

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COUNCIL **ADJOURNS**

Will Convene Again on Thursday, July 9.

Bill Passed Placing \$25,000 In Hands of Commission to Exploit Quartz.

Saturday afternoon the Yukon council at about 5 o'clock adjourned eys expended shall be accounted for. until July 9 after sitting continuously for two weeks, the first session to be held since the election of the five members last winter. One of the most important pieces of legislation to be enacted was crowded through at the last moment, the passing of a bill placing at the disposal of the development of quartz and other minssioner the sum of \$25,000 to be used in the exploitation of quartz. The same bill also arranges for the appropriation of \$400 toward the installation of an assay office at Whitehorse and the further payment of \$100 a month in aid of the maintenance, of such where miners have their specimens assayed free of any cost.

In what manner the commissioner will dispose of the funds placed in his hands has not been stated, though he remarked at the meeting Saturday that it was not his intention to expend a dollar of the amount until after the 30th of June with the exception of the monthly donation to Whitehorse. There is a probability of a diamond drill being purchased, such has not been definitely

The resolution providing for the appropriation was brought up by Newlands and on motion at Pringle the council at once went into committee of the whole for the purpose of considering it. Clarke then inquired the nature of the resolution and in what manner the money was to be expended, which was explained at some length by the commissioner. He said in part that one reason why he had made the recommendation was on account of the number of complaints that have recently been received relative to the free assaying of quartz at what is generally termed the government mill. Under a resolution passed by the council last winter arrangements were made for the free assay of quartz by the mill for a term of three months, the time expiring on March 20 last, since which time there have been no assays except at the expense of the prospector applying for such. The assays have all been as satisfactory as such usually are, at least no complaints were received. A few days ago at the time of the free assay office being conducted at Whitehorse was first brought up it was suggested there was no reason for affording the min not here. Referring to the stamp mill the commissioner said no payment has as yet been made on the bonus that was intended for the mill as he had not received a certificate from those in charge that the work had been satisfactorily performed in ers such an accommodation there and ordance with the pr accordance with the provisions. He also said that it was a matter that was immaterial to him whether the council saw fit to make an extension of time of the free assays to June 30 or not. The stamp mill is at present unsatisfactory, though no fault has been found with the assaying.

Thompson was in favor of the resolution as was also Lowe, though the latter was not in favor of distributing charity indiscriminately. He thought it would be wrong to give a

thought it would be wrong to give a money grant to one and not to another and if all were favored in that respect the sum voted would not be a drop in the bucket. Out of 286 claims recorded and upon which the assessment work has been done in the vicinity of Whitehorse not over 80 are held by people who are not almost at all times in dire need. They must have assistance in some manne or they will be compelled to abandon many of their most promising prospects. He considered it would not be a bad idea for the government to acquire a claim in a favorable locality and then develop it into a producer. Dugas favors the purchase of one or more diamond drills and allow them to be used in certain localities: He had been informed by miners that such was the best and the most economical methos of prospecting a quartz proposition. The committee of the whole which had been considering the resolution rose and reported such without amendment. The motion that the council concur with the resolution was voted upon and

Shortly before adjournment Newlands introduced a bill covering the provisions of the resolution and it vas given its first reading. The rules being suspended the bill received its second reading, then went committee of the whole which reported it back without amendment was read a third time and passed without further comment.
