## LICENSE BOARD MET YESTERDAY.

(From Friday's Graphic.)  
The liquor license commissioners met yesterday afternoon to consider the applications for licenses for the ensuing year. The board as now constituted consists of J. H. Taylor, chairman, H. Cyr and E. J. Allingham.

A large number of citizens were present, among whom were a number of ladies, members of the W. C. T. U.

The report of Inspector Gray was submitted on each application. He recommended that licenses be granted to Daniel O'Keefe, Patrick O'Leary, Rose Anna Lacasse and John McIntyre.

The applications of Jos. Danbouse, Wm. R. Riddell, Numa Bernatchez, Joseph Boudreau and Belanger Bros. were not recommended on the ground that they had been fined for violation of the act. The application of Thos. J. Gorman on the ground that it was not filed within the proper time.

The resolution passed at a meeting of the Baptist congregation as well as the petition of over 200 residents of the town, against the granting of a license to Thos. J. Gorman was then submitted.

A petition of ratepayers of Ward Two against the applications of W. R. Riddell, Joseph Boudreau, N. Bernatchez, Belanger Bros. and Jos. Danbouse was also submitted. Similar petitions against Wm. Sproul, Henry Murray and Thos. J. Gorman were also submitted.

Judge McIntyre addressed the commissioners in support of the petition against the granting of a license to Thos. Gorman. He explained that as he was a member of the Baptist church, which was interested in the case, he felt that in the event of the matter going to trial, he would be debarred from hearing the case, and it was because of this fact that he was taking part in the matter. He dwelt upon the close proximity of the applicant's premises to the Baptist church and called attention to the section of the act bearing on the case. He also referred to the evil effect upon the boys and girls attending the church, being compelled to witness the accompaniments of the saloon.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc appeared on behalf of the petitioners in the other cases. He pointed out that the inspector had reported against the applicants and the commissioners had no other course but to withhold license according to the act. He also pointed out that taking the figures of the last dominion census, and the census of the town taken in 1900, and making a proportionate estimate, the limit of licenses allowed by the act would be four in Ward Two, and three in Ward Three.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc appeared on behalf of all the applicants with the exception of Thos. Gorman. He contended that Mr. Trueman's interpretation of the law in regard to the report of the inspector was not correct. He was about to speak in regard to the census question when Mr. W. P. Gray asked permission to read a letter that had been received from the Attorney-General by the commissioners in answer to a letter written by the Temperance Federation, a copy of which had been forwarded to him. Permission was granted and the Attorney-General stated that the only course to pursue would be to take the very best means in your power to ascertain what the population of the town is and what should be made whatever reduction is reasonable for the increase in those wards since 1901. The letter also implied that the legislature would consider the bill to amend the act in order that the spirit of the act might be carried out if the action of the board was attached.

A resolution was adopted by the board making it compulsory at least twelve miles of the upper portion of doors and windows so arranged that any lights burning in bars may be seen from the outside, under a penalty of not exceeding twenty dollars.

The commissioners decided to adjourn to meet on Thursday, May 7th, when the licenses will probably be granted.
