

COUNCIL ADJOURNS

Will Convene Again on Thursday, July 9.

Bill Passed Placing \$25,000 In Hands of Commission to Exploit Quartz.

Saturday afternoon the Yukon council at about 5 o'clock adjourned until July 9 after sitting continuously for two weeks...

The resolution providing for the appropriation was brought up by Newlands and on motion at Pringle the council at once went into committee of the whole for the purpose of considering it...

Thompson was in favor of the resolution as was also Lowe, though the latter was not in favor of distributing charity indiscriminately.

Shortly before adjournment Newlands introduced a bill covering the provisions of the resolution and it was given its first reading.

Whereas, It appears by message from Frederick Tenayson Congdon, commissioner of the Yukon Territory,

and the supplementary estimates accompanying the same, that the sum hereinafter mentioned in the schedule to this ordinance is required to defray certain further expenses of the public service of the Yukon territory not otherwise provided for...

1. From and out of the general revenue fund there shall and may be applied a further sum not exceeding in the whole twenty-five thousand dollars for the charges and expenses of the public service for the 12 months ending June 30, 1903...

2. The due application of the moneys expended shall be accounted for.

SCHEDULE. Further sum granted to the commissioner by this ordinance for the 12 months ending the 30th of June, 1903, and the purpose for which the same is granted:

For assisting in assaying and in the development of quartz and other minerals in the Yukon territory under regulations to be adopted by the commissioner.

June 30, 1903. The payment for last July was \$300 after which an arrangement was made by which the monthly sum was decreased to \$225 paid by the government of the territory and \$75 per month by the city council...

Thompson was much pleased at the complete manner in which the commissioner had made his reply and expressed his appreciation of the courtesy. It was a gratification he said to know that the members of the council were also members of the board of control and such knowledge would enable him to act in quite a different manner in the future.

By consent the dental ordinance was carried over until the next sitting of the council. The same disposition was made of the three bills affecting the city, the amendment to the charter, the amendment to the assessment ordinance and the bill providing for the road tax.
