GREAT LOSS OF RUSSIANS.

SUMMARY OF WAR SITUATION.

The first forty-eight hours of the Russo-Jap war have ended greatly to the advantage of the latter. The Japanese, by splendid audacity, and great naval efficiency, have put eleven of the enemy's warships out of action, two of them, the Czarevitch and the Retvizan, being amongst the most powerful in the Czar's navy. It is believed that the balance of the Russian fleet, bottled up in Port Arthur, is helpless for the present. Another of the Mikado's fleets swooped down on Chemulpo, Korea, and after a stiff fight destroyed the Russian cruisers the Variag and the Korietz. An army of twelve thousand Japanese troops hasf landed at Chemulpo, and unimpeded is marching toward Seoul, the Korean capital,

The Russian fleet at Vladivostock is said to be icebound. China has given assurances of her neutrality, which will prevent the coaling by Russian fleets at Chinese ports.

The Czar has issued a supreme manifesto, in which war is officially declared against Japan, and troops from all parts of the empire are being hurried to the Far East. France. Great Britain and the United States, have all declared they will remain neutral. Secretary Hay, of the United States Government, has approached the powers with a view to having China and Manchuria declared neutral. Great enthusiasm prevails throughout Russia over the declaration of war. Japanese fleet appears before Port Arthur a second time and bombards the Russian ships and fortresses.




DIAGRAM OF PORT ARTHUR. X Is Point at Which the Russian Warships Were Torpedeed



BUDGET SPEECH

Gratifying Financial Situation of the Province.

ONTARIO'S ASSETS \$3.531,600

Revenue for the Year Unusually Good-Success of the Timber Limit Sales.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Feb. 9 .-- Premier Ross' budget speech, delivered in the Legislature today, was an able and lucid exposition of the prosperous and gratifying financial situation of the Province, and an ample demonstration that Mr. Ross, in his capacity as treasurer, had maintained a firm and intelligent grasp not only of the larger concerns of his department, but of its minutest details. It was a model budget speech-direct, businesslike and easily followed. He pointed out that while the expenditures were larger than ever before, the revenue had more than kept pace with their advance, the receipts in several departments being record ones. He outlined for the current year an inviting and ambitious programme, whose fulfillment cannot fail to materially advance the interests of the Province; and closed with an eloquent appeal for the abandonment of pessimstic views of the future of the Province. Mr. Matheson (East Lanark), who replied to the Premier, proved to his own satisfaction that the Province was in a bad way financially, with a prospective deficit for the current year of over a million dollars. He devoted considerable time to criticising the Government's course in assuming the Soo liability despite the fact that his leader. Mr. Whitney, had claimed all the credit for suggesting that the Government should pursue the course which it took.

THE PROVINCIAL ASSETS. Hon. G. W. Ross was received with Government applause on rising to present the budget speech. The Government, he said, began 1903, after paying off all maturing obligations, with a balance of \$1,415,510, and closed the year with a credit of \$1,994,679, an improvement of \$1,539,169. At the begining of 1903 the surplus was \$1,539,-262, which by the end of the year had grown to \$2,549,164, an increase of over \$600,000. Today their assets in the bank amounted to \$3,531,600. The expenditure for 1903 was the largest yet. The average expenditure
