A SLIPPERY YOUTH.

Burke's Companion Escapes Through a Train Window,

Although Handcuffed and in Charge of a Constable-The Latter Gives Chase, But in Vain.

A Guelph dispatch says: About the latter end of July Chief Censtable Chas. J. 1800s, Preston, arrested a man and two boys for vagrancy. They were suspicious-locking characters, and were found guilty and sentenced to 60 days in the county juil at Berlin. WHY MAKE HALF A JOB OF IT? The London Board of Health has made a move towards the removal of the domestic refuse of the city. It has resolved to have waste vegetable matter, old boots, etc., carted away, but it draws the line at coal

This halfway measure, though in the right direction, will not be satisfactory to the people. But, strange to say, the Board of Health is prepared to defend its action on the ground that it believes the people would not pay for the added cost of a completed job

It would have been time enough to assume this attitude when the council refused to place the money needed in the

The board has waited to hear what they do in Toronto and Hamilton. Is has found out that in both these cities a complete job is made of it, and a weekly removal of all vegetable refuse and ashes takes place.

t would have been better if the London

Board of Health had followed the example set by these cities.

"The expense scares us," say the board Is not that a shortsighted excuse? The ashes have to be moved in any case. Taken away by the co-operative method, as in Toronto and Hamilton, the cost to the average householder in yearly taxation would not be over 30 cents a year. By the system now in vogue, each citizen making his own bargain, the cost is from \$1 to \$2 a year! Where is the saving in providing that a dirty heap of ashes shall be saved up for a year at a time, when, at so small cost, the collective method might be pursued, and ashes, as well as bad vegetables, could be carted off every week? We are convinced that the taxpayers will not be satisfied with this half-way measure, and that the faint-hearted Board of Health will be compelled to revise its scheme before many months have elapsed.

Such is the question that Mr. Stead, editor of the Review of Reviews, propounds in an article on the famous May orick poisoning case, which has interested two continents, and which he has answered by a remarkable statement in the condomned woman's favor.

Mr. Stead took the matter up because o a communication which he received from Johannesburg, South Africa, inclosing an alleged death-bed confession by a man named Henry Wilson, who asserted that he could not die without confessing that he, and not Mrs. Maybrick, had put arsenic into her husband's medicine. He did so, he said, 'for purposes of revenge on Mrs. Maybrick." This man wrote to Sir Charles Russell, counsel for Mrs. Maybrick, first; but not obtaining an answer to his letter in four months, he communicated with Mr. Stead, as likely to look into the matter as "one loving justice for my

The Review of Reviews editor was moved to look further into the case, and he reached the conclusion that whether or not there was anything in the confession, "the case is so scandalous an illustration of the very worst sides of the British judicial system and of the British character, that, if only to give us a chance of burying the matter in oblivion, Mrs. Maybrick should be released." It will be remembered that Mrs. Maybrick, a native of the United States, was sentenced to death on circumstantial evidence for the murder of her husband by poisoning. The presiding justice was Sir Fitzjames Stephens, and for some reason or other he took strong grounds against the woman. Logically, she should have been hanged; but Home Secretary Matthews did not dare o carry out the capital sentence, and instead of sending Mrs. Maybrick for trial on the charge of attempting to poison, he agreed with the judge that the sentence should be commuted to penal servitude for life. As the editor of Truth remarked at the time, this virtually knocked the bottom out of the whole case against Mrs. May-

Mr. Stead now points out that Mrs. Maybrick made a fatal mistake when, even after she was placed in the dock, she chivalrously shielded the reputation of her dead husband. It now turns out that he had very bad reputation, that he was a de-bauchee, that before marriage he lived the life of a rake, and that he had repeatedly broken his marital vows. He even con-tinued to spend his money in support of louseholds other than his own. Long before Mrs. Maybrick met her friend Brierley, and was guilty of at least indiscreet conduct, she had been compelled to virtually separate herself from her husband. Far more damaging evidence than this, Mr. Stead assures us, could have been adduced in court, but the fatal chivalry of the loving heart of a deeply injured woman influenced her to command her lawyers "to spare Jem as much as possible." Thus the "hideous miscarriage of justice" was rendered com-paratively easy.

When Mr. Maybrick married he was over 40, but he was a physical wreck from his own vices. He only kept himself going by the perpetual administration of aphrodisiacs. His office was like a drug-shop, his ouse had arsenic in almost every corner. house had arsente in almost every corner. He habitually drugged himself with arsenic, in the hope of restoring his exhausted vitality. This does not condone or excuse the wife, but it entirely puts the husband out of court, and Mr. Stead nusband out of court, and Mr. Stead asserts, makes Judge Fitzstephen's ana-themas seem even more brutally unjust than they appeared at the time. That this man was a confirmed arsenic eater, Mr. Stead found abundance eater, Mr. Stead found abundance of evidence when he visited Liverpool last month. The jury found that James Maybrick died of arsenic. The judge did not need to re-

mind them that if there was any reasonable doubt, it is the estab-lished principle of English law that the prisoner must have the benefit of that doubt. That goes without saying. But the jury, notwithstanding the evidence of four most distinguished medical experts, who swore that the deceased aid not die of poison, decided that there was no reason for doubting but that James Maybrick did die of arsenic. The Home Secretary retries the case and proclaims to the world that after taking the best medical and legal advice that could be obtained, he has come to the conclusion that "the evidence does not wholly exclude a reasonable doubt whether his death was in fact caused by the administration of arsenic!" This is directly opposed to the finding of the the jury, and as the prisoner is entitled to the benefit of the doubt, the very foundation of the verdict of the jury is knocked out. If there was no murder no one can be guilty of murder. If there is a "reason-able doubt" that Maybrick did not die of poison, then clearly there can be no ground in law or reason for convicting his wife of having poisoned him. But although the Home Secretary thus summarily destroys the foundation of the verdict of the jury he refuses to alter the decision that she is guilty of willfully murdering a man who, he admits, may never have been murdered at all. We shall have to ransack the annals of topsy turvydom to discover a precedent for this absurd and ridiculous conclusion. But it stands to this day unreversed, though strenuous efforts are now being made to secure the release of the condemned woman.

The view of the law officers seems to be that, though the verdict of willful murder has been practically annulled, the Home Secretary decided that the evidence clearly pointed to the conclusion that Mrs. May-brick administered and attempted to administer arsenic to her husband with intent to murder, and that for attempting to poison she may be lawfully imprisoned for Stead, in that case let us clearly understand that Mrs. Maybrick is at this moment a convict in Woking, not for committing wilful murder, but for attempting to poison. That surely is clear enough from the decision of the Home Office. Yet so anomalous are the ways of the circumlocution office, so labyrinthine the maze of British jurisprudence, that the Home Office still maintains that Mrs. Maybrick is under sentence, not for attempting to poison, but for willful murder. It is such banal futili-ties which will yet make the British Home Office the laughing-stock of the world.

Is it true that the evidence points so clearly to the administration of poison by Mrs. Maybrick? She herself admitted having put a powder, at her husband's urgent request, into a bottle of meat juice, and at the trial a bottle of meat juice was produced which contained arsenic, but Mrs. Maybrick declared she never saw it before. It is, however, admitted that none of that arsenious meat juice was ever administered to him, so that, whatever her intent may have been, it was not carried into effect. Where, then, is the evidence that she administered the arsenic, if she ever gave him any, which is not proved, with feloni-ous intent? If she gave him arsenic in his medicine, it may have been at his own request, or she may have given it to him inadvertently, owing to the poison having been placed in his medicine by other parties. The former is the conclusion which s suggested by the notorious habits of Mr. Maybrick, the latter is put forward by the confession from South Africa. In either case there would be no reason for keeping Mrs. Maybrick in jail. There has been no evidence that Mrs. Maybrick ever procured any arsenic anywhere, or administered it at any time. Medical experts who gave evidence deposed that the arsenic found in James Maybrick's body might have been taken merely in medical doses, and that it could have been taken, and probably was taken, a considerable time before either his leath or illness. 



CHEAPEST LIGHT IN THE WORLD.

It is said by those who have experimented with them that the light given by the fireflies of Cuba is the "cheapest" in the world, produced, that is to say, with the least heat and the smallest expenditure of energy; and that a successful imitation of it would prove to be a most profitable substitute for gas and electricity. The insects are beetles too inches long and belong to the family of "snapping bugs," so called because when one of them is laid on its back it enaps itself into the air with a clinking sound.

The secret of the light this firefly gives is as yet undiscovered. Apparently it is connected in some way with the mysterious phenomenon of life, and chemists and physicians have sought in vain to explain its origin. On each side of the animal's thorax is a luminous membranous spot, and these flash at intervals so that the Cubans put a dozen of the insects in a case together, and so obtain a continuous illumination bright enough to read by. This light is accompanied by no preceptible heat, and is seemingly produced with almost no expenditure of energy. How great an improvement it represents upon all known artificial lights can be imagined when it is stated that in candielight, lamplight or gaslight the waste is more than 99 per cent. 

The great German chemist, Liebig, says:

"We can prove with mathematical certainty
that as much flour as can lie on the point
of a table knife is more nutritious than
nine quarts of the best Bavarian beer, and
that a person who is able daily to consume
that amount of beer obtains from it in a
whole year in the most favorable case exactly the amount of nutritive constituents
which is contained in a five-pound doof of
bread." And to get that he must drink 24
barrels of 30 gallons each, or about a barrel
every fifteen days, and get the value of less
than half a pound of bread from each
barrel. That is making a strainer of your

PROGRESS IN ENGLAND. PROGRESS IN ENGLAND.

A leading English journal has just written this; "People who are sometimes disposed to despair over the slow progress of temperance work should remember that in 1738 there were in London 207 inns, 447 taverns, 551 coffee houses, 5, 971 ale houses, and 8,659 brandy shops, making a total of 15,839 houses at which intoxicants could be purchased—and all this for a population of 630,000. A century later the population had advanced to 1,776,500, but the number of houses where intoxicating liquors were sold had greatly diminished, not then exceeding 5,000, so that, in proportion to the population, there were at the former period, nine times as many places open for the sale of intoxicants as at the latter. In the matter of gambling, too, great as is the present evil, the progress towards reform has been very great. In 1782 there were in the city of Westminister 296 public gambling tables, to say nothing of the clubs, where fortunes were often lost."

THE CAUSES OF POVERTY.

In an article in the Westminister Review for September, on "Poverty in London," Edward Reeves says:

"I will name three things which alone are powerful enough to bring misery upon a large number of our inhabitants:

Free trade in land—by which I mean power to a few individuals to monopolize it, entail it, shut it off from cultivation for the support of all the inhabitants—the purpose for which it was originally intended by nature—and, in short, to do what they like with it.

"Free trade in labor—by which the native worker can be brought down to the levell of an imported, alien, lower race; and "Free trade in intoxicating liquors across the counter, on which point the London Daily Telegraph of Feb. 25, 1892, says:

"Statistics, like facts, are subborn things, and they conclusively prove, first, that 50 per cent. of all the crimes annually committed in the United Kingdom are traceable to intemperance; and, secondiy, that 90 per cent. of all the spirituous liquor consumed in this country is distributed across the counter by publicans."







The Iowa Experiment Station has just reported the result of an extended experiment to determine the cost of wintering a flock of breeding ewes. Representatives of seven breeds were taken—Merinos, Shropshires, horned Dorsets, Southdowns, Cotswolds, Oxfords, and Hampshires. The ration was one-eighth oil meal, three-eights corn, and one-half oats, one-fourth corn, one-fifth bran, and one-twentieth oil meal. After Feb. I the corn was left out of the ration, the balance being the same. A pound each of sliced sugar beets twice a week was fed the last 60 days of the experiment, and increased to a pound a day after lambing. The hay was timothy and clover mixture. From the above experiment it was found that to maintain an average flock of mutton ewes in proper breeding condition there will be required one and one-third pounds of good mixed hay and three-fourths of a pound of grain equal in value to that given. These are good figures to remember by farmers who are thinking of going into the business of raising mutton sheep. Nothing is said of the care given. Good care is half the battle with mutton sheep, and no man should attempt to handle them who is not willing to give it.

Few farmers appreciate the value of pats, if cut early, for hay. Wild cats of the Pacific Coast, which closely resemble cultivated oats, are a favorite hay food, and barley is extensively used throughout the far west for hay. These hays are so well liked by horsemen of the coast that in some distances when trotting and running horses have been brought east from California, hay has been shipped at the same time for their food. Of course oats must be cut early to make good hay, and will then yield about the same as our other hay plants. When the oats of a field have grown unusually tall and are falling down badly it is often better to cut the crop for hay than let it remain and get a small yield of light oats. Oat hay is bright, palatable, and free from dust—qualities of much importance, especially in horse feeding.

According to a statement of a French chemist oats contain twice as much mineral principles to form and grow bones of the animal as Indian corn. It is 12 to 14 per cent. richer in protein—that is to say, in matter that makes muscle and other tissues. Besides that, oats contain a principle that has been ignored for a long time—a stimulant simflar to that contained in tea and caffein contained in coffee. The German chemist who discovered this principle calls it avenin, from the Latin word avena—coats. Oats are almost indispensable for the horse, and with regard to all other animals one ought to feed them this grain in preference to all others.

Cellar for Storing Roots.

—Fourteen hundred bushels of roots will require between 2, 150 and 2, 200 cubic feet of storage room. The main object in storing roots is to keep them at a uniform temperature as little above the freezing point as practicable. One of the best ways to do this is simply to plet them in long narrow piles on well-drained ground, convenient to the place where they are to be fed. An exavation about a foot deep should be made and a layer of clean straw placed be made and a layer of clean straw placed be made and is should be covered thickly with straw and then with a foot of earth. At distances of six or eight feet along the apex of the plle, a drain tile should be inserted to give ventilation. For a permanent cellar, in many cases, the most convenient arrangement is simply to partition of a corner of the barn basement of setting up ten or twelve inch studs, boarding on both sides and stuffing the barn evilar. This arrangement is especially convenient where the root cellar can be so built that it can be righted from the driveway in the second floor of the barn. Where a cellar is built in this way, grout walls, cemented on the inside, should be used, both as a protection from

cold and against rats. The relative advantages and cost of these various ways of storing roots will, of course depend entire-ly upon individual circumstances and surroundings.

Pruning Fruit Tree Roots.

THE HORSEMAN.

The breaking and early teaching of the youngster will have a very important bearing on the future usefulness as regards road driving. It does not require a trainer at \$5,000 a year to break and handle colts, but it does require some brains, considerable patience and a man of more than ordinary intelligence. One hasty blow may do more harm than weeks of rational treatment can restore.

There is no remedy for diseased teeth i There is no remedy for diseased teeth in horses save extraction, and this should be accomplished immediately by a thoroughly competent operator, as there is considerable danger in performing the operation both to patient and dentist. Fracture of the jaw, swallowing of the drawn tooth and quite a number of other accidents have happened to the animal during the operation, thereby showing the necessity for skill.

Horses differ in the amount of food they Horses differ in the amount of food they do best on, just as they differ in the amount of work they require. A limited proportion of cracked or ground food is beneficial in all cases, and essential in some. Horses who are inclined to bolttheir cats, in whose solid excrement are observed whole grains, will get more nourishment from broken than from whole grain. Good, clean bran, well scalded, may be used judiciously to good advantage when the horse's bowels need a little loosening.

Kentucky is the natural habitat of the horse—runner or trotter—but she always doffs her colors to the transcendent specimen of equine perfection, no matter where it halls from. Pruning Fruit Tree Rocts.

—This is very little practiced by horticulturists in Ontario, and the operation is one that should be attempted with considerable caution. The danger lies in too much lessening the vigor of the trees by cutting off those roots by which supplies are taken in for its growth and development. If the roots are over-pruned, the life of the tree will be shortened. The life of the tree, way be diverted to the formation of fruit beds. The same end is accomplished by grafing the trees on dwarf stock, as when a pear tree is graited on the quince, or an apple tree on Paradiae atock, and by summer pruning of the tep. 
