H. V. DICKSON, M. L. A., of Kings county, who has been especially concerned about the Fair Vale roadway underpass difficulty since the accident there, has suggested a cement wall or curb—probably 16 inches high and a foot thick—to divide the treffic research. divide the traffic-way under the railway bridge and to extend on either side about 50 feet. This unyielding guide-mark, splitting the thoroughfare into two distinct sections—one going, the other coming—he thinks should stop altogether the foolhardy oblique

coming—he thinks should stop altogether the foolhardy oblique driving of automobilists in passing under the railway.

Mr. Dickson is strong for safety first in public utilities, but on the other hand firmly holds that upon drivers of cars there is a great moral and legal responsibility to pilot their vehicles safely and sanely. This they do not always do, he claims. In the matter of the Fair Vale danger spot, investigation since the accident proves the majority of cars keep on the right side in approaching the place, but as soon as they start passing under the "S" turn beneath the railroad track they cut slantways across and emerge on the other side, encroaching upon the roadway of the cars coming in the opposite direction. Wheel-tracks prove this.

THE little mid-roadway wall should correct this bad driving, Mr. Dickson thinks. If a man or woman swerves from the paths of driving rectitude in negotiating this under-pass, he or she will get a gentle reminder from the cement barrier. It should regulate speed, bring cars down to a sensible rate of travel for such a dangerous spot, and keep every automobile hugging its own proper side of the thoroughfare. Halifax has such guidewalls; there are thousands of them all over the continent. Simply a matter, in this case, Mr. Dickson says, of getting a move on and adopting well-tried methods.

TO BACK up his opinion that it is reckless driving-erroneous driving—that is causing trouble at crooked under-passes everywhere, Mr. Dickson is going to station Traffic Officer Harrison of the Gondola Point-Hampton road patrol, on the Fair Vale under-pass spot, to insist upon drivers making this turn correctly. LONDON, July 6.—The House of Commons sat until nearly five o'clock this morning discussing the government's motion to continue the emergency regula-tions which were made effective at the beginning of the coal strike under the Emergency Powers Act of 1920. The moion was carried 181 to 64.

Sir William Joynson-Hicks, the Home Secretary, said one reason for maintaining the regulations was to enable the government to keep track of financial communications between Russia and the British trade unions. He hoped it would not be necessary to apply the regulations, but said it must be remembered that there were people who were trying to stir up trouble. TO PROTECT WORKERS.

Referring to recent speeches by A. J. Cook, Secretary-General of the Miners' Federation, Sir William said that if measures were taken to prevent willing miners from returning the work, the regulations would be invoked to protect them.

The Laborites strenuously opposed the motion, one declaring that the money was as welcome from Russia as anywhere else if it would enable the men to defeat the mine owners. It was hoped that, besides Russia, the United States would send large sums. The Speaker hinted an impending decision to send a delegation to the United States to seek the maximum help possible from that country.

CONVICT INJURES Investigation WARDEN'S CONCERT BREAKS IN BELGIAN DYKES CAUSE LOSS

Assailant Will Be Charged With Attempted Escape and Causing Harm

HALIFAX, July 5-While making his rounds early this morning in the county jail, David Pettipas, turnkey, was attacked from behind by a convict, who struck him on the head with a bottle and locked him in a cell.

Hearing the commotion, Jailor Mitchell ran to the scene and found nobody in sight. A short investigation revealed the dazed turnkey lying on the floor of the cell, blood streaming from his wound. After being treated by the jail physician, Pettipas named one of the prisoners as his assailant. The man, who is destined for Dorchester penitentiary on a theft conviction, will be charged with an attempted jailbreak and causing grievous bodily harm. He was found in his own cell, whither he had run after attacking the turnkey. Today's assault follows the discovery Saturday night of two nine-inch saws which had been concealed in cracks in the wall. One of the iron bars in an upper corridor window had been sawn through and it came away in Jailor Mitchell's hand when he grasped it.





## Along The Sport Trail

AMATEURS AND "INDEPENDENTS."

THE local sport world has watched with considerable interest the attempt hereabouts to set up an "independent amateur" league and the prompt action of the organized amateur union to draw the line of demarcation rather clearly insofar as their own fold is concerned. So long as there is an organized majority in control of amateur sport throughout Canada, the boys calling themselves "independent amateurs" will be classed as professionals whether they take money or not. They were warned repeatedly of the penalty provided. They have seen that penalty inflicted on some of the boys they started playing with. Either you are an amateur or a pro, officially. There is no mid-way station to alight and view the scenery on both sides and then take the train back, if you so desire, or continue on. That is what organized majority says and organized majority rules in democratic countries. And so long as there is the distinction between amateur and pro, so long there will be a line. We believe it is right that there should be a line.

ON THE other hand, the sooner this life sentence imposed on those who step over the dividing boundary is done away with, the better for amateur sport in Canada. Not only is it harsh but it is unjust. Whether a man accepts ten cents or ten thousand dollars, the punishment is the same. And oftentimes, the biggest offenders wiggle back after several years and the boy who made only a slight slip is branded for good and kept beyond the pale. The proportion is all out of gear and it should be adjusted. There is nothing new in this doctrine. It has been preached time and again by several amateur leaders and it is fast becoming accepted that the punishment should fit the straying-away. The Criminal Code of Canada fixes certain penalties for certain crimes against the state. We need some kind of a code like that for amateurism. It is hard to lay down a definite measure for this but a spirit of toleration should follow any judgment.

THE ideal of amateurism is "sports for all." That does not mean a limited number. It means "all." Just what it says. If a man who is past the usually-accepted athletic prime, wishes to include in amateur sport but is debarred for a slip-up in the days of youth, it seems to us that keeping him out of healthy sport is a violation of the moral amateur code in an attempt to keep the letter of the law. What possible harm can come from keeping him outside the pale? It is altogether likely that letting him in would do good. Having seen the boys from being blinded by the material side of the matter. The sinner can preach a pretty good sermon sometimes.

THEN again, we hear much about "camouflaged amateurism"amateurs who accept money under the guise of simonpures. This is practised to a considerable extent in the United States where foreign stars are paid heavy expenses to compete. No sooner had Johnny Miles won the Boston Marathon than they offered him a "job." Under Miles won the Boston Marathon than they offered him a "job." Under this cloak, he could retain his amateur standing. It was spreading to this country until the five-months residence clause was passed. That checked it. It must not be understood that we are advocating no punishment whatever for those who transgress. Every broken law demands a penalty but the penalty, we believe, should be more of a curative quality than simply fixed as a life sentence. Amateur officials are a harassed lot. If they do it, they are condemned. If they don't do it, they are condemned. Three-quarters of their trouble is caused by erring athletes—athletes breaking from the fold or those knocking at the door seeking re-admission. These athletes have their friends and they talk and spread stories and the result is misunderstanding all the way round the board. If something definite in the way of fixing the way round the board. If something definite in the way of fixing penalties were done, it might help. But there always will be friction and trouble so long as the present law stands. It should be amended.
