

INFANT BAPTISM.

The Doctrine Upheld in an Able Paper by Rev. S. Howard, at Methodist Ministers' Meeting

At the Methodist preachers' meeting Monday morning. Rev. S. Howard read a paper on the subject of Christian Baptism: To Whom Should This Rite be Administered. He began by saying that, while no one denies that an adult believer is a suitable candidate for baptism, there are a great many earnest and honest Christians who deny the validity of infant baptism. He then proceeded to set up the claim that, in a duly organized Christian community, the infant is really the normal subject for baptism. He based this claim on the clearly expressed thoughts and feelings of Jesus with regard to the little children. "Except ye be converted and become as fittle children ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven." "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

er to decide as to the relation of the little children to Himself and to His What that relation is H has not left us to vaguely guess. He has directly and authoritatively an-nounced it. According to His teach-ing, every child born into the world is a member of the kingdom of heaven. Properly understood, there is no doc-trine of original sin taught in the New Testament which contradicts this plain statement of Jesus, "Where sin

As a matter of fact, too, all evange-lical Christians practically assume that the infant is a member of the kingdom of heaven on earth. Logically they must, therefore, further assume that, as such, he is in a regenerate condi-tion. For they do acknowledge that when the infant dies he enters the kingdom of glory in heaven. But if the infant is ungenerate how does he As a matter of fact, too, all evange the infant is ungenerate, how does he enter heaven? If he is fit for the king-dom there, he is fit for it here. It has been said that God prepares for heaven those who die in infancy by a special act of grace. To this it may be fearlessly replied that the scriptures nowhere teach that God does for the dying infant anything more than he has to to do for the ordinary adult believer. Those who baptize infants are sometimes charged with administering that rite to unregenerate persons. We stoutly deny the charge. The fact is, we claim that Jesus has conclusively settled the question as to whether or not little children are regenerate. We simply proceed on the assumption that Jesus meant what He said when He declared that a little child is the true standard of member ship in that kingdom, to enter which every man "must be born again."
