The Courier Successful in Obtaining Great War Film; Realistic Views Show Verdun Under Shell Fire and Other Stirring Scenes

After two years of war films, some of them good, some uninteresting, the public will find a wholesome refreshment in these pictures to be shown at The Rex Theatre under the auspices of The Courier, Monday and Tuesday next, The pictures were taken by Captain. Donald C. Thompson, staff photographer for Leslie's Weekly, and the official cinematographer for the French Government.

With utter disregard for personal safety, Capt. Thompson has amassed a series of reels which show vividly the grim side of the great world-conflict.

Impressive scenes mark the approach to battle of 50,000 French soldiers. They are aptly termed the "steel wall of France," and they always insist on passing in review before their commander just before going into action.

A French aviator consented to take him over the German lines, and he (Capt. Thompson) of course, took his "box" with him. Up through the clouds they travel, thousands and thousands of feet, and always on the look-out for hostile aircraft.

Finally one is sighted, but Thompson's aviator, unaccompanpanied by a machine gun operator, declines combat. But another French aviator rises, then Capt. Thompson's camera did its most spectacular work. Every moment of the aerial fight is filmed from the time the French craft rose until finally the German machine was sent hurling to the ground inside the French lines.

Verdun's battlements are also revealed, staunch after incessant pounding by the German howitzers. Verdun's buildings virtually ground to powder, are also shown.

The films are impressive and are deserving of success for they accomplish their purpose-to show "War As It Really Is." There will be two showings each day.

LENTEN RECIPES FOR HOUSEWIFE

BOILED COD .

Put the fish into a large pan with enough tepid water to cover. Add salt and enough vinegar to flavor the water; boil gently till the fin or tail bone will come out if lightly pulled. When fish is boiled too fast the skin will break. A medium-sized piece of fish usually tak-es from fifteen to twenty minutes to cock. When done, lift the fish carefully out of the water, drain it, and dish it up. Serve with melted butter, anchovy or parsley sauce.

SHREDDED COD BAKED WITH CREAM SAUCE

Boil four or five pounds of fresh When cooked, dra'n and shred in fine pieces and set away to cool. Make the following sauce for five-pound piece of fish: Boil one quart of milk with one onion and a little finely chopped parsley. Set it aside. Mix one cup of butter with enough flour to absorb it. Add this to the milk and boil until it is the consistency of custard. Season with a dash of cayenne and salt to taste. Put a layer of shredded fish in a baking dish, cover with a layer of sauce, then a layer of fish and so on until the dish is filled. Have the last layer of cream. Cover with fine bread crumbs. Sprinkle with pieces of butter and bake in the oven until the top is a nice brown. Small boiled potato balls covered with cream sauce should be served with this.

HALIBUT CUTLETS

Cut your halibut steaks an inch thick, wipe them with a dry cloth and season with salt and cayenne pepper. Have ready a pan of yolks of eggs well beaten and a dish of grated bread-crumbs. Put some fresh lard or beef drippings in a frying pan and hold it over the fire till it boils. Dip your cutlets in the egg, and then in the breadcrumbs. Fry a light brown, serve up hot. Salmon or any large fish may fried in the same manner.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS The sole head of a family, or any male

over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Ap-Manitoba, Saskatchewan of Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homograder may live within cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead.
