## AEROPLANE CAN SKATE AS WELL AS FLY AND SWIM.



FRANK COFFYN FLYING OVER THE HUDSON

Frank Coffin, an air pilot trained by the Wright brothers, introduced the hydroaeroplane to New York as a new feature of winter sport. In a spectacujar flight of twenty minutes over the lower Hudson River he demonstrated that his marine aeroplane can, skate as well as it can fly and swim. Further, its triple capacity enabled it to travel at will over rough frozen masses inaccessible to an ice boat and to glide without hesitation from water to ice or into the air at a turn of the rudder, all in a twenty-five mile gale.

Its performance caused spectators to name it the "flying toboggam."




The gavalry school, which was opened
