P. construction east of Quebec was successfully carried out at Hennegan Mountain in the Willard Ritchie Company's work. It was intended to blast the rock, but the rock proved of the wrong formation. A charge of between five and six tons of dynamite was used at each end, and the explosion opened up about 1000 cubic yards of material. DIED AT POINT LA NIM. Mr. William Langer, a prominent farmer of Point La Nim, died at his home on Tuesday. The late Mr. Langer was born a short time after the Armistice and was one of the young men of the town. He was a member of the local militia and was killed in the war. He was a very popular man and his death is a great loss to the community.
