## FOURTEEN THOUSAND MEN, 227 CANNON IS HAIG'S BIG CATCH

British Captures Since April Are Mounting Hourly as Noose Is Tightened Around Lens and St. Quentin.

(By William Philip Simms.)

With the British Armies Afield, April 18 .- Captures by the British army since April 9, in its great push, reached the vast total of 14,000 men and 227 guns today. There are still more streaming back constantly from the front.

Around Lens and St. Quentin, Field Marshal Haig is stretching a tight noose, and increasing the pressure every hour.

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

### CONGRESS DEBATING BILL TO CHECK GERMAN SPIES

BRAZIL WRECKED BY

ANTI-GERMAN MOBS

Washington. April 18.—The Senate today planned to take up the administration espionage bill, which the judiciary committee reported with a number of amendments, including that to diminish restrictions on newspapers. The committee retained sections authorizing the closing of mails to anarchistic or treasonable publications, and giving the president power to forbid export of materials which might reach the enemy. The house committee continued work on the spy bill today and expects to report it in a day or two.



### HINDENBURG'S BIG PLANS UPSET BY THE DRIVE

Paris, April 18.—According to information from a reliable source the double offensive of the British north of Arras and of the French on the Aisne, disarranged the German plans. Field Marshal von Hindenburg, it is declared, was preparing an offensive against Riga and another against Italy, while on the western front he was considering an attempt on Calais on the one hand and on Paris on the other. # **ALLIED GUNS PULVERIZING** HUN WORKS

London, April 18.—French forces smashed their way to within two miles of Laon today. British troops co-incidentally began closing in about Cambrai while still maintaining their strangling pressure about St. Quentin and Lens.

The fighting along the whole of this vast front was bitter, French and British guns roared unceasingly, literally pulverizing the German defences. The French apparently were the most active in the day's fighting.

## BRITISH FORCE HOLDS LINE FOR MORE SUPPLIES

Operations On General Haig's Front Partially Held Up.

PREPARE FOR NEW WAVE

Captured German Documents Show They Expected the Defences To Hold.

British Headquarters in France, April 18, via London, 2:30 p.m.—(From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press).—Operations on the British front may be said to have reached a temporary holding stage along the line of the recent advance. Towards Lens and St. Quentin the process seems to be one of absorption. Minor assaults here and there are improving the British positions but the general battle scheme is awaiting the development of its next stages. stages.

Bringing Up Supplies.

War operations involving such numbers as are now opposed on the western front necessarily move in waves. The work of bringing up supplies, guns and munitions during apparent lulls often is more strenuous than the actual assaults and it is of equal importance. The British plunge forward in Easter week reached a greater depth in a shorter time than any attack on such a large scale since entrenched warfare began on this front. The total of 227 guns brought in, together with ammunition by the thousands of rounds and other supplies, exceeds any haul made during a similar period of the war.

TUESDAY'S VICTORY FOR FRENCH

WAS WON IN MAGNIFICENT STYLE

Paris, April 18.—The latest French victory, while on a smaller scale than that of Monday, is an equally important success. Both of the sections attacked had been left alone hitherto on account of the exceptional natural strength of the German positions. The French command held that an assault could only be successfully undertaken when over well supported by a powerful mass of artillery. Nivelle Extends Battle Front Another 12 Miles, Driving Enemy From First Line Between Soissons and Rheims--German Loss Estimated at 30,000.

Paris, April 18-2:15 p.m.-Important progress was made last night by the French in their attack east of Soissons. The war office announces the capture of Chavonne and Chivy. The French pushed on north of these points, reaching the vicinity of Braye-En-Laonnis.

The Germans made three desperate counter-attacks in the Champagne last night. They were checked by the French, who inflicted heavy losses on the attacking troops. Since Monday the French have captured upwards of 14,000 unwounded Germans. In the Champagne large numbers of machine guns and trench mortars have been captured, and also twelve cannon, including three of large calibre.

### GERMAN LOSSES, 32,000.

Paris, April 18-Midnight.-The great western battlefront was extended for another twelve miles today when the French drove the Germans from all their first-line positions and part of their second line from Rheims to the Champagne front. Momentarily halting in the Champagne district to organize their positions the French were attacked in the process by the Germans. Three counter-attacks were delivered at Mont Cornillet, ten miles southeast of Rheims. All these German reac-tions were beaten off with heavy losses to the attacking forces. While the French are delivering their heavy blows in the Aisne-Champagne battle, the British are organizing their forces for a renewal of the struggle in the Arras region. 

One London Man Wounded at Hill 60-Windsor Man in War Since Start.

Forty-two invalided and wounded Forty-two invalided and wounded soldiers, including fourteen Londoners and also members from the 1st, 18th 33rd, 71st, 135th, 142nd, 161st and 163th Battalions, arrived in the city at noon today via C. P. R. The men were part of a number that arrived at Halifax on April 9th last.

The majority of the men were invalided home on account of illness, although some have seen considerable service before being sent home because of sickness.

The men were welcomed by one of the largest crowds that has yet gathered at the C. P. R. on a week-day for the purpose of welcoming returned sol-

The party is also with one exception the largest that has returned to the city since the outbreak of the war. The city since the outbreak of the war. The first returned party last August consisted of 51 men. The men, with relatives, were placed in autos kindly loanded by citizens and taken to the Central Military Convalescent Hospital, where luncheon was served and addresses of welcome delivered by J. P. Moore and James Gray, representing the Soldiers' Aid Commission, and John Struad, secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Association. The procession from the depot to the hospital was headed by the Marconi Band, who volunteered their services for the occasion and the 1st A. M. C. Pipe Band.
