

H.H. ASQUITH, EX-BRITISH PREMIER WINS BY-ELECTION SERBIAN PRINCE AND PREMIER WOUNDED BY ASSASSINS

RESIGNATION OF CHAIRMAN NOT YET ACCEPTED Cabinet Considering Action of Head of Board of Commerce. CAME AS SURPRISE Judge Robson's Move Is Due to Internal Friction.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—The resignation of Chairman Judge Robson from the board of commerce has been accepted by the cabinet today. It was expected that Judge Robson would ask that the board of commerce be relieved from the duties of paper controller and his action in placing his resignation before the cabinet came in the nature of a surprise.

ROBSON BELIEVED TO HAVE VARIOUS REASONS FOR QUITTING JOB [Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Feb. 25.—The reasons for the resignation of Judge Robson as chairman of the board of commerce are a mystery. "I have nothing to say," remarked Sir George Foster, acting prime minister, when questioned on the matter.

Has Various Reasons. It has been alleged that one of the reasons for the resignation of Judge Robson was a conflict with the civil service commission regarding the appointment of certain experts to the board. The commission was not communicative this morning, and Judge Robson's reasons for resignation, "said Hon. J. R. Booth, who is in charge of the civil service commission, "have nothing to do with the resignation."

WORKERS IN ITALIAN CITY SET UP SOVIET FORM OF GOVERNMENT Fighting Takes Place in the Streets of Pieve di Soligo. DISORDERS SPREADING Sympathetic Strike Called by the Metal Workers of Naples.



London, Feb. 25.—Workers at Pieve di Soligo, Italy, have seized the municipal buildings and proclaimed a soviet government, according to a Rome dispatch to the Central News, which says fighting has taken place between the workers and carabinieri, in which many persons were wounded. Disorders have also occurred at Vittorio and Montebelluna, as well as elsewhere, the dispatch adds.

London, Feb. 25.—(By Canadian Press).—The Marquis of Queensberry's affairs are again before the bankruptcy courts. 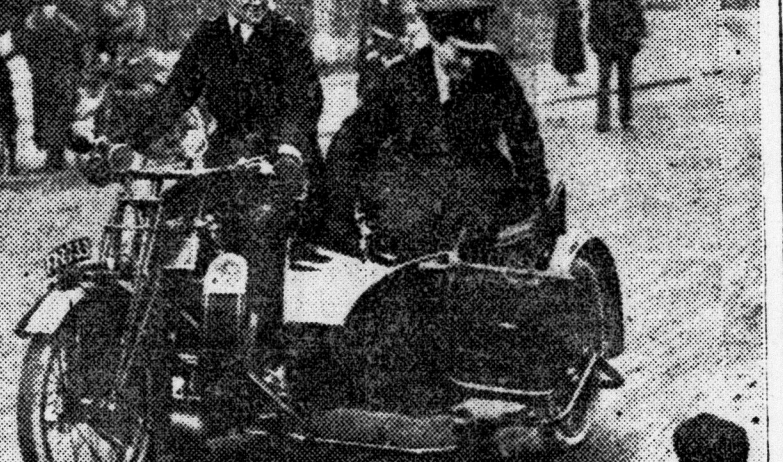

UNION HEADS WILL MEASURE KILL MEASURE. Representatives of Railroad Men To Go To Wilson.

DECISION WAS SUDDEN. Only Taken When No Other Plan Acceptable To Rank and File.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 24.—Railroad labor tonight decided to ask President Wilson to veto the railroad reorganization bill. In a memorial to be submitted probably late tomorrow, the representatives of the two million union workers will request the president to withhold his signature from the measure until they can present a brief of their reasons why it should have executive approval.

The next step in the union program, which will not be developed definitely until the bill is approved, is to contest the constitutionality of the law. Various methods of bringing this about were suggested, but all will be held in abeyance pending the president's action. Decision of the union officials to present their views to Mr. Wilson was reached suddenly. There had been insistent clamoring for such action by the labor committee, and here to discuss the president's wage settlement proposal. The course was not decided on, however, it was until it appeared no other plan would be generally accepted by the rank and file. The sentiment among the delegates appeared almost unanimous in favor of formal presentation of the case to the president.

ERZBERGER OUT; SENSATION ENDS SUIT FOR LIBEL. Minister of Finance Resigns After Testimony Shows Questionable Actions.

BERLIN, Feb. 24.—(By Associated Press.)—Mathias Erzberger, minister of finance, voluntarily resigned from the cabinet today. Erzberger's resignation came as a climax to a day of sensational testimony in his libel suit against Dr. Helfferich, former minister of the treasury. The nature of this testimony, it was considered, left Erzberger no other choice than to relinquish his portfolio.

USED OFFICIAL POSITION. Helfferich Claimed Erzberger's Fortune Was Made During War by "Inside" Deals.

According to the testimony of States Attorney Messerschmidt, which was given with the utmost reserve and caution, Erzberger had amassd large amounts of his private funds to Switzerland. Previously, testimony adduced by Dr. Helfferich involved Erzberger in numerous questionable transactions in connection with the issuance of imperial permits, and otherwise missing his official position and influence in the furtherance of ventures in which Erzberger was alleged to be interested.

MEMORANDUM TO PURITY. Mathias Erzberger brought suit against Dr. Helfferich, former minister of the treasury, in September, in which Helfferich designated Erzberger as "a menace to the purity of our public life" and asserted that he was a dangerous member of the Government. On the witness stand Helfferich declared that years of careful observation of Erzberger's activities had convinced him that "this man is bound to become fatal to the German nation and that he must be removed from public office if our political life again is to become healthy and normal."

TRY DOZEN PERSONS FOR RAILWAY THEFTS. FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 24.—A dozen or more persons, said to be largely employees of the railway, were arrested at Napadogan this morning by railway officers, and are being brought here in a special car which would reach Fredericton attached to this evening's express from Newmarket.

STORM LOSSES CUT POWER DIVIDENDS. ST. JOHN, N.B., Feb. 24.—At the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Power Company here yesterday afternoon a letter from L. R. Ross, the president, states that owing to severe storms and extremely cold weather of the last winter the company was compelled to pass the dividends on the preferred stock. It is stated that the storm losses total \$40,000 and up to date.

NAME SWAYZEE LABOR WHIP IN ONTARIO HOUSE. Caucus Decides On Niagara Falls Member—Homuth Report Was Wrong.

CROCKETT IS SECONDER. South Wentworth Labor Man To Second Reply To Throne Speech.

TORONTO, Feb. 24.—Charles Swayzee, M.P., Niagara Falls, Ont., will be the Labor whip in the Ontario Legislature, not Karl Homuth, M.P.P., for South Waterloo, as reported a short time ago. The selection of a whip was made today at a caucus of the Labor members here. It was decided that W. A. Crockett, M.P.P., South Wentworth, would second the speech from the throne, on behalf of the Labor group in the Legislature.

Workmen's Compensation. Amendments to the workmen's compensation act, introduced by the Labor members, include an increase of the general compensation above 50 per cent, and a provision that widows of men killed in the line of duty shall be equal to those of widows whose husbands are killed prior to April 1, 1917. An equal amount to women widows since then.

Would Prevent Host Offering Guest Liquor. Dominion Alliance Would Stop Drink in Home—Make Ontario "Drier."

OTAWA, Feb. 24.—The policy of the temperance workers of Ontario relation to the application of Dominion temperance legislation for Ontario will be, it is expected, outlined and decided on at a convention of the Dominion Alliance to meet in Toronto on March 3, 10 and 11. There will also be discussion regarding the best means to have legislation enacted whereby a limit will be put on the amount of liquor in person may have in his cellar and to prevent a host entertaining his friends at his own house with apportioned liquor.

TREW 50 CASES OF LIQUOR FROM TRAIN; TWO MEN FINED \$200. Windsor Men Lose \$1,800 Stock of Whiskey by Panic Act.

[Special to The Advertiser.] THAMESVILLE, Feb. 24.—Albert C. Hebert and David Harris of Windsor and Ford City, respectively, were arrested here today, and this afternoon came before Magistrate John Coultas on a charge of having liquor in their possession in a place other than a private dwelling without a license.

KING VISITS BRITISH INDUSTRIES FAIR. LONDON, Feb. 24.—(By Canadian Press.)—The King and Queen today visited the British industries fair at the Crystal Palace, organized by the overseas department of the board of trade. The fair is a collection of stalls occupied by actual makers of British goods, and there are four thousand buyers attending from all over the world. The fair is open to the general public, and there are similar fairs also at Birmingham and Glasgow, while traveling fairs will shortly be sent out all over the Empire.

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Predict Hard Fight On New Franchise Bill. Liberal Members Will Buck Attempt To Duplicate Work of Enumerators.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—In the opinion of members of Parliament reaching the city within the last couple of days to attend the opening ceremonies on Thursday there is a hard fight ahead when the Government introduces the franchise act in the Commons.

There is also the matter of any redistribution, if such is proposed, and the limitation as to who shall or shall not be eligible to vote in the Dominion elections. Several members have declared that anything less than giving the vote to every Canadian man and woman over 21 years of age will not be satisfactory, so that whatever may be the provisions of the act as it comes before Parliament a long wordy battle is almost assured.

QUEBEC HAS 213 CASES. OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—There are at present 213 cases of influenza in Quebec, and 24 new cases were reported since noon yesterday. A number of homes for the aged and sick closed their doors to the public yesterday as a precautionary measure against the flu.

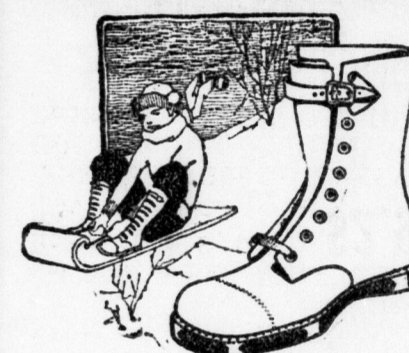

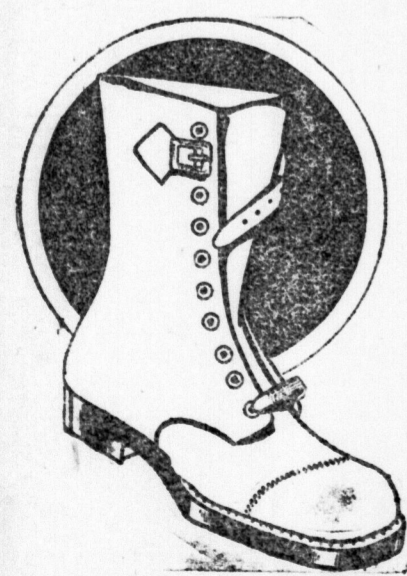
