London, May 9.—Mr. Chamberlain's proposal that Mr. Gladstone and Lord Salisbury have a conference on the Irish land question was much discussed in the lobbies of Parliament last night. The

lobbies of Parliament last night. The Gladstonians were strongly against the proposal, while the Conservatives seemed convinced it would have no good results. The Irish landlord party is urging the Government to pass the clauses of the Land Purchase Bill which relate to congested districts, and postpone further consideration of the remainder of the bill till next session of Parliament

Varying Views.

London, May 9.—Emperor William's

speech has produced a bad impression at St. Petersburg. It is regarded as having a warlike significance beneath the pacific pro-tests. The fact of increased military credits being asked is considered as contradictory to the Emperor's pacific phrases.

Senor Castellar, in a Senor Castellar, in a discussion with a member of the Spanish Chamber of Deputies, condemned Emperor William's Socialist policy as inspired by mere political designs. He blames the Pope for making advances to Socialism. He admitted the grievances of the working classes, but maintained that State interference would fail to cure them.

The Pope, in receiving German pilgrims, praised the Catholic spirit of Germany and eulogized Emperor William's effort to ameliorate the condition of the working

Re-enforcing the German Army.

BERLIN, May 9. - In announcing the prep aration of the bill to increase the field ar tillery by 70 batteries and the army corps by special troops, the Reichsanzeiger says that the state of things among the neighors of Germany does not admit of Gerbors of Germany does not admit of Ger-many's continuing the present military sys-tem, under which the artillery is strength-ened at the expense of the infantry. It is therefore necessary to fix a new effective strength for the army. An increase of the cavalry and infantry near the western and eastern frontiers is also intended. It will be the duty of the troops in those sections to advance to the frontier in the event of war, without awaiting the reserves, to repel attacks. It is expected that the increased expenditures will not exceed 18,000,000 marks annually.

The Germans in East Africa. LONDON, May 9.—The Germans are to take the initiative in building forts in East Africa. It is obvious that wherever the boundary is doubtful, the first comer will Africa. It is obvious that wherever the boundary is doubtful, the first comer will have greatly the advantage, and the most practicable road to the great lakes will be in German land. The scheme of occupation, as outlined, is more elaborate than has hitherto been imagined. Friendly natives and liberted clare will be greatly set. and liberated slaves will be encouraged to and noeraced saves will be encouraged to settle around the forts, where they will be taught the use of firearms, assisted to cul-tivate the ground and otherwise converted into useful allies. These forts, which will thus be made practically into settlements, will be within any conting distance of each will be within supporting distance of each other and will be gradually made insur-mountable barriers to the old slave trade,

Thirteen Killed and Eaten by Cannibals. BRUSSELS, May 9.—News is confirmed of the killing of Mr. Musy, commander of the French post at Bangui, on the Mobargi branch of the Congo. He is the second white man who has been killed by natives in the Congo Basin. The first wasa comrade of Capt. Trivier in his trip last year across the continent. Musy was killed with twelve men on Jan. 2. He had left his post with many allies for the Jacobi tribe to chastise the village of Salangi tor making slave raids on villages that were on friendly relations with the Salang for making since rates on viringes that were on friendly relations with the French. During the fight which followed his arrival at Salangi all his allies deserted him and he and the twelve men of his station were left surroundary of the salary station were left surroundary of the salary station were left surroundary. ned by an enemy in overpowering numbers. Musy kept the savages at bay until his ammunition was exhausted, when all his men and himself perished and their bodies were eaten by the cannibals. Keeper Mainwaring says that when he was aroused he did not wait to dress himself, but bounded down stairs in his bare feet. On opening the door leading from the hall to the idiot department he saw the interior was one mass of flames, and the smoke overpowering. He attempted to rescue the impates who were shut in to rescue the inmates who were shut in their cells, but was driven back by the heat their cells, but was driven back by the heat and smoke. He then ran out and gave the alarm, returned to his room and dressed himself, and then ran through the corridor and aroused the paupers. In some instances the people were dazed, and it was neces-sary to carry them bodily down from the house. Mainwaring says that when he took possession as keeper he threw out all the stoyenines and replaced them with took possession as keeper he threw out all the stovepipes and replaced them with new, besides putting heavy sheet-iron screens around every stove, and he did everything to prevent a conflagration. Keeper Hall, of the insane department, says some of the lunatics were ugly, and refused to be rescued until main force was used. All the corpses were burned beyond recognition. 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

Cutting Potato Seed.

According Potato Seed.

According to experiments at the Ohio Station, other conditions being the same, the larger the cutting, the greater the total product, varying about in accordance with the size of cutting. The marketable product also increases in about the same ratio, but is not in the same ratio as the total crop. A crop grown from whole potatoes matures at an earlier date than from small cuttings. The question of profit as between small cuttings and whole potatoes depends upon the cost of seed, date of harvesting and selling, and the condition of the soil. Neither extreme will be found profitable.
