Berlin, Aug. 8 .- Further progress of the Austro-German forces which are attempting to cut off the retreat of the Russians was announced today by the War Office. The statement says that Serock, at the mouth of the Bug, north of Warsaw, has been occupied; forts near Novo Georgiecsk have been captured; the Germans have occupied the east bank of the Vistula, near Warsaw, and to the south the Russians are be-ing driven back by Field Marshal Von Mackensen.



Notwithstanding the general trend, Steel was the leader in this movement. It rose four points to a new high record at 92½. Record prices were made also by General Motors which advanced 113-8 to 207, and Willys Overland, which rose 7½ to 148½. Bethlehem Steel was quieter than heretofore, making only a small gain. All these stocks fell back on the general decline. The widest break was in Bethlehem Steel, which lost ten and a half on the day.

Heaviness of railroad shares was one of the most discouraging aspects of the situation to traders on the long side who counted on the increasing.




