#### THE NEW CENSUS OF NEW YORK CITY

Population of Five Boroughs Is Estimated at 5.000.000— Manhattan Fading.

New York, April 26.-This city has increased more than a million in populaion in ten years. "Little Old New York" is fading away in population, while her sister boroughs are growing marvellously. This is the tale the census enumeration is beginning to tell.

Of course, all that can be done is to estimate the changes that will be found in the population of the entire city, and even this cannot be done with certainty. What has been learned so far is that the swarming, congested sections of New York have been thinned out by the opening up of subways, bridges and tunnels that have been completed since the last census, and that other boroughs are increasing in population in a manner that could not have been foreseen five years

The consistent policy of the board of health in reducing the population in the cheap east side tenements and the lower rents offered in other boroughs, have had their effect, in conjunction with the opening up of means of getting to and from the heart of New York quickly, but until the census men began making their tables of comparison the size of the exodus from the crowded centres could be only vaguely estimated. As soon as all the tables have been compiled and compared, however, it will be possible to know just what the subways, bridges and tunnels have cost New York in the way of population

It has been believed heretofore that at least 200,000 residents of Manhattan have moved across into New Jersey in the last five years, and that a larger number have taken advantage of the new bridges and ing of the kittenish airs and graces the subway and moved to Brooklyn, Brownsville and the Bronx.







#### GREAT FIRE IN A ST. LOUIS BREWERY

Half-Million Dollar Damage Done the Anheuser-Busch Plant.

St. Louis, April 27: - Fire of unknown origin caused a loss of \$530,000 in the mammoth plant of the Anheuser-Busch Brewing Association early today, and for a time threatened the entire establishment with destruction. Five hundred thousand bottles of beer were destroyed, and millions of burning corks made such a dense smoke that the firemen fought the flames in a black smudge. The streets around the plant flowed with beer for more than an hour, and floating corks bobbing up and down the stream gave the streets a strange appearance. 


