



There is a page for mounts owed to and by the farm, and forms on which may be made inventores of land and buildings of live stock of feed and supplies, and of machina: y. Following is a page on which may be filled out a summary of the year's business, together with the few directions necessary to filling it out intelligently at the end of the year. Further, for the farmer' information there is a table in which to enter acreage and yield of crope and one in which to keep a live stock service record.
