SEASONABLE RECIPES. Rhubarb Fritters.-Cut some sticks of young rhubarb into pieces about an inch long and boil them in water ten minutes; drain and place them in cold water. When cold, drain, lay on a dish, and strew finely crushed sugar over them. Moisten with a few tablespoonsful of butter, and allow them to stand for a couple of hours. Dip the pieces of rhubarb into some frying-batter, drop into boiling lard and fry to a nice color. Drain on paper for a few seconds to absorb the fat, then place on a dish that has been spread with a folded napkin and serve.

The Miramichi Pilgrimage Question.

The Advance, recognizing that the existing difficulty between the pilots of the Miramichi and the pilotage commission is a serious one, and that other and more far-reaching interests than have appeared on the surface are involved, has not been able to settle the whole matter in its columns and undertake the championship of either side, simply because all the information necessary to the forming of a just conclusion has not been available.

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Outlook, which says:—“We have heard it all before in Washington these 35 years since the United States cut out of unparliamentary spite against England, abrogated the Elgin reciprocity treaty and set themselves to thwart Canadian national ideals and drive the Dominion into the republic. We do not believe a word of it. Canadians will not be jockeyed at Washington or anywhere else. They will be fairly treated and will have no more such surrenders of Canadian rights at the bidding of careless and ignorant British statesmen as past years have seen. The public will await the hearing of the Canadian side of the case.”

Official here deny that Canada has shown an impossible attitude and deplore the bad and unjust effect of Mr. Smalley's message.

LONDON, May 26.—The Foreign Office officials confirm the statements made by the New York correspondent of The London Times to the effect that the negotiations with the Canadian Government on the subject of Alaska have reached an almost hopeless stage, owing to the insistence of the Canadians that they receive a slice of Alaska, which apparently precludes any agreement being reached on the subject between the American and Canadian High Commissioners.

The evening newspapers here reproduce the New York despatch, with comment generally regretting the situation, but objecting to the conclusions that Canada is blaming.

The Globe says:—“The Canadian view is far less patriotic than the American if they yielded to what they demand for an unjust and indefensible demand for the sake of the establishment of more friendly relations with their big neighbor.”
