



Suggestions As To House Papering

(By Beatrice Carey)

After the spring house cleaning has been done, furniture recovered and other renovations made, it will probably be found necessary to repaper some of the rooms in the house, unless it happens to be a very modern one, which has recently been decorated and fitted out.

Plain ingrain papers, for instance, are very desirable for a dining-room, and the two-toned striped or figured papers are also to be recommended.

When to clean the teeth. If the teeth are to get but one thorough cleaning during the day, just before retiring is the best time to give it to them, as there are six to eight hours during sleep that the salivary glands are inactive, and fatty and starchy food, that may be lodged between and around the teeth are not bathed in saliva—a partial digestive fluid—undergo decomposition, forming acids which act more or less readily on the tooth structure at the time of its formation.

In Strawberry Time

Perhaps after all the best way to serve strawberries is the simplest way, that is, hulled and served with a little sugar, and when the berries are very large and fine, the hulls may be left on and the sides of the fruit, first being dipped into a little powdered sugar, which is served in a little mousseline.

Jellied Strawberries—Bury a large mold in cracked ice and salt to within an inch of the top. Wash, drain and hull one quart of ripe strawberries, and with a small silver fork dip each one in a little gelatine that has been dissolved in water.

Strawberries in Custard—Make a rich, boiled custard with six beaten eggs (omitting the whites of two), one small cupful of granulated sugar, a pinch of salt, one quart of rich milk and half a cupful of chopped blanched almonds.


At Easter it is, of course, desirable to wear something new. If one cannot afford a complete new outfit from head to heels, one can at least wear a new tie for luck at Easter.



INTERESTING SITUATION. That liquor is sold during prohibited hours is no news to the license commissioners and inspectors. They were not ignorant of the fact. For years there has been an understanding that the hotels need not live up to the strict letter of the law.

RATHER UNCALLED FOR. Mr. Recorder Skinner, before the license commissioners on Saturday, deemed it unnecessary in the interests of an applicant for a liquor license, to intimate that the Every Day Club is not a well conducted institution.

THE MILITARY SPENDTHRIFT. (Montreal Gazette.) Those who have learned with amazement, that Canada is spending more than \$2,000,000 a year on the militia, a service which ten years ago cost less than a third of that amount, will also be interested in the fact that this sum mentioned does not represent the whole of the outlay.

For the reorganization of the navy and the purchase of new ships and guns various nations actively competed, and the report states that the orders will probably be divided between representatives from Great Britain, Germany, and Japan.





"MERRY WIDOW" HATS ALMOST CAUSED RIOT IN U.S. SENATE

They Obstructed the View and Lively Scenes Ensued—Gamblers Leave Washington, Perhaps For Ever

(From our Regular Correspondent.) Washington, D. C., April 18.—The political-entertainment of this week has been Senator Foraker's argument for his bill re-instating all the negro soldiers dismissed by the president on account of the Brownsville outrage. Senator Foraker knew that there was no chance for his bill. He and Senator Bulwacker of Connecticut were the only senators in the committee in favor of it. It was voted down in the committee by a majority of the republican members, and with the democrats, overwhelmingly defeated. It furnished the Ohio senator a theme for brilliant oratory and for the best argument that could possibly be made for such a cause. It was of course an appeal to the colored vote throughout the country, and Senator Foraker is now emphatically in his own opinion and in the opinion of the ignorant colored brother, the political leader of the race, as well as Charles Sumner and Theodore Stevens forty-five years ago. He spoke for three hours and had the closest attention from a full senate on the floor and from crowded galleries. The senate encouraged members of congress, and their friends, to bring their own chairs and to crowd that part of the gallery set apart for them, and the "Merry Widow" hats formed a brilliant background of color against the wall up to the ceiling of the senate chamber. All but those occupying the front seats were shut off by the pyramidal effect of these spring connections and there was at one time an incident riot among the fair ladies. Those in front were requested to remove the military obstructions to vision, but declining, language, more forcible than polite, was interchanged between the fair west on the front seats and those sitting where they could neither see nor be seen in the rear. One gallery, doubtless by prearrangement, was reserved for colored people. Mrs. Humphrey Ward the author of "Robert Elsmere" doubtless looked on color outraging any of her productions. If she understood it all, or whether she did or not there will probably be a rejoinder of it in her next novel. The Senatorial Democratic Campaign Committee is in session today, considering the Foraker incident in connection with the Brownsville incident in its entirety with a view to making it figure in the coming presidential campaign. If first deliberation and study it shall appear to be available. The president has sent another message to congress, in which he pleads almost despairingly for four battleships instead of the two which is the largest number congress appears to be disposed to appropriate for. The president's belief in sea power is well known, and since we have that perilous and imperiled outpost in the Orient it appears to be almost indispensable that we shall strengthen our navy and then strengthen it more by Dewey's expedition to Manila Bay, but that is another story. We have the land and we are afraid or ashamed to let them go. Therefore we must build ships to defend them. Perhaps somebody sometimes will benefit by our supineness, but when and where and how no man knoweth. Congressman Burton who appears to be the coming statesman in Ohio, if not in the west, although a personal and political friend of the president is opposed to his naval programme, and is most logical and persuasive in his opposition. It is most probable that the president will not get what he wants or much of anything that he has recently recommended. But little more than ten months of power remain to him. His local popularity among politicians on Capitol Hill, and in Washington is at its lowest ebb. All hopes and fears are centered in his successor. If he were to announce tomorrow that he would run for another term, he could get anything he wanted from a congress every member of which knows the recent less strength of Roosevelt in his state or district. While writing I learn of the defeat of the four ships appropriation in the house. President Roosevelt is gleeful over the steady rise of Taft and is not lamenting the eclipse of Hughes and the possible support that other favorite sons are receiving in Indiana, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Illinois.
