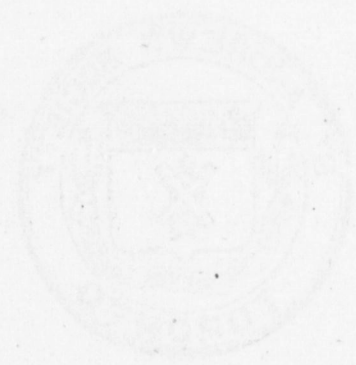

Secretary's Report.

The regular meetings of the Society, four in number, have been well attended. At the February meeting, a resolution was passed testifying to the loyalty and devotion of the members of the Society to Her Majesty's Government, and ordering the payment of the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars to the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

The death of His Grace the Duke of Argyle, for sixty years an honorary member of the Society, called forth at the May meeting an expression of deep regret, and an appropriate resolution was engrossed, signed and forwarded to Inverary Castle.

The Society has also to deplore the loss of its late President, Lieut.-Col. Cosby ; of William Christie, one of its most generous supporters, and Alexander Cromar, T. M. Burnside, Alexander Gemmell, William Grindly, J. F. Kirk, John Laidlaw, Duncan McIntosh, Campbell Mackenzie, George S. Morrice, Thomas Armstrong.

At the October meeting His Grace the Duke of Argyle was elected an honorary member, and at the same meeting Mr. William Thomson, who for fifty years had been a resident member in good standing, was also elected an honorary member of the Society.

The proprietors of *The Weekly Scotsman*, Edinburgh, and William Ramsay, Esq., of Bowlands, have again favored the Society with boxes of heather from Scottish hills, for which the thanks of the Society are due.

The total number of members on the roll, as amended, is two hundred and seventy-six.

The Ball

(Condensed from THE TORONTO GLOBE)

THE St. Andrew's Ball, which was held in the Pavilion last night, was the most successful assembly ever held by the great Scottish organization which has so many triumphs to its credit. The presence of their Excellencies The Governor-General of Canada and the Countess of Minto lent additional interest to an event which is ever an enjoyable reunion of our citizens. The attendance was very large, seven hundred and thirty persons being present. Their Excellencies arrived a little before ten o'clock. They were received by a guard of honor of one hundred picked men from the 48th Highlanders under the command of Captain Catto. The President presented Lady Minto with a bouquet of lilies of the valley and violets, and Miss Mowat with a bouquet of pink roses. Lady Minto was also presented by Mr. Alderman George McMurrich, on behalf of the Parks and Gardens Department of the city, with a splendid bouquet of orchids cut from the Exhibition premises.

The scene in the Pavilion after the ball began was one of great splendor. Never were there more beautiful gowns, more brilliant uniforms or a more distinguished assemblage at St. Andrew's ball. The decorations were in perfect harmony, and made a magnificent stage setting for the moving panorama. The great building was transformed into a large, brightly-colored

pavilion, with the dingy walls completely hidden from view. In keeping with the events of the year, khaki divided the honors with red and white in the decorations throughout. The emblems were suggestive of Scotland's famous royal personages, of her great clans, of her far-famed fighting regiments, and of the prominent guests and families represented. The color scheme was not a little novel, but under the skilful handling of Messrs. John Kay, Son & Co., who did the decorating throughout, it was carried off with the utmost harmony and most striking result. The design was furnished by Mr. J. Wilson Gray, architect, one of the members of the Society.

The stage was set in white, with crimson bunting at the rear. Metallic shields bearing the names Elliot, representing the Governor-General, and Mowat, the Lieutenant-Governor, hung from the walls, with drapings of their respective plaids festooned just above. On the front of the stage were shields and plaids in honor of the President, the Macintosh (Clan Chattan), and of Lieut.-Col. Macdonald, "Macdonald of the Isles." Banners showing the lion rampant and the royal arms of Scotland were also on the front of the stage. A small table bearing the emblematic snuff mull in the form of a ram's head resting on a plaid of the Cluny Macpherson tartan, was also an ornament on the platform. At the corners of the stage were banks of palms, half hiding stands of arms.

The pillars, which reached from floor to floor were buried under a mass of color. On the ground floor they were covered with white and khaki and crimson, alternately in two colors. In front of the balcony they were hidden by Oriental rugs, which were also draped on the wall.

The front of the balcony was smothered in red and

white bunting, with a thread of the same colors running from end to end, while beneath hung a drape of khaki, setting off the building most effectively. On the bunting were placed many metallic shields, surmounted by the corresponding plaid. These included the emblems of Bruce Wallace, the Duke of Rothesay (Prince of Wales), the Royal Stuart and the Dress Stuart.

The regiments represented were 42nd and 73rd Royal Highlanders, 79th Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, 91st and 93rd Princess Louise's Highlanders, 48th Highlanders, 75th and 92nd Gordon Highlanders, 72nd and 78th Seaforth Highlanders, all of which have recently served in the South African war. The roof of the building was covered by the St. Andrew's Cross, and festoons of red, white and blue bunting radiating to the four corners. On the ground floor and in the balcony were cosy corners tastily draped off with Oriental rugs. The dressing rooms and the conservatory were likewise a mass of color.
