

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

FOXES WORTH

The Provincial Government of Fogo Prince Edward Island has about completed a census of the fox industry in the Island.

This enumeration is taken for the purpose of ascertaining the number and value of all the young foxes born and reared to maturity this year on which a tax of 1 per cent. is payable

to the Government. The result shows that there are 312 anches in operation as against 277 last year. The number of young foxes of this year in captivity is 2,082, of which 1.239 are silver foxes; 565 cross

foxes; 276 red foxes and 2 blue foxes. The sworn value of young silver foxes of this year is \$6,056,190, and of this year of \$6,577,586. It is to be noted that the sworn valuation for under the actual selling price.

The total number of foxes of all kinds, old and young in the ranches of Prince Edward Island is now 4,550, of which 2,644 are silvers and 1,906 of the less valuable varieties.





RUSSIANS RENAME 'EARL GREY,' 'CANADA'

As an Appreciation of Action of Dominion in Handing Over the Ship

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The Canadian Government ice-breaker Earl Grey recently sold to the Russian Government has arrived at Archangel. where she will be used in keeping open that winter port for Russian military operations.

A message received from M. Timasheff, minister of Trade and Commerce in the Russian Government, asks the Canadian authorities "to accept the respectful expression of profound gratitude which I hasten to present in the name of all interest in the Archangel sea route for the valuable aid given by Canada in providing the fine ice-breaker which has now arrived at Archangel. It is re-named Canada in commemoration of the assistance rendered by the Canadian government.

Another Canadian ice-breaker, the J. T. Horne, was privately purchased along with the Earl Grey through the Russian Embassy at Washington, whose representative came to Ottawa several weeks. The Earl Grey has been used on the Prince Edward Island route in winter. She is 250 feet long, was built by Vickers Sons and Maxim, and has a gross register of 2357 tons.

The Government has still three icebreakers-the Stanley, Minto and Montealm, while a fourth, to be the largest in the world, will be delivered next year.
