RECORD CAR RUSH AT ST. STEPHEN POINT

Officials say traffic only heavy into N. B. Sunday and Monday. The American immigration officials at the border state today that never in their experience or according to the records of their department was there such a rush of automobile traffic from the States as on Sunday and Monday—the fourth of July exodus. Hundreds upon hundreds of cars steadily streamed along the Maine traffic ways, all heading for New Brunswick at least those with which they came in official contact. There were 122 cars from the Waltham, Mass. district alone. The officials state the big auto procession is now fairly commenced. C. B. Foster, passenger traffic manager of the C. P. R., Montreal, who was in town today, in commenting upon summer tourist traffic, stated that the automobile is still a factor to contend with in the shorter hauls, but in the long runs the railway is still doing capacity business. In the general sense railway traffic is heavier this season than last and continually rolling back to old standards.

DRIVER AVERTS TRAIN MISHAP

Connecting Rod on Ocean Limited Breaks Near Painsac Jct.

But for the care of the driver of the locomotive on the westbound Ocean Limited on the C. N. R., as the train approached Painsac Junction, about 8 miles east of Moncton, yesterday afternoon, a serious accident might have occurred. The crack passenger express was speeding along at a rate of about 40 miles per hour when the driver heard a clanking on the side of the engine. He pulled up the train and it was then found that one of the connecting rods on the locomotive had broken, and the free portion of the rod had been smashing into the tie and the roadbed at such a revolution of the driving wheel. The train limped into Painsac Junction station and word was sent to Moncton from where a new locomotive was sent to the scene to bring in the disabled train. The express eventually arrived in Moncton about half an hour late. Had the break in the rod been such as to leave a longer portion free it might easily have derailed the locomotive.

HEAVY TRAFFIC

The Halifax train, due at the Union Depot at 6.50 o'clock Daylight time, was about half an hour late in arriving last night owing to exceptionally heavy traffic between Halifax and Moncton. The outgoing Boston and Montreal trains were held up for some time last night both on account of this and the late arrival of the steamer Empress from Digby. 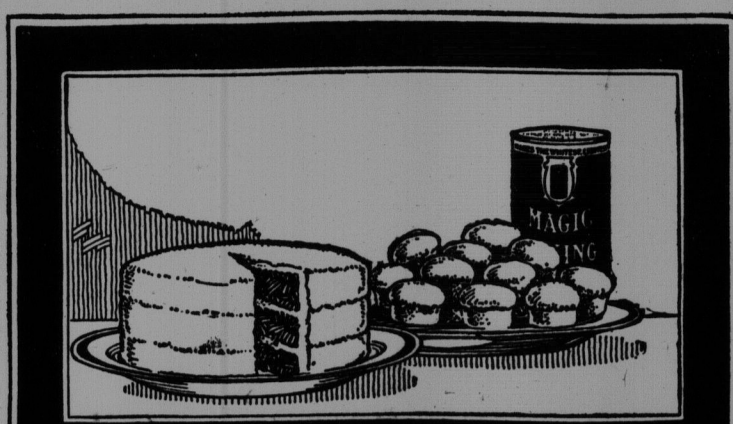

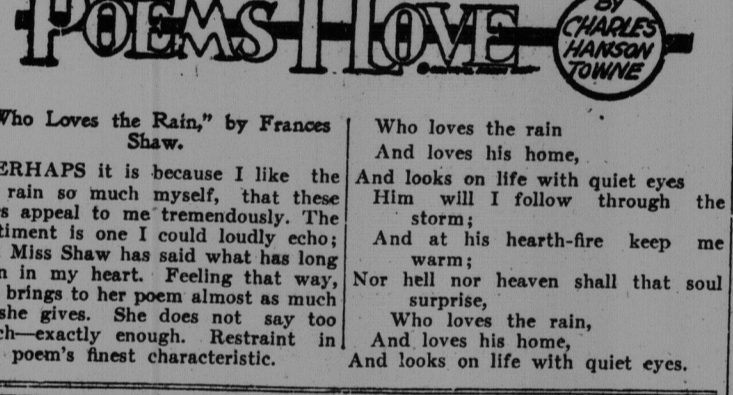

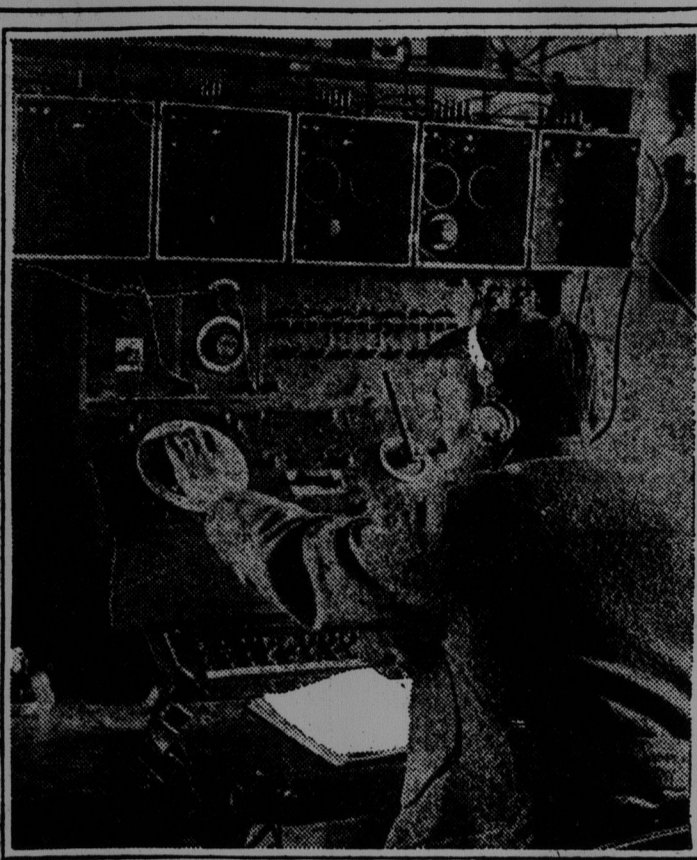
Monctonian Freed in Amherst Case

MANY SALMON DIE IN RED HEAD POND

Unusual Water Conditions Blamed For Recent Infection, It Said

Unusual water conditions, following upon the high spring freshets of this year, are held to be the cause of the death of many of the salmon placed in the brood pond at Red Head by the Federal Department of Marine and Fisheries. James Catt, district inspector of hatcheries for the Maritime Provinces, said yesterday afternoon that several of the brood salmon had become infected with some disease apparently caused by the insufficient quantity of salt water which has entered the brood pond since the freshets. Mr. Catt further said that D. C. Duff, of the Biological Board of Canada, had inspected the salmon at the pond. The results of his inspection are not known as yet.

REGULATIONS RE RAW MILK ARE BEFORE BOARD

One Application to Sell Is Received by Health Authorities

The first application for a permit to sell raw milk, Grade A, under the recently announced regulations, was before the sub-district Board of Health monthly meeting yesterday afternoon, but no action was taken, as the applicant had not yet fulfilled the requirements.

There was some discussion regarding the passing of these regulations. In the absence of John Kelly, chairman, the meeting was presided over by Commissioner Wigmore. The Board appointed Lieut.-Col. W. H. Harrison as

its solicitor in the place of the late Dr. J. Roy Campbell.

T. M. Burns, secretary, reported the deaths during June had totalled 68 and notifiable diseases reported to the Board had been as follows: Scarlet fever, 22; typhoid, 1; measles, 2 and tuberculosis, 13. The department reports were very satisfactory.

ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS WORK

Miss Alice P. Hegan, reporting on anti-tuberculosis work, said the total of cases under supervision had been 881, of whom 57 were new cases and 12 were former cases readmitted. There were 62 discharged and 51 of these were non-tuberculous and 12 died. The examination of the children applicants for the Lady Byng Camp had increased the attendance at clinics, making the total 116. Nurses' visits to patients numbered 888 and other work was recorded as follows: Receiving milk, 4; receiving medicine, 2; X-rays, 14; fluoroscopes, 28; sputum examinations, 5; cases reported to the Board of Health.

Miss Martina Wallace's report of the dental clinic showed that 81 patients attended 15 clinics, where 138 treatments were given, five cases were referred to a private dentist and two to the General Public Hospital, and 41 home calls were made by the nurse. For the pre-school age clinic Miss Wallace reported a total attendance of 14 at four clinics and 13 visits to homes.

Mrs. Marie Furlong-Coleman, food inspector, reported 422 visits during June, in which month she issued 75 milk permits and warned all storekeepers to cover candy and fruit with netting and to keep milk on ice during the hot weather.

Dr. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector, commented on the small amount of meat slaughtered, only 133 animals having been killed at the two slaughter houses during June. That month he said had been a very trying one for the milk men and there was much sour, grassy and gassy milk. Sixty-four cans of sour milk from King's county producers had to be separated and 22 of 8-gallon cans of milk, making 702 quarts after being given a sediment test were considered too dirty for human consumption and were dumped. Special notices were sent to the producers who had shipped dirty milk.

CHILD WELFARE

The two recently appointed child welfare nurses of the sub-district Board of Health during the month of June made 600 visits and had supervision of 345 babies. In the previous month, which was the first on which the two nurses were on duty, 283 babies were visited and the total of visits was 464. Miss L. Richardson and Miss A. Mc-

Phall are carrying on this work and are conducting well baby clinics in the Health Centre, the North End and the West End.

The analysis of the visits made in June shows that 485 were educational and for giving instruction in proper methods. Ten visits were inspections of boarding houses where babies are sheltered; 20 visits were made in connection with the issuing of birth certificates and eight were investigations of deaths. During June there were 88 new babies listed for supervision and 44 were discharged, five had left the city and three had died.

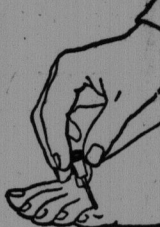

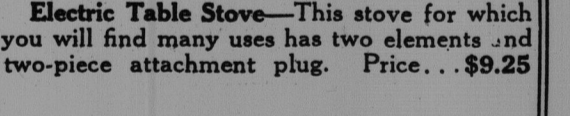

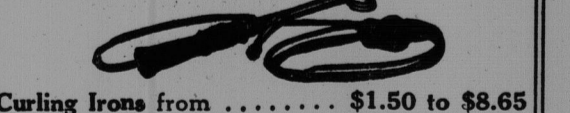

Stork Shower In Mind? Some Table Decoration Hints

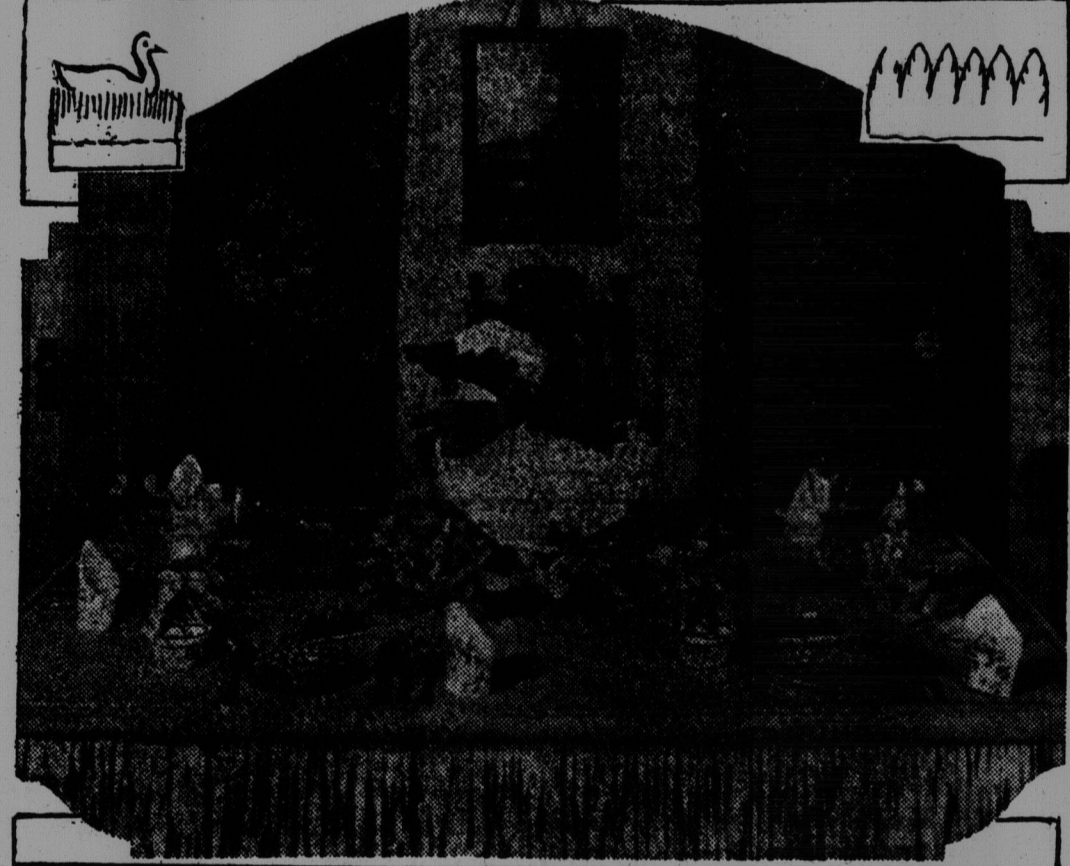


Table set for luncheon for a stork shower.

ARE you planning a stork shower for one of your friends in the rear future? I am showing here a table set for the luncheon which may give you some ideas for your party. If you decide not to serve refreshments at the table you could still use some of the ideas in the decorations of the rooms and in the giving of the shower gifts.  
As set above, the table has a white paper cover. Around the edge of the table tuck or pin to table pad crepe paper cut into fine fringes with plain hand on one edge. Use two thicknesses of saure blue or shell pink crepe paper and one thickness of white. Finish edge with strip of colored paper pulled very tightly and finished on corners with flower, leaf or bows of ribbon.  
The duck centerpiece is made of two pieces of cardboard cut duck shape. Reproduce them along with pieces of medium weight wire held in place with gummed cloth tape. Cover both sides with white crepe paper cut in imitation of feathers. Add a few black feathers to the tails, and heads or buttons may be used for eyes, or black and white crepe paper may be used.  
Fasten large bows to the ducks' necks and attach the ducks to a square box with wire shanks, first covering it with the paper feathers and lining with crepe paper stretched and crumpled. Then brace the ducks apart with a piece of heavy wire wrapped several times with strips of crepe paper. Fasten ends of the wire—which should be left un-wrapped—to inside of feet with cloth tape and then cover the legs and beaks with dark amber paper. Flowers and ferns may surround the base of the centerpiece.  
This box may be used to contain the shower gifts, or some of them, as it must not be too large, of course, when used as a centerpiece.  
For the wee cradles containing the dolls use paper ice cups. Measure a piece of medium weight wire around top of cup and cut off. Wrap this piece with strip of crepe paper and fasten ends to sides of cup with gummed cloth tape. Measure distance from center of the wire to edge of cup and cut a strip of crepe paper this width. Gather one long edge and paste to the wire. Then gather the other long edge, pasting it to the wire, and press a strip of crepe paper in place, gathering slightly with the fingers and leave a one-inch band above the cup which is stretched out along the edge to make a frill.  
For the duck place cards cut shape shown by diagram of white mat stock and band on dotted line. To represent grass cut strips of green crepe paper into irregular points along edge.

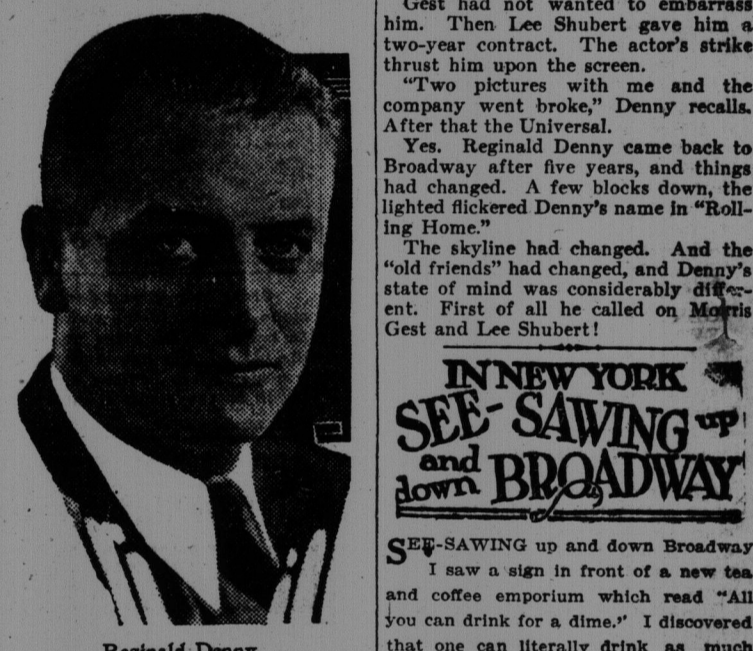
Broiled Meat Loaf—One pound ground round steak, one-quarter cup bread crumbs, one-half cup milk, one egg, well beaten, one-eighth teaspoon grated nutmeg. Soak bread crumbs in milk for three minutes. Rub mixing bowl with cut clove of garlic and combine all ingredients. Pat into shape one and one-half inches thick in well buttered tin pan. Cook five minutes under very hot broiler. Reduce heat and cook ten minutes more. Turn steak into another buttered pan and cook that side ten minutes. The garlic gives a very distinctive flavor to beef or lamb, not at all like the odor resulting from actual consumption of the bulb.

Date Rocks—One cup sugar, one-half cup shortening, one and one-half cup flour, one-half teaspoon baking powder, two eggs, one-half teaspoon onion juice, one teaspoon salt, one-quarter teaspoon paprika, one-half teaspoon chopped parsley. Mix with mayonnaise and chill. When ready to serve place tomato on crisp green lettuce leaf or a bed of cress; fill with salad mixture and garnish top with egg yolk rubbed through strainer.

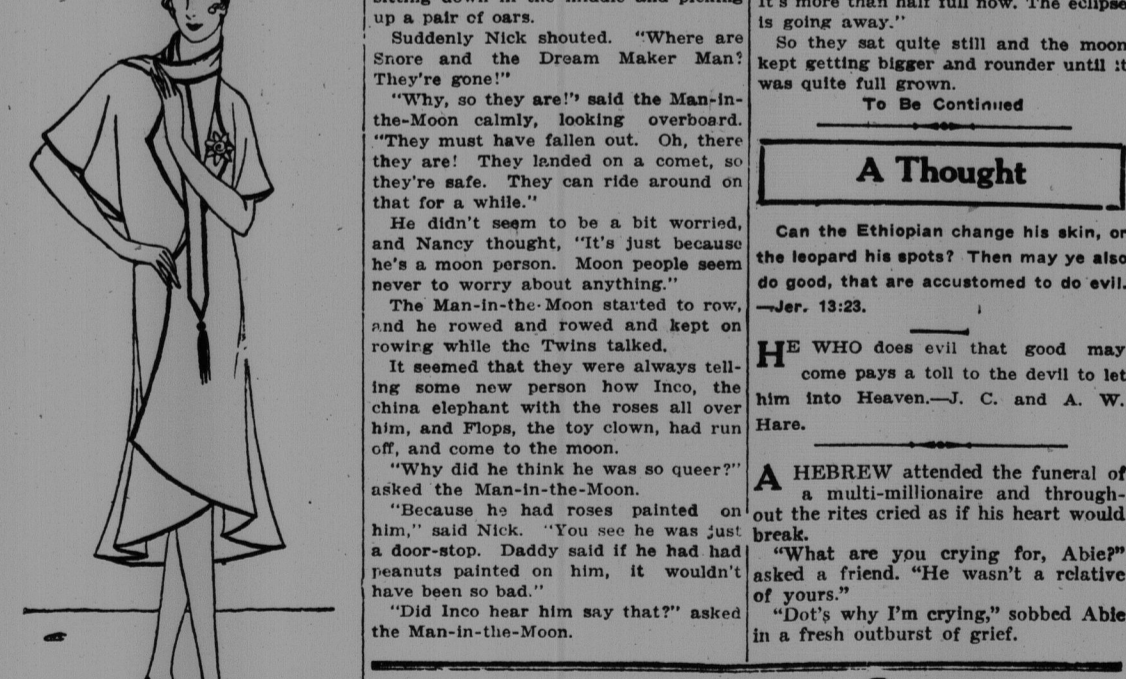

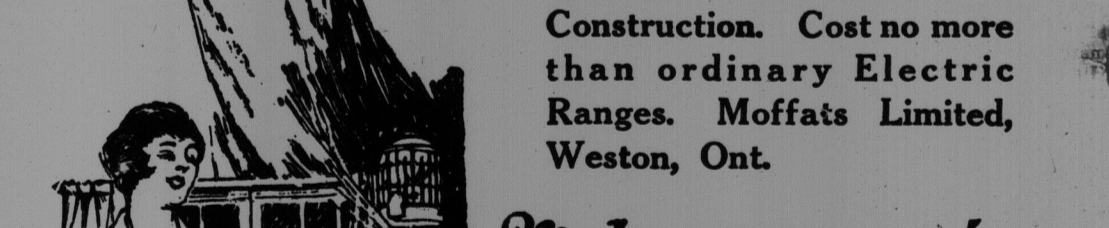

# Eight Swimmers Training To Conquer English Channel

## SIX WOMEN ARE TO ATTEMPT BIG FEAT THIS YEAR

All But Two of Aspirants Are From North America

By NORMAN E. BROWN.

THE greatest advance on the tempting English channel in the history of swimming is to be made within the next few months. No less than six women are now in active training for attempts to paddle their way against wicked seas, cold water, chilling winds and heart-breaking tides from one side of the channel to the other. Two men have announced their intentions.

THOSE WHO WILL TRY.

Those who have already announced their intentions of attempting the 20-mile swim this year are:

- GERTRUDE EDERLE.
- EVIA MORRISON.
- LILLIAN CANNON.

Of these all but Mme. Sion and Helmy are from this side of the Atlantic. Mme. Sion is a French swimmer. Helmy is a giant Egyptian who helped Miss Ederle train for her attempt last season.

The effort of Miss Ederle looms up as the most interesting. It will be her second effort. The American girl swam to within a few miles of the British coast from Cape Gris-Nez, France, last summer. It was announced when her attempt failed that her trainer, James Wolfe, ordered her lifted into the boat when she appeared nauseated by the salt water and cold. Miss Ederle later stated that she was not ready to give up the struggle. Miss Ederle had trained diligently for the attempt.

ADDING MORE WEIGHT.

Her start was postponed for a time due to unusually rough weather. In her training she took on some added poundage as resistance against the biting cold of the water, which rarely rises above 50 degrees. This year she is adding more weight. This would indicate that she has revised her plan of attack. Five men have swam the channel. All were sturdy, chunky fellows, large barrelled and with plenty of warm fat about their torso and legs. Their time for the feat was slow, they depending upon main strength and endurance, rather than speed.

Miss Ederle last year hoped to triumph mainly through speed. Gauging her endurance she believed that with speed she could beat the tide, swimming with it the second half of the journey and reaching her destination before the tide turned against her. She was cautioned repeatedly at the start for her desire to "sprint" in her efforts to cut down the time.

This year she will take a steadier pace, under the watchful eye of William Burgess, conqueror of the channel years ago.

Miss Cannon, a Baltimore maid, is also training at Cape Gris-Nez. Miss Ederle's camp. Miss Cannon attracted attention last summer when she swam the 20 miles across Chesapeake Bay in the remarkable time of 11 hours. She is 26.

Mme. Sion attempted the swim last year. She swam to within a mile and a half of the British shore from the continent and was then forced to give up. She had been in the water 18 hours and 15 minutes.

Mille Gade, who in private life is Mrs. Clemington Corson, has won nationwide attention through her feat in swimming the Hudson and in other endurance events.

Miss Barrett, a teacher of swimming in the James Monroe High School in New York city, has won much fame as a long distance swimmer and holds many medals for such feats.

W. O. Jackson, the latest announced aspirant for the honor of swimming the channel, is the chap who recently swam from Mobile, Ala., to Sand Point, off Fort Morgan, at the mouth of Mobile Bay, a distance of approximately 84 miles, in 19 hours, 9 minutes. His swim is believed to be the longest ever achieved in salt water in America.

Helmy is perhaps the most picturesque aspirant. This husky stands six feet, three inches tall. He weighs 240 pounds. He is large about the waist and hopes to remain that way until after his swim—because the fat will help him fight the cold.

Helmy trained with Miss Ederle last summer and planned to attempt the swim late that season but didn't.

Eva Morrison is the only Canadian to the list. She is a daughter of the chief of police of Pictou, N. S.

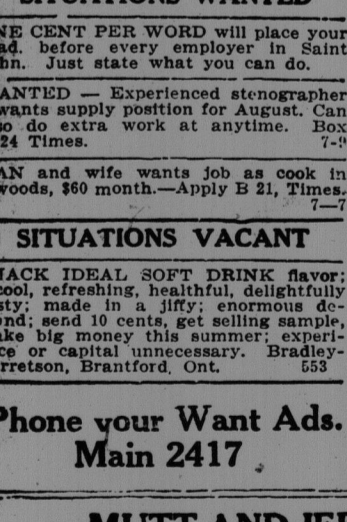

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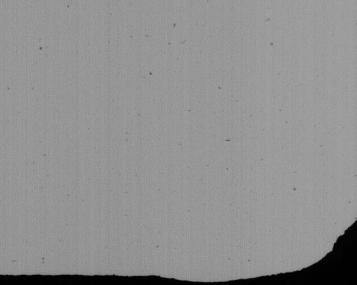
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### EXCELLENT BILL AT IMPERIAL OPENS THE WEEK

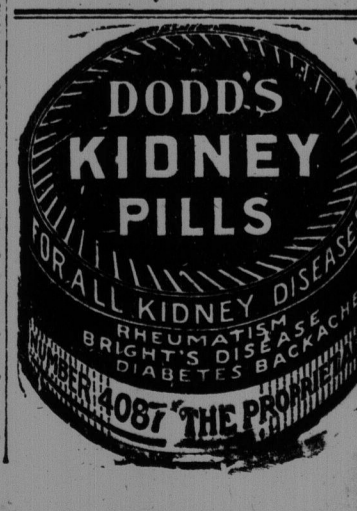
### FORMER M. P. P. HERE

**MAYOR IN SIGN LANGUAGE BIDS MUTES WELCOME**

Rest of Address at Convention Conveyed Is By Interpreter

**HUNDRED GATHER IN K. C. BUILDING**

His Worship Is Made Honorary Delegate—Two-Day Convention Here

Hearty applause greeted Mayor White in the Knights of Columbus Hall this morning when, in the sign language, he spelled the words "Welcome to our City" in his opening greeting to about 100 delegates to the Maritime Association of the Deaf, which began a three days convention at the Maritime Association of the Deaf, R. E. Sowerby of Moncton, the president, was in the chair, and Frank Gardner, who was formerly a teacher of deaf mutes and who is now a member of the staff of the Inspector of taxation here, acted as interpreter and in the unavoidable absence of Rev. William Duke, rector of the Cathedral, gave the opening prayer. Use of the sign language was given by the Knights.

**MAYOR'S ADDRESS.**

In his address of welcome His Worship recalled that 22 years ago when also he was Mayor of Saint John he had the pleasure of performing a similar duty and he was glad to know that several of the delegates who attended the convention at that time were present today. Mayor White said he was aware of the handicap under which the members did their life work, but it should be remembered that three quarters of the things we heard were not worth listening to. "Speech is silver," added His Worship, "but silence is golden."

Organization was essential to the success of any meeting, and Mayor White felt sure that the improvement and friendships which result from such meetings as that being attended testified to the existence of the association. He concluded by again extending a hearty welcome and trust that the visitors would enjoy the hospitality and excursions in which the visitors would participate.

President Sowerby congratulated the Mayor on his gracious remarks and said he was glad to see present several of those delegates who were present when the Mayor spoke 22 years ago.

**MAYOR IS HONORED.**

Mayor White was then made recipient of an address of welcome, which made him an honorary delegate. The address presented to Mayor White by the association's president stated that the convention promised to be one of the best ever held. "I may mention," President Sowerby stated, "that many of us received our early education in the building on Lancaster Heights, Craft Street. The building is being used now as a school, but we are glad that the building is being used for the good work of caring for those who were broken in the Great War. He mentioned the co-incident of Mayor White, welcoming the association in 1904 and in 1926. As the Mayor left the hall he was again applauded.

The convention then took up routine work, including the reading of reports, which was continued at the afternoon session. The program includes election of officers on Thursday morning, a picnic at McLane's Beach tomorrow, drives about the city and a theatre party at the imperial tonight, when the Mayor will be the guests of Manager W. H. Golding. The local arrangements are in charge of William McDonald, of the Saint John Post Office staff.

There are 26 delegates from Halifax, 18 from Cape Breton, 14 from Moncton, 12 from Fredericton, two from Woodstock, three from Boston, 25 from Saint John and several from other places. The headquarters of the association is at Hotel Dunlop. The last biennial convention was held in Moncton.
