



Seattle, Nov. 8.-Bringing gold bullion valued it more than \$1,000,000 and a passenger list of 370, the steamer Victoria, Captain O'Brien, arrived in Seattle this morning, 7 days and 18 hours from Nome. She is the last of the larger vessels to leave Nome this year.

The British steamer Harlsden, Captain F. H. Sorres, is in port to-day from Tacoma, loading shipments for the Orient. At Tacoma the Harlsden loaded 2.000 bales of cotton, valued at \$125,000, the ondensed milk, 22,000 sacks of flour, 540,-000 feet of lumber, and 80 tons of oats. The Harlsden will go from here to Van couver to load shipments of lumber and fish and then to Port Blakeley, where she will also load lumber shipments.
