

Report of the Session of Melville Church

FOR THE YEAR 1894.

The Session at the close of another year gratefully acknowledges the Divine blessing on the various departments of Christian service, which are under its oversight. It has been a season of somewhat unusual interest in religious work. The Special services of last winter resulted in the ingathering of a large number of new communicants.

At the beginning of the year there were 201 communicants on the roll. Of these six were removed by certificate and one by death. There were added during the year thirty-seven on profession of their faith and thirteen by certificate, making the membership of the congregation at the present 244, a net increase of forty-three.

The member removed by death was Mr. James Gray, who was also an elder. In reference to him, the Session passed the following inputs:—

"We record our deep sense of the loss we have sustained as a "Session and as a Church in the death of Mr. James Gray our brother in the eldership and would bear witness to his quiet, inoffensive, and consistent Christian life. We pray that the bereaved friends and especially the aged widow may be comforted by the God of all comfort."

Besides Mr. Gray, the following children of members of the congregation were taken away during the year:—Maggie Ruth McKay, Alexander Gordon Hardman. The Session extends to the bereaved parents its sincere sympathy and pray that they may be truly consoled by God our Father.

The Session notes with submission to the Divine will that it pleased the Head of the Church to suddenly lay aside their beloved pastor soon after his return from his midsummer holidays. It was deemed advisable by the joint Board of Session and Managers, that, in order to secure a more permanent recovery, he should not attempt to resume his work this winter. It has been very gratifying to the Session to discover the practical unanimity of the congregation in this matter. And while the Session deeply sympathizes with the pastor in his en-

Dinth Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

The report of the Board of Management for the past year is hereby submitted to the Congregation.

Special attention is invited to the financial statement which presents several interesting features.

The contributions from envelopes are somewhat less than in 1893, while the plate receipts are about \$100. in excess. This is doubtless owing to a number of the Congregation changing their mode of offering. In May last a circular was issued conjointly by the Session and Board calling attention to this whole matter. It is to be regretted, however, that the response was not as general as should have been the case. It should be known at this time that the Treasurer's books show arrears on account of weekly offerings unpaid amounting to over \$300. Were this amount paid the deficit presently shown would not exist.

In addition to the amount reported last year, the sum of \$500. has been received from Mr. A. C. Hutchison on account of the new church building fund. By consent of the donor, \$400. of this amount has been temporarily used to reduce the mortagage, on which the sum of \$1000. was paid during the year, leaving the amount presently carried at \$2000. which, in addition to the \$600. due to the new building fund, makes a total indebtedness of \$2,600 on the building. At the rate at which contributions for this purpose are being received, it will take about five years more to clear the building of debt.

In November, the Board were called upon to act with reference to the serious illness of our pastor. Medical advice deeming it necessary that Mr. MacGillivray should pass the winter in Colorado, it was decided, after several joint meetings with the Session, to afford him six months leave of absence. Every hope is expressed for a return of our pastor in renewed health at the expiration of that time. In the meantime provision has been made for a maintenance of regular ordinances.

The lack of seating capacity is daily becoming more apparent. To afford the needed relief, it is recommended that the partition dividing the church proper from the parlor be removed. This, it is estimated, would cost about \$30. besides the cost of curtain or such other finishing touches as might be deemed necessary.

The Board request permission, as in former years, to expend such sums as may be necessary (over the \$100. annual allowance) for repairs to the building, painting, &c.

During the year the resignations of Mr. Brady as vice-president, and Mr. Paton as secretary, were received. The positions were filled by the appointment of Messrs. Ray and Robert Greig to the respective offices, and Messrs. Harrower and Robertson to the vacancies on the Board.

In conclusion, the Board desire to tender thanks to all connected with the Congregation for the co-operation received during the past year.

Mclville Church Missionary Society, 1894.

The Missionary Committee beg leave to report that the amount received from envelopes for the year 1894 has been \$217.89, being an increase of \$29.75 over last year, and of \$21.32 over the largest collection yet received in any one year (1888). In addition to the above-named amount the sum of \$100.30 was collected on account of the B. Fay Mills fund, so that the total receipts for the year were \$317.80.

In the month of March an appeal was issued by the Committee asking for increased liberality on the part of the Congregation, and at the same time a new method of distribution of the Record was inaugurated, a number of young ladies most kindly lending their services in placing the Record and a supply of contribution envelopes in every home. In this way the home of every member of our Church has been regularly visited each month. To this plan, we believe, may be credited the increased receipts and yet the average number of contributors for the year has been but seventeen-only seven per cent of the Church membership. In urging upon the members the desirability for a more generous support of the Church missions, the Committee would emphasize the fact that "Systematic beneficence means systematic blessing."

Mission Band.—Owing to the opening of the Junior Endeavor Society and the impossibility of having two separate organizations for the children working successfully, it was deemed best to suspend the operations of the Band for the year. As they had in former years undertaken the support of a Child's Cot in the Montreal General Hospital and the clothing of a child in the Mackay Institute, besides other work of a charitable character, it was felt that to give up this work was a backward step. A lady of the congregation, however, kindly offered to raise money to carry on the work formerly undertaken by the Band, and the teachers gladly placed in her hands a balance of money belonging to this organization to assist in this good work.

Soirée.—The annual soirée was given to the School towards the end of January, at which there was a large gathering of parents and children. After tea had been partaken of, a short musical programme was gone through. Rev. Mr. Silcox of Emmanuel Church, also gave an address which was listened to with interest by all.

PICNIC —In the beginning of June the picnic was held at Hudson, a charming place on the Ottawa. We were again favored with fine weather and the day was most thoroughly enjoyed by all who were fortunate enough to be able to attend.

Hudson, vith fine ho were LIBRARY.—We are deeply indebted to our Superintendent and our Librarian for the sums of \$15 and \$10 respectively which we hope soon to use in purchasing new books for the library. In January last 162 new books were added, the total number of volumes at present being 1175. A good deal of time and labour was expended by the Librarian in his efforts to counteract the destruction occasioned in the wear and tear of books. Besides the 162 new ones, 272 old books were re-covered, making in all 434 books covered during the year.

Some slight change has been made in the arrangement of our school. In order to save time at our monthly business meetings, it was deemed advisable to elect an executive committee, whose duty it is to discuss all matters of business before presenting them to the teachers for approval.

Weekly meetings for the study of the Sunday-school lessons were also instituted, and were found of great benefit in the preparation of the weekly lesson.

Let our watchword for the new year be "Go forward!"

In presenting this our fifth annual report we would acknowledge the goodness and mercy of our Heavenly Father, in the way by which he has led us during the past year.

At present our Society has enrolled 28 Active and 8 Associate members.

During the year several of our oldest and most active members have withdrawn from the Society, we have added their names to our list of honorary members; our president Mr. J. Paton, also was obliged to resign, his duty having called him to another field of labor; more than all, we have missed the loving counsel and timely help of our Pastor, and we most sincerely hope that the separation may be only for a little while. Despite all these changes the work of the Society has been faithfully carried on, a Junior Society of C. E. has also been organized and is doing good work among the children of the congregation.

The Missionary Committee have helped in various ways, the work being carried on at the Brewery Mission; they have also collected and distributed a great amount of papers, magazines, &c., to different missions both in Montreal and others places, they have also tried in many ways to interest the members in mission work, and the success of their efforts is shown by the larger missionary collections, which have amounted to \$98.35; of which \$56.95 has been given to Home missions, and \$41.40 to Foreign missions.

The Charitable Committee have provided clothing for a pupil in Mackay Institute and have also done good work in visiting and assisting the sick and needy.

The work of the Flower Committee has been seen and appreciated by all, the flowers placed on the pulpit each Sabbath have been supplied by them, they have also taken flowers to the sick among the congregation and to the hospitals, and the members of that committee wish to take this opportunity of thanking some members of the congregation who have kindly given flowers to help them in their work.

The work done by other Committees, though not of so noticeable a character, has been earnestly carried on, and all look forward to another year of loving service " for Christ and the Church."
