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TOWN AND COUNTRY.

News From Various Quarters Gathered for "The Gleaner."

Doings on the Upper St. John - Railways and Mills. Campbellton's Progressive Move - News From York Districts.

REMEMBRANCE. A Paper Between the New Brunswick and the Maritime Provinces on the Upper St. John.

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The Gleaner.

ANNEXATION?
 For some time past the feeling has prevailed in Boston and other important centres that the best and most sensible solution of the fishery question lies in the annexation of the Maritime Provinces to the United States, the latter to be responsible for the entire debts of the provinces, or to give fifty millions of dollars, and the provinces to square their own debts. The Boston Herald is now out strongly in favor of such a scheme, and is evidently largely supported in it. The proposition meets with the favor of many important public men in the United States. We have been favored ourselves with two or three private letters on the subject in which the same scheme was proposed. Some of our citizens have also been communicated with on the same subject. About four weeks ago Edward Atkinson, of Boston, wrote advising the submitting of the scheme to the people through the press. He was personally, it appears, not unfriendly to commercial union as a settlement of the dispute, but the vast majority of American citizens, he said, could not be induced to sanction such a settlement. Therefore, annexation was only one means of a fair and reasonable adjustment. He enclosed his letter to Mr. Wells, of Connecticut, probably one of the most influential democrats in the United States, who in forwarding it enclosed a letter to the position taken by our friend Atkinson. On October 25th, Mr. Atkinson again wrote, "What a pity it is that a mode of settling fishery questions which would satisfy every one, cannot be considered on account of international jealousy. Only think what a start New Brunswick and Nova Scotia might make if they could be brought into the United States absolutely free of any State debt and with the United States debt nearly all paid." The Americans are evidently sincere in their proposal, but it is difficult to say at this date in what spirit the people of the Maritime Provinces will receive it. Some eight or ten years ago, we do not hesitate to say, such a proposition would not receive a moment's consideration. There was then but a comparatively small annexation element. Since that time, however, a wonderful change in feeling has been wrought. An insidious government has controlled affairs, and the business of the country has, in consequence of their policy, been paralyzed. Our young men have been practically driven from their homes to the neighboring republic where in most cases they are doing well and are content. These young men number thousands, and the sympathy of their relatives goes out to them and to the country that further so well their interests. In this way we say there has been a wonderful change of feeling and sentiment during the past few years. Of course other agencies have contributed to the change, but that mentioned we regard as the most important. If, therefore, there should be a predominance of the annexation element, and the American proposal were readily accepted, the Tories are in every sense responsible. We would be pleased to publish the views of some of our readers on this subject.

NECESSITY OF INCREASED EXPENDITURE.
 For some time past the condition of the British army and navy has been such as to call for expressions of alarm from those who have kept a watchful eye on the nation. High military authorities have been urging upon the government the necessity of putting the army and navy on a better footing so that they may be able to make a stand against invaders, and that Britain may retain that reputation for supremacy which alone has so often sufficed to cool the temper of an angry power. No little heed has been given to their suggestions, and Lord Wolsey found it necessary to emphasize his advice by giving the army "a shot" or two, while Sir Charles Dilke, who stood almost within reach of the helm of Britain, has exposed the unsound condition of both the army and navy. These two authorities are no alarmists, and unless the Salisbury government early take steps to supply the deficiencies which have been pointed out, it will one day wake up to find that Britain's supremacy is in jeopardy, and that the nation is in a position which was forethought and preparation could readily have averted. Lord Randolph Churchill, in a boyish passion, quarrelled with his colleagues in the cabinet over what he termed the enormous expenditure on the army and navy, but wiser heads than the noble lord's have shown that though the expenditure may be great, it is far from being sufficient to maintain the efficiency of the service. Not a nation whose glory has been her arms cease to give adequate support to a service which has placed her in the commanding position she has so long held, and which has done so much towards making her to lead the van in "the emulating arts of peace."

CONFIDENCE AND BUSINESS.
 The Montreal Times appears to be given to the belief that all that is necessary for success in business, or in fact in almost any undertaking, is confidence in one self and one enterprise. It is because there is in many quarters no such confidence, that there are hard times, hints our contemporary. This is a new way of accounting for the depression. We had all along been of the opinion that the depression was due to a great extent to the confidence with which many manufacturers and merchants solaciously received the protection policy

of the present government. "Clap on full sail," said a late Finance minister. The action was followed, and all that followed it were confident of success. And what has been the result? No one will venture to assert that since then there has been in Canada even a single season of prosperity. We have been under the pressure of hard times ever since, and no one is more impressed with the fact than the overconfident manufacturer and merchant who "clapped on full sail." Confidence in business is a very good element, but confidence will not better the condition of trade. Remove the embargo from the commerce of the country, give us a larger market, then apply that element of confidence which our contemporary speaks about, and we will have prosperity.

THE LATEST TALK.
 A report is current that the dominion government intends at the next session of parliament to ask for a grant of several million dollars to enable them to purchase the Canada Pacific railway company's monopoly in the Northwest. Unable to get over the Manitoba difficulty by a policy of disallowance, Sir John has determined, at the instigation of his master Sir George Stephen, to further increase the burden of taxation on the people, that the monopolists may not be at a loss and that the government may escape exposure. The railway magnates are, it is said, using every effort to have the construction of the Red River Valley railway delayed till after the session of parliament, so that the element of competition may not be considered when parliament discusses the question of the grant. Whether or not they will be successful in this we cannot tell, but the country may rest assured that the monopolists will get as much money from the government as they wish to ask. As time goes on, the more must reflecting people feel that we are in the hands of a huge monopoly, and that however dishonorable and outrageous the demands it makes upon the people, the government are not in a position to do ought but yield to its exactions.
