ELECTS 79 PLEDGED Extra Load On British "Dole" System Through Strike End TO BACK FERGUSON PROHIBITION GIVEN BLOW, SAYS N. B. MAN 1,500,000 MEN TROL MEASURE

Of Thirty Prohibition Candidates, Not One Was Elected—Liberals Secure 14; Progressives

Legislature to Meet Likely in February to Work Out Details of New Scheme-Ministers Re-elected, Save Hon. D. Jamieson Yesterday

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—Premier Ferguson's following in the Legislature was reduced by one this morning, when Ontario North was changed from the Conservative to the Progressive column. With Manitoulin still to be conceded, the Canadian Press reported at noon today the election of 111 members out of 112, of whom 79 are pledged to support Premier Ferguson's government control policy.

SUMMARY: Conservatives, 74; Liberals, 14; Progressives, 13; Lib.-Prog., 5; Ind.-Lib., 4; Labor, 1; doubtful, 1.

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—Ontario has decided to try government control in the matter of liquor sales after a ten year period of prohibitory law. The battle of the ballots, waged yesterday after six weeks of vigorous campaigning, is over and the casualties are chiefly on the side of those who championed the Ontario Temper- Film Comedian's Wife Takes could have happened from the ance Act, which since 1916 has permitted the legal sale of liquors only on doctors' prescriptions. The Conservative government, led by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, decided to jettison this act and go to the country an a proposal to introduce government sale of liquor to permit holders over 21 years of age.

All the conservative ministers were re-elected with the single exception of Hon. D. Jamieson, minister without portfolio who lost in South Grey to Farquhar Oliver, Progressive, aged 23 years, and a nephew of Premier Oliver of British Columbia.

PARTY LEADERS ELECTED

All the party leaders were elected, W. E. Raney, chief of the Progressives getting in with a majority of only 44 in Prince Edward which in the referendum of 1924 showed a dry majority running into the thousands. Two religious leaders, Rev. W. G. Martin, in Brantford, and Rev A. C. Calder, in Kent West, were elected as supporters of the government.

All the big cities went with the government, Toronto returning a solid contingent of 15 members with

overwhelming majorities.

The new house will assemble, probably early in February, when the liquor control measure will be presented for approval. TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 2-Premier Ferguson issued a statement on the result of the elections, in which he said, in part:

"We have today a verdict which represents sound intelligence, deliberate thought of all the people of the Province of Ontario. The result of today's vote will, I think, do a great deal to promote law observance and better conditions hereafter in the Province of Ontario, because the government will have behind it an unmistakeable, emphatic mandate from all over the province endorsing the suggestions it made to the people and enabling us to form and pass sound, sane legislation, backed up by the will of the voters of

Ontario. "May I express the hope that hereafter we will have the cooperation and assistance of those who have been opposing us, rather than a continued aggressive opposition and captious criticism."

RANEY'S VIEWS. In an interview given by W. E. Raney, leader of the Progressives, at Picton, Ont., in Prince Edward county, where he was elected by a majority of 112 over the Conservative candidate, the Progressive leader said:



Strained relations, with warning notes from Secretary of State Kellogg, have developed with Mexico because it is fe ared Mexican alien land laws, going into effect Jan. the United States and the government of President Calles.

In Nicaragua, the United States has aligned itself with the government of Adolfo Diaz, who called for aid a week after he became president, charging Mexico with aiding the forces opposing him. TUBERCULOSIS is preventable and curable. On this point there seems now to be unanimity among those who deal directly with this dread disease, whose toll among the human race has been so terrible. In former years, it is safe to assume, many a victim passed out of this life, ignorant of the cause of his going; many a child, afflicted in its early years with the death-dealing baccilli, faded and passed before reaching

But today we have hospitals, clinics, doctors and nurses whose sole work is the gallant fight against the never-sleeping enemy, tuberculosis. They have accomplished much, but their work is really only commenced. They must be encouraged to carry on the battle ceaselessly; relentlessly and with greater strength than ever.

It was with this end in view that the Saint John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was formed, and it is the excellent results achieved and the hope of even better achievement in the future that is spurring it on to increased accomplishment. In this effort, the Association deserves the hearty co-operation of all citizens, and an opportunity now presents itself for active

LORD KYLSANT

ONE has come to regard the operations of great corporations as something mechanical and soulless. In actual fact the personalities of the presidents of these huge economic forces are tremendous factors, and of this Lord Kylsant, before? the six-foot-seven Welshman who has just bought the White Star Line for about \$35,000,000, is an

Lord Kylsant, whose family name is Phillips, does not come of a family traditionally seafaring or shipowning. The Phillips claim to trace descent from the Emperor Maximus; and another ancestor, Aaron Ap Rhys, accompanied Coeur de Lion to the Crusades. Owen Phillips was the third son of a clergyman. Entering the shipping business he acquired his first steamer in 1889. Now he controls 538 ships trading in every quarter of the globe. His greatest rival never controlled more than 130 ships. The Peninsular and Oriental line, which has long held virtual control of the East and Far East routes, and the Cunard Line which has maintained its paramount position on the North Atlantic, are both challenged by Lord Kylsant.

In 1902 he became chairman of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co., immortalized by the bard of Empire in "Rolling Down to Rio" as owning "the Don and the Magdalena," who "may go there when they will." His first great purchase was that of the Pacific Steam Navigation Co. The Glen Line and the Shire Line next gave him a footing in the East. The Holt Line, his rival in South America, was next absorbed. The acquisition of the Forwood Line entered him as a power in the Mediterranean, which was later extended by further purchases. THERE can be no mistaking the significance of yesterday's verdict in Ontario. Premier Ferguson has een given a mandate to introduce a policy of iquor control. He has a large majority in the House, of members who were elected by large one against the existing law. A striking feature of the campaign was the defeat of Hon. W. F. Nickle, who resigned from the Ferguson Government to run as a prohibitionist. His career has been marked by a number of rather abrupt changes, and he will now have an opportunity to

reflect upon the ways of politics and politicians. The Ontario Temperance Act had a majority of 407,289 in 1919. Two years later it had a najority of only 166,874 and in 1924 this had dwindled to 34,031. It will now be entirely wiped out and replaced by a policy under which those who desire liquor may get it, subject of course to restrictions, and under which Premier Ferguson asserts that an end can be put to bootlegging and the illicit traffic generally. His policy is not yet framed, but doubtless the Legislature will be

Man's Laughter

WHY do we laugh? The subject of laughter is a puzzling problem to philosphers and psychologists. Many theories have been put forth the Ninth Corps Area at San Franto explain the problem, but no single explanation cisco.

Seems to satisfy every one. Herbert Spencer, the English psychologist, believed that laughter was merely an overflow of excessive nervous energy.

Henri Bergson, the famous French philosopher, thought that laughter was evolved by the human race for the purpose of social discipline. No one likes to be laughed at. To be laughed at is to be made to feel ridiculous and small. Thus, to avoid being laughed at we avoid being awkward, unusual, eccentric, grotesque. We adhere to propersocial form and usage.

One of the latest, and perhaps the most comone of the latest, and perhaps the most complete, theories of laughter has been propounded by Professor William MacDougal of Haryard University. Professor MacDougal sums up his explanation in the short sentence: "Laughter is the antidote to sympathy."

In other words, nature evolved laughter as a protection against the excessive working of the instinct of sympathy. The method by which laughter accomplishes this protection is twofold: physiological and psychological. First, laughter immediately increases the rate of breathing and stimulates the blood circulation, causing a greater flow of blood to the head and brain; secondly, it breaks up any trend of thought that may be going on at the moment. It therefore causes a complete suspension of effort, both physical and mental. The result is that you are carried away from thinking of any particular situation that would


Many a hard, bitter, cynical man has had his faith and regard for women and everything good and holy blasted for life by a school-boy love affair with his teacher.

GRADUAL, though interrupted, decline of the power of the batter in the American League is given striking evidence in the 1926 records, which have been released today. The slump last season was marked from that of the previous season of 1925, when the batters showed signs of reasserting themselves, after being halted in 1924, and its real impressiveness appeals when averages of 1926 are compared with those of 1921, when batting had reached its high peak and sluggers were

A few figures will serve to show th. slump of batters. In 1921 the Detroit team led the American League in batting with a team average of .316. Cleveland was second with .308. St. Louis third with .304. New York had an even .300 percentage. The lowest batting team that season (Philadelphia) batted .274. In 1926 Washington was batting leader of the league with brought up the rear with a mark of 256. A year are in 1991, 292, Detroit second with .291, Boston A year ago, in 1925, Boston was

last with an average an even 10 points above that of 1926. The slump of the Athletics in hitting the past season was notable. A year ago they led the league with a mark of .307; in 1926 they dropped to seventh position with a batting average of but .269. Washintgon's work was consistent through the two seasons, with 303 in 1925 and the leadership in the

past season with .292. Cleveland, New York and Chicago showed wide divergence. For instance, New York made its extra base hitting count for many runs, scoring more than a hundred over each Cleveland and Chicago: On the other hand, the Cleveland team was tight in allowing opponents runs, being second to Phila-relphia in runs allowed opponents. It might appear that only tight pitching saved the Athletics from complete col-lapse the past season. The Browns

allowed opponents more runs last season than any other team. cause he plays with or against a professional. Second: The allied bodies, such as the hockey associations, rugby, lacrosse, etc., would be given complete autonomy in placing restrictions on the classes of athletes permitted to play except interfer-

ing with the amateur definition. Third: The A. A. U. of C. already recognizes that one can be an amateur if he plays with or against a professional in cricket, golf and indoor bowling. The tennis associations also claim such

Fourth: The amendment involves the registration of all nonateurs participating in sports controlled by the amateur bodies. The registration would give control

of the membership. Fifth: The term "non-amateur" is preferable to the word "professional" in that many players who are classed now as professionals

are not really such. Sixth: There are many players. in the larger cities who are ineligible under our present rules, and who can find an outlet for their energies in playing independent ball or even joining the out and out professional ranks, whereas such players in smaller places have no such opportunities. Are we going to prevent these boys from giving

enjoyment to themselves and the Seventh: The present rule as to Class A professionals can be strictly adhered to, without hurting anybody except those who lack the

proper sense of sportsmanship. Eighth: The real amateur will not live under the suspicion that he is a "veiled professional." There would be no need for such. There are thousands of pure amateurs in Canada and none more pure than in tennis, cricket and golf, which as

mentioned above do not brand a man a professional because he "mixes." Ninth: The new rule would permit an amateur to play against
