

Official Report of the U. S. Agricul tural Department.

Washington, April 12.—The report of the Department of Agriculture makes the average condition of winter wheat 81.4, as against 99.5 on Dec. 1; 77.1 last April, and 81.4 at the same date in 1895. The average rye condition was 88.9, against 82.5 last year. The condi-tion of the soil at the time of seeding 88.9. against 82.5 last year. The condition of the soil at the time of seeding was favorable throughout the country, a few scattered counties reporting too dry or too wet, so that by Dec. 1 a crop nearly standard was indicated. The falling off since December, greatest in Illinois, but strongly shown in every neighboring State, and making an average of 18 per cent for the whole country, is due to the sharp freezes of early winter. Snow covering was ample in the Rocky Mountain States, and westward, but elsewhere to the east it was scanty. The deficiency caused little damage along the Atlantic slope, where the winter was mild, and the favorable early indications continue, no important wheat state showing a condition under 95. The condition of winter wheat is reported below the average in Great stream. The condition of winter wheat is reported below the average in Great Britain, France and Holland, because of excessive rains, but favorable in Central and Eastern Europe. NEVER PETITIONED FOR. Mr. Cameron pointed out that no petitions were presented to Parliament in favor of the act, and that many petitions were lodged against it. No one, indeed, thought of changing from the municipal system that had been in force for many wears "until the in force for many years "until the tempter in an evil hour seduced from their allegiance to the country the Ministers who then occupied the treasury benches and palmed off this so-called Franchise Bill on the country." THEY ALL KNOW IT

"The Conservative members," continued Mr. Cameron, "of this House well know the iniquities of the present franchise law. They know the hardships of it, and the difficulties of work-I now make are correct. The experience of twelve years of that law has from day to day, intensified the feelng in my province against its in-

NO UNIFORMITY NOW. To the plea that the act of 1885 was intended to make the franchises uniform throughout Canada, Mr. Cameron replied: "After we discussed that bill for weeks and weeks together, the principle upon which it was based at its inception was abandoned by the First Minister, and the franchise was not made uniform throughout Canada. We have not the same classes represented in all the provinces; we have not the same interests represented in all the provinces. Ontario and Prince Edward Island have a different franchise. Quebec and British Columbia have a different franchise, Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia have all different franchises, and hardly two



After a pause, Dr. Bucke came forward, and gave a brief review of his argument of a couple of weeks ago. He pointed out that from all we know of William Shakespeare, the actor, it was a priori unlikely that he had written Lear, Hamlet and Macbeth; that from all we know of Bacon he might have done so; that from the identity in thought, language, and style, the words seemed to be written by Bacon; and, finally, that in several places Bacon had practically said that he was the author. He was now going to produce the evidence of DR. BUCKE.

The substance of the argument was that Bacon had, by means of an anagram associated his names with the play. In the fifth act of "Love's Labor Lost" (act iv. in the folio), after a dialogue which seemed foolish in itself, but full of meaning if the Bacon hypothesis were adopted, came the word, honorificabilitudinitatibus. In the dialogue, Math agis: "What is ab spelt backwards, with the horn on his head?" Taking the Latin word for horn (cornu), we had "bacornu," which, the doctor said, was widently a pun on "Bacon." But, taking the suggestion, and breaking up the big word already quoted, we had the fair Latin sentence, "Hi ludi Fr. Bacono natituit sibi," which might be freely translated, "These plays, preserved for themselves, proceeded from Fr. Bacon." Again, in the Northumberland MSS. appeared the word "honorificabilitudino," which might be broken up similarly into, "I nitio hi ludi Fr. Bacono," which, though a defective Latin sentence, corresponded approximately to the English, "These plays (are) in the beginning from Fr. Bacon." The sentence was incomplete, as it had no verb, but, the doctor argued, it was on that account all the more interesting, as it showed the anagrame in course of construction. 



The empire gives him annually \$375,000 to be spent in presents for needy subjects or worthy enterprises and \$22,000 for the "Hercules" salaries of his adjutants, but nothin more. All the rest comes from Prus-

The sum is not imposing, less than 00 a year, besides drawing severa millions more as chief of the house of Romanoff. The Emperor of Austria with a large private income, gets \$5,-100,000, and the King of Italy, who stays at home and has few extrava-gant habits, cannot make the ends lay with \$4,800,000. Even Queen Victori whose frugality is proverbial at continental courts, receives fully \$1,000,000 more than does the German empero and king.

If the emperor is to continue shining as an imperial star of the first magnitude, he will have to squeeze from the Prussian parliament a million or so more. He doubtless has wished for several years to do this, and his min-isters have wished to do the same for who showed him over the town.


