PROCEEDINGS
— OF THE —
Annual Meeting of the Society.

The THIRTIETH ANNUAL MEETING of the MISSIONARY SOCIETY of the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, was held in Toronto, on Tuesday, October 16th, 1855, the Reverend RICHARD JONES in the Chair. The Meeting was opened with singing and prayer, and the Report having been read by the General Superintendent of Missions, the following Resolutions were adopted :—

- I. Moved by the Rev. J. DOUSE, seconded by the Rev. J. SPENCER,—

That the Report, an Abstract of which has just been read, be adopted printed, and circulated according to the Society's regulations.

- II. Moved by the Rev. S. D. RICE, seconded by the Rev. H. LANTON :—

That the most devout thanks of this Meeting be given to Almighty God, for the unprecedented success He has granted to the Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada the past year, and for His favour conspicuously shown to the Parent Society in Great Britain, and to other Protestant Missionary Associations, in publishing the great Salvation.

- III. Moved by the Rev. J. GEMLEY, seconded by the Rev. T. BEVITT,—

That the moral aspects of the remarkable events of the nineteenth century; the consequent duties and exigencies of all Christian Missionary Societies; the growing number, expense, and importance of this Society's Missions, and the present demands upon it for a large addition of Stations, Missionaries, and Schools in Western and Eastern Canada, and Hudson's Bay; and the paramount necessity of "power from on high" to make them effectual, imperatively require an extraordinary increase of prayer and liberality on the part of all the friends of the Society.

- IV. Moved by the Rev. J. BORLAND, seconded by the Rev. C. LAVELL,—

That the cordial acknowledgments of this Meeting be presented to the Officers of the Society; to Ministers of other Churches and of the Wesleyan, who have advocated its interests; to the Committees and Collectors of all the Branch Societies; and to the Subscribers, of every Christian denomination, for their very valuable services, and increasing generosity the past year; and that the following Ministers and Gentlemen be the Board of Management for the ensuing year :—

Report.

THE evangelical and eloquent Melville, of the Church of England, has said, "The earth has never yet presented the grand spectacle of what might be called a Missionary Nation—a people who felt that the true religion was held in trust for the benefit of the world, and who concentrated their energies on the being faithful in their stewardship." But this granted, it is a fact, and the highest and best of the nineteenth century, that many nations, states, and colonies derived their highest fame from denominational benevolent efforts, Christian in their character, and commanding in their power.

The Committee of the MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA present their Thirtieth Annual Report with an increasing pleasure, and again commend the Society to its generous friends for its principles and agencies, and its unprecedented success, and claims, and enterprises.

They have not deemed it a sufficient compliance with the Divine command, which requires the propagation of the Gospel, to give only existence to Mission Stations, but have acted under the conviction, that the same supreme authority expects the establishment, enlargement, and unlimited multiplication of Christian Missions, till the redeemed millions of every country and generation are fully evangelized; a paramount vocation in which, they rejoice to know, they are the honoured and happy coadjutors of the wise and energetic ministerial and lay supporters of the great Protestant Missionary Societies of the age, whose labours for the human family are indispensable and inestimable. May our common Master bless them with prosperity!

While the Committee's just solicitude is to obey the Lord of all, and conform all their proceedings to His requirements, and secure continually undecaying principles, and Divine influences for the Society's work, they are

stimulated and confirmed in their course by the tried efficiency of their general plan of operation,—the plan originating in one of Mr. Wesley's early Conferences, and which is thus stated in his Large Minutes: "How may we raise a general fund for carrying on the whole work of God? By a yearly subscription. . . . Many are willing to hear, but not to bear the expense. Nor can it be expected of them: Stay till the word of God has touched their hearts, and then they will gladly provide for them that preach it. Does it not lie upon us, in the mean time, to supply their lack of service? to raise a general fund, out of which, from time to time, the expense may be defrayed? By this means, those who willingly offer themselves may travel through every part, and stay wherever there is a call without being burdensome to any. Thus may the Gospel in the life and power thereof, be spread from sea to sea." After an application of this plan for a century, the object still is, the "carrying on the whole work of God"; and the voluntarism of multitudes sustains "a general fund" for its accomplishment.

THE PARENT WESLEYAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, of Great Britain, had last year, 377 Central Stations, 3,177 places of Worship, 538 Ministers and Assistants, 798 other paid Agents, 8,913 unpaid Agents, 111,557 Church Members, 6,478 persons on trial, 84,076 Scholars, and 8 Printing Establishments. Such a summary requires an acquaintance with local circumstances for its immensity and importance to be fully estimated. The Stations are what they are said to be, "Central"; and it must be understood, that though only one, two, or more ordained Ministers are appointed to a Station, there may be from five to twenty other salaried Agents employed, as at Colombo, Bangalore, Melbourne, Free Town, Akrah, Newton Dale, St. Christopher's, and Barbadoes; and the area occupied by so many agents cannot be confined, but is widely extended, sometimes comprehending as many communities, or islands as there are labourers. By this arrangement much is achieved, and much of the Society's funds expended in elevating ignorant and degraded tribes.

From the Report read at the Annual Meeting of the Parent Society, held at Exeter Hall in April, it appears that the spiritual, educational, and social state of the Missions had been very favourable during the year. The fact that the number of persons on probation for membership is more than six thousand is evidence of the good effect of the Word preached, and discipline enforced; and the yearly supply of Assistant Missionaries, Catechists, School Teachers, and Interpreters, from superior Mission Schools is gratifying proof of the progress of Education. The Report says, "The Committee have

aimed at maintaining the various Missions in a state of moderate efficiency without increasing the immediate or future responsibilities of the Society. They have not increased the number of Missionaries, except in cases where special provision was made for that object, as in China and Australia; neither have they filled up every vacancy which has been occasioned during the year by death and other causes." Still, with so much economy in purpose, it has been necessary to send out eighteen Missionaries, and eleven wives of Missionaries. And it may be said without invidiousness, that according to the work done, it supports its operations at less cost per agent than any other British Missionary Society of magnitude.

The income of the Society is £111,048 14s. 4d., and is the highest reported by any Protestant Church purely voluntary; and though some £3,450 less than the aggregate of the last year, it is the largest from established sources for some years. Last year the legacies amounted to nearly £14,000; this year to little more than £2,000; so that there is a handsome increase from ordinary sources; and this is a year of war, augmented taxation, and commercial embarrassment. It is encouraging to see that the receipts from Foreign Auxiliaries is £21,547 10s.; that the Juvenile friends of the Society raised £5,904 5s. 2d.; and that in the report of contributions there are many subscriptions from £10 to £100 each; demonstratively shewing that no misrepresentation, no obloquy, can diminish, much less destroy the confidence of the Society's noble and numerous supporters.

The historical excellence, and affecting allusions in the following extract from the Parent Society's Report will, it is certain, make it unusually acceptable to Christian readers:—

"The prosperity of the past year is the more remarkable when viewed in relation to that afflictive event which was announced at the last Anniversary Meeting. The last year is the first since its formation in which the Society has not had the advantage of the labours of that great man, whose gifts and endowments were so unreservedly placed at its service, and who probably pleaded its cause more frequently, and with greater pecuniary success, than any of his contemporaries. Prudent in counsel, warm in affection, unwearied in labour, powerful in persuasion, Dr. Newton was justly regarded as one of the pillars of the Society, and most appropriately finished his long course of public service by presiding at a Missionary Meeting.

"Almost as soon as the last Anniversary was concluded, the Committee sent a Deputation to attend his remains to their last resting-place, where they were deposited on the 4th May, 1854. On the same day forty years before, the waves closed over all that was mortal of another distinguished advocate and friend of Christian Missions, the Rev. Dr. Coke. Dissimilar in almost every respect, these great men resembled each other in this, that the personal agency of each was, in his day, among the most important means of sustaining and extending Missionary

operations. The forty years which elapsed between the demise of one and the other, affords a period sufficiently long to mark the progress, and test the success, of that work to which each was so ardently attached. At the beginning of that period, the Missionary enterprise was not merely scorned by the world, but misunderstood and doubted of by many of the churches. Now its principles are everywhere admitted—the judgment and the conscience of Christendom are on our side. Then, (to speak more particularly of ourselves) the Conference could hardly be persuaded to consent to Dr. Coke's proposition, and he entreated with tears permission to depart for India: now it sees with joy the self-consecration of Ministers to this work, and has cheerfully placed at its service some of its most honoured Members. Then the supplies were obtained principally by an annual collection, and by the indefatigable diligence of Dr. Coke, who, accompanied by a friend, was accustomed to beg from door to door the small sum annually expended. Now an organization exists throughout the kingdom adapted to all localities, and capable of being worked even more beneficially and extensively than it is. Then the proceeds of long and tiresome begging joined to the regular annual collection, were not a thousand pounds in excess of the sum now raised by the children and youth of our congregations. In 1814, the whole of the foreign work was comprised in British North America and the West Indies, Gibraltar, and Sierra Leone. The language of the British Islands alone was used, unless by the Missionaries to the French prisoners. In the interval more than sixteen languages have become necessary, and are now in constant use by the Missionaries. These signs of progress we may enumerate, but who shall register the souls born from above in forty years, or by what numeration shall we express the amount of enjoyment created and diffused by attempts to do good upon the largest scale, and (in the best sense of those much abused words) to confer the greatest happiness upon the greatest number? The comparison need be carried no further; but it convincingly shows how gracious have been the dealings of God with the Society—how He has cared for His own work, and carried it on even while He has removed those who seemed most serviceable, if not necessary to its progress."

The welcome official visit to Canada during the year, of the Rev. Dr. Beecham, the respected, experienced, and eminently effective Senior General Secretary of the Parent Society, evinces the concern of its Committee for their Foreign work, and is sincerely appreciated by their Colonial brethren, the Committee here, for the statements, counsels, and cordial testimonies, and brotherly well-wishes, with which he favoured the Canadian Conference in London, and on account of the exceedingly important Connexional purpose for which he came to the American Continent, and his wise and successful formation, in the Atlantic Provinces, of the sixth Wesleyan Methodist Conference which the world has beheld: and the expectation is, that e're long other Conferences, in different climes, will be added by a gracious Providence,—which has from the first days of Wesleyan Methodism, by extraordinary developments, honoured, sustained, and expanded its scriptural instrumentalities in every land, to the benefit of myriads of immortal beings purchased with the precious blood of Christ.

But how immense is the work still before that Society! Miss Farmer,

the accomplished daughter of Thomas Farmer, Esquire, Lay Treasurer of the Parent Society, in her true and tasteful volume on "Tonga and the Friendly Islands", impressively says, "Though our own immediate work in Tonga is at an end, (it being now embraced in the new Australian Conference,) we know that the change that has passed upon her sons during the last thirty years, is a type of the change that the large Islands and vast Continents of our globe are yet waiting for. What have we done for New Guinea, and the Spice Islands? What for Japan, Thibet, Tartary, Persia? How inadequate is our supply of Missionaries in India and China! We have fringed Africa with a narrow and broken border of light; but what have we done for its dark and thickly peopled interior? And how few have turned their thoughts, and prayers, and speeches towards South America?"!

The AUXILIARY SOCIETY OF CANADA has, besides the contingent expense of management, outfits, travelling, printing, and publication, this year, sustained in the Province, and the distant Hudson's Bay Territory, 71 Domestic Missions, 20 Indian Missions, and in addition to many Sabbath Schools, 18 Day Schools, and 2 large and expensive Industrial Institutions; and has employed 98 Missionaries to the Whites, 24 Missionaries to the Indians, 20 Teachers, and 10 Interpreters; being an increase of 14 Missions, 5 Schools, and 30 Labourers; making a total of 152 salaried Agents. There are 11,062 White, and 1,289 Indian Members of the Wesleyan Church on the Missions, and as the result of numerous revivals chiefly, and the recent transfer of members from the Parent Society, and from different Circuits, there has been an accession of 1,727 members on the Missions; and a proportionate increase of Hearers, making, it is believed, the whole number of persons, adults and youth, participating in the ministerial and educational benefits of the Society, sixty or seventy thousand. Such a Missionary position, more influential and promising than ever, is very satisfactory to the Committee, and the friends who so generously sustain this institution.

It is not necessary for the Committee to state with particularity the year's operations on the various Missions respectively, and their present condition and prospects, as this is done fully and authentically in the reports from the laborious Missionaries, now published, to which ingenious attention is directed with confidence, and with gratitude to that Being who has been with His servants in "journeys oft", and "in labours more abundant."

The Committee in some degree feel the accumulated responsibilities pressing upon them since the late incorporation of the entire Wesleyan Methodism of Canada and Hudson's Bay, for which they devoutly thank the God of love;

but the pressure is much relieved by the cordiality and generous declarations of the British Conference; the fraternal harmony of ministerial and lay brethren in Eastern, as in Western Canada; the corresponding and opportune approbation and liberal coöperation of the friends of the Missions; and more than all, the honour which God puts upon the Society by increasing its opportunities and facilities for saving souls, and glorifying the Redeemer. It was very satisfactory to state last year that the Rev. John Ryerson, Co-Delegate, had gone as a deputation to Hudson's Bay, accompanied by several suitable Missionaries and their families; and now that satisfaction is increased by the safe return of the Deputation, whose prompt and successful exertions, amidst many privations and dangers, were, at an early meeting of the Committee, gratefully, though imperfectly acknowledged; and from which for years to come many advantages must accrue to the scattered and untutored inhabitants, and to the Wesleyan Missions, in that vast and interesting Northern region. Throughout the tour he was gratified and aided by the courteous and hospitable attentions of the Gentlemen at the Establishments of the Honourable Hudson's Bay Company, and especially by the very considerate arrangements made by His Excellency the Governor, Sir George Simpson. And not only did the Deputation obtain a correct knowledge of the Wesleyan and other Missions already in existence, but of numerous needy and Pagan localities inviting to the Society, which should be speedily occupied. The calls upon the last Conference were too abundant and imperative for this to be done to an adequate extent, but Mr. Woolsey and Mr. Steinhaur were ordained and designated to the Bay Territory,—their post fast by the Rocky Mountains; and doubtless they are e're this discharging the duties of their far-off field of self-denial and toil,—distant indeed from the Society's other valued Missionaries in that Territory, but one in the spirit they breathe, the means they employ, and the apostolic object they ardently contemplate.

Next to the sanction of God, and the intercessions of His people, the Committee place the necessity, at all periods, of competent Agents—agents themselves regenerated by the Holy Ghost, doctrinally correct, variously gifted, Divinely and ecclesiastically called, strong in mind to think, strong in body to labour, apt to teach, happy in pastoral activities, and the soul fraught with intense zeal, fervent charity, and invincible faith. Such are some of the essentials of Missionary fitness for Canada and Hudson's Bay, and such, in different degrees, it is presumed, are the qualifications of the Society's Missionaries. That distinguished Wesleyan Minister, and matchless advocate of Missions, the late Rev. Dr. Newton, declares in his invaluable life by the Rev. Thomas Jackson, what every Christian Missionary believes: "To receive

and give, to get and to do good, are the only things that are worth living for in this world." Few can expect to live as long as one of the Society's honoured Missionaries, the Reverend William Case, who has recently completed his fiftieth year as an unwearied and most devoted Itinerant Methodist Minister, and whose "Jubilee Sermon," preached by request before the Conference, and now sent from the press in accordance with the unanimous wish of his brethren and sons in the Gospel, will be long and everywhere treasured for its evangelical and Wesleyan doctrine, its hallowed and fatherly spirit, and its precious reminiscences of the simple and early origin, swift progress, and unspeakable utility of Methodism in Canada.

It has been the solicitude of the Committee for some time to make ampler communications to the public of the position and proceedings of the Society, under the impression, that its necessity, usefulness, and intentions had only to be more extensively known, to be more extensively approved and supported. They have nothing to conceal, and have an indiscribable pleasure in unreservedly exhibiting their principles and operations. For this purpose all the Ministers of the Wesleyan Church devote much time and talent to the increasingly attractive Anniversaries of the Society annually, and great and growing are the joys and gifts of the thronging people. For this purpose, too, the last Annual Report was made more voluminous and specific than any former one; and it is intended that this shall not be less so. Thousands of addresses for age and for youth have been printed and distributed; and during this year there has been commenced a periodical, designated, "Wesleyan Missionary Notices, Canada Conference," which the more widely it has been disseminated, the more has it secured commendation, and, in conjunction with other publications of the Missionary Press, has conducted to the growth of Missionary intelligence, and zeal, and liberality,—ministered to the edification of Christian families, and vivified the devotions at Missionary Prayer Meetings. Besides these stated issues, the Society has on its own responsibility published this year, in beautiful form, "A Missionary Tour in the Territory of the Hon. Hudson's Bay Company," by its very intelligent Deputation to the Bay,—who is thus the author of a volume, which, while it indicates his Wesleyan excellence, and Christian catholicity and energy, needs no other eulogium than this: it is worthy of a place with Crantz's History of Greenland, and Young's Southern World. These, with frequent supplies of the Parent Society's valuable publications, are powerful incentives to pious effort; and although by these means no small expense is incurred, religious sympathy is deepened, and the Missions sustained with remarkable intelligence and vigour; and, then, the wish is for a larger outlay for the same purpose, that blessings the more copious may be the glad result.

The monetary settlement consequent on the transfer of the Missions in Eastern Canada not yet having been finally adjusted with the Home Committee, they are not now reported. The official communications, and financial statements relating to Western Canada now submitted to the Society's subscribers, furnish evidence of the correctness of the opinions just expressed, as they excite in an unusual degree the admiration of the Committee. Better attention on the part of ministerial and lay Officers to the suggestions of the Missionary Department at the Conference Office this year has had a good effect. The Public Meetings for the Branch Societies throughout Canada West and East, have, (though always felicitous,) been more prominently marked with the lofty and holy attributes of a Christian Festival. The Collectors were never so methodical and thorough in their prized and gratuitous labours. Never, it is thought, were the moral necessities of human beings more deeply felt, or supplication to God for them more earnestly made than this year—nor more prevalent. The prognostications of decline, after the novelty of such efforts had passed away, are false; and the abundant fruitfulness of this, one of many fields which the Lord hath planted, shews that God's work passeth not away, but abideth, in freshness and fragrance.

The Committee, without any personal interest, have anxiously economized the funds sacred to souls, with a due regard to the varying circumstances, and efficiency of their very extended and costly agency: and the subscribers have always candidly awarded their confidence. This, and the ceaseless shouts of victory in the spiritual arena they occupy, fully repay them for their willing, though not faultless services. It was difficult, a year ago to find language to acknowledge the doings of the Society's contributors, when the increase of funds was great; and this year, when the increase is still great, that difficulty is not lessened. "By liberal things" they "shall stand." The printing of many cards and addresses for the young has been much more than remunerated; and in this Report the Catalogue of names will be pleasanter than ever to read,—pleasanter to parents, ministers, and Sabbath School Teachers, for the more frequent insertion of "Juvenile Offerings". How welcome especially are these Branch Lists in which, preceded by the name of the father and the mother, the name of every son and daughter of the family appears; and not satisfied with subscribing themselves, many of them are successful collectors with "Christmas Card" in hand! A year ago the appeal for Hudson's Bay was first heard on the Wesleyan Missionary platforms of Western Canada, and it is not doubted that its effect is embodied in many subscriptions not specifically for that object; but in several cases, it will be seen, that Hudson's Bay is upon the heart of the subscriber—

its Missions and unsaved wanderers; and in one instance the death-bed favours the Society with a legacy for Hudson's Bay,—an example which deserves practical attention in Canada, and might, as it does in Great Britain, be made greatly to enhance the funds, and redound to the glory of Him for whom “to die is gain.” In addition to their regular subscriptions, some have not imagined it to be a work of supererogation to prepare, collect, and give clothing and other useful articles; and several months ago thoughtful friends on the Toronto City West Circuit—always noble in benevolence—sent to the Superintendent of Missions a box of articles of £40 value for the Wesleyan Mission at Oxford House in Hudson's Bay. Such a subscription, when persons have already given, is somewhat supplementary; but how serviceable! They shall hear of it again when the Lover of the poor tells the deed to worlds: “I was naked and ye clothed me”!

For the patronage and prosperity of the past, and for the beneficence, diversified benefits, and prospects of the present of the Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, and of every other Protestant Christian Missionary Association in Canada and the World, “blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, and might, be unto God for ever and ever”! To all the friends of the Society the Committee's most cordial thanks,—to Ministers of other Churches, and of the Wesleyan, who have to any extent served the Society; and they have served it well;—to members of Committees, and other Lay gentlemen, who have facilitated its operations;—to Collectors, whose unwearied and unremunerated zeal, and in an inclement season, is their praise;—to Christian Families, who from the east to the west of the country have given by local preparations interest to the Anniversaries, and pleasure to their guests by free hospitalities;—to all the Subscribers and Donors, of every age, of every Branch Society, and of every Christian community in Canada, and Hudson's Bay, who now by tens of thousands give to Christ, and some “beyond their power”, “willing of themselves;” and to those Jacobs and Hannahs of Christ's Israel, who, in city, and settlement, and wilderness, cry without ceasing, “Hallowed be thy name”! The assurance to the intercessors is “All the ends of the world shall remember and turn unto the Lord: and all the kindreds of the nations shall worship before Thee. For the Kingdom is the Lord's.”

INDIAN MISSIONS.

A late Chief Justice of Ceylon, Sir Anthony Oliphant, has remarked of Africa, "If you once convince the natives of that country that the Great Almighty desires a pure heart and a sincere worship, they are perfectly capable of worshipping in sincerity and in truth". And in the Missionary annals of that country there are many exemplifications of this sterling sentiment; in other countries it is the same; and in Canada, and the far North, the Wesleyans, and their fellow Protestant Christians, can present vivid facts corroborative of it.

The Society commenced its efforts among the Aborigines of Canada when much in their condition and character forbade them,—the natural inaptitude of ignorance, the enmity of depravity, the stubbornness of the social habits of ages, the rootedness of puerile superstitions, the contaminations consequent on acquaintanceship with vicious white men, and the unflagging attempts of such men to give perpetuity to the wild manners, and beastliness of the natives. Could such difficulties have deterred, the Society would, at any rate, have postponed the trial to rescue: but the Gospel is unabashed by the formidable and threatening; and so is the Christian Missionary. There was another consideration, not alluring in this path of obstacles; the opinion was expressed, and is expressed still, that the Indians are "a doomed race"; and, if so, why expend money and men upon their lot? But there is a sophism in the argument,—what is worse, there is something no better than infidelity,—certainly what is barbarous. Doomed or not doomed, it is trifling to decide: and had the Indians soonest to be swept from earth, the philosophy of Calvary would say, soonest, then, give them that preparation for eternity which "the glorious Gospel" secures!

Every way, the Society in its first assaults upon the Paganism of Canada was right; and in routing darkness, prejudice, superstition, and vice since,—in counter-working the approaches of a serpent—Papacy, and in soothing the Indians under civil disabilities, it has been right; and "the blessing" of them that were "ready to perish" has come upon it. Wesleyan Missionaries have been the conservators of Indian life, morals, and property. Little has been said of the devoted wives of the Missionaries, but the Committee know the great value of their unrecorded, self-denying, holy, Dorcas-like services; and

their memorial perisheth not. As with the Parent Society in Britain, so with its auxiliary here, a large proportion of its funds has with gladness been annually expended for the Aboriginal inhabitants of this part of North America; and some of its most signal triumphs were won when the subsidies from Christians were not a tenth of the present amount. The victory, however, is not by human wisdom, might, or mercy any where or at any time, in such a contest: but there was a forceful significance in this statement then deeply touching; as there was in earliest Christian times, when weakness was made strength, and poverty wealth, by Jesus of Nazareth.

It is a momentous question, What is the select instrumentality God has thus honoured? And when ascertained, the safe inference will be, that the same instrumentality is everywhere, and among all people, indispensable to complete Missionary success. George, a distinguished Christian Sovereign of Polynesia, according to the Rev. Robert Young's valuable new volume, answers the question. In a sermon which he delivered as a Wesleyan Local Preacher, he says, "We must read the sacred Book. What Kingdom was ever wise without reading? This book is a compass, a chart, telling us where we are, and where to go. Can the *lotu* prosper without reading the Book? The Bible is the thing to confirm us in religion." This is the interpretation of every thing dim, dark, and puzzling about Indian improvement; and the jargon of the wigwam is silenced forever. The reason is here, and only here, for the establishment of the Society's Christian Indian Villages, the quietude of Indian households, the intelligence of Indian minds, the sanctification of Indian hearts, the immortality of Indian hopes, the abolition of Indian deities, weapons, ferocity, cupidity, sensuality, stolidity, inhumanity; and for the putting in the place of these, "whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report." And this is the eventful moment when these immutable considerations must come with replenished consciousness to the judgment and conscience of every patron of the Wesleyan Missions: some two or three, if not four or five hundred thousand Natives of the Hudson's Bay Territory are without the Gospel! The Tonga King is in advance of certain modern speculatists and philosophers, who would but civilize savages to save them. They are lost or confounded if that be the sole or the primary means employed; and though they might reach an ancient Roman, or modern Chinese social elevation, yet with gods many, which civilization cannot destroy, they are without "hope, and without God." Such are the established views of the Society, and of its Missionaries in Hudson's Bay and Canada.

The Committee know the preference which the friends of the Society give to intelligence from their Indian Missions; and it is amiable; for those Missions have cost them many anxieties, and thousands of pounds, yet often caused them exultation. Besides the Indians these letters report, there are lesser bodies of them at Amherstburgh, Wardsville, Penetanguishine Road, and Scoogog, regularly, and at the Society's expense, supplied with the word and ordinances, by the Society's Missionaries, and of whom some 137 are consistent Members of the Wesleyan Church. The letters first inserted will gratify expectation, doubtless those from Hudson's Bay Stations, new to the Society. Their topics shall not be forestalled, but the existence and increase of evangelized communities are objects in many a locality more than poetic; the docility, the songs, the homage of Red men in the Church of God striking; the simultaneous Scripture readings, and happy devotions of Red Families morning and evening, if not at noon, delightful. And then the Sabbath School, and the Day School; and, as the result of these religious exercises, manual labours, and mental achievements, social privileges, temporal sufficiency, and reputation; and above all, blessed be God, the perennial happiness of many Indians departed in the faith. With them it is no longer the dissonance of the war-whoop, but "the song of the Lamb." This is the process; and although it is not far advanced, it is not slow, when human beings are the subjects, from time immemorial inured to other habits. Lamentable it is that the emissaries of a false religion; the heartless promoters of drunkenness, disease, and ruin; the devotees of Mammon; and the partizans of an ill-adapted secular policy, should in any circumstances retard this Gospel process.—the unblushing machinations of all repugnant to truth, and righteousness, and charity.

Special attention is desired to the reports of the two Industrial Institutions, from the Rev. Messrs. Musgrove and Rose, whose duties as Principals are exceedingly important. Whilst it is cheering to read of the Church Missionary Society's Christian Institution at Fourah Bay, in Africa, and of the splendid Institution of the Free Church of Scotland, at Madras, in India, and the crowded Wesleyan Normal School, at Nukualofa, in the Friendly Islands, be sure it cheers to think of the Alnwick, and Mount Elgin Wesleyan Native Institutions of Canada, all effectual agencies destined, with others, to lift the pall of ignorance from the intellects and hearts of living, and of unborn millions. And it is a hopeful circumstance that several Natives now in the Mission work were educated at the Society's Missionary Seminaries; some even at Victoria College, and that sons of Indians are now there. The advantages of superior Native Schools are being discovered by more Indians,

and a wish has been earnestly reiterated for additional Industrial Establishments. These aspirations of minds, once untaught and debased prove that there has been advancement. Christianity aided them in the first steps of their progress, and in all their subsequent career; and if perfection is to be given to the attainments already reached, and every son of the forest, whether near or remote, is to rise to the majesty of a man, a Christian, and a citizen, it must be accomplished by Christianity.

ALNWICK.

"We present our Report of the Alnwick Mission under a deep sense of our indebtedness to the Divine Being, for his protection and guidance vouchsafed to us during the year just closing. Amidst much to discourage us in our toilsome and up-hill work, we have had much also of an encouraging nature to cheer us in the prosecution of it.

"By the blessing of God upon our united labours, we are able to report an increase of 24 in our membership, 14 Indians and ten Whites. There have been a few cases of inebriation among our Indians, and we were obliged to exclude two from Society, but I am glad to be able to say, that one of them has since returned, humble and penitent, and has been again admitted on trial. Our Indian Missionary at Rice Lake, Br. Herkimer, who visited this Mission fortnightly, held a protracted meeting, here, last winter, when upwards of 20 adults and young persons professed to be converted, and were added to the Church, 14 of whom are still in connexion with us. At one of our White appointments also, where special services were held, 10 were added as the fruits of the meeting. It is recommended by the District Meeting, that the appointments among the White population be detached from the Mission, and formed into a regular Circuit. We have no doubt but this arrangement, when carried out, will greatly promote the interests of the work on the Circuit, and afford us more time to attend to the duties more immediately connected with the Mission.

"We have 26 boarders in the Industrial Institution, 19 boys and 7 girls, one more than last year. With very little help besides that rendered by the boys, we have just completed our Spring work on the Farm, having put in 36 acres of Spring wheat, 20 acres of peas, 10 acres of oats, 5 acres of potatoes, 4 acres of turnips and carrots, and 1 acre of beans; the girls have also performed their part of the work in the house. Most of the boys and girls are making considerable proficiency in the various branches of study, taught them in the School, such as Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Geography, &c.

"The Sunday School, under the direction of our excellent Teacher, Mr. Cathey, has been kept open through the year, at 9 o'clock a. m. We have also a Bible Class, which meets on Sabbath afternoon at 3 o'clock; and we are led to look upon this as one of the most efficient means we are employing in connection with the Institution, for the moral and spiritual improvement of the children. We have preaching also, every Sabbath morning, and either preaching or public prayer-meeting and exhortation in the evening. The Holy Sabbath is thus spent, in doing and getting good, and our dependence, in the use of the means, is upon

the Great Head of the Church. May He so abundantly pour out his Holy Spirit upon us, that sooner or later; all connected with this important Mission and Institution, may be brought under the influence of saving grace."

MOUNT ELGIN AND MUNSEY.

"Through the mercy of God we have now closed the fifth year's labour on this Mission, a Mission embracing three distinct Indian Bands, *Ojibwa*, *Oneida*, and *Munsee*, and the white families living near the Reserve, who are mostly dependent on Missionary Stations on this Mission for the ministrations of the Word of God. Brothers Sunday, Sickles and Half-moon each speaking to his own people, in their own language, the Word of Eternal Life, have been most faithful in building up believers, reclaiming the backslidden, and in turning their benighted countrymen "from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God.

"Various difficulties have beset us on this Mission during the year. The native converts have been assailed by the *Divisionist*, and some few have been drawn away from the Society; though some are returning. This hindered the work of God!

"Heavy pecuniary loss to the Indians did much for a season to shake their confidence in the white man; and the neglect of their business unsettled their minds, and caused many to fall into temptation; but the appointment of a most excellent and suitable Superintendent, and his kind attention to their affairs, has done much toward restoring their confidence, and the removal of their gloom. The Rev. R. Phelps, whose failing health has compelled him to take a superannuated relation, beside teaching the Oneida-Day School, embracing some 45 children, rendered valuable assistance in preaching to the whites, and a flourishing class among these has been raised up.

"Every effort that could be made, has been put forth by our Brother Sunday, to save that degraded band called the "Bear Creeks;" and though some have been gathered into the fold, others, whose cases had become hopeful, have been overthrown, through the unceasing labours of the venders of "strong drink:" their blankets have been taken in exchange for whiskey; and under its maddening influence, one of these poor besotted creatures roasted his drunken companion on a fire of coals to death. Another stabbed himself and fell dead! Thus, while the Missionary labours to save these lost Sons of the Forest, and sometimes rejoices over the converted, he has also to mourn over the lost ones, snatched from the hand of hope by the venders of the accursed "fire-water"! Does not the blood of these slain cry from the ground to God against them! Through the supplies of strong drink, furnished by the *White man*, this once powerful and numerous people have been fast passing away, until there remains (including *Ojibwas*, *Munsees*, and *Pahtawatahmies*) only 176 men, 176 women, 115 boys, 113 girls, making a total of 582. In 1846 they numbered over 700! One's heart sickens at the thought, that it is thus the White man requites the poor Native for the land he has taken from him! This does not include the *Oneidas*, who through the blessings of the Gospel, are increasing in numbers. They now number 507, an increase of nearly 35 in 4 years. They have nearly all abandoned the chase, and live by agricultural pursuits.

"THREE SABBATH-SCHOOLS have been regularly attended to, on this Mission, embracing some 80 youths, from which much good is accruing.

"THE MOUNT ELGIN INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTION, established on this Mission, a full account of which has been given in the five preceding Annual Reports, has received every possible attention. The Boys' and Girls' Schools, under the able management of two excellent Teachers, have been in successful operation. Sixty-one names have been entered on the books of the Institution during the year as boarders: and though some, who had finished their course, returned home to settle amongst their own people, and others left before the expiration of the time for which they had entered, there are yet 44 boarded and clothed in the Institution; and daily applications for admission for want of room, have to be rejected. In a recent visit to the Institution by the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, instructions were given to receive the children from Moravian Town, which will require the immediate enlargement of the buildings. An additional wing is now under contract, and is to be completed this Fall.

"A Brick Church, which will cost some £500, is also being erected near the Institution; towards which the Indians of this Station have subscribed out of their annuity \$800.

"Though the care and training of these youth involves a great amount of sacrifice and labour, we are thankful to God that the daily religious, mental, and industrial labour is not in vain, but is productive of much satisfactory fruit.—Over 11,919 verses of the Scriptures were committed to memory, and recited, in English, on the Sabbaths, by these youths. This seed, watered by the dews of Heaven will bring forth fruit that shall be gathered when 'Heaven shall shout the harvest home.'

S T . C L A I R .

"Through the mercy of God we are brought to the close of another ecclesiastical year; its toils and conflicts are past, but to be reviewed when the Judge of all the earth will do right. In presenting our Annual Report we are reminded of the visitation of cholera, by which some forty persons connected with this Band were removed. Consumption and scrofula greatly increased the dreadful mortality. During this afflictive dispensation, we could witness the influence of Divine grace upon these pagan converts to Christianity. 1st, Their patience in enduring affliction. 2nd, Their kind attention to the suffering. 3rd, Their peace in death! Speaking in class, and love-feast, they seemed to feel "the pleasing smart of the meltings of a broken heart." This band numbers 588; about 100 children under 15 years of age. Principally on account of sickness the Mission School has been kept open but one quarter. The Sabbath School, we trust, is doing good. All who can read, and will attend, are put in a Bible Class, and each Sabbath meet at 9 o'clock, and after reading and recitation, a lecture is given in presence of the congregation, on the Bible lesson, which is interpreted. Our congregations are large, attentive and cleanly. Seldom is there a blanket worn in time of worship, except in the cold season. On account of deaths and a few exclusions, we report a small decrease, though we have had some hopeful conversions. A number of females occasionally meet at the Mission-House, where they are instructed in needle-work, &c. It is pleasing to witness how ready they are

to make repeated efforts to imitate their Teachers. Mrs. W. has introduced the husk bed, and it is beginning to take. The plan is to slit the corn husk fine, and use instead of straw or feathers: this forms a cheap and elastic bed, which is an acquisition to their neat bed-quilts and curtains.

"We feel it justly due to the Mount Elgin Institution to say, that the youth who have been trained there a suitable time are decidedly improved; but something should be done for them after leaving the Institution, to prevent their sliding back into their former habits after their return to their homes. We trust this subject will not be lost sight of by those whom it concerns. Some matured plan should be adopted to bring Indian children more directly under the influence of a moral and religious training in order to secure their *salvation*."

GRAND RIVER.

"I regret I have nothing interesting or encouraging to communicate. You will perceive by the returns at Conference, that we have to report a small decrease in members; for although there have been a few conversions, and accessions to the Church, yet not enough to make up the loss we sustained during our severe visitation last autumn, not only in the death of a number of our best members, but also the breaking up, and scattering of several of the largest and best families, the loss of whom is severely felt both in the society and congregation."

"We are blessed with a general state of peace and harmony in the societies; also with pretty large and attentive congregations; and our people for the most part maintain an exemplary deportment and character before the world; but there is a sad neglect of the means of grace, especially Class and Prayer-meetings; and although exemplary in their attendance on the ministry of the gospel, and also the sacrament of the Lord's Supper; yet we cannot expect to enjoy spiritual prosperity, or hope to see a revival of the work of grace among us, unless there is a great improvement in our attention to all the ordinances of God's house, and increased fervour in our devotions. For this we are laboring and praying; and though much discouraged, yet we try to believe and "hope against hope" that we shall see better days.

"The health of the mission has been pretty good this season until within a fortnight or three weeks, since which a number of families have been taken down with the fever. I have just returned, almost tired out, from a journey of twelve or fifteen miles, through the swamps and mud, visiting the sick, and administering the sacrament of the Lord's Supper to one apparently in the last stage of the fever; and burying another who died yesterday. From appearances, I fear we shall have another season of wide-spread sickness and mortality."

named places is about seven miles, and the Mission House stands near the centre. Its remoteness from White settlers, together with the unhealthiness of the locality, renders it an unenviable situation for the Minister's family. The Indians themselves are very unhealthy; many have died since their settlement in this place. This is rather a gloomy picture, I am aware; it has, however, a bright side to it; the greater number of those who have been called away by death, gave evidence of a change of heart before they took their departure; and some of them were inexpressibly happy in the hour of dissolution. We have had two triumphant deaths among us recently. The first was a Mrs. Smith, a person between eighteen and nineteen years of age. She was the daughter of James Chickhalk, one of our most efficient Class-Leaders. She was not a Member of our Church, nor had she made any profession of religion previous to her last illness. She was not long confined to her bed. I visited her several times during the last three weeks of her life, and urged the necessity of her being regenerated or born again, in order to her being admitted into the Kingdom of Glory, and at the same time directed her attention to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world. Suffice it to say, she sought and found redemption through the blood of Christ, even the forgiveness of her sins. This happy change took place about three days before she died, and from that time until she left the world, she was filled with joy and peace in believing. She has left an infant in the hands of its grand-mother. "O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God; how unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out.—The next was Thomas Young. Br. Young has been a consistent member of our Church for several years, and for some time past he has served the church in the capacity of a Class-Leader. Last fall he took the chill fever, which reduced his system very much and brought on a complication of diseases; and he was confined to his bed most of the time during the winter. I visited him frequently, and always found him rejoicing in hope of the glory of God. He died, and was buried while I was at the Conference: his end was peace. I feel disposed to say, in the language of one of old, "Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his."

"I had only two appointments at the beginning of the year, the one among the Indians, and the other in the Hartford Settlement, some six or seven miles distant from the Mission-House. I have, however, passed over these narrow bounds, and for the greater part of the year have attended an appointment in the village of Oakland, where, by the blessing of God, we have succeeded in raising up a Society consisting of some 27 members, a large majority of whom have experienced a change of heart. Since I commenced my labours among them we have also had a little revival in Hartford, and some ten or eleven have been added to the Society in that place. To God be all the praise. I have several times during the year visited a settlement in the south part of Townsend, where there should be regular preaching; but it is impossible for the Missionary stationed here to attend to them with any degree of regularity, owing to the bad state of the roads. If we had an additional labourer here we could find employment for him. May the Lord of the harvest send forth more labourers into his vineyard. Amen and amen."

R A M A .

"It is with peculiar feelings that I attempt to draw up a report of this Mission. Not because there is any thing very different from former years; but from

the fact, that with this year closes my labours among the Indians, with whom I have laboured eleven years. They have been years of trial and privation both to myself and family; but they have been cheerfully borne for the love of Christ, and love to the interesting, though I fear, doomed race. Those years have not passed without here and there a sun-beam lighting the dark scene, and cheering the heart, like an oasis in the desert.

"I have witnessed the power of the Gospel to raise these sons of the forest from the lowest depths of human degradation, to be the sons of the living God: nay more, I have seen, after years of striving and toiling, those red men dying in the triumphs of faith. And if I am so happy as to gain that land where the clouds of adversity never pass between its inhabitants and their glorious Sun, I expect to meet many of those poor Indians, rich in faith, who will shine forever, whilst many who are wise, and rich, and noble on the earth will, it is to be feared, be lost in darkness forever.

"We have buried three Members during the past year,—one a female, taken away in the midst of life, leaving a husband and family to mourn the loss of a mother who loved her children, and whilst living did all she could for their comfort. But above all, she loved the Saviour, and has gone to dwell with him above. The other two were very old men, who died in great peace. They were among the first of this tribe to embrace Christ and his Gospel, when it was proclaimed by the venerable Case and others. Peter Cowen, who was near one hundred years old, was one we lost, and Captain John was the other, who must have been more than one hundred and twenty years old. These, with many others, (since I have been with them) have left this world of trouble, for that where colour and language will make no difference.

"In going from them, I feel as if I was leaving a helpless part of my family behind; but my declining health renders it imperative, and I trust that the God whom I serve, and the Church to which I belong, will not forget these sheep in the wilderness, but will watch over and supply them still.

RICE LAKE.

"You have, dear brother, been at Rice Lake, our beautiful Mission, and as I have heard, you have spoken well of it. Could you visit us now, or bye-and-bye, when the crops are ripening, you would still admire our little village, with its green slopes down to the water, which, beneath a cloudless May sky, and as far as the Islands, is dotted all over with points of fire from the little waves dancing in the sunlight. The White Man puts every thing under him. The waves of our Lake, free since the Great Spirit made them, are free no more. Iron bands bind them from shore to shore. The White Man's fingers are strong fingers. Iron bars in his hands become as pliable as the sinews of the deer in woman's hand when she is beading a moccasin. God has been good to us Indians in letting us see these times. Glory be to his name!

"I am in good spirits. Last Sabbath was the best Quarterly Meeting we have had on the Mission. God was with us. To him be the praise. Often have I been here, but it appears to me that this spring there is more light and life on the Lake, in the field, and in the sun-light, than there used to be. Ah! here it

is! We have good meetings. God is with us. The people are all busy on their farms. Soul and body are being cared for, and our good God has not waited for us to go half way to meet him, but has, glory be to his name, come right here, to our own homes, and is blessing us.

"At present there are in connection with our Society, 47 members. Three have joined during the year, two have been dropped, four have removed, and one has gone to her happy rest. Brother Taunche's only son triumphantly passed from this to the upper world. Our religion is indeed of heaven. The young as well as the old, the Red Man as well as the White, enjoys its comforts here, and its consolations in the hour of death. Life ends in death. Who does not know this? Without God's favour DEATH indeed! O the hardness of heart, the blindness, the madness to refuse God's mercy with a proud heart, a stiff neck, and an open eye! To look at the Sun of Righteousness until all light is struck from our eyes, and we are left in night and woe. Spirit of the Lord, still bear with the sinner! O work for thy glory among my white brethren, as well as among my own.

"That God may bless Missions and the friends of Missions, is the prayer of your brother in Jesus,"

NEWASH AND COLPOYS'S BAY.

"From the wreck of a steamer last fall, several barrels of ardent spirits were washed on shore, and were concealed by wicked Indians; this, with some other causes beyond our control, produced several instances of intoxication, even among our own people, with whom we had to deal as our discipline directs. Our School has been frequently interrupted by the absence of the children from the Mission, and the change of Teachers, but we have succeeded in continuing the school in the midst of opposition, though not with that degree of success we had anticipated, but perhaps with as much as we could reasonably expect, till we can have a Manual Labour School established at all our principal Missions. A few Pagans, from other parts, who visited this Mission, were hopefully converted to God during the year, and have settled among us. The means of grace have, in general, been well attended. We have much to encourage us in the stupendous work in which we are engaged. We therefore thank God, and take courage."

S A U G E E N .

"Nothing has occurred on this Mission during the past year out of the ordinary routine of duties. We have still to complain of the irregular roving habits of the Indians, which takes them for so much of the time from under the ministerial oversight of the Missionary; yet in nearly every instance, members, when absent from the Mission, have conducted themselves with Christian propriety. Some improvement has been made by these Indians in agricultural pursuits. We have used our best endeavours to cultivate in them habits of industry and frugality, and they begin to see the necessity of cultivating the soil. The members

our Mission have been faithful to the service of God, especially on the Sabbath, during the year. The attendance of others, not members, on the means of grace, is generally good. The total number of our members is 64; 62 Indians and 2 Whites: 6 have been expelled from our Church, and 2 have died in the Lord. The Indians are desirous of having an Industrial School, for which purpose they are willing to give to the Wesleyan Methodist Church 300 acres of land in their Reserve. Had it not been for the continued exposure of the Indians to the wiles of unprincipled drunkard-makers, by whom, as in former years, the devil has succeeded in retaking many of those who had clean escaped his debasing power, but who, by these faithful allies of Satan, have again been brought under the yoke of bondage, it would have been our privilege to have rejoiced over most of the Indians here, as the saved of the Lord.

"The School, I am happy to state, has been well attended, and as well kept by Br. James Briggs, who has given general satisfaction: scholars attending, daily, from 7 to 25.

"My heart's desire and prayer to God is, that all the dear Indians at Saugeen and elsewhere, may be found prepared when called for.

SNAKE ISLAND.

We have had some tokens for good. "The Sun of Righteousness has arisen with healing in his wings" to some precious souls. We have received into the Church 28 souls during the last six months. You know when the Holland Landing Mission was formed it took all the Members on this Mission among the White people and incorporated them into itself, so that when we came, in December last, there was but a small Society of Indians, 21 in number, that constituted the whole sum of the membership on this field of labour. And the Indians were away camping all the winter, so that I was sent to form a new Mission. We have been enabled to form five new congregations amongst people that were left nearly altogether to Unitarianism and the devil. Sutton and Egypt never had Methodist preaching established in them before. They have the name of being very wicked places, but still many of the people are becoming very kind to us, and I believe that a good Methodist Society will be raised up yet in each of these places. When we got the appointments formed, and I had done my Missionary tours, we began to use what Mr. Caughey calls, "Revival Artillery," and the conflict resulted in one place, in raising 18 Members and a good congregation. We went to another place called Egypt, hoping to deliver some Israelites from bondage, but the first night the Egyptians came under the command of King Pharaoh, the Devil, and burned up our Meeting-House. Still, God has opened the hearts of many to receive us into their houses. We have a good attentive congregation in this place. We preach every alternate Sabbath afternoon. When they get another house up there may be a good Protracted Meeting held. On the whole, I think this Mission will yield an abundant harvest of souls by-and-bye. May God pour his Holy Spirit on the people, that they may taste his grace and live. Amen.

MUD LAKE.

"This field of labour, I am happy to say, is in a healthy state: the members of society in general are living as becometh the gospel of Christ. Some thirty-five have been added to the Church, during the year, the most of whom, I trust, are truly converted to God. To his name be all the praise. I am happy to say, that the Indians are doing well. I have not heard one complaint against any of them that belongs to us, about drunkenness. This year consumption is preying on them very much. They should be removed from this place."

GARDEN RIVER.

"As regards this mission, the past year has been one of pleasing prosperity.—We have not, indeed, been without our trials, but these have hitherto been surmounted. When Methodism commenced its efforts in this place the ground was unoccupied by any other denomination. The Indians spent the Sabbath in fishing or hunting—or not unfrequently in scenes of dissipation. No sympathy was manifested in their behalf, and no effort made, even by the assumed teachers of the "Great Queen's religion" to emancipate them from the thralldom of wretchedness and degradation into which they were sunk. But strange to say—no sooner had Methodism become established and begun to exert a happy influence among them, than it met with the most violent opposition. *Puseyism* becoming alarmed at the effects produced, made every effort to overthrow our work. Slander and misrepresentation were resorted to in order to bias the minds of the Indians against every other religion save that of "the Church," while jesuitism has made use of all its heathenish parade and senseless mummery to draw them into the meshes of Popery. Yet amidst all, Methodism not only holds its ground, but its course is still onward; and we feel that onward and aggressive *will* be its course while God is honored in the preaching of a full and free Salvation."

"The Indian is no theorist: his case demands *present help*. Give him Christ as a present Saviour, and then—to use the words of Chief Payahpetahung—"With nothing but the big house which Munedoo has built us for a shelter—and a few rabbit-skins for our clothing, we are rich."

"During the past year several have died in the Lord. Among these were two Roman Catholic women, who were savingly converted while living among our people. One of them (whose disease was consumption,) we visited a short time before her death. For several days she had not spoken intelligibly. We endeavored to point her to the Saviour, and then commenced to sing the hymn,— "Jesus my all to Heaven is gone," &c., in the native tongue, when to the astonishment of all present she began shouting, "Praise Jesus; I love Jesus; I shall soon be for ever with Jesus." She continued in this happy state of mind till the next evening "when her happy spirit took its flight to mansions on high."

"Our Mission School continues to flourish; considerable improvement has been made in it during the past year. We have received from a friend of Indian Missions \$150 for the support of a female teacher. During the past winter the school has been regularly taught, and well attended. In local matters we have also made some advancement. An addition has been made to the mission house; and

through the kindness of friends a bell weighing 127lbs. has been purchased for the church."

"Last winter we extended our labors to the Pumpkin Point Band ; making them a weekly visit. The prospects upon the whole are encouraging. But what is all that has been done compared with all that still remains to be done ? From scores of perishing bands the question is urged, "How can one or two laborers suffice to meet the wants of the suffering multitudes of this vast country?" Men of Israel, help ! Mothers in Israel, help ! While you have bread enough, and to spare, send at least the crumbs to this perishing people, and God will own the gift."

PIC RIVER.

"This new Mission is established at the mouth of the Pic River, on the North shore of Lake Superior, near the Hudson's Bay Company's fort. When I received my appointment to this remote field of missionary toil, it was with considerable reluctance and trembling I entered upon it. But I came hoping it was my providential path. Trusting in the Lord, I determined to do all I could to advance the good cause, and for this I have labored day and night in my weak way. During the year I have visited the Indian in his wig-waum. Last winter, I spent four or five weeks in search of the poor benighted Pagan on his hunting-ground in the interior of this cold country, and have laid night after night on the top of the snow, without shelter ; sometimes I have found a foot of snow on top me in the morning. We may not always reap an abundant harvest from our toil. Yet when there is some good effected, it is cause of much gratitude to Him who condescends to employ such feeble instruments in improving the condition of those who sit in darkness. At this Mission we have a few that enjoy the comforts of religion, and meet in class regularly. In all, nineteen have renounced paganism, given up their images, and are striving to serve the true God. One who was converted last fall, continued faithfully during the winter, and this spring while on a hunting excursion he died in the triumphs of faith"

"Three families have promised to build houses at the Pic and remain ; which we hope will induce others to do the same. My first effort was to build a house with my own hands, 14 feet square, with a cellar, which I completed in September last. I had no shingles, so I made the roof of *timbers* laid close together, then plastered and covered it with cedar bark. The Hudson's Bay Company kindly furnished me with plank for the floor, and several other materials without charge. All the Indians I have met with in this remote country give the utmost attention to the word of life, and often they come to me and enquire what they must do to be saved. 'The harvest is great, but the labourers are few.'"

meantime the Missionary at Norway House has visited Berrin's River; the Missionary at Oxford House is giving efficiency to his establishment; another Missionary has made tours which must have a useful effect; the Word of God is not bound; numerous baptisms have taken place; and there are added to the Church a goodly number of submissive and hopeful Natives,—a speedy return for the services of the Society's Bay Deputation, for the local labours performed, and liberal subscriptions paid, well calculated to elicit the thanksgivings of the Society's expectant friends.

The persevering Missionary at Lac-La-Pluie writes like a warrior whose daily engagement is with unyielding adversaries—not, however, despondingly. There is too much of power in Scriptural law,—too much of victory in the history of Indian Missions,—too much Christian confidence in his own heart for that. The period of unsuccessful contest there has not reached fifteen years, as it did in Greenland, and in Tahiti; and fifteen years or fifteen months, the duty is, to preach the Gospel to the lost: and Brother Salt, in another letter disinterestedly says, he will “endeavour by the grace of God, to be dutiful to the good cause, though surrounded with many difficulties and dangers.”

It is with gratitude the Committee communicate the information, that the British and Foreign Bible Society—that great bulwark of the world's Protestantism—has conferred a gift characteristic of its well known generosity to many Missionary Institutions, as is learned from the untiring Chairman of the Hudson's Bay District, the Rev. Thomas Hurlburt,—who says, “The British and Foreign Bible Society has sent us paper for 1000 copies of the Gospel according to St. John, and will be at the expense of printing them.” Here is work for the Wesleyan press at Rossville: and while there is prayer, and liberality, and anticipations of success there and in Canada, will not the Father of Lights make the Truth more mightily prevalent among the Pagans of the North?

NORWAY HOUSE.

“*Rossville, June 14, 1855.*—I am happy to inform you that we still are in the enjoyment of peace and prosperity. On Christmas Eve we held a Missionary Meeting;—the first, probably, ever held in the place. All the donations to the Mission cause from all sources amount to something over £12 sterling. About a week ago we equipped two brethren, and sent them on an evangelical tour of two months to Nelson River.

“In building new houses, making new fields, and enlarging old ones, and making roads through the village, there has probably been more done this spring than in ten years previously; and it has required but little prompting to do it. We

have inclosed and brought into cultivation about one and three quarters of an acre ; and it has been rather a heavy job ; but as it lay immediately joining the Mission premises, I was apprehensive we might lose it if we waited much longer, as our Indians have manifested quite a spirit of improvement, and land in our immediate vicinity is being prized. We have now a little over three acres in all, belonging to the Mission. We have, however, not planted our new ground, as we have nothing to put into it as yet. In regard to finances, you will observe that the gross amount falls much below my estimate. This will be accounted for from the fact, that our accounts with the Company close on the 4th of April, instead of the 1st June.

"On our arrival here I commenced the study of the syllabic character, and the Cree language. In two months I was able to read the Morning Service in Cree, written in this character. For three or four months I have been praying publicly in this language, and as we have a large number of Indians around us, I have occasion to converse with them from twenty to fifty times a day. I feel that under these circumstances, to be compelled to use an interpreter, would be an intolerable burden. It has taken much of my time to oversee the work we have done. In consequence of the kind of material we had to work with, I have found it necessary to be almost constantly present, and then I would not only tell how it should be done, but take hold and help. Thus I have worked at ploughing, planting, fencing, ditching, grubbing up stumps and roots. We have a pretty good garden, and I have attended to that mainly myself. Early this spring I made nearly all alone, two small boats that we needed for the use of the Mission, &c.

"I expect to visit Berrin River soon : this will take me from home about two weeks. I am happy to say that we are all in usual health. Mrs. H. has not suffered from the effects of this climate as she did from that of Lake Superior. We have additions to our numbers from time to time. A short time since Adam Moody came, and wished to join us. This man had got some knowledge of Christianity from the Church Missionaries at Red River, and when Bro. Rundle arrived here in 1840, he found Adam exhorting the Indians to be Christians. He is decidedly a man of talent, but some years ago stopped short in religion. He wishes to try again. One of the Company's servants, an intelligent watchman, and an Indian, have joined us within the last week or so.

July 9th. I have just returned from a visit to Berrin's River. The distance we travelled is about 260 miles. We spent three days with a company of most wretchedly degraded savages. We learned many particulars concerning them, and our prospects of doing them good. I baptized two children of a member of ours residing at the place, and a few of the Indians expressed a desire to become Christians, and promised to visit me at this place soon. I saw some of those Indians last summer, and promised them a visit this season. Brother Ryerson also advised me to visit them. I need not remind you how necessary it is for us to be particular in keeping any engagements we make with the Indians. We used our own small boat ; two good brethren accompanied me, to whom I paid £1 each for the trip, besides furnishing them.

"At the present time our men are away in the Company's service, taking furs to, and bringing goods from York Factory ; so that our congregations are smaller than usual. Last Sabbath we received another into the Church by baptism. She is a widow whose husband died last winter, and whose last words to her were, to unite with us in serving God. She came with her infant child, and both were baptized at the same time.

"We have done what we could in the way of gardening, and raising our supplies, but an army of caterpillars has destroyed every thing in all this region of country, except potatoes, and them very much. I had one and three quarters of an acre of barley, with turnips, 1000 fine cabbages, &c., but not one spire of barley or a cabbage is to be seen; all, all is gone. The like was never heard of here. We are not anxious in regard to the amount of salary, but I am urgent that the Committee should fix the amount on some uniform scale. We are expected to abound in works of charity: for instance, on our arrival we found 18 lbs. of tea among the groceries furnished by the Company. We have not used a particle of it, except for the male teacher, and yet it is all gone. We have a large population around us: so this old woman and that would send for *upsees*: it did them so much good! We should be furnished with some simple medicines, for we are constantly applied to for them. I am anxious to save the Society from certain expenses as soon as it can be done with safety. I feel perfectly content with the appropriations made for our salaries. It is as near equal as earthly things can well be made. It will, however, require close economy for us to make the year's end meet with it. The customs and circumstances of the country render it necessary for us to have more servants-hire than in Canada. I think it very necessary that all our Missionaries in this country should be strict temperance men. We are in usual health and spirits.

"*July 17th.* I improve every opportunity that presents itself to forward you information in regard to the state of the work committed to our charge. Since our arrival here in August, 1854, there have been 35 baptisms; two were children at Berrin's River, and two or three children belonging to the Fort, and the rest belonging to this place. We have had 22 births, and 7 deaths during the year; leaving us a gain of 15 in the population. There is nothing wanting but plenty of good food; sufficient clothing; with comfortable houses, and religious culture in the people, and these Tribes will be about as well-doing as other people.

"*July 26th.* I write to acknowledge the receipt of your letter by the hands of Brother Woolsey, who arrived, with Br. Steinhaur, safely this evening, and will leave in a day or two for their appointed field of labour. It is easier to come from Canada to this place, than to go from here to Edmonton. He has been near six weeks coming to this place, but will be two months in going from here to Edmonton. Bro. Woolsey's attainments in the printing department would be a very great acquisition to us here, if we could avail ourselves of his services. Good School-Teachers from Canada would likewise be a great acquisition to our Missions in the Territory."

OXFORD HOUSE.

Jackson's Bay, June 7th, 1855. You will have been aware by this time that we arrived here on the 21st of August of last year; and at that time we only found one family on the Mission; the rest had dispersed abroad on different parts of the Lake and other places, to catch fish and game. The general aspect of affairs was far from pleasing. The house was barely habitable, even at that period of the year; and the church scarcely fit to perform Divine Service in. Very little had been done to improve the general aspect of the place. The potatoes that Mr. Steinhaur had planted, in consequence of his removal to "Norway House," had been greatly neglected; the consequence was, that where we ought to have had 100 bushels, we did not get near half that quantity, and these had not ripened when we had to dig them to secure them from the frost.

"The place, however, is *"beautiful for situation"*, and with some labour and a little expense, can be made all that is desirable in these hyperborean regions. Since my arrival I have been exceedingly busy in fitting up the interior of the house, and in making several articles of furniture. The house, which is built with logs, and filled in with clay, was penetrated by every shower of rain, and the clay washed down on the floors and every thing else that happened to be in the way; added to which, it was literally swarming with mice, so that both our little daughter and the girl were bitten by them while asleep, and during my absence at York Factory Mrs. B. was obliged to keep candles burning in order to get any sleep.

"Not being able to procure a carpenter, I had to purchase a few tools and set to work in good earnest; and I can say most conscientiously I never worked harder in my life; but I have done it cheerfully, knowing by experience that the Indians are more apt to learn by example than by precept. The house is now comfortable, as far as the small size of it will allow; and the extremely severe winter has been passed in comparative comfort as far as the cold was concerned. The place, as I have already stated to you, was exceedingly bare of furniture, but I have made during the winter, two very good beds, one sofa, a good side-board, a chest of drawers, a table, and several other useful articles. Besides which, with the assistance of the men I have hired, and the Schoolmaster, I have got a good Fish-House erected 18 by 16, for which we have had to get out all the timber. I have also got about 1000 boards of various sorts sawed and brought on to the premises, also the frame timber for a Schoolmaster's house 26 by 18; the same for another building, which we require as a store-house; ice-house and dairy 24 by 13; also, enough for the addition of two wings to the dwelling-house, each 16 by 14; and an excellent light, clench-work boat 16 feet long, very nearly fit to launch, and which could not be purchased in Canada, exclusive of the sails, for less than £16. This also I have entirely built myself. On my arrival from York Factory I found that several of the Indians had returned, and from that time until the hunting season arrived, we had about 25 families on the Mission. Two new houses have since then been built, and other Indians are preparing to build this season. Their attendance on the means of grace was good, scarcely one remaining away on these occasions.

"We have not been able to commence a School as yet, partly from the want of suitable and necessary books, of which indeed, we have none; but *principally* from the fact that the fishing was a complete failure, so that the Indians were under the necessity of taking away their wives and children with them to prevent them from starving. Indeed, so extreme were the wants of many of them, that we have seen them cook the entrails of fish and rabbits, and other disgusting garbage, to keep body and soul together. I am thankful, however, that no other evil consequences of the scarcity have come to our knowledge. We found no Society existed when we came, but I at once organized a Class, which I have to lead myself, as there are none here who could as yet be placed in so responsible a position. We have 25 On Trial. I am not willing to receive any into full membership until I have a full knowledge of them; and as they, for the most part, have been absent from the Mission for the last five months, and are only just returning, I think it prudent to see a little more of them. During the time we have been here I have administered the sacred ordinance of Baptism to 53,—28 of whom are adults.

"I find that we shall have our difficulties in establishing a Mission here. In this country, in consequence of its northern latitude, and long winters,—(the lake is now, June 7th partly covered with ice,) the Indians must be principally dependent upon their hunting for their subsistence, as nothing but a few vegetables

At Norway House they have an annual examination of the School, when considerable sums are collected from the gentlemen of the Company, which are laid out in suitable clothing for the children; but here, in consequence of our isolated position, being quite out of the line of travel, we have no such resources, and unless we can procure articles of clothing suitable for children of both sexes from 3 to 10 years of age, we shall never be able to keep any thing like a school in operation. But if we had these little aids we should soon have a good School, as I think we could easily collect from 60 to 70 scholars.

"In conclusion let me say, that we never more fully felt the need of the prayers of the faithful than now; and I feel confident that if our case be fully brought before the Church, that we shall not fail in securing the sympathy and prayers of its members. Here we have no Christian communion, no one to converse with or consult, whatever difficulties may arise, and in case of dangerous illness no medical aid to be obtained within 200 miles. But our trust is in God, whose mercy and aid never fail."

LAC-LA-PLUIE.

"Fort Frances, 4th July, 1855. As Sir George Simpson will pass here, I write a few lines beforehand in order to fulfil my promise which I mentioned last winter in my letter. Early in the spring I visited the River Indians, and held a consultation with them in reference to establishing a mission at the Muido Rapids. Some of them were willing, but those who appeared to have the most influence opposed the object. The next tour I made was towards the north-eastern shore of Lac-la-Pluie for the purpose of giving religious instruction to a family that was baptized by Mr. Mason. This was my second visit, and the head of the family is anxious to have me establish the Mission on his hunting-ground, called Chimauauguning, but the place is out of the line of communication, and rocky. I have since received this Indian on trial as a member of the Wesleyan Church: his name is Peter Jacobs.

"The Indians from different parts have been tenting near this fort for several days, and performed their customs of metamisms, dancing with a human scalp, war-whoop, the pretended intercourse with the spirits of animals, and gambling. They are aware of the service which I am kindly allowed to hold every Sabbath in one of the largest rooms in the Fort, but they do not attend. The only course I pursue is to speak to them one by one; and I perceive that several would embrace Christianity if they were not intimidated by the principal metas, who get clothing from their fellow-Indians, by initiating them into the customs, and telling pretended revelations successively. I learn that they do these things every year in the month of June; hence their combination against receiving instruction from Missionaries.

"There are several Indians about this part whose title is Kishigowiniung, i. e., skymen, or as they are commonly called, conjurers. On Wednesday, 27th June ult., I had a sort of a talk with one whom I saw the other evening pretending to hold intercourse with the spirits of animals. In the first part of our conversa-

tion I threw out a hint which made us begin to talk about religion. The following is the substance: "I follow," said he, "according to my dreams I had when I sought the favour of the *munido* that gives light;" meaning the sun. "The Great Spirit that made all things," said I, "forbids man to worship such things." "Neji," (friend,) said he, "I wish to ask you a question, Do you hold all the souls of men?" From this, I endeavoured to throw light into his mind; after which I asked him, Do you believe the words that I have told you? "Yes," said he. Why do you not then embrace Christianity? "Because I am afraid that the spirits which are in me would be angry with me." I said, There is only one Being whom we ought to fear, even the Great Spirit, who has power to destroy both soul and body; neither is there salvation in any other; for there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved. He got up, and shook hands with me, and resumed his seat. This is a sign of theirs, to show the addressed that they have said as much as they desired to say.

"I know not the number of Indians that have been tenting here; the greater part of whom have left for the American Territory, to receive their first payment from the government for the lands which they have surrendered. The chief of this band was the one who threatened me not to speak to his young men last year, but he was quite low this summer; for he is under the displeasure of his band on account of their lands in the American territory. Though they know my sayings against their deceptive and barbarous customs, yet they have not acted rudely towards me, as I expected when so many of them were tenting on the portage. On one occasion several of them came into the yard of the fort naked, variously daubed with vermilion, oxide of iron, and clay, with guns and tomahawks, and half-drums. I asked one of the party, what they were going to do? "To perform one of our customs," said he. It was the war-dance, war-whoop, etc. They performed this three several times this summer: it is a begging custom: but I did not favour it.

"The principal Indian who said to me last summer that they "intend to retain the Indian customs," is not so haughty this summer; the cause is, his son was shot by a brother-in-law purposely two months since, but not mortally; he is getting better: they are tenting near the fort. This principal Indian was the one who strenuously opposed me at the council early in the spring. Since they have been tenting here, I asked him if his mind was the same as it was last spring in reference to rejecting Christianity: 'Yes,' he said; 'but I am looking in the east and west, I am observing and thinking.' The Indians make many foolish objections."

EDMONTON AND ROCKY MOUNTAINS.

Since the Rev. Messrs Woolsey and Steinhaur took their departure in June for this remote Mission, several letters have been received from Mr. Woolsey, which are too full of well-narrated incidents of travel to be longer kept from the public than till the next number of the *Missionary Notices* appears. None, however, could announce their arrival at Edmonton, as the last was written on the party's leaving Red River for their destination, a thousand miles distant: a detailed report of that Mission, therefore, is at present precluded. ters, dated, York, Hudson's Bay, September 12th, 1854, mentions Edmonton among other "inviting fields for Missionary labour," and observes, "there should be sent, at least, two or three Missionaries. The Wesleyan Missionary Society has a Native Teacher labouring in the neighbourhood of Edmonton, near the Rocky Mountains, with gratifying success; but one individual, although ever so well qualified for the Missionary work, can do comparatively little in a population of many thousands, the most of whom are anxious to receive religious instruction."

These views of the Society's Deputation are satisfactorily confirmed by the action of the Conference, and now by a few lines taken from a letter written by Mr. Woolsey, July 30th: "We have met, among our voyageurs, with two men from Edmonton, one of whom was intimately acquainted, and connected with our late Missionary there. He states that the Romish priest has only effected his purposes amongst the French half-breeds there. The other states, that the Indians who are at present under Brother Benjamin Sinclair's charge, are looking out for a Missionary. He also informs us, that there are not less than 30 camps of the Sioux, (about 350 persons,) desiring most ardently to see and hear the herald of the Cross. Truly, the field is white unto the harvest." By this time the operations at this important Station have, it is believed, been methodised and enlarged by the Missionaries recently sent out; and before long cheering intelligence may be expected.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

"How think ye? if a man have an hundred sheep, and one of them be gone astray, doth he not leave the ninety and nine, and goeth into the mountains, and seeketh that which is gone astray? And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that sheep, than of the ninety and nine which went not astray. Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish." This extract is made to shew the spirit and indefatigableness of Wesleyan Itinerants in the backwoods of Canada, in their pursuit of men,—some of whom are in solitary localities well-nigh lost to the inhabitants of populated places; some lost to religion in their lax moral habits, and Lord's-day desecrations; others lost to those sacred teachings and regular ordinances they once enjoyed,—their children without a school, as the parents are unblesed with the

"Sabbath appointment" of a Gospel Minister. Lost, but not forgotten and unsought; and not long lost, if the Missionary can discover them in their solitude.

These remarks present a threefold object, contemplated by the Wesleyan Missionary Society of Canada, and which the Committee are determined to keep in view. First, the making of the Society's Missions co-extensive with the Settlements,—that, however far they may stretch, or intricate and toilsome the approach to them may be, the Word, which is Mercy's provision for the wilderness, as for the city, may be proclaimed, and in no human habitation be heard the complaint, "No man cared for my soul." The frequent and unpublished removal of thousands in a year to scattered and secluded lands, makes it not always easy for the Missionary to know which path to take, or when to take it; and the newness of the path is a sufficient guarantee of its rudeness and undesirableness; but generous charity in the heart, and the Conference direction to go to the "most" needy, leave not the Wesleyan Missionary undecided, nor unprepared; and he seeks the lost to save them: and after this manner it is intended that the Gospel shall be made as far-reaching as the abodes of humanity, and seldom to have it said anywhere, the Methodist Missionary has not found us out.

A second object is, to give permanence to the piety of persons for a time destitute of public ministrations, and the helps of christian communion. Old settlements send forth the sons and daughters who are new settlers of the colony, not a few of whom have been intellectually and religiously, as well as secularly, trained; Churches lose respected members; and many vacancies are made in families and communities, which bespeak the tendency of Canadian society to fluctuation. From other Countries, too, Christians emigrate; and the voluntary and vigilant catholicism of Wesleyan Methodism cares for them; though it happens too often, that after many years of labour and outlay for their good, some pretender to an exclusive sacerdotal fitness and authority comes along—when the ruggedness of travel is passed away, and the people have the Gospel ordinances—and repudiates the genuine work done, and calumniates the divinely-called men who have done it! The primitive truth, and successful methods, Protestantism, and loyalty of Wesleyanism rebuke such unscriptural intermeddling: and it is not Popery, nor that hybrid, Puseyism, that can bless any people; but both can create and spread the miasma of falsehood and sectarianism. Among New Settlers are many Methodists from Great Britain and Ireland, and from other European, American, and Colonial Societies; and their former ministers and leaders may be consoled in their ecclesiastical bereavements by this statement, their late mem-

bers and spiritual children have come not to a land sterile and parched, and without spiritual vitality and beauty. The Committee have no deeper anxiety than to meet all Wesleyan new-comers with a family greeting, and afford them Gospel and Methodistic facilities everywhere, abundantly, and continually.

A third object is, to supply, far as the Society's Missions extend, a sanctified, gifted, and variously adapted Ministerial and Lay agency, which shall, under the influences of God's spirit, tell upon the minds and hearts and lives of all of every age and condition in the country;—instruct the ignorant; convince the sinful; bring peace to the awakened; bestow holiness upon the unregenerate; and elevate general society to that moral and evangelical height, to which the Gospel allures its votaries;—thus preparing a people who, while favoured with the unsurpassed privileges of British rule, and rejoicing in their domestic harmony, and in their temporal opulence and prosperity, shall have this said of them, "Happy is that people, that is in such a case; yea, happy is that people, whose God is the Lord."

The following unusually numerous official Letters report the continued cultivation of old ground, the taking possession of new territory, the planting of new fields, the gathering of new harvests for the Saviour. Some of the Missionaries have had to travel on foot their weary rounds. There was weeping in going forth with precious seed; there is joy in the garnering of bounteous sheaves. Old Missions have been divided, other settlements have been explored,—congregations collected—societies formed—churches erected—parsonages built—funds augmented—Sabbath-Schools, and Missionary Societies organised; and by these, and other means, the Agents of the Society have greatly contributed to the happiness, advancement, and popularity of Canada. How swift the progress of some places, not known till lately! The Letters will plainly shew that old Methodist doctrines and discipline, class-meetings, prayer-meetings, and special meetings, are highly valued, and that sanctification is a blessing often obtained. Gracious signs! The acknowledgement of Divine assistance, not infrequent in these letters, is very proper, when the work in which the esteemed writers have been engaged, as the Committee well know, has had its trying concomitants of privation, exposure, opposition, labour, and peril.

The Wesleyan Missionary system was, and is, and must be, that of pioneering for souls at Christ's command. And what encomium is too glowing for the past in this hemisphere? In the prized and animating "Sketches of Western Methodism," the venerable, living Finley eloquently asks, "What were the privations and heroic deeds of daring of the pioneer-backwoodsman,

levelling the forest, or roaming the woods in search of game, when compared with the toils, hardships, and privations of the pioneer-preacher of the Gospel? If the lives of the one are an example to their descendants of an energy and an enterprise which danger and the greatest difficulties could not intimidate or destroy, the self-sacrificing devotion of the other, urged on by a spirit of benevolence as boundless as the wants and woes of humanity, has left to the Church and the world an example of heroism abounding in everything morally sublime. Their heroic deeds, in bringing to the cabins of the sturdy pioneer, as well as the wigwams of the savage, the blessings and benefits of religion, will be treasured up in memory, if not recorded upon the page of history, and will live as long as one is found to recount them to the generations yet to come. . . . And though no splendid monuments of brass, or marble, or even rude, simple stones may tell where their ashes rest, yet in the faithful urn of a thousand hearts, their memories shall live for ever fresh."

KINCARDINE.

"The Missionary on this field of labour has, during the past year, travelled and laboured, less or more, in the townships of Kincardine, Huron, Bruce, Kincross, and Culross. The proportionate amount of labour expended on each township, was according to the order in which they are named here—Kincardine and Huron on the Lake Shore receiving most, and the others as much as could be devoted to them. I had to travel on foot because of the difficulty of bringing a horse round a field of labour where the roads are comparatively impassible. This, with the very long winter and deep snow made the work of going round so severe, that my health, both in the fall and spring, was so affected as to require me each time to curtail my amount of labour. The extent of country over which I have been travelling is entirely too extensive for one man to labour on it effectively, and beyond this there are fields open to which your Missionary cannot go. A few have been converted to God during the year, and the general state of the work is becoming more cheering. Our congregation in the village is large, respectable, intelligent, and serious. Other congregations have also improved. The extension of Sabbath preaching to those who now have only a week appointment, would greatly benefit those neighbourhoods and strengthen our cause.

"The prince of darkness seems to have been struggling hard for the mastery in this new country of our missionary enterprise. The minds of the people have been too much secularized in their efforts to acquire property; and the continuous assembling of 'bees' to log, build, &c., where the firewater has been used with unsparring liberality, succeeded by the nightly revelry of music and dancing, has tended much to injure our spiritual progress as a people.

"While I have been distressed in soul to see sin abounding, and often worn down in body and mind from labour and endurance, I at the same time feel thankful to all for their respectful and kind treatment, and their willing support of the Missionary and Institutions of the Wesleyan Methodist Church."

CAINSVILLE.

"There are some ten appointments on this Domestic Mission that are filled every two weeks with the help of a hired Local Preacher. There are four chapels, and three Local Preachers, and one Exhorter. There was no special revival on the Mission last year. Some few added by conversion. But a number of our most wealthy and liberal friends removed to the west. The removals were seventeen, deaths five : three died in the Lord ; but their loss is felt by the Church on earth. The friends are, in general, liberal in supporting the Preacher who labours among them.

"I have thought it would be for the best if this Domestic Mission could be united to a part of Dundas Circuit, say Jersey Settlement. By such an arrangement an excellent four weeks' Circuit could be formed."

GODERICH.

"What constituted the Goderich Mission was divided last Conference, and the lower part formed into a new Mission, with the village of Clinton for its head. By this arrangement, three-fifths of the members were taken from Goderich. God has been pleased in various respects to bless the division. A number of souls, by conversion, and from other Circuits and Churches, has been added. The means of grace have been, through the Circuit, well attended. The town congregation has been greatly enlarged ; so much so that our church accommodation has become altogether within our requirements.

"The handsome and commodious brick parsonage, which was commenced last year, has been occupied by the family of the Superintendent Minister almost ever since last Conference. It is regretted, however, that a considerable debt remains on it. It is hoped that the Circuit at large, which must be greatly benefitted in having a parsonage, as rents are now very high, will liberally contribute towards its greatly-desired liquidation. The brick church referred to in last year's Report has been so far completed as to allow of its being opened, for the worship of Almighty God, on the 15th May last. The other anticipated church, also referred to in the above-named Report, is contracted for to be completed by the 1st of September next. This will be a handsome frame building, 26 x 36.

"All the funds are greatly in advance of last year. The Missionary subscriptions amount to about as much as was raised last year on what are now two Circuits. The other funds are also greatly in advance. While the fund for the support of the Minister's list, in the division of the Circuit, nearly £80, has been made up, with an additional appropriation of £25 made by the Missionary Board."

ERIN.

"There are upon this Mission about eighty members, most of whom are warm friends of our beloved Methodism. We have had no particular revival. Our congregations have been respectable. Our cause, which is the cause of God, is doubtless gaining ground. The friends upon this Mission have responded nobly

to every call that was made upon them in aid of our connexional funds. Your Missionary, in consequence of most severe domestic affliction, having lost a beloved companion by death, was prevented from making those extra efforts which he would otherwise have made. There are two new churches in progress: we hope they will be completed during the coming Conference year. May God bless the friends of Erin Mission, and make them ten fold what they now are!"

A MHERSTBURG.

"I have nothing flattering to say of this Mission, yet I can write encouragingly. Stony-hill appointment is in a prosperous condition, and offers much encouragement for future labour. In the Atkin neighbourhood, where, at the commencement of the year, we had four members, we now have a truly interesting and helping class of fourteen. At the Indian Settlement that monster, *Alcohol*, robbed us of two of our members.

"In Anderlon we have a friendly, and quite numerous congregation, though but few members. As to the prospects in Town I can only say, 'the Holy Spirit is' evidently 'postponing his' larger 'effusions till the Church' here 'is prepared with more urgent intercessions.' Yet there are, even now, encouraging symptoms—*anxious inquiries* after truth; and the congregations are good. After deducting for 'removed,' 'dropped,' &c., we have an increase of ten, beside those given us at Stony-hill. The Circuit-fund is about one-half, and the Mission-fund *more* than one-half in advance of last year. We have now four sabbath-schools, three of which are of considerable promise. May the Head of the Church grant that my successor may reap a harvest of souls: amen."

PROTON.

"Troubles which were commenced previous to our arrival, and which were but slightly healed, broke out, and have done harm in the places affected by them. We made some efforts to hold special services; but these were not attended with that amount of success which was desirable; however, our labours were not in vain, as some precious souls were made partakers of the saving grace of God. We suffer a decrease in numerical strength, caused by dropping some for non-attendance on their classes: the expulsion of others; the death of two, whom we hope have made a good exchange; and a considerable number have removed to other places. Between twenty and thirty have united with us in Church fellowship. There are some who feel interested in the cause of God, and remember Zion in secret and public before the Lord; while, on the other hand, we have to lament the apparent deadness of others, and the too general neglect of prayer-meetings,—which must lead to declension in religion,—and without which it is next to an impossibility for the work of God to prosper. In financial matters more has been done than in any former year. But we think that more could be done here as well as in other places. Our last quarterly meeting was considered to be the best of any held through the year. Lord hasten better days; and save thy Church and people here."

"During the past year we have had a few conversions on this Mission, and a very encouraging increase in all the funds. The work of God has prospered on the District generally,—while several of the Domestic Missions are rapidly advancing in moral and material strength, and will soon become self-sustaining.—Two new Missions have been commenced under favourable auspices of being useful and prosperous."

DURHAM.

"The working of this new Mission is attended with many difficulties and privations. It is a very large field of labour, including parts of the townships of Normanby, Egremont, Glencol, Brant, and Carrick. Though we have not been blessed here with many conversions, yet we have been cheered in our work in observing a faithful attendance, and a growing seriousness in nearly all our congregations, especially in the one in the town of Durham, where the want of a place of worship sufficiently large to accommodate the increasing congregation is most sensibly felt. There is no parsonage on the Mission, and it has been with the greatest difficulty that a house has been obtained for your Missionary during the past year. Our people here, though few in number, and labouring under the disadvantages incident to settling in a new country, have done well in contributing of their limited means to the support of the Missionary Fund. There are at present five classes, numbering in all 41 members, the greater number of whom I have reason to believe, are pressing faithfully on for the better country. We hope that the seed of the Gospel, which we have endeavoured to scatter wide during the past year, will produce an abundant harvest in the day of eternity."

OSPREY.

"This Mission, first undertaken after last Conference, includes nearly the whole of Osprey Township, one appointment in Melancton, and one in Mulmur. The Society then consisted of 16 members, now of 46. The appointment of a labourer to this field was most opportune. His visits have been joyfully received and much appreciated by the members of our own Church; and by many belonging to other denominations. During the greater part of the year 5 Sabbath appointments have been attended, and 7 or 8 on week-days, once in each fortnight. The services conducted by your Missionary were, in a majority of cases, the only public means of grace the people had access to; and frequently these services have been made a blessing to precious souls. There are some firm friends of our cause on this Mission, some of whom have recently come from other circuits, and they have consecrated their dwellings as Sanctuaries of the Most High. It is to be regretted that some of these places can be visited on week-days only. May our beloved people see their calling and feel their responsibility! To our Missionary cause our friends have contributed according to their ability. Melancton Branch has raised 70 per cent. more than last year. I trust this little flock will have the continued attention of the Missionary Committee, as the labor bestowed shall not be in vain in the Lord."

The letter now introduced has two prominent subjects of intelligence. Wardsville is about sufficiently advanced for independence of the Missionary Fund. A new Circuit is a perfected Mission; and this Mission after years of effort and expenditure has nearly reached its maturity. The Wardsville Wesleyan Indians, too, are growing in numbers and piety,—a gratifying fact, when it would seem, that in these times extraordinary exertions are made in some vicinities to abolish Indian sobriety and happiness.

W A R D S V I L L E .

“This, we hope, is the last time it will be necessary to furnish a report of the Wardsville *Mission*. This part of the country is rising, and there is a manifest willingness on the part of the people to help themselves; which appears from the fact that, after paying all the expenses of the Mission for the past year, including the Missionary grant, we pay to the funds of the Church something more than forty-eight pounds. We have, therefore, thought that with a view to this field of labour being better understood, the Wardsville part should henceforth be a Circuit, and that the Indian part of the work should stand, as it properly is, an Indian Mission. Of course while supplied by the Wardsville minister, the appropriation to it will be so much towards his support.

“The Indian part of the work is becoming increasingly interesting. The congregation is very good, and during the past two years the membership has increased from sixteen to thirty-three, and so far as we can judge, while there is an increase in number, there is likewise improvement in personal piety. About twenty were present at our last lovefeast in Wardsville, when we were delighted to hear many of them tell with melting pathos of their enjoyments in the service of God. The cause throughout the Mission is in a thriving state; our places of worship are becoming too strait for us. At our last quarterly meeting in Wardsville, the little church was literally crammed inside, and about fifty sat upon the grass on the outside. For the improved and improving state of Methodism in this part of our beloved country we feel truly thankful. Glory to God alone.

D E R B Y .

“This Mission embraces a large tract of country lying between Owen Sound and the thriving village of Southampton. But the country is new, consequently the Missionary has to labour under many inconveniences. But the time is not far distant, if we may judge from present prospects, when these inconveniences will disappear, together with the wide forest. Our numbers have increased during the past Conference year, from 18 to 47. Some of these came from other Circuits and Missions; the remainder were gathered from the world.—One church has been completed for divine worship;—two Sabbath Schools have been formed, and two Classes organized. For these things we thank God and take courage. We have a people on this Mission that love Wesleyan Methodism, and the remembrance of their kindness to me, I shall doubtless carry to my grave.”

ST. VINCENT.

"From this field of labour we have nothing special to report. We have witnessed some good during the year, and have enjoyed seasons of spiritual profit; but your Missionary has to regret that, owing to the lack of a second preacher, and the vast bounds of the Mission, there was not so much good effected, or the work so fully sustained, as the nature of the case required. In addition to this, the great want and inconvenience is felt throughout the Mission of an ordained Minister to meet the wants and wishes of the people. Upon a review of the whole, we have cause of thankfulness to Almighty God that we can report a degree of prosperity. There is a small increase of membership, and an advance in our financial department."

SANDWICH AND WINDSOR.

"We feel grateful to the Head of the Church, in closing our second year on this Mission, for the very encouraging success with which He continues to favour us. In some country places the work has been somewhat neglected in consequence of the very long illness of my colleague. The local brethren, however, have been very faithful and efficient, which, with some help from Detroit, has enabled us to supply the regular Sabbath appointments; and upon the whole, the Mission is prospering delightfully. In consequence of an unusual number of removals our net increase is not large, but we are gradually advancing. Two new Classes, and as many Sabbath Schools, have been formed during the year, which are doing remarkably well. Sabbath Schools previously organized are advancing. "The Lord of the Harvest" has lately thrust out to our aid several Local Preachers and Leaders, a class of labourers very much needed on this Mission. Four church sites, and three grave-yards have been obtained, and three new Churches are now in course of erection. In consequence of the comparative failure of the lumber trade, upon which many in this country depend for a living, the scarcity of money has been severely felt; and still our local and connexional funds have been well sustained. In our opinion, if this Mission is properly worked, it will soon form two important Circuits, which, in addition to supporting their own Ministers, will contribute handsomely to aid others. We should have moved for a division this year, but thought it best to wait till some of the churches are completed which have been begun.

OWEN'S SOUND.

"On taking a review of the past Conference-year, we see cause for thanksgiving. The Lord has been with us. We have been favored with many times of refreshing from his presence. The adversary has bruised the heel, but victory has been with the Lord of hosts. About thirty souls have been added to the saved ones; apparently insurmountable difficulties have disappeared; peace has taken the place of discord; order of confusion; and the sacred character of the cause of God stands in a more commanding aspect before the public. Hoping to succeed yet further in promoting the spiritual interests of the people committed to our pastoral care, we commend ourselves to God, and to the word of his grace."

SOUTHAMPTON.

"This Mission was formerly called Arran, but for some reason or other its name has been changed. Here is a wide field, and far beyond there are a great many settlers to whom I cannot attend. I cannot, like some, boast of a great increase of members, yet, notwithstanding one prosperous class has been taken from this, and added to the Derby Mission, we have a small increase, and I feel grateful to Almighty God that we have realized his presence, and I may say that the Mission is in a good state; many of our members earnestly desiring to obtain holiness of heart. We have erected a commodious plank church in Southampton, in which divine service is held every sabbath, and in the country there are two log churches in the course of erection. They have done nobly with regard to the Missionary funds, having more than doubled last year's subscription."

LINDSAY.

"When I arrived on this Mission I found no house ready for our reception. After going to the Circuit five or six times we got a small unfinished house into which we moved. Shortly afterwards we commenced to build a parsonage, and by working hard we had it ready to move into by the last of December. The parsonage and two new stoves cost us £112; and one half of that amount is already paid: the other we hope to raise before the close of another Conference year. During the year souls have been converted and added to the Church. On our arrival we found 138 members, returned by my esteemed predecessor, the Rev. T. Hanna: at the end of the year we return 180, after deducting removals, withdrawals, and deaths,—leaving an increase of forty-two, in the course of the year. We have taken up two new appointments, and formed two classes, one of eighteen members, the other of eight. We are thankful to God for the success he has granted us, and humbly pray He may still carry on his work."

NORWOOD.

"In reporting the religious state of this Mission, we may be allowed to say, that it includes within its boundaries the whole of the Townships of Asphodel and Belmont,—the principal part of Otonabee, and the southern part of Dummer,—extending westward to within eight miles of Peterboro', and eastward to within eight of Marmora Iron Works. The religious state of the Mission is tolerably good. Several have been awakened and converted during the year. Our quarterly meetings have been seasons of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. Many on these hallowed occasions have been constrained to adopt the language of the Apostle, 'Master it is good for us to be here.'"

"The year has been one of great toil, and has been distinguished more by pruning and lopping-off dead branches than by any special in-gatherings into the Church. Though we have endeavoured to labour faithfully during the year, and have received a number into the church, we are under the necessity of returning a decrease in numbers. We account for this in two ways: The preceding year (and especially the latter part of it,) was a time of great ingathering: a large

number was added to the Church; and, as too frequently happens after these times of excitement, there was a large falling off. In renewing the tickets the first quarter we found thirty or upwards less than were returned in the printed Minutes.

"During the year we have succeeded in getting our new church in the village of Norwood finished. This building was commenced some five or six years ago. On our arrival here last June we found the frame up, and a little lumber on the spot. By constant attention, and the untiring efforts of a few noble-minded friends, and the liberality of the people generally, we have succeeded in finishing this building, which is likely to prove a great blessing to us. We were greatly in need of a suitable place in which to worship God. Our old house was worn out and laid aside. The people were for some time indebted to another denomination for the use of their Church; but now they have a neat and commodious house of their own in which to worship the God of their fathers. The building is of wood, 38 by 52 feet, capable of seating over 400 persons, and is an ornament to the village, and a credit to the people that built it. Cost from £300 to £400. The people here generally, are pretty liberal, and willing to support the Gospel according to their ability. We are labouring and praying for an outpouring of the Spirit. The language of our hearts is, 'O Lord revive thy work!'"

PERCY.

"This Mission is in a good working state. We return 229 members, being an increase of 86. All the funds in advance of any previous year; the Missionary receipts more than 150 per cent. Our members are in fine spirits, being much encouraged by the growing state of the Mission. Our beloved Wesleyan Methodism is striking her roots deep, and spreading her branches wide. This Mission bids fair to become a very interesting field of labour in the course of one or two years more."

MADOC.

"During the past year, we have been enabled to attend to every appointment on this Mission. The congregations have been regularly good, with the exception of one or two. Several have joined our Church with fair promise. A few members have removed to other Circuits; and others we have had to drop, being unable to induce them to attend either class or preaching. From all other Christian denominations the Missionary has received marked respect, and some aid. The half of the lot adjoining the Parsonage has been purchased for a site for a new Church, the size to be 40 feet by 34; the frame lumber is upon the ground, and 450 dollars signed towards its erection."

RAWDON.

"The Conference year now coming to a close, has been one of much anxiety to your Missionary in this section of the work. There have been numerous delin-

quencies of late years ; many have grown weary in well doing, and some, I think, cultivate the false notion that the rules of Methodism are too strict. Here we have bare-faced Puseyism, which will not look at that side of the road on which your Missionary walks ! Our trustees of chapel property have been tried by a heavy amount of debt,—hence, our experience has been like some of old, of whom it was said, 'Faint yet pursuing.'

"Feeling the effects of time and toil, last summer, with the approbation of my respected Chairman, I requested Brother Carr on the Norwood Mission, and Br. Baxter of Madoc, to take charge of two or three Classes near their work ; with this request these good Brethren kindly complied, no doubt to the benefit of those appointments. This shortened my travels and afforded me time to cultivate other parts of the 'field' nearer home.

"We have, generally, six Sabbath appointments in two weeks, with about the same number of week evening ones. The congregations are increasing regularly. We have an appointment in a remote corner of Huntingdon, where a few members live in shanties ; but they are precious souls : one of them has a good recollection of twice seeing the venerable John Wesley on his last visit to Ireland.

"We dare not lose sight of the Sabbath-School department, or of the cause of Temperance. Our people here give freely towards our Funds. An inspired writer gives the following command :—'In the morning sow thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thine hand.' Keeping this in mind, in the name of our God we will set up our banners ; expecting that the day will come, when, in consequence of a glorious revival, many here will cry out, 'What hath God wrought!'"

SHANNONVILLE.

"This Mission is situated in one of the front Townships, nine miles from the flourishing town of Belleville, and on the beautiful and majestic Salmon River : still it is necessary to be numbered with the Domestic Missions, as the principal part of the friends are poor, and unable to maintain a Preacher as yet, but they are in hopes soon to be numbered with the Circuits. Our prospects are brightening in several respects : we have an increase in the number of members ; several backsliders have been reclaimed ; and some 18 or 20 sinners have been converted to God, and the work of holiness sought after. At a village called Tonsdale, where we had but one member, and that a female, we have now a prosperous Class, and Sabbath morning preaching once in two weeks, and a flourishing Sabbath School, numbering 6 teachers, 75 scholars, and 100 volumes ; and £3 has been collected to increase the library, that there may be a full supply of books. We have succeeded in finishing a beautiful Church in the village of Shannonville, which was dedicated to the worship of God on the 13th of May, 1855, and we have another in view in a village called Milltown. We have 110 persons in Society."

dication of some inadvertance, of a deficiency quite unintentional. "The labourer is worthy of his hire", before any other claims are met; and it is certain, that so noble a people need only to be reminded of such priority, to prevent a recurrence of even an accidental shortcoming, which affects the funds of the Society. They will accept the warm acknowledgments of the Committee for their generous Christian support of the worship of God. Delightful truly is the large accession of members with which their piety has been recently rewarded: and in their new temples may it soon be found that many more are born of the Spirit.

OSGOOD.

"While the scenes of our three years ministry with this kind people close, we cannot but express gratitude to God, for disposing them to bear and forbear, and in using us for the advancement of his glory. No year has transpired, without divinely accredited seals of a Wesleyan instrumentality; and none has been so prolific, as the one closing, in the spiritual, numerical, and financial departments. We make progress, except in quarantine, which we attribute to the building of five churches, with pressing claims. Wesleyan Methodism having no friendship with the world, demonstrates, that her best friendship is the piety of her people; and were it not for this, here, accommodating systems might materially injure us; but they have only tended to draw off undesirable elements. Dropped 44, removals 16, deaths 2, professed conversions 153, received on trial 126, increase 72. Under God, we have the sinews of war, and our armament must prevail. The Lord omnipotent reign. Amen."

HINCHINBROOK.

"This Mission, though it bears the name of Hinchinbrook, has all its work in Portland and Loughborough, excepting one appointment in Hinchinbrook, and this is separated from the rest of the work by many miles of almost impassable roads. The prospect there, is at best, but very discouraging. The land is mostly made up of ridges of rocks, marshes and lakes,—the people are poor, few, and far between. In fall and spring the roads are rendered impassable by the overflowing of the lakes. The place has had labour about four years, and yet there are not more than three or four Wesleyans in the township. Our Sabbath congregation averages from 10 to 18.

"But the rest of the work is truly encouraging. In the township of Portland we have six Classes, numbering nearly 150 Members. We have seven Sabbath, and a few week-day appointments; with an excellent staff of Local aid, and two Sabbath Schools in full operation. The year, on the whole, has been an interesting and profitable one. In December last we commenced a series of protracted services, which were continued with little interruption, till April,—from which much good has resulted. The Church has been revived, sinners awakened, and about 40 have professed to experience a change of heart, most of whom have joined with us in church-fellowship. During the year four have gone to their reward, who were heads of families,—pillars in the Church, and members of the

same class; but they all died in the triumph of faith. While we have been under the painful necessity of lopping off a few withered branches, the Great Head of the Church has been ingrafting many more living branches into the living Vine, and the report of the year will show an increase, both in our membership and in our financial concerns. Our Mission, on the whole, is in a healthy state of grace. There is peace in all our borders; not a jarring chord to disturb it. Our classes, for piety, Christian consistency, and strong breathings after scriptural holiness, will compare with any I ever knew. To God be all the glory!"

BATH AND AMHERST ISLE.

"This is an interesting field of labour, pleasantly situated on the Bay of Quinte. It has for many years been occupied by the Wesleyan Church, and has been cultivated with considerable success. We have received during the past year 13 as members; from other circuits 7; removed to other circuits 15; deaths 2; expelled or dropped 16,—leaving 305 members. I think, if the Island, for which the Missionary grant is principally intended, were set off as a separate field of labour, and a Minister sent to it, that such an arrangement would be a great advantage to that part of the work. The most marked improvement in the religious state of the Societies during the year, has been in the increased number who have attained the blessing of entire holiness. If this work go on, I have no doubt but ere long there will be a large ingathering of souls to the Church of God."

SHEFFIELD.

"This Mission is rather wide, extending into four Townships, and embracing a number of poor and scattered settlements; and if there were any probability of more Ministerial help, or even an increase of Local Preachers, it might be extended much further than it is at present, with the prospect of much good. There are now fourteen appointments on the Mission, and several more school-houses, in which we might preach if we had the means. The spiritual state of the work was very low at the commencement of this connexional year; but there has been a steady and constant improvement. The congregations at all the appointments are greatly increased. Several new classes have been formed, which are doing well. A number of persons who were formerly in church-fellowship, but from various causes had left, have been brought back again, and are found faithful and zealous members of the Church. Many of the old members have been greatly quickened, and brought into the enjoyment of that perfect love which casteth out fear.

"When your Missionary entered upon the duties of this field of labour, every thing was new and strange to him, and at first he felt alone, in a strange land, among strangers; but casting himself on the strength of Jehovah, and the sympathies and prayers of a kind, devoted, and affectionate people, he was soon cheered by tokens of the Divine favour and presence. The year has been one of great peace and prosperity. There has been an increase of more than thirty members. The connexional funds have also been sustained amidst poverty and distress, caused by the failure of crops. In reviewing the past, we say, 'Not unto us, O Lord; not unto us. But unto thy name give glory.'"

STORRINGTON.

"In reporting the religious state of this Mission I would observe, that during the past year there has been a great increase in church-membership, as well as in our financial matters. There have been two very extensive revivals, and some of greater or less extent. There are now 130 members; there were not over 20 the previous year. The amount raised for Missionary purposes in more than three times as much as in the former year. We have nine appointments every two weeks. Of a truth we might say, 'The best of all is God is with us.'"

PORT SARNIA.

"The year now closing has been one of unusual trial and affliction on this Mission. Last summer we were visited with that fearful pestilence, the cholera, by which some 4 of our members were carried away, and many more of our regular hearers. By other causes we lost 4 more of our members. Making 8 deaths in the year. Though we had to visit the sick and the dying, and bury the dead, yet we were mercifully preserved. To God be all the praise.

"Being favoured with the valuable assistance of Br. Hawke this year, we have been able to supply the different neighbourhoods more abundantly, besides preaching at some four new places. The back settlements on this Mission are quite new, and the roads to them very bad, but the people are very anxious to have our Missionaries visit them; and this has induced us to overcome many difficulties in order to supply them with the Word of Life.

"Our accessions to the Church are not so many as we expected; however, after filling up all deficiencies occasioned by death, removals, and dropped, amounting in all to 23, we report only one of a decrease.

"Our people, though greatly embarrassed through sickness and the pressure of the season, in their money matters, have nobly met our claims, but in order to do so the Stewards had to pay extra nearly £25.

"During the year our Parsonage has been finished, and the new Church in Corunna made fit for holding Divine service therein. May it be rendered the spiritual birth-place of many souls. Amen."

Though compression is desirable, select intelligence is more so; and the following Letter from Dr. Aylesworth is properly made very interesting by its fullness, though not prolixity of important detail,—shewing the success that can be secured even during the first year of a Mission, when the necessary means are thoroughly carried out.

MITCHELL.

"This is the first year of this Mission. Mitchell is a village 12 miles from Stratford, 17 from St. Marys, and 20 from Clinton, in the midst of a fertile and

newly settled country. The section of country embraced in the Mission was visited about ten years ago by agents of the W. M. M. C. and some members gathered into society. After that, unfortunately, for several years, the services of Wesleyan Ministers were withdrawn, whilst most of the members gathered together, with others who settled in this section, united with other denominations, leaving some who refused to do so, without church-fellowship. From representations made by the late Dr. Bristol, and others, towards the close of the last Conference year, the attention of our Ministers was turned to Mitchell, and some successful labour bestowed upon it by Br. Barber, then of Stratford, and Br. Adams, who was appointed to labour on the Mission this year, at the last Conference. Great sorrow and discouragement were caused on the Mission by the death of Dr. Bristol, in August last, followed in a few days by the death of Br. Adams, who was succeeded by Br. Shaw, from Cobourg, and who continued until the first of November.

"Upon my arrival in Mitchell, about the first of November, I found a list of names, forty-five in number, of persons who had expressed a willingness to unite with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, some of them having been members in other places, and some converted at a protracted meeting held by Brs. Barber and Adams. I also ascertained that my predecessor had taken up appointments at five other places besides Mitchell. To the six appointments taken up at that time, three others have been added, making nine in all now on the Mission; while invitations have been received from two or three more places for preaching, to which, as yet, appointments have not been sent. At five of the appointments, including Mitchell, besides the usual preaching once a fortnight, extra services, amounting to forty-eight sermons, and as many prayer-meetings and fellowship meetings, have been held, resulting in the conversion of more than fifty persons. These, with some reclaimed, and others received from other Circuits, and those previously enrolled, swell the number of members at present, after deducting those expelled, removed, and died, to one hundred and eleven, who are divided into six classes, and are met regularly once a week.

"A great interest in the subject of religion is manifested by the people, who are chiefly from England, Ireland, and Scotland, where some of them have listened to Dr. Clark, Mr. Watson, and other celebrated men of God. The congregations are large and increasing, until the houses and shanties will not hold them. Nor is the interest confined to hearing the Word,—many of the members have not only the witness of the justifying grace of God, but are looking earnestly for purity through the cleansing blood of the Lamb. They are also liberal, according to their ability, in the support of the Gospel. I should also state that they have a new brick church of respectable dimensions now in course of erection, to be completed this season, in Mitchell, the subscription for which was commenced before the death of Br. Adams. Nor will it be many years, should the same religious influence continue to spread, before this Mission will take its place among the most promising, devoted, and self-sustaining Circuits."

WELLESLEY.

"During the past year, the Lord has graciously favoured us with his presence and blessing. In connection with the means of grace, God, by his Spirit, has led many to cry for mercy, 50 of whom give evidence of the pardon of their sins, and 14 of purity or perfect love. Four new classes have been organized, which number 68 members. There are eight classes in all, making a membership of 160 on

the Mission. There is the spirit of revival all around this Mission. A new parsonage house is nearly finished and paid for, except a small sum of nearly £20. A remaining debt of £10 on one of our churches, has been paid. Another church will soon be finished and ready for public worship. The Missionary cause has been well sustained;—last year a commencement was made, and £6 10s. realized;—this year £31 7s. 1d. has been contributed. The Connexional collections are double that of any previous year. \$40 has been obtained for a Library to one of our Sabbath Schools, and \$15 for another. Some of the other Sabbath-Schools much need larger Libraries, and more pious Teachers.

WARWICK.

"Though many circumstances have been combined during the past year to militate against our prosperity on this Mission; nevertheless, in defiance of much opposition we have been successful. The Good Lord has owned our labours by sound conversions here and there. Some of the classes (from which it was my painful duty to drop names left as members by my esteemed predecessor) are in a flourishing condition. Many of our members are widely scattered, and to be properly shepherded and organized, an additional Missionary would be required, or, to use the words of my brother predecessor last year in the Report: 'This Mission is altogether too large to be successfully worked by one man.' It is due, however, to this Mission to say, that if a strong man (who is used to the Canadian bush and unfinished roads) had the care of it, great improvements and prosperity would undoubtedly follow. The amounts raised last year for the various benevolent institutions were a little in advance of the present, which is owing to our having so many contribution lists out for other purposes. The erection of three or more new chapels is contemplated,—one on the second line south, to be commenced at once. The new parsonage house has been occupied most part of the year.

"Having come direct from England to this extensive Mission, to encounter that which I had never been used to, you may be sure I have laboured under great disadvantages; however, to the best of my ability, I have discharged its arduous duties, under occasional afflictions, it being my first year out; and so exposed to immediate change of climate, I suffered the more. Thank God, I feel now strong and healthy, and better prepared for Canadian work, and encouraged; finding from the experience of many that my feeble efforts have been followed with the blessing of God. To Him be all the glory."

HUNTLY.

"This Mission was set off from the Richmond Circuit last Conference, and includes the township of Huntly, and parts of Nepean, Goulburne, and March. When we came last Conference, we found 90 members; we are able to return to the Conference this year 131 members, an increase of about 41, the result of our protracted efforts in the winter. Our congregations are good, and attentive to the Word of Life. We have four Sabbath-Schools, and about 200 volumes in

the Library. Four of our members removed to other parts of the country, and one entered the kingdom of glory. We have no parsonage house on the Mission, and as it is the child of the Richmond Circuit, only one year old, it cannot be expected to be a self-supporting Mission for some years to come; yet they are a noble people. May they stand firm and steadfast to the end. Our last Quarterly Meeting was a time of refreshing coming down from the presence of the Lord. On the whole we are encouraged to believe that the Lord of Hosts is with us,—that the God of Jacob is our refuge."

BRUCE MINES.

"Bruce Mines is situated on the north shore of Lake Huron, about 40 miles below Sault Ste. Marie, and some 30 miles below Garden River Mission. Five miles in a southerly direction lies the Island of St. Joseph. The government survey of this Island will be completed during this summer, when a large increase to its present small population may be expected.

"The location of the village at the Bruce is exceedingly picturesque,—the ground gradually rising from the Lake shore, from whence a fine view is obtained of the St. Joseph, and many smaller Islands. Population of the Bruce, January, 1855, 515. Means for education and general instruction: Day School,—number of scholars during the winter ranging from 65 to 83: Sabbath-School,—number of scholars during the year from 40 to 59: teachers 9: volumes in the Library 112. The superintendent of this School and the other officer and teachers are using their best endeavours to promote the present and eternal happiness of the youth of this place. May their united efforts be blessed in their work of faith and labour of love. Library and Reading-Room supported by subscription.

"About half a mile west of the Bruce lies the Wellington Mine, now worked by a rich English Company, on ground leased from the Montreal Mining Company. This Mine commenced last summer,—population, January, 1855, is 56. The loss of the "Bruce Mines Steamer", last November, having on board the engine for the Wellington and the Bruce ore-dressing machinery, proved very detrimental to the workings of both mines, and has caused a temporary suspension of money-circulation at the Bruce until the ore-dressing department has overtaken the ore already raised. One hundred men were discharged in April.

"Notwithstanding the trials though which the Bruce has had to pass, there are hopeful indications of a divine influence being exerted through a preached gospel upon the inhabitants. The attendance on the Lord's Day services, morning and evening, has, during the year, been very encouraging,—nearly, if not fully doubling the former. On some Sabbath evenings during the winter, the chapel has been too strait for the congregation. Our prayer-meetings, held three times each week, are seasons of refreshing. The class meets each Sabbath morning at nine o'clock.

"Since our lot has been cast here, our heart has been cheered by witnessing the salvation of a few precious souls, some of whom remain on the location, and evince symptoms of spiritual health. Some have gone to other parts, and one was taken, we believe, to join the church triumphant—a brand plucked from the fire. While it is the privilege of other Missions to report an increase at the close of the conference year, it becomes our painful duty to report a decrease, owing to the fact that miners are in a sense itinerants, constantly moving from place to place. At one time

this year we numbered 23 in Society, now only 10 : there have been 11 removals : 1 has withdrawn, and 1 was dropped.

"The connexional funds are all in advance of last year. The Bruce will in a short time sustain the Missionary independent of the Missionary Fund. There are some noble-hearted worthy persons on this Mission. May they long live to be a blessing to the Church ! The Company has kindly furnished the Mission with a comfortable Parsonage and some articles of furniture, now three years free of rent ; also, fuel and candle-light for the chapel. Several of the friends from the Wellington Mine attend our meetings at the Bruce, and manifest a spirit of liberality in sustaining the funds of our church. Could there be a single ordained Minister sent here, we believe he would be provided for, without any appropriation from the Missionary funds. May the Lord be with the Bruce and Wellington friends."

MORPETH.

"Having nothing specially interesting to communicate, the report of this Mission, in reference to the present year, is necessarily brief. In regard to finances, I may remark that notwithstanding certain unfavourable changes in the boundaries of the field, necessitated by the non-arrival of the "One wanted," several of the funds, as may be seen from the respective reports, are considerably in advance. Of the state of piety, I regret to say I cannot speak so favourably. The deplorable lack of deep spirituality and practical godliness by which this part of our work has been so long and so generally characterized, I am sorry to say in a measure, still exists. Happily, however, many of the causes of this state of things

are removed ; and better times confidently expected. In concluding my remarks respecting the Morpeth Mission, I cannot forbear expressing the hope that a section of Canada so favourably distinguished for the purity of its atmosphere, and the richness of its natural resources, may speedily become equally noted for moral excellence and richness towards God. And also that, at no distant day, it will, as it properly should, take its place among self-supporting Circuits."

NANTICOKE.

"We are happy, through the Divine blessing, to be able to report improvement from this field of labour. Owing to removals and other causes, we found a deficiency of nearly 20 members as compared with the Minutes of Conference. These, by conversions and additions to the Church, have been more than made up during the year. We are glad also to notice a higher tone of religious experience in different parts of this Mission. On the whole we have reason to take courage, and give thanks unto God for his many mercies, and those interesting manifestations of his gracious presence which we have enjoyed during the year.

"In writing these lines the past has vividly presented itself to our view. Nine years ago the writer of this report had to retire from this Mission in consequence of a severe and almost fatal fever. How many changes since then ! Some that

sat by his bedside, and kindly and attentively ministered to his wants, and shed the tear of anticipated bereavement, have been called away from this mortal scene, and to rest in the grave,—and, better still, rest in the bosom of God, while he who seemed to be within a step of death, has been raised to a moderate degree of health and strength. O my soul, let all thy powers, with renewed energy and delight, be devoted to the service of God! Several of the appointments that were at the time above referred to held on the week evenings, are now Sabbath appointments, and furnish an interesting proof of the steady progress of the cause of God. We should like to make several other remarks in reference to matters and facts we have witnessed; but fearing we might occupy too much space in your valuable Report, we conclude by praying that the God of all grace may pour on this and on every part of our beloved Zion, the saving and sanctifying influence of his Holy Spirit."

ARTHUR.

"Our prospects in this part of the Mission field are good. It has never been the writer's lot to labour among a more kind, zealous, and benevolent set of people. We have not been free from the inconveniences peculiar to new settlements; but they have been less numerous than we anticipated. We have six Sabbath appointments, and seven week-night services. At each of these appointments we can discover an increasing interest in, and attachment to our institutions. We have formed one new class of ten persons, added fourteen to a second, and enlarged others. Many of the old members have been brought nearer to Christ, and are now living under his unclouded favour. It is our earnest desire, the aim of our preaching, and the burden of our prayers, that they may live perpetually in the full enjoyment of their privileges. In the two flourishing villages of Arthur and Mount Forrest, which are being rapidly filled up with enterprising merchants and mechanics, we have a firm hold of the people, and our congregations are multiplied three-fold. For all these tokens of divine favour we are truly grateful, and humbly ascribe the praise to God."

BERLIN AND BLENHEIM.

"This field of labour comprises the north-west part of the old Dumfries Circuit, and part of three Townships, viz: Blenheim, Wilnot, and Waterloo; taking in the flourishing villages of Plattsville, Hamburgh, Waterloo and Berlin. During the past year many of our neighbours and friends have been taken from us, by our remorseless enemy, Death. At the commencement of the second quarter, the esteemed Superintendent of the Circuit, the late Rev. John Williams, was called to his reward. For several years this devoted Missionary of the Cross laboured faithfully and successfully in the vineyard of his Master; and his piety and fervent zeal in preaching the Gospel of Christ, evinced his love to his God, and the souls of his fellow-men. Our people in Blenheim will long remember his great anxiety for their spiritual prosperity, and his zealous efforts to promote the cause of God on this Circuit.

"Our congregations are generally good; several of our hearers have been converted to God during the year; and we believe genuine piety is reviving in

M O R R I S .

"This new Mission embraces the Township of Morris and part of Wawanosh. It is fast filling up with an intelligent class of settlers, many of whom were Methodists in other places, before their removal. There were twelve persons whose names were returned last year as members,—persons desiring one of your Missionaries to labour among them. From certain causes six of these were induced to join themselves to another body before our arrival. This left us six to begin with. A class of eleven members were transferred from Clinton Circuit, as their location was within the bounds of this Mission properly. God has blessed our labours, and now we find a membership of fifty-six, with increasing congregations to preach to. Most of these have been converted to God and united to the Methodist Church during the year. Some have been received from other Circuits. An ordained Missionary living among them, is indispensably necessary for the carrying on our of work. It cannot be supplied in connection with Clinton as in the past year. On the two fields united, we have 26 appointments in four weeks. To reach some of these on this Mission, we had to ride from 40 to 60 miles going and returning. Interesting fields beyond these appointments we had no time to visit. The usual amount of bad roads, and hard fare for man and beast—the latter especially—may be expected on such a new field of labour. All things considered we regard it as an interesting field for some self-denying labourer, who is zealous to gather souls into the Church."

CARTWRIGHT AND SCHOOGOG.

"This Mission embraces the Townships of Cartwright, Manvers, and the Indian work on Schoogog Island. The past year has been one of toil and anxiety. The want of an Assistant, according to the arrangement of last Conference, has been a great draw-back to the work, especially on the Island. There should be two Sabbath appointments,—one with the Whites, the other with the Indians. Yet, after all, we have had some tokens of prosperity. Our connexional funds are all in advance of last year. The Western fever, a disease which infests the Eastern part of this country much, has carried off 16 of our members. Still we have an increase of 20 over the returns of last year. To God be all the praise."

STRATFORD.

"Another year has passed away with its usual varied success. One new appointment has been taken up on this Mission since last Conference, at which a large and intelligent congregation has been gathered, and an interesting class has been organized. Our numerical strength remains much the same as when I entered upon this charge. Our moral strength has evidently increased. Measures are now in progress for the erection of a new church in Stratford village, the former church having been converted into a parsonage. By the kindness of the Perth County Council, the County Court-House has been placed at our disposal for the purpose of public worship. Methodism is making new friends in this region, and will, ere long, exert a more commanding influence, as one of the great instrumentalities employed in the world's evangelization."

"The past year has been one of religious and financial prosperity on this field of labour; and while the friends have been contributing liberally of their earthly substance to help forward the Redeemer's cause, God has been blessing them with spiritual blessings, and raising them up to sit in heavenly places in Christ Jesus."

"Admitted on trial during the year 45; admitted as members 37; dropt of those on trial 5, remaining 3; admitted from other Circuits 17; removed to other Circuits 29; deaths, triumphant, 2; dropt or expelled 18; put back on trial 1; total number of members 229; increase this year 28;—with an improvement of 35 per cent. in all our connexional funds. If this financial and numerical increase, in connection with the sound, Scriptural, and Methodistic experience of our people, as related in our love-feasts, are indications of growth,—then are we in a state of progression. That a little has been done, is a cause of thankfulness and encouragement: that so little, is a cause of deep humiliation. "In reviewing my labours on this Mission through the past year, the fact that good has been accomplished in the name of the Lord Jesus, affords me pleasure, and I am disposed to thank God and take courage. Some thirty persons have been received into church fellowship during the year, which, after making up for deficiencies, gives us a small increase. We have also an increase in all our funds. My own claims have been met with the assistance of the appropriation from your Mission fund, into which the Mission has paid, this year £43 13s. 8^d., besides finishing the parsonage, which we have occupied since the middle of last Nov., and building a stable 29 by 26 feet. Our people are at present endeavouring to erect a church in the village of St. Mary's; the stone is being quarried for that purpose; and I trust by the blessing of God they may succeed. Also, in Vicker's neighbourhood, arrangements have been made for the erection of a church, which will doubtless be carried into effect.

"Amid the toils and privations incident to Missionary life, the Great Head of the Church has been with and blessed us. We have peace within our borders. Some of our members are growing in grace: their prayers are marked with more fervour than formerly; and their example is compelling the enemies of the Cross to acknowledge there is vitality in the religion of Jesus. Some enjoy the blessing of holiness, and are striving to bring others into the fold of Christ. GREY.

Here is an extensive and interesting field of Missionary labour, including the township of Grey, Elma, Wallace, and Howick. This section of country has been filled up with settlers with remarkable rapidity, mostly from other parts of the province. In these new settlements we have had occasion to observe that professing christians of other denominations look to the Wesleyan Missionary Society to be among the first to introduce among them the ministry of the Word—the blessings of the Gospel. During the year closed, it has been rather inadequately supplied, partly in consequence of the infirmities of the Missionary laborer employed; however we report an ingathering to the Church, of 68 persons above the return of last year; most of whom were connected with our Zion in other parts before they moved into the bush."

PENETANGUESHINE.

"Who hath despised the day of small things?" is a Prophetic interrogation. While my brethren in the Ministry can rejoice over scores and hundreds of souls

who have been 'brought from nature's darkness, into the glorious light and liberty of the people of God,' during our ecclesiastical year just closed, we in this remote Mission can rejoice that a few souls through the preaching of the 'Gospel,' have been hopefully converted to God. Our funds are increasing; and we have commenced collecting materials for the erection of two churches. The one is to be erected in the village of Coldwater, where the proprietor of the village has kindly consented to give us a site: the other is to be erected in Miller's vicinity, in the Township of Medonte. We fondly hope, with the Divine blessing, to have them erected during the next Conference year. This is rather a laborious Mission. We have 10 appointments, and 106 miles travel per fortnight, exclusive of White's appointment, which should be attached to the Orillia Mission. We hope in a few years, this will become a good Mission, when we shall have erected a parsonage house, and when we shall perhaps be able to sustain ourselves and become a Circuit. May the Lord of the harvest grant that my successor on this Mission may be more abundantly blessed with an ingathering of souls, and financial means than I have been during the three last years"

HOLLAND-LANDING.

"The bounds of this Mission are chiefly within the township of East Gwillimbury. It is a newly organized field of labour, having been set off in its present form at the Conference of 1854. At our first Quarterly Meeting, on making out the schedule we found our membership numbered just forty-five. About twenty-four weeks of revival service have passed since that time; the results of which, as regards the number of members, are, that at our fourth Quarterly Meeting we find ourselves possessed of 160 church members. Numbers that were converted during these services, have connected themselves with other churches. Our contributions to the Missionary Fund are nearly £40. The other Connexional Funds of course are supported. Viewing the Mission in this respect, we find that twice as much funds are raised on it, as are expended there. If two preachers could be sent on the ensuing year, it would be well, as they could labour to advantage; more ground could be taken up, and important posts could be better attended to."

Westmeath, an Ottawa Mission, far away, had its struggles, and is struggling still, but the day of prosperity has dawned, and now brightens more and more. The reference made below to the "faithful labour" expended "in past years on this Mission is considerate and generous.

"This Mission has been favoured during the past year with peace, and with a measure of prosperity. Our ordinary services have been well attended, and it is believed that there is a growing interest in the great subject of religion. The services of the Sanctuary have, in some instances at least, under the Divine blessing, proved to be means of grace indeed; and though on account of the extent of the field, and the want of local help, but little time could be devoted to special efforts, yet we have had instances of awakenings, and several additions to

the Church, either of persons hopefully converted, or of inquirers after salvation. In one instance only, has death been permitted to remove any of our members. A mother plunged into the water to recover her child, but alas! they perished together. She had joined our Church but a few weeks before.

"The chapel in Pembroke, long in an unfinished, unsatisfactory state, is now in a fair way to be completed. A deed has been procured, and the contract made for its completion; so that in a short time the chapel will be finished and pewed, with a pulpit. To aid in liquidating the debt with which the chapel is burdened, the friends, in a very spirited manner, got up a Soiree last winter, which, while it reflected credit on themselves, placed about twenty pounds in the hands of the Trustees for that noble purpose. Financial embarrassments however, occasioned by the sudden depression in the lumber trade, has greatly fettered our operations, as this is emphatically a lumbering community. Were it not for this a chapel would now be in course of erection in Westmeath. An effort was lately made to commence the work, but as times became harder and still harder, it was thought best to desist for the present. Much faithful labour has been expended on this Mission in past years; but much yet remains to be done. May Jehovah constantly favour us with his blessing!"

CORNWALL.

"In carefully reviewing the labours and trials of the past year, we cannot but feel grateful to our heavenly father for his preserving care and sustaining grace. In reporting the state of this Mission we find there is a decrease of thirty-two members. This is owing to my predecessor having returned thirty-three members more than could be found; so that after making up admissions, expulsions, removals, and deaths, we number two hundred and twenty-seven. Some have professed during the year to have found peace through believing. There are three Sabbath-Schools, numbering sixteen teachers, members of our Church; one hundred-and-sixty-one scholars; and three hundred and twenty-three volumes of library. Our people have erected a neat brick church, which we expect will be opened for Divine service during the year. Two others are about finished, and pretty free of debt."

WINCHESTER.

"In looking back on the two years which I have spent on this Mission, I feel that I am brought under renewed obligations to Almighty God, for His preserving mercy, and for the favour he has given me in the eyes of his people, and also for the degree of success which has attended my labours on this Mission. When I came here Methodism was in a low and languishing state, but now it exerts an extensive influence. This is seen in the very large and attentive congregations, and the handsome increase in all our connexional funds. We have succeeded in building a comfortable parsonage in the village of Chesterville; and also in making preparation for the erection of a chapel in West Winchester, which will be enclosed by the end of Autumn. Our people here are willing to do what they can, but they will require help from the Mission Fund for a few years, as many of them are poor; and if this Mission is properly managed, it will, with the blessing of God, cease to be a Domestic Mission, and become one of the best Circuits in

the Brockville District. Yet notwithstanding our favourable position, and though many of those in connection with us enjoy the favour and love of God, and rejoice in a crucified Saviour, yet there are many in a lukewarm state. I have received into Society 12; 6 have removed, 3 died, and 3 have been dropped: number in Society 181."

SHERBROOKE.

"We are thankful to the Great Head of the Church for the peace and prosperity that he has granted to us on this Mission during the year. The revival of the work of grace which the Lord favoured us with in Garrett's Meeting-House last fall, has greatly advanced the cause of religion in that locality. In the west part of Oso the people love to hear preaching, and turn out well to listen to the Word of Life, and are willing, according to their ability, to support the Missionary. We have there now a few members, and a good prospect of soon having a class formed. They have built a school-house, and so soon as they can get a teacher, they intend to have a day-school for their children, and a Sabbath-school organized. In looking over the Schedule for the year, I find that there has been received on trial 72; removed 6; dropped 15; deaths 2; withdrawn 2; which, after all deductions, leaves an increase of 28 members. The reason why we do not return a greater number of members this year, is because that at the District Meeting last year, the Hopetown church, and the classes, consisting of nineteen members, were set off to the Carlton-place Circuit."

"This Mission, which is formed by the junction of parts of the St. Andrews Circuit and Lochaber Mission, lies on the North shore of the River Ottawa, at the 'Head' of the 'Long Sault.' It contains six appointments. We cannot boast of any great additions to our branch of Christ's Church during the past year; but this we can say,—there is amongst our members an earnest and anxious perseverance after entire holiness. The justified are seeking to be 'sanctified wholly,' while those who have experienced this grace are 'reaching forward to the things which are still before, so that, with a very few exceptions, the Methodists continue to shew that there is something in religion which can raise man from below the level of the brute, to aspire to something noble,—to something holy! Towards the end of our ecclesiastical year, too, there seemed to be some indications of the powerful operations of the Divine Spirit on the unconverted mind. The secret of this is in the diligent attendance at the class and prayer-meetings and the closet. May the Most High pour out his Spirit on this Mission, and may the work of conversion and sanctification go forward. And He shall have all the praise."

During the year I received 112 on trial; 51 admitted into full connection; 16 received from other Circuits; 46 removals; 2 deaths; 2 backsliders; 1 withdrawn; 137 professing justification; 10 sanctification; 170 in full membership; and 40 still on trial. During the year we held three protracted meetings, one at Turnbull's, one at Thornton, and the third at Flindle's. I secured the deeds for Thornton, Turnbull's, and Agnew's churches. The Thornton church is free from debt. The one at Turnbull's is in course of erection, 26 by 36; to be finished by the 1st November; to be painted outside: whole cost £160. The friends in Bunting's or Agnew's neighbourhood are building a church also: we expect to have it enclosed this season. At Cookstown the brethren have paid the remaining debt on their church. We shall soon have four churches, free from debt, and filled with devout worshippers. We have not forgotten connexional funds; they are in advance of last year: Chapel Relief £3 2s. 6d.; Educational 15s. 9d.; Contingent £2 14s. 4d.; Superannuated £2 15s. For the Missionary, as table expenses, &c. £73 2s. 1d.; and for Missions in general, the noble sum of £67 15s. 4d.—£28 in advance of last year.

"From the above statements you will perceive that the cause of our Immanuel is prospering gloriously in this part of his vineyard. Yet there is more to be done. I have 9 appointments. We need the prayers of God's people to sustain us in our work of faith and labour of love. My prayer to God is, that we may increase, not only in numbers, but also in the graces of the Holy Spirit.

COLLINGWOOD HARBOUR.

"Part of this Mission has been cultivated for many years; and although there are at present Ministers of various denominations labouring among the people, our Missionaries were the first in the field. Father Neelands travelled through these wild woods about twenty years ago; called together the scattered inhabitants, and proclaimed the unsearchable riches of Christ in their now forsaken shanties. He must have had hard times. The few settlers in different neighbourhoods have had severe struggling to exist; and it is only within these last two or three years that they have had sufficient encouragement or ambition to cultivate their lands. The railroad, pushing its way through to the Harbour, has put a new face on the whole country. Nearly, if not all the land is taken up in the surrounding Townships; the people are flocking in from various parts; and go where you will, all are hard at work, and improvements are being made. Villages are springing up along the railroad track, and other places, where congregations are collected, and numbers listen with devout attention to the 'glad tidings of great joy.'

"Our people are in different parts beginning to see the importance of erecting places of worship for their accommodation. At Tegart's place the body of a building is raised, which it is hoped will soon be finished. At the Harbour we have felt the need of a place, our congregations being too large for private dwellings. This difficulty is in some measure met; the house erected by the Missionary, being without partitions, is rented for a common school and religious services.—Notwithstanding all that has been said and written against this new and flourishing town, it is destined to go on. Perhaps no place in Canada ever made such

rapid progress in so short a time. In a few years all the privileges of large cities will be enjoyed here. 'For the Lord shall comfort Zion : He will comfort all her waste places : and He will make her wilderness like Eden, and her desert like the garden of the Lord : joy and gladness shall be found therein, thanksgiving, and the voice of melody.' Is. li, 3."

ST. ANDREW'S.

"As we have said on former occasions, the Mission in its present form is much too large for that pastoral oversight our people require. An extent of country embracing part of seven Townships or Seigniories, and covering an area of nearly 100 square miles, is altogether too wide a field for careful culture. We have, however, done what we could ; and the facts that a new church is being erected, and another improved, at an expense of about £90, in times the most depressing, and amongst a community almost unprecedentedly poor, arising from the failure of the crops for the last two years : and in addition to this, we have lost about forty members by the formation of the Grenville Mission. That all our funds are in advance of last year under circumstances like these, will, I am sure, give you some general idea of the prosperity of the circuit."

STRATHROY.

"The past year has been to us a season of trial on this Mission. For about three months of it I have been by sickness laid aside, and unable to attend to any part of the work; and as assistance could not be procured, the appointments, with the exception of the village of Strathroy, had to be neglected: this appointment, by the assistance of Brother Saul, has been kept up constantly through the year. So dark was the cloud that hung over us, for a long time I feared the cause amongst us would quite go down : but this lesson I have learned afresh,—that God's work does not rest on the arm of flesh. Through his infinite goodness, the prospect has been brightened much this spring, and appears now, I think, full as fair as at any former period since I became acquainted with this part of the country. We have now an appointment in the village of Adelaide, and a small class, where we have had nothing of the kind for years past. A gracious influence appears to be abroad among the people ; several have been lately enquiring the way to God. Our last quarterly meeting was a season of great spiritual refreshing and comfort. Notwithstanding the necessary suspension of our operations on account of my afflictions, all our funds are nearly as much as last year. The Missionary and Superannuated Fund Collections, will show an increase this year over last. Our congregation in Strathroy is on the increase. We are contemplating an addition to our chapel here, or building a new one. We cannot say yet what course will be taken : but we want more room. To God be all the praise."

Though I came on only about two weeks before the Missionary Meetings: and the Mission was divided, so that it is only about half the size it was the previous year, we have succeeded in raising nearly the amount raised last year, on the whole. I have been in Stouffville about six months and we have raised a Class of 20 members, where they told me they had not had a class-meeting for two years. The other Classes are doing well, with the exception of one. We hope, with the blessing of God, to build two churches this year: we have not one at present. I think that religion is prospering amongst us. I feel truly humbled and thankful to the Great Head of the Church for the success he has granted to my labours here. To His name be all the glory."

DEVONSHIRE.

"We enjoy peace, and a good degree of prosperity in every department of our work. God has been pleased to own the labour of his servant, and a number of souls have been converted and turned from the error of their ways; but owing to withdrawals, removals, dropped, and expelled, we can only report about the same number in society as last year. Our congregations have greatly increased at almost every appointment. We have 3 Sabbath Schools, and 20 teachers and officers, and 100 scholars. To carry on the work efficiently there must be two Ministers on this Mission, as it is impossible for one to attend to it. Great praise is due to Brother David Elliott, for a grant of two acres of land, which he has deeded to our Church, on which to build a parsonage house and church. We have erected a parsonage house 22 by 28 feet, one story and a half high, and it is expected to be ready for the Minister to move into in a few months. By the time it is finished there will be a debt on it of about £37 10s. During the two years I have laboured on this Mission, there has been a large increase in our money matters, as a glance at the statements made in the Minutes and Missionary Report will show. Our Missionary money is 100 per cent. above last year. 'Not unto us O Lord, not unto us, but unto thy name give glory; for thy mercy and for truth's sake.'" JOHN WEBSTER.

Cavignall is a field of labour, like others in the East of Canada, blighted by the presence of the Man of Sin, where the Wesleyan labourer needs the sympathies and prayers of Protestants; but where, nevertheless, there is success, and encouragement to continued effort by the Inspired assurance of the destruction of that pestilential power.

CAVIGNALL.

"This Mission extends from the Ottawa to the St. Lawrence River, and includes in its geographical boundary, five or six French settlements, to which we have but little access. Cote St. Charles is the head of the Mission, and is settled mostly by friends from England. Some of the land is very poor, consequently the people are not rich, but they are willing and generous, as far as they have means. They love Old Methodism. We have a good new chapel 30 by 36 feet, out of debt, 21 Church members, a Wesleyan Sabbath School, attended by 5 teachers and about 40 scholars; good congregations, a kind and affectionate people, with a suitable parsonage and kitchen garden. At the Glass Factory, on the Ottawa, we preach in the Temperance Hall,—congregation increasing; and I have just formed a new Class of 6 members—3 on trial.

"At Cote St. Henry 9 members, all the Protestant population except one family, attend our services. At these appointments the blessings of Scriptural holiness, and Gospel revivals of religion, are subjects of conversation, and earnest prayer. Prayer-meetings have been well attended, and are times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. At Coteau Landing, on the St. Lawrence, we have no Church members at present; our congregations are large, attentive, intelligent, influential, and 'esteem us highly in love for our work's sake.' A strong attempt was made this year, in a very unchristian spirit, to feed this people with strong doctrinal food, but without success: the people highly appreciate the labours of the Wesleyan Methodist Ministry, and are benevolent supporters of our institutions. We are taking up another appointment at the head of the Beauharnois Canal, south side of the St. Lawrence, and have the prospect of a very large congregation, and hope for the salvation of souls. There is no regular preaching in the place,—the people are asking us to come over and help them. May the Holy Ghost come down in all his convicting and saving power. Amen."

LOCHABER.

"When we came to this Mission last June we found affairs in a very disorganized state; two-thirds of the members of the previous year having been removed to Grenville Mission, and L'Original Circuit taking four or five important appointments off the East end of the Mission, leaving us only forty-two members to begin with. The parsonage was in a delapidated condition. We have succeeded in arranging the appointments conveniently. The next thing was to repair the parsonage, which we accomplished early in the fall, expending about sixty dollars, only about half of which has been raised on the Mission.

"Your Missionary, in looking over the labours of the past year, is thankful to be able to say, that peace has prevailed throughout the Societies, and prosperity has crowned his labours in some places. The number of members returned this year, after deducting deaths, removals and expulsions, is 53, showing an increase of 11. In financial matters this Mission has far exceeded its former self. After meeting all the demands of the Missionary, it has contributed the handsome sum of £25 to the Missionary fund, as well as supporting the other funds of the church liberally. In view of these encouraging circumstances, the year closes up satisfactorily."

"This Mission was commenced a year ago, and though it is within a few miles of the city of Hamilton and the village from which it is named, was one of the first places where the Gospel was preached and Methodism established in Canada. It has been for many years almost without any regular attention by Ministers of any Church, and almost without any interest in religious matters being manifested by the people. After the year's labours we think we can see a great improvement in several important particulars, and hope the time will very soon come when what is now called 'Stoney Creek Mission' may be joined with some neighbouring work, and form with it a very interesting and important circuit."

We have had the pleasure of adding one hundred and sixty-six to our list of probationers, and are happy to believe that most of them give evidence of the remission of sins through faith in a crucified Saviour. When we came to the Mission we could only find one hundred-and-seven members, instead of one hundred-and-ninety-two (the number returned on the Circuit-Book;) have dropped eight—two have removed to other circuits—have received one from another circuit—and two have died; leaving us a membership, including probationers, of two-hundred-and-sixty-two. To God be all the praise. Although we number so many members, yet are they almost all poor, and unable to sustain the work in any other form than we now have it,—a Mission." L. HORTON.

GATTINEAU.

"This Mission comprehends the country lying along the shores of the Gattineau River to the distance of sixty miles from its junction with the Ottawa. It presents an amount of Ministerial labour sufficient to occupy the attention of at least two Missionaries. Moreover, new and extensive settlements are being formed far beyond the points hitherto reached by your Missionaries, from which loud calls are received for religious instruction. They say 'Ask the Conference to send us a Preacher; we prefer the ministrations of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Only send us a Preacher, and we will cheerfully pay all that we are able towards his support.' Our Societies were left by the Rev. J. Howes, in a good state of piety, and my labours have been directed toward their improvement in holiness. Eighteen have been gathered from the world into the Church, and many are still enquiring the way to Christ.

"Through a diminution of the lumber business, during the past winter, many of our friends have suffered great pecuniary embarrassment, nevertheless, after meeting the contingent expenses of the Mission, they have contributed £34 in aid of the funds of the Missionary Society, expended £12 in repairing and enlarging the parsonage, and paid £23 towards the salary of your Missionary."

MONO.

"This extensive and interesting field of moral culture, embraces parts of the townships of Mulmur, Tossorontio, Mono, Adjala, Tecumseth, Albion, Caledon, and until a few weeks since, Garafraxa. On this Mission there are 7 churches, and 2 others have been begun, and we hope will be completed by winter next. The Trustees have purchased a house and lot in 'Mono Village' for a parsonage: if possible it will be ready for occupation by September next. Never had this village such a season for removals. Twelve out of one class, four from another, and so on, until we grew sad in witnessing such extensive disruptions; but we trust they will be found in other parts of the Lord's vineyard. Death has been amongst us, and some of our most promising members have been called suddenly to their account. 'They are not lost but gone before.' Conference of 1854, 'Osprey Mission' was formed, and we gave to it a class of 13 members. A class of 10 members, being seduced, withdrew from us in June, 1854. We have dropped others for non-attendance, and expelled 1; yet, after all, we have still 17 thriving, healthy classes, including 435 members. We have had some powerful seasons in protracted services,—souls converted; whole families brought into the liberty of the Gospel; our wisely adapted system to the wants of the people more developed; our ordinances more than ever thronged, and respected; peace and good will exists amongst us, and we are determined our motto shall be 'upward and onward.' We anticipate a good and prosperous year to come. When all our

machinery is in operation, the end will be, with God's blessing, successful. We do, then, at the end of another Methodistic year, lift our Ebenezer of gratitude to God, and would encourage ourselves and our brethren in the Ministry by the following cheering lines :

' Let those that sow in sadness wait
' Till the fair harvest come ;
They shall confess their sheaves are great,
And shout the harvest home.' "

CONCLUSION.

These ample statements, in a review of the past year's proceedings, are due to the Christian benevolence and expectations of the friends of the Society ; and they are presented by the Committee with a deep conviction of their acceptability. There now remain for renewed, intense reflection, the object, wants, and obligations of the work.

THE OBJECT of the work. And that is, the Divine glory,—diffused by legitimate means,—diffused without being dimmed,—diffused illimitably, that the people of every shore and island, valley and mountain, prairie and forest, province and continent, regardless of colour and tongue, may cry out and shout, " Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things ! " The joy that was before the Son of God in his agony is at length his fruition ; and the prayer for the world which He put up here, answered by the promised, and most ineffable displays of the Holy Spirit's power. The Kingdom is come ! How transcendent, though future, is such a consummation ! Intent be the eye upon, and comprehensive and continued the contemplation of it. The success of the coming year, and of all years, depends, not upon the lowering, but the highest elevation of this object.—What an altitude does Isaiah give to Christian Missions ! That lamented Missionary writer—the John Howe of Wesleyan Methodism—Richard Watson, observes, " Nor is there any subject upon which human thought can fall that is so deeply interesting. We take our books of history, and admire the march of merely earthly powers to the climax of their grandeur ; and we must own the spectacle to be magnificent and instructive. The population swells ; new and untrodden fields display the labours of civilization ; cities rise ; armies are formed ; battles are won ; men of high and commanding minds are seen in the loftiness of operation, and the variety of fortune ; arts impress their skill and beauty on every object ; and science adorns and immortalizes the whole. But, magnificent as all this is, what is there even of grandeur in it, compared with the march of Christ's Kingdom, and the operations which it excites ? The field of strife is not a country, but the world."

The WANTS of the work. The Committee could point to the globe's population; and the temporal and moral necessities of a tremendous majority of unchristianized beings are overwhelming. They could point to the wide territories occupied by the Parent Wesleyan Missionary Society, and enforce a heartier consideration of the pressing requirements of those territories: and this they do with earnestness. The necessities of this Auxilliary Society, however, ask present and fixed attention; and its necessities are in proportion to its magnitude, which never before attained such extension; the Providence of God having placed its operations at the head of every other of a Missionary character in the colony. These operations have to be *sustained*; and though another agent had not to be sent forth, the conservation of the existing Missions is of high moment. But, year after year, whatever the amount of reported good previously done, the next Report has announced its accessions—of stations, agents, hearers, members, and scholars,—liabilities and contributions. Last year, as the introduction to this Report testifies, the accession was remarkable; this year, as a reference to the catalogue of Missions on another page shows, the Stations, Schools, and Agents of the Society were never so numerous. Nevertheless the Society could now occupy at least thirty more interesting and inviting posts in Canada and Hudson's Bay, and would, if it had the men and the means. Numerous Missions which have one Missionary ask for two; some with two need three; settlements which have monthly Ministerial visits, ought to have them every fortnight, if not every week; many services which are week-nightly ought to be held on the Sabbath; Eastern Canada requires more men to give the gospel and Protestantism their merited influence, and Western Canada calls for more urgently and incessantly. Then how painfully stirring is the fact, though the Society's Deputation to the Bay returned with information, that there were some seventeen new places in the Territory that should "*at once be occupied*," only two Missionaries have since been sent! With deep feeling does the Committee concur in the philanthropic opinions and wishes of their Deputation, as thus expressed in his published "Missionary Tour:" "We hope the day is not distant when no country will be unexplored by the Heralds of Salvation, and the wandering tribes and benighted sons of our own almost interminable forests will not be overlooked. I have no fellowship with the opinion, and I am glad to know you have none, that is strongly entertained by some, that the Indian race is doomed to destruction. In proportion to the efforts which have been made, no Missions to the heathen have been crowned with greater success, than those to the Aborigines of America. The Indian Tribes of America have peculiar and strong claims on the millions of American Christians, who live in freedom, and have grown rich upon their soil; and to me it seems that no part of the extensive field to be cultivated on the American Contin-

The Protestant Missions in the country are few and far between, notwithstanding nineteen-twentieths of the Natives are willing, thousands of them are anxious, to have Missionaries sent to them, that they may be brought to the Christian Religion."

The OBLIGATIONS of the work:—the obligations of ministers; the obligations of officers; the obligations of collectors; the obligations of subscribers: the obligations of all. God commandeth his people. Missionary Meetings will be held, of course, where the people are accustomed to them, on every Circuit and Mission in Western and Eastern Canada, and in Hudson's Bay; and they should be held in all neighborhoods wherever in the least practicable, and new Branches organized. Mental acquisitions are becoming more definite for this object, that the advocacy of Missions may be as agreeable and effective as the duties of the pulpit; besides preventing the failures consequent on haphazard effort. The hallowed potency of the Missionary platform has not yet all been felt; and it will have obtained its full respect when its claims are everywhere seriously, yet joyously placed next to those of the pulpit; and when, to give it impressiveness, difficulties are always made to succumb, and distance and storm are deemed trifles, and punctuality is made a law of action by every member of every Missionary Deputation. Such conscientiousness, yearly more apparent, is of itself success. The results of the Wesleyan Missionary platform in Canada are not excelled. The intelligent and cordial co-operation of many Laymen has been of great benefit; and to that source of zeal, friendliness, and ability the Committee look with pleasure for more of such willing assistance;—for willing it is. All preparations for Anniversaries should be made deliberately, on a noble scale, in good time, the taste and time of youth called into requisition, the widest publicity given to them; and a cause which is distinguished for its light and warmth, should, it is more than ever thought by many, never have to be advocated in a building where neither the lamps nor the atmosphere sufficiently cheer the shivering assembly sitting in gloom. The Collectors will conduce greatly to the financial success of the Branch Societies by observing the "Directions" found in the collecting books issued by the Society,—by making a complete visitation of their respective wards and districts immediately after the holding of their own Anniversary Meetings, and by distributing freely copies of the Society's "Appeal." These in connection with the "Missionary Notices," regularly sent, and the "Missionary Tour," and various publications from England, forwarded to the Circuits when requested, may be expected to give growth to the Missionary interest and funds

Much as children, and young persons have exceeded their former selves this year, it is suggested to Branch Officers, that Juvenile Collectors be appointed in every neighborhood, and the Cards handed them early enough to have all their returns reported at the Missionary Meetings. This system has a fine effect upon an assembly when used with tact by a superintendent, and prevents any clashing with the general Branch collecting of the ladies. How much does efficiency in this holy Canadian enterprise depend upon a scrupulous attention to these and other lesser essentials!

This work, however, in a report, always partakes of the defectiveness of an encyclopedia, on account of new wants, new movements, new acquisitions; and this desirable deficiency teaches duty; while its effects, visible and glorious, stir up to steadiness and perseverance. If the friends of this Society had shunned the post of duty, the loftiness of their achievements would not have been beheld. *Their* deliberations and plans have such a result; their anxieties have thus been made available for Christ; their prayers have thus been answered; their restless piety thus honoured; their benevolence thus made eminent by its blessings. It might be said to them, get not bewildered by the shouts of the conquerors in your own Missionary field, much less desist now from action because your own triumphs are so cheering; but it is said, if the work has reached its present state of extension, usefulness, and popularity by their means, they who have accomplished so much under God, will—not forsake it—but secure for it the highest perfection. Their successes, bind them to attempt greater things.

The work done is amazing: the work *left undone* is immense and humiliating. The omitted duties of Christians, therefore, are solemnly to be thought of, felt, profoundly felt. And if the Missionary firmament is but partially—very partially studded with lights; and the kingdoms of this world have not become the kingdoms of God and his Christ; and the demands of sense are regarded, and the demands of religion too little respected; and multitudes of our race, and tens of thousands in Canada know nothing of experimental godliness; and hundreds of thousands of Hudson's Bay Indians are enveloped in the dense darkness of Paganism; and thirty, rather sixty additional Missionaries ought to be commissioned by the Society; and the best predictions of the Holy Ghost are unfulfilled—what then? Prayer is indispensable! The connexional Monthly Missionary Prayer Meeting is a desideratum. The right machinery, to some extent, is in its place: The Divine power must propel it. "I exhort, therefore, that, *first of all*, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men."

It is a fact that the noble friends of this Missionary Society, in Western Canada alone, present this year upwards of £9,000 to its Treasurer. It is

likewise a fact, that no other British Colony does it. There is a third fact, no other British Colony is so prosperous. Grateful indeed is the Committee; and piety and patriotism are in Canada's Wesleyan Missionary munificence. It is a blessing itself, and blessings for the Country, for the Church, for the Circuits, for the Missions, for families, for old and for young cluster about it. But what meaneth the Holy Ghost by inspiring so many prophecies yet unaccomplished, if the Church has done all her duty? What intendeth the Lord of all by prompting thousands of Indians and Whites to expect the services of this Society, if its supporters have nothing more to do? Why is not the destitute portion of the great human family, and of the Canadian and Hudson's Bay population saved, if the past efforts, prayers, and gifts are considered by God sufficient? There is a startling disparity between the duty and the performance. Cannot more parents give their sons to the work? Cannot more sons give themselves? Important presages,—when more mothers shall dedicate their children from their cradles to God, and when revivals shall be more productive of evangelists for the Saviour! If Wesleyans and their friends cannot do more—pray, give more, and send out more labourers yet, *why does God now require more?* Is He a despotic task-master?—More He asks: more they can do. Their oblations gladden by their rapid annual accumulation; but are sacrifice and system generally attributes of their benevolence? Does it cost anything to give? Is the generosity the result of forethought and plan? With many it is. Why not with all?—God has made His redeeming, infinite mercy to all men an imperial motive: May it soon be dominant in all hearts! When that takes place, the consecrations of the Churches are without stint and guilty selfishness.

Millions of unsaved men wait till Christendom is thorough in her zeal, thorough in her devotions, thorough in her self-denial, thorough in her charities! There is ominous delay in the progress of the world's salvation. The sublimest periods of the Christian Church are yet future; and the REDEEMER is put off by our unbelief with an incomplete reward. Hasten—Christians, hasten the exultant era of spiritual plentitude, when it shall be sung universally, "Now is come salvation, and strength, and the kingdom of our God, and the power of his Christ!"
