PARENTS AWAY KILLED SISTER

Guysboro Colored Girl Tied To Ladder and Beaten to Death.

A REVOLTING CRIME.

Halifax, Aug. 25.—The latest information has come to hand of the atrocious deed of a vicious negro boy of Guysboro, N. S. This lad is a son of Joseph Innes, generally known as the "Violent".

The father and mother were away on a picnic on Thursday last and upon returning home found that the son, thirteen or fourteen years of age, had tied his little six-year-old sister to a ladder and beaten her to death.

The father applied to the coroner of the poor for assistance to bury the dead child and an order was given him to have this done. Subsequently a coroner's jury was held and the local authorities had the body dissected and examined. Coroner Atwater empaneled a jury and held an inquest. At this inquest magistrate DeBarres was present and Dr. Buckley, who made the autopsy, testified as to the cause of death.

The boy, who is charged with the deed, was arrested and lodged in jail and will be tried before a magistrate.

NOW PROMOTING THE TOBIOUC TO CAMPBELLTON R. R.

J. E. Stewart of Andover While Visiting St. John Tells of a Proposed Route To Join International Railroad

WORK COMMENCES SHORTLY

St. John, Aug. 25.—J. E. Stewart, who is at the Victoria Hotel, and last evening that the construction contract for the Tobioque and Campbellton Railroad would be let early in the autumn and that construction work would begin this year. The new railroad, which is practically an extension of the Tobioque Valley Railway from Master Rock to Riley Brook, will be operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway under terms similar to those made which that company operates the Tobioque Valley Railway.

The new road will run along the west bank of the Tobioque River through a thickly settled district. A short distance from Master Rock the railway will connect with the National Transcontinental.

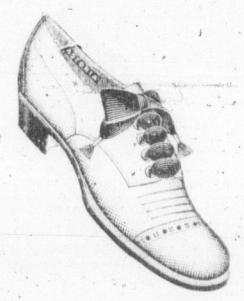
