legislature provided for the seats of those against whom "action was aimed," the council could do nothing. "A miserable rump of institutions were left over," he said.
