Arrested in Connection With Killing of M. Sipiaguine.

Vienna, July 14.—It is reported from Kieff, Russia, that the police have arrested two members, named Wier potoff and Gerschunn, of the executive committee of the revolutionary society concerned in the murder of the Russian Minister of the Interior, M. Sipiaguine, who was assassinated at the ministry, April 16, 1902, by a student, and of M. Bogdanovitch, Governor of Ufa, who was killed by two unknown men in a public park at Ufa last May.
