OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—This was private members' day. Mr. Truax asked the Minister of Customs if Mr. McNamara, sub-collector of customs at Walkerton, resigned his position prior to or during the election in February and March last, and if so when he was reappointed. MINISTERS ON THE INTERCOLONIAL.

With regard to all such conflicts taking place before Confederation, much as their heroism might be admired, he believed it would be best to let them be forgotten, or at least not have this federated Parliament revive them. TEMPERANCE ACT AMENDMENT.

Mr. Flint's bill amending the Canada Temperance Act, 1888, was read a second time. In moving the second reading Mr. Flint made a strong speech in explanation and support of his measure. The effect of the amendment, he explained, would be to put druggists and chemists under the same restrictions as regards the sale of alcoholic and spirituous liquors as regular licensed

Nebraska Job Printers Locked Out-Detroit Cigarmakers Trouble. The eight-hour law, passed by the last Legislature of Nebraska, went into effect on Saturday. The only trouble growing out of the enforcement of the law so far is a lock-out of job printers. The employing printers refused to grant eight hours and when the men came to work this morning they were told their services were no longer

WESTERN FAIR BUTTER TEST.

An interesting feature of the Western Fair to dairymen will be the two days' butter-producing contest for a prize of \$50, open to cows of any registered breed. The American Shorthorn Breeders' Association also offers a first prize of \$100 and a second of \$50 for the cows of that breed making most butter in a two-days' test. It is hoped that a lot of the famous "milking Shorthorns" will put in an appearance in compe tition for these valuable premiums. The tests are to be under the supervision of Mr. C. A. Tavitz, assistant to Prof. Shaw in the experimental department at the Ontario weighed separately and the milk tested for its percentage of butter fat by the Babcock method, in which way the total butter fat produced in the two days can be very easily reckoned. As our dairy readers are aware, of course, the total will be less by from 12 to 15 per cent. than the weight of good, marketable butter that the milk would yield, but the test will be equally fair to all sows competing. Some minor points in the regulations to govern the test will be published in another issue. Feed will not be taken into account. Get your butter cows

STARVATION IN EUROPE MAY BRING PROSPERITY HERE. All attention of business men and farmers

in Canada and indeed throughout the civilized world is now concentrated on the crop prospects at home and abroad. Industrial interests, whether in the factory, the workshop, or the store, are all affected for better or for worse by the yield of the earth's bounty, not only at home but in every portion of the world where the soil is cultivated. With a comparatively plentiful harvest in these parts and an alarming shortage in more than one of the great grain-growing countries in Europe, unusual interest has been taken in the outlook, and an unbiassed statement of the latest reports as to the crops is therefore timely.

Last winter was most severe in all Parts of Europe and in some portions of Asia and Northern Africa, and the wheat and rye crops, on which the populace chiefly subsist, were severely injured. The summer has witnessed no improvement. On the contrary, there has been extreme heat and drought, fol lowed by excessive cold and frosts, and over wide portion of the old world the crops

are far below an average.
In Great Britain the yield is probably 10 per cent. below the average, or 64,000,000 bushels. The imports necessitated will be in the neighborhood of 160,000,000 bushels.

Harvest time has arrived in France, with a wheat acreage short by 8,500,000 acres of the average, a loss of 62,000,000 bushels. The remaining 13,500,000 is not likely to yield 70 per cent. of the average, which has been 310,000,000 bushels for the last decade. Thus a loss of 134,000,000 bushels on the average crop is accounted for. The rye crop of France is also short 75,000,000

In Germany there is a shortage of 16, 000,000 bushels of wheat and 55,000,000 bushels of rye. In Austria-Hungary the crops of these staples are 15 to 20 per cent. below the average; in Italy from 10 to 20 per cent. below; in Spain, 15 per cent. below, and in Belgium the crops are little more than half the average. Switzerland's crops are such that her annual import of 13,000,000 bushels of wheat will this year have to be added to by 2,000,000, while Portugal, Holland an Scandinavia have 15 per cent. of a deficit. In Syria the drought and locusts have left but a poor crop, and in Morocco and Algiers the locusts have left the populace so little that they are on the verge of famine. From Asia Minor reports of splendid crops come, place. In Tunis and Egypt there will be the usual quantities to export, but from Persia little need be expected. The locusts have been there also. Australia's new export of 10,000,000 bushels of wheat is expected. India becomes more and more of competitor with this continent in the old world markets. This year the exports

from that country will be large, probably the greatest ever known. The most gloomy reports come from Russia. The winter wheat crop is almost an entire failure; in many provinces the land will not return the rye seed sown, and in widely extended districts the people are suffering-are on the verge of a famine. The rye crop is practically destroyed, and the deficit in it alone is expected to foot up to the enormous total of 290,000,000 bushels, taking the average annual yield as 725,000,000. The Montreal correspondent of a Toronto newspaper reports that in the course of an interview anent the alleged amalgamation of the Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk, Mr. McIntyre did not hesitate to say that it was all without foundation. "It would not be possible for such a fusion of interests to be consummated, though changes were contemplated in the management of the G. T. R."

From all that can be learned a Canadian board will be constituted composed of Duncan McIntyre (chairman), Sir Joseph Hickson, General Manager Seargeant, Assistant General Manager Wainwright, and the fifth member will probably be a broker of extensive experience in G. T. R. securities.

It is understood that Mr. McIntyre's

An additional eighteen miles of double track will be opened for traffic on Aug. 9.



Death of Dr. John M. Fraser.

Dr. John M. Fraser, B.A., passed away carly Sunday morning at the family residence, corner York and Talbot streets, His death was not entirely unexpected, as for months past his health had been seriously affected, his condition having been rendered the more dangerous recently by heart disease. Deceased was born in Westminster township 54 years ago this month. His father, Donald Fraser, was a native of Inverness, Scotland, and his mother of Dawn county, Ireland, the two coming to Canada in 1833, soon after settling on the farm in Westminster. Mr. Fraser died in 1861, and his widow survived him until a few months ago, her demise taking place in the state of the st 1861, and his widow survived him until a few months ago, her demise taking place in this city. The subject of this sketch attended the Grammar School in London while a youth, and subsequently took his degrees in arts and medicine at Kingston University. In 1861 he commenced the practice of his profession in Morpeth, Ont., where heremained three years. After a year's study in Europe he went to Ridgetown, moving to this city in 1868. During his residence of nearly a quarter of a century in London his recognized ability and strength of personal character rendered him prominent as a citizen and a physician. He was among the foremost promoters of

strength of personal character rendered him prominent as a citizen and a physician. He was among the foremost promoters of the General Hospital and the Western University medicel department. For years he was a member of the Board of Education; he was associated with Tuscan Lodge, A. F. and A. M., London Council, Royal Arcanum, and the Oddfellows, and was an esteemed elder of St. Andrew's Church. Dr. Fraser had one of the largest practices in Western Ontario. He was a member of the Royal College of Surgeons, England, and of the Obstetrical Society, Dublin; professor of principles and practice of the Western University, and also surgeon of the Seventh Fusiliers, whom he accompanied to the Northwest in 1885. His first wife, by whom he had nine children, still living, died some time ago, and deceased was again married at a very recent date. His profession is followed by two of his zons. Dr. S. M. Fraser is Mounted Police force surgeon at Fort Macleod, N. W.T., and Dr. J. W. Fraser was in parthership with his late father.

The death of Dr. Fraser makes the first break in the ranks of the officers of the Seventh Fusiliers who served in the Northwest campaign. The doctor was highly esteemed and his loss will be deeply regretted. A member of the Seventh says: "The writer will never ferget the memorable occasion of the first burch parade after the

writer will never forget the memorable writer will never lerget the memorable oc-casion of the first church parade after the Fusiliers left London. It was on the ice of Lake Superior, and after a miserable bight previous and half a day's march over the frozen lake Dr. Fraser conducted the

service, which was of necessity brief, and his prayer and few words made a deep impression on all."

The Masons, Oddfellows and military have expressed a desire to conduct the funeral, but the bereaved family have preferred it to be of a private nature.
