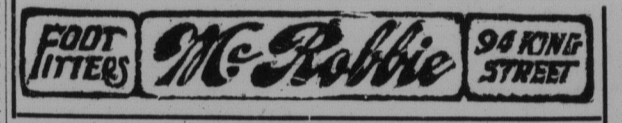

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, July 18.—That unlucky French Treaty, which Mr. Fielding and Mr. Brodeur negotiated in 1906, which the French Parliament then insisted upon modifying to the further advantage of France, which we thereupon had to accept in its modified form, and which has been hanging fire for three years, has suddenly cropped up at the most inconvenient moment imaginable. The French Parliament has ratified it, and it now rests with our Government to request Parliament at the next session to ratify the pro-French modifications. This situation arises at the precise moment when the United States tariff, with its elaborate apparatus of retaliation provisions, is at its most formidable stage.

Notes. The controversy over Hecta Strait seems to have become a further stage. British newspapers which have come to hand contain the assertion that the United States Government has made fresh representations to the British Government pressing for a clear definition of its claims with regard to its jurisdiction over the Strait. The British Government, it seems, is now ready to furnish a return to the Dominion Government before replying to Washington. The United States claim is that the Hecta Strait beyond the three mile limit, is to be regarded as open water and that American fishermen should have the right to fish therein.

KNOX IS VEXED. State Department of the United States is Not Well Pleas'd With Treaty. A Washington despatch to the New York Herald says:— "Formal notification of the ratification of the Franco-Canadian treaty by the French Parliament today, reached the State Department, and there are indications that the department is far from pleased with the effect of the treaty upon the interests of American manufacturers in France and Canada. The treaty was signed in Paris on September 19, 1907, having now been ratified by France after nearly two years of negotiation and discussion. It is expected that the Canadian Parliament will accept and ratify the treaty next November.

Matter of Interpretation. The foreign country must "accord" to American products "treatment which is reciprocal and equivalent." There is room for much hair-splitting on those words. Then the president empowered the tariff commission to amend the minimum tariff to, or withhold it from, not merely the whole of a foreign country, but any one of its political subdivisions which have "authority to adopt and enforce tariff legislation, or to impose restrictions or regulations, or to grant concessions upon the exportation or importation of articles which are, or may be, imported into the United States." Thus the maximum tariff might be applied to one province of Canada for say, prevent.

Archibald Hilden, on Thursday, when his daughter, Florence, was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to William MacGregor Langille, of Truro. The bride was unattended, dressed in a handsome silk dress, and the ceremony was performed by the Rev. Dr. McLeod, in the presence of the immediate friends of the bride and groom. The bride's going away dress was a brown broadcloth with hat to match.

COMPENSATION ACT. Mr. Copp Condemned It Because It Was A St. John Measure. Mr. Copp, M. P. P., has been campaigning in St. John county against the Hazen Government candidate, Mr. Copp now expresses great interest in the workmen but when the Compensation Act was before the House what did Mr. Copp say? "The main objection I have to the bill is that the whole matter originated in the City of St. John." Mr. Copp declared that "this bill was drastic and would have the effect of throwing cold water on schemes to employ labor in this province."

EARTHQUAKE IN GREECE. Athens, Greece, July 17.—Several villages of Uposistia have since the village of Damiza, is in a state of alarm, and a number of other villages, including Loped and Maringki, also were terrified, but the death toll not known. Relief trains are now on their way.

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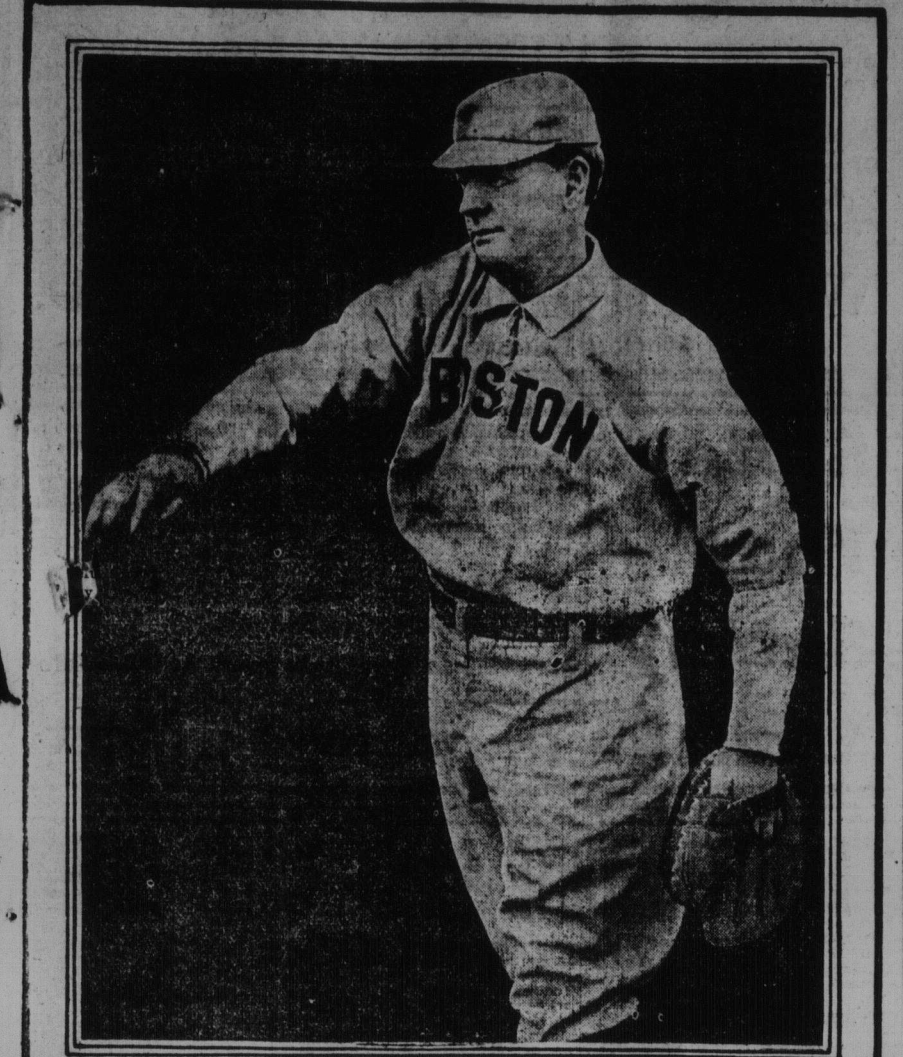
