Many friends along the North Shore and in this city will hear with regret of Mrs. Williston's death.

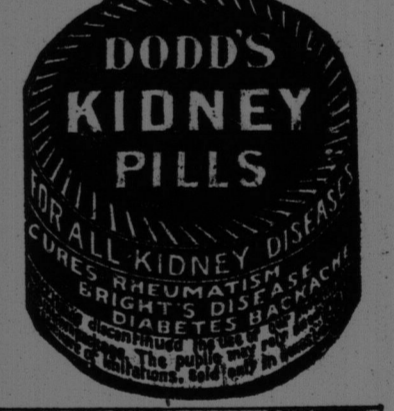
Barton W. Ward

HERE'S A ROAST FOR SIR WILFRID

Government Charged With Gross Neglect in Regard to P. E. Island Life Saving Stations.

(Charlottetown Guardian, Ind.) The plain facts with regard to life-saving stations are that down to date the one province of the dominion that is wholly surrounded by the sea and with an exposed and dangerous coast has no life-saving stations of all this is the case as it stands thirty-four years after the official promise was made that three would be provided.

Later the money was voted for three stations, and during an official visit here, in the present season in reply to an inquiry by Mr. Tidmarsh, president of the board of trade, the deputy minister of marine gave the assurance that these stations would be provided. Now on the near approach of the stormy season, when anxious inquiries are made as to what is being done, or to be done, Mr. Lord is in receipt of a letter from deputy minister of marine stating that a tender has been accepted and directions given for the construction of one life boat for Charlottetown.

That is all, except that Mr. Lord "pre-empted" that in the near future he may receive instructions for the construction of buildings to house the life-saving apparatus at the points approved of. In other words we are about as ready for the most awful emergencies of sea-faring life as was the man whose house was on fire on the roof, and went to a neighbor's house to borrow the tools with which to construct a ladder.

A life boat is to be built for Charlottetown, the least exposed of all the stations where apparatus is called for. It is the north shore and the northwest coast from West Cape to North Cape that feels the force and danger of the October and November storms. Still, if we get the life boat here, whether with or without a house to shelter it, we shall be as far forward as we were last year when the Mint's life-boat was available to be sent away by rail--always assuming that some generous and humane private citizen will again pay the \$80 charge out of his own pocket!

Other provinces have life-saving stations well equipped and ready. Prince Edward Island is still waiting for these and other things. Some more brave seamen may be drowned while we wait still, like the Japanese, who attribute all their blessings to the supreme virtue of the Mikado, we have this consolation of which the party journals plentifully re-

mind us, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is great and good. It requires a great deal of goodness and grace, however, to atone for inefficiency, neglect and inhumanity such as have been forced upon us in our winter service and the want of a life-saving service.

(With respect to the letter of Mr. A. Lord, agent of Marine and Fisheries here, regarding our editorial on life saving stations, we may state that the matter is not yet quite satisfactory. According to this letter it is evident that only one life saving station is to be established and equipped, and that is Charlottetown. We distinctly recollect that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, promised three stations in Prince Edward Island, and the places mentioned in our previous article. The Charlottetown Board of Trade asked for four stations, but only three were granted, and no doubt these would be amply sufficient for this province.

The places were stations are most needed are the two extreme ends of the Island, namely--Souris and Digby. If there is to be only one built, then it would be more desirable to place it near the east end of the Island. Anyway the Patriot has done its duty. It has warned both the department and the local office regarding the sending in of a life-saving station, and urged the necessity of having them erected this fall. The stormy season is about upon us, and should any unnecessary delay in this matter be responsible for loss of life, we should not like to vouch for the temper of our people.

No less than five false alarms were rung in during the firemen's tournament, and three were sent in last night, thus causing the department much inconvenience and frightening a great many people. The police suspect that an outside fireman is to blame for the sending in of alarms. Centenary church, which for some time has been in the hands of painters and decorators, will, on Sunday next, be opened to the congregation for the first time this season. Rev. Dr. Spragg will preach at both services. The old gas fixtures have been removed and electric lights installed. The roof and walls have been repaired and stained and new coverings will likely be put on the aisle floors.

The cars and their occupants were white with dust, but the autoists were enthusiastic over their trip, which thus far has been attended with excellent weather and good roads.

The itinerary of the trip is as follows: Saturday, St. John to St. Stephen, 66 miles; Sunday, St. Stephen to Bangor, 46 miles; Monday, Bangor to Rockland, 63 miles; Tuesday, Rockland to Brunswick, 69 miles; Wednesday, Brunswick to Portland, 79 miles; Thursday, Portland to Boston, 101 miles. The return to St. John will be by steamer from Boston.

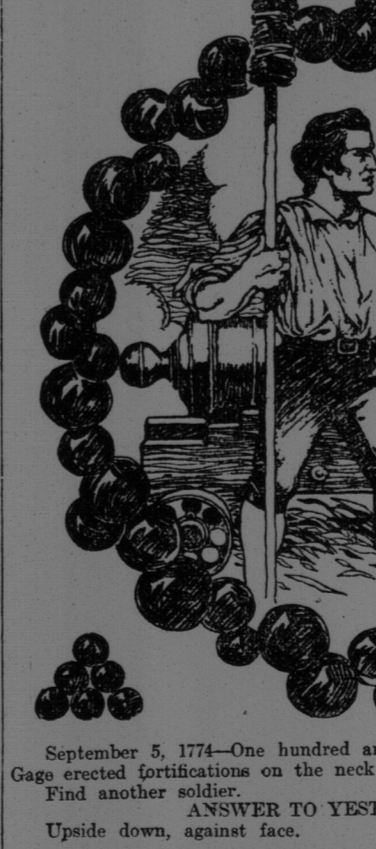

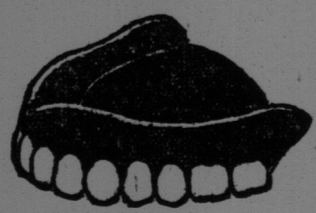
