ICE CREAM CAKE.

One cup of sugar, 1-2 cup butter, 1-2 cup of milk, 1 egg and white of two others, 1 1-2 cups flour, 1 1-2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon lemon. Cream butter and sugar, then add the eggs, well beaten, after the milk.

Icing—Yolks of 2 eggs beaten quite stiff with powdered sugar. Flavor with vanila.

OATMEAL COOKIES. Cream together 1 cup of sugar and 1 tablespoonful of butter. Add 2 well-beaten eggs and a little salt. Then add 1 heaping teaspoon of baking powder and 3 1-2 cups of rolled oats. Drop in pan

RICE PUDDING. Mix one quarter pound of rice flour with a little cold water. Pour it into a pint of boiling milk and sweeten to taste. Gently boil until it thickens, stirring all the time. Then add one teaspoonful each of vanilla and cinnamon extract. Put in a mold until cold, or serve hot if desired. 



KR. FIELDING'S SURPLUS A RECORD ONE

Magnificent Position of Canada Under Liberal Rule Shown in Budget Speech in House of Commons

Ottawa, April 4.-Mr. Fielding's fifteenth annual budget stateemnt, which was presented to the commons this afternoon, was remarkable for two things. It was the shortest budget speech he has yet presented to the house, taking only som forty minutes in delivery.

presented to the house, taking only some forty minutes in delivery.

At the same time in its statement of a record surplus of \$30,500,000, of revenue of \$117,500,000, and of the payment of all but \$3,900,000 of the total expenditure on both capital and current account out of the past year's income, despite \$24,000,000 spent on the National Transcontinental Railway construction, and 11,500,000 spent on public works and other items of capital expenditure, it was the most eloquent and convircing testimony to the successful financial administration of the country that the Minister of Surpluses has yet given to the house.

Mr. Fielding confined his remarks practically to a succinct statement of income and expenditure for the fiscal year just closed with a brief review of the figures for preceding year. He made no reference to tariff matters and his only allusion to the pertinent subject of bounties was a brief statement to the effect that hereafter all bounties would be charged to income rather than to capital account, as in the past.

The figures he presented were in themselves the most eloquent tribute possible to the growth and prosperity of the country and needed no amplification by the finance minister.

In the face of the story they told Hon. George E. Foster had to confine his criticism, as he himself expressed it, to "sticking a pin in here and there."

For the financial year 1909-10 the surplus was a little over \$22,000,000, which paid all the charges on capital account for railways and canals, for public works, for railways subsidies, for militia, for bounties and also \$7,000,000 was deposited in the National Transcontinental Railway. The actual revenue for that year was \$101,503,710, which was \$16,000,000 in excess of that of the previous year and \$8,500,000 in excess of the record year of 1907-8.

The expenditure on consolidated fund account would be about \$87,000,000, an increase of about \$7,500,000. And in this increase there was included the expenditure for dominion land surveys and for militia, totalling \$2,500,000, which would have formerly been charged to capital account, and also \$1,250,000 spent on the naval service, both of which amounts were this year paid out of revenue.






