ations, which have become notorious of late. The means employed by these parties were fraudulent and cruel in the extreme, the exigencies of the case, in this particular at least, demanded a law that would bring swift and certain punishment down on the offenders. The bill was not brought down until late in the session, and met its death at the hands of the famous One Minister and Government.

"I think it but common justice, however, to state that I am convinced of the sincerity of purpose of Sir William Mulock in this matter, and his sympathy with labor in his work as minister of labor. One swallow does not make a summer, neither does one minister constitute a government. We have received assurances from some of these gentlemen that have been totally ignored, a sad commentary upon the character of some of our men in public life.

"The government has declared that the fair wage clause will not apply to those industries bonded or assisted by them. The manufacturing interests are protected by increase of the tariff, which is placed upon the free list; not only so, but a bonus or bounty of \$2 to \$3 per bushel per head by the government for labor to come to this country to compete against work done by some of our men in public life is not calculated to inspire confidence in a policy that protects the interests of the laborer, and has to enter in the struggle against the low-priced labor from continental Europe.

"The question of international relations between the labor bodies as dealt with by President Combs at Boston has gone into fairly, and also affairs in Great Britain as from the report of the committee of the general federation of trades unions, especially as touching on the labor issue in South Africa.

"Trades unions undoubtedly should have the same right to do collective bargaining as has any other form of corporation," says President Flett's report. "One of the alleged complaints of the laborer is that his unions at times violate their agreements. While this may be true in some instances, the organizations not claiming perfection, we venture to assert without agreement entered into by labor organizations and their employers are as free, if not more so, from breach of contract as those of any other nature in the community, and labor unions are becoming more conservative in their methods of doing business. In view of what has been stated I would urge upon our people everywhere to be more careful in their agreements or contracts as binding upon their honor and to be lived up to religiously. I recognize it as the duty of every citizen to observe the law, and to demand necessary condition for all employment contracts, and that all employment contracts should be subject to regulation and discipline by the organizations entering into the agreements of contracts of employment.

"The value of women's union leagues in aiding in creating a favorable sentiment is strongly urged as is also the importance of a fair discussion of law to protect workers engaged upon large construction works and quarries and contractors to examine machinery and regarding of explosives will be discussed.

GOVT. TO INVESTIGATE FENDERS.

Engineer Fairbairn Instructed to Inspect and Test New Cars.

Hon. Mr. Latchford on Saturday notified the city authorities that Government Engineer Fairbairn would investigate thoroughly the condition of the fenders in use by the Toronto Street Railway Company.

"If he finds that many of them are in need of repair, it will probably lead him to the conclusion that the fender, though good in itself, is not a good fender, or that the company have been negligent in keeping it up to the standard of safety."

"Mr. Fairbairn will be pleased at any time to give evidence before the committee at his disposal that will permit, the testing of all fenders that may be submitted to him."

Mr. Latchford, however, points out that there is no responsibility whatever on the part of the government in the condition in which the fenders are represented to be. Three years ago the fenders were of a different design, and the cars were of a very crude design, and numerous complaints were made of their inefficiency. Proposals were made to the government that some action should be taken to improve the company to provide a better fender. The act of 1901 was in consequence of such representation passed.
