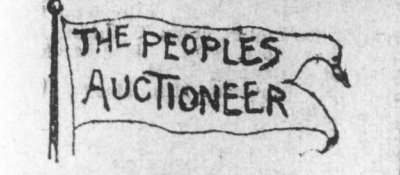

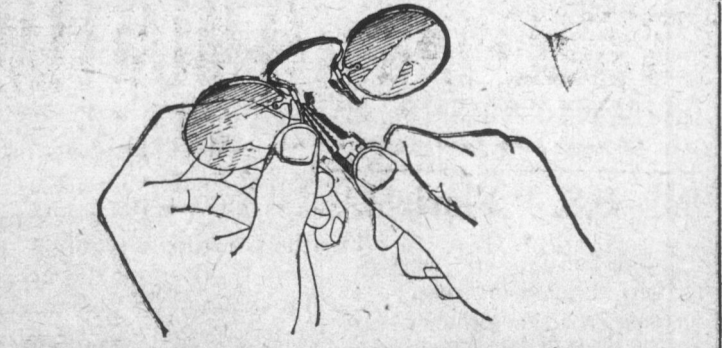

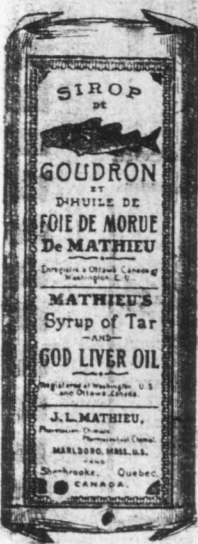

The Evening Chit-Chat

According to the United States latest census there are 4,832,630 women in the country who work for wages. That is, one out of every five women is obliged to be a wage earner.

Don't those statistics impress upon you the big necessity for women to get out of the still comparatively few beaten paths in which they have been most successful, in order not to lower wages to starvation point by overcrowding these few occupations?

Here are a few suggestions that have come to me: I have heard that the law publishing houses pay very good salaries to women to analyze, designate and classify decisions of the Federal and State courts.

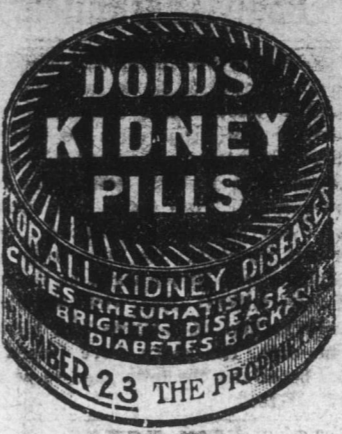

and should be absolutely free from lumps. A little alcohol rubbed on quickly will clean a dirty window better than soap; ammonia in wash water is equally good.

The Typhus Outbreak.

In another column we publish a letter from the Public Health Officer in which he denies the accuracy of the report in the Evening Telegram of what took place at the special meeting of the City Council. We obtained our information from a first hand source and we believed it reliable. Dr. Brehm states that the officers on guard at the Fanning house were instructed to watch Cheeks' house also and to permit no one to enter it, and that this was practicable.

On enquiry this morning from Dr. Brehm he tells us that the two houses are not more than 100 yards apart, and that a man stationed midway can easily watch the entrance to both houses.

Our informant asserts that his statement of facts are substantially correct, but that he is not responsible for any deductions the writer may have made.

A Homeless Wanderer

Six days ago Jack Quinn, who is so well known to the police and citizens generally, was released from the penitentiary after doing a term there, and since then he has been wandering round the country in the neighbourhood of Freshwater Road without food or shelter and at night time he slept in barns and outhouses. But for the kindness of the people of the place he would have fared badly in the frosty weather of the past two nights. Mr. Jas. Bulger, last night took him into his home and gave him food and shelter and this morning notified the police of the man's presence in his home and of the possibility of his being frozen to death if left to roam at large. Const. Lawlor was sent to Mr. Bulger's house this morning and brought him to the lockup. He will no doubt be sent to the penitentiary as a vagrant.

The Durango Arrives.

Conada's Pulp Wood.

Three-Fifths Cut Last Year Was Shipped to United States.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—According to statistics collected by the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior, there were 622,129 cords of pulp wood used in Canada during the year 1909. Of this the total value of the mill was \$3,464,959. In spite of a decline in the price of pulpwood, the value of the wood increased more than \$500,000 over that used in 1908. The quantity used being more than three per cent in advance of that used in the previous year.

There are some sixty pulp mills in the Dominion, and of these reports were received from fifty. Half of these mills are in Quebec, one-fifth in Ontario, and the rest are located in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and British Columbia. The Province of Quebec furnished over half the pulpwood, Ontario gave about one-third, while the rest was obtained in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and British Columbia. Two species of timber, namely, spruce and balsam, furnished 99 per cent of the wood used in the making of pulp. Poplar, hemlock and jack pine were also used.

Three-fifths of the pulpwood cut in Canada during 1909 was exported to the United States for manufacture. Nearly all this wood went from Quebec. The average price received from it was only forty-five cents more than was paid at the Quebec mills.

De-Alcoholized Beer Leaves Good Whisky Behind.

London, January 12.—A chemist named Overbeck, who announced lately that he had discovered how to make alcohol without fermentation, has patented a process for de-alcoholizing malt liquors. A company is being formed to operate under the patent.

The first brewery will be started shortly at Grimby. The process is applicable to all beers, and it will be possible for teetotalers to drink Bass or familiar brews without breaking the pledge. The new company proposes to buy famous brands de-alcoholize them and put them on the market with the familiar labels with a blue ribbon attached to designate that they are not intoxicating.

Mr. Overbeck's discovery has another side. He says that every hogshead of beer de-alcoholized by his process will yield about three gallons of proof spirit. This forms an excellent mild whiskey, which can be sold as such. It burns clearly and steadily without fumes.

How Royal Speeches are Prepared.

"To prepare the speeches of a Royal personage such as King Edward, ranging as they do over almost every subject under the sun, from art to agriculture, and from chemistry to cattle-breeding, one would require to combine the eloquence of Demosthenes with the varied erudition of an encyclopaedia."

So said Lord Rosebery a short time ago; and, indeed, it is only necessary to look over a list of the subjects which have inspired the oratory of King Edward or King George to marvel how one little head could carry all they knew. As a matter of fact, no head could carry such encyclopaedic knowledge as these Royal speeches exhibit; and their composition is often the product of a good many clever brains.

Helping a Hospital.

Although King George, like his lamented Royal father, is by natural aptitude and long training a ready and eloquent speaker, he has naturally neither the time nor the knowledge necessary to prepare many of the speeches he has to deliver. Take, for example, the opening of a new wing to a hospital, for which it is necessary to give a history of the hospital and its work, to refer to the distinguished men it has given to the world, and to the part it has played in advancing medical and surgical science.

These are matters which call for expert knowledge, and of which the King is naturally as ignorant as the average layman. Here the hospital authorities come gallantly to his assistance and practically prepare his speech for him. A committee of the principal officials is formed, the records of the hospital are carefully searched, and the result of the committee's work is embodied in a speech of perhaps an hour's duration. The speech, or statement, is then carefully revised and cut down to the required compass of about a quarter of an hour at the outside, and invested with as much interest and literary merit as the committee can put into it.

Purple Letters on Vellum.

Four typewritten copies of the finished speech are then made, and arranged with these, the committee arrange a conference with the King's Secretary, who makes such suggestions and amendments as he thinks advisable. The revised proof is then submitted to His Majesty, who frequently rewrites it to satisfy his individual taste and when it has thus received the Royal approval the manuscript is sent to the printers and reproduced in purple letters on vellum, in which gorgeous form it is sent to His Majesty.

In his earlier years King Edward used to learn these prepared speeches by heart; and, aided by an excellent memory, was able to deliver them with all the natural effect of impromptu utterances. On one occasion, it is said—the speech was to be delivered at the Royal Academy banquet—he had omitted this precaution, and had, further, found to his dismay that he had forgotten to take the copy with him. He proved, however, more than equal to the emergency, trying as it was to an inexperienced speaker, and delivered one of the best speeches of his life, to the surprise and delight of his auditors, to whom he confessed his predicament.

In later years, when experience had begotten confidence, His Majesty was content to master the facts and figures of his speech, and to trust to the inspiration of the moment for its delivery. How happy this invariably was—how natural and gracefully expressed—those who were privileged to hear him well knew. "King Edward's happiest efforts, however," Lord Rosebery says, "were those which were quite innocent of any preparation. In grace and simplicity of language, delicacy of humor, and dignity of utterance, the King's impromptu speaking might well challenge comparison with that of any after-dinner speaker I have ever heard."

On many subjects, too, King Edward was an expert who needed no help in preparing his speeches; and many of his best efforts, on such wide apart subjects as art and agriculture, were entirely of his own production, and, like all his speeches, gained considerably from his clear enunciation and his beautiful, well-modulated voice.

The King is a Horn Speaker.

King George is, if possible, an even better speaker than his Royal father. Indeed, some of his speeches are perfect models of lucidity, happy expression, and natural eloquence. Although the material for many of them is supplied on lines similar to those described above, he has long passed the stage when he had to rely on his memory. A perfect master of his facts, he is able to clothe them in

Dear Sir,—Will you permit me to say that the statements which appear in the Daily News of yesterday, as a report of Monday's meeting of the Municipal Council, are false and misleading in every particular? I made no such statements as those which are attributed to me in this report. The fact is that for special reasons the house of George Cheeks was strictly quarantined from the time when the nature of the first case was known until the third patient was removed, and the house closed. The officers on guard at the Fanning house were instructed to watch Cheeks' house also, and to permit no one to enter it. This was quite practicable, as the two houses are only a few yards apart, and the entrance of both can easily be watched at the same time. The statement that these three cases, which occurred in the same family within a week, were "the result" of the house not having been guarded is, of course, utterly absurd, and could be made only by a person who is grossly ignorant of the facts. The three inmates of the house were all actually infected with the disease, which takes about twelve days to develop—several days before the first patient was reported to be ill, and in his case the disease must have been contracted in December, before any of the typhus cases were discovered.

I have good reason to believe that these statements, which are obviously malicious have been given to the press by a certain member of the Municipal Council, who is smarting under a supposed grievance against myself. A few days ago it was found necessary to quarantine one of this gentleman's employees, who is an inmate of a house in which a case of typhus has been, and still is, under treatment. The Councillor indignantly protested against being thus inconvenienced, and has on several occasions since given expression to his resentment. He now appears to be organizing a petty persecution of the Health Officer who has dared to offend him.

I may say, also, that the statements on this subject, which are published in an article in this evening's Telegram, and which evidently emanate from the same source, are almost equally untrue and misleading.



Royal Bank Earns Over 18 Per Cent.

The Royal Bank of Canada, in its annual statement, shows net profits of \$951,336.99, against \$828,206.51 for the year ending December 31, 1909. With \$228,326.94 carried forward from 1909, the total amount of \$1,179,730.93 is available for distribution. Appropriation for dividends is \$588,500 transferred to officers' pension fund, \$50,000; to reserve fund, \$100,000; written off bank premises account, \$200,000, leaving \$243,230.93 to be carried forward to the credit of profit and loss.
 Specific and Dominion notes show an increase of \$118,000; deposits, \$21,000,000, and aggregate assets, \$25,459,000. Liquid assets are \$37,226,000, against \$31,406,000 last year, an increase of nearly \$6,000,000.
 Net profits for the year are at the rate of 18.24 per cent., against 18.08 per cent. in 1909.—Montreal Star, Jan. 12.

Children Frostbitten.

Numbers of children who live on the higher levels, cross Harvey and LeMarchant Roads in going to and from the various schools, and in returning to their homes over these thoroughfares yesterday they had a hard time of it. Several were pretty severely frostbitten about the ears and face and had to be looked after by their parents. Under such weather conditions as prevailed yesterday it is rather imprudent to send youngsters out and have them traverse bleak, wind-swept thoroughfares.

Dangerous Position.

About 7.30 last evening a man passing up Fever's Lane, a narrow thoroughfare which runs north from Governor Street, found an unfortunate man overcome from alcohol lying down in one of its darkest corners. He tried to arouse him but could not do so, and fearing if he left him he would be frozen to death, he ran to the police station and gave the alarm. Const. Tobin repaired to the place and after great exertion got the unfortunate to the station. He was frozen with the cold and if not discovered when he was he might have been badly frostbitten.

Water Pipes and Fountains Frozen

Yesterday morning and last night owing to the very severe frost which prevailed in most houses of the higher levels the water pipes became frozen, and plumbers had to attend to them. The fountains on several of the upper streets also became frozen and people had much difficulty in getting a supply of water for household purposes until the Council's employees attended to the fountains.

Very Cold Spurt.

The frost was very severe last night. At 10 o'clock at Mount Cashel it was 11 below. After that the mercury gradually lifted and at one o'clock this morning it was 6 below. At 10 a.m. it was at zero. At Signal Hill at sunrise the glass registered 2 below. In the city at 6 p.m. it was at zero, and at 10 p.m. went down to 4 below.

Fighting Bulls of Spain.

Raised in Andalusia and Brought Up for the Ring.

The famous fighting bulls of Spain are one of the most interesting features of the Andalusian plains. The Spanish bull often has a rather hollow back. His horns are large, rather wide and turned up and inward—never shot, very thick and turned downward, as is usually the case with English bulls.
 In his early youth he roams in comparative freedom over the plain. He early makes acquaintance with the garrochista's pic. Though the latter is merely a pole with no blade but only a small point like the stud end of an alpenstock, it is a formidable weapon when dextrously wielded.
 At the age of about 2½ years a crisis in the life of a fighting bull arrives. This ordeal, which every animal must go through, is one which, according to a writer in the Wide World, very few foreigners have seen.
 In the cool of the late afternoon one day a party of horsemen gather on a plain, accompanied by a professional picador. Two of the number, armed with long lancest ride up to the herd, round which is a guardian ring of horsemen. It should be mentioned that the full herd has already been split up into two portions by the removal of the belled bullocks to a distance of some half mile away. The guards now allow a bull to escape and off the latter goes at once to his bullock friends, tail in air, scouring over the plain, closely pursued by the galloping horsemen.
 The latter, indifferently mounted on ewe necked ponies, do not usually succeed in overthrowing their quarry for a couple of hundred yards or so, but then the nearest horseman, with his lance in rest, ranges alongside and delivers a prod. The bull turns to one side, letting up the other horseman, who in his turn delivers a thrust and throws the bull over.
 Up gets the bull and again faces, pursued as before by the horsemen. The whole business is very like pig-sticking, with a much larger and slower quarry. This time the animal makes towards the other horsemen, who in scattered groups are for the present spectators, and possibly judges of the sport.
 Before the bull reaches the latter, however, one of his pursuers ranges alongside once more, when he receives a third prod and down he goes again. Thoroughly annoyed he swings round for the charge, but his immediate adversary has galloped on and is out of reach. He turns his attention, therefore, to No. 2, whose place has now been taken by the professional picador. This man, with couched lance, awaits the bull's onset. The latter charges again, and yet again to be received each time on the point of the lance.
 And so the game goes on. If the bull after receiving a plentiful succession of nasty jabs, which merely inflict flesh wounds and do no serious harm, is undismayed and continues to charge as gamely as ever, he is considered to have pluck and fire enough to be worthy of the ring.
 But should he, finding that his charges are fruitless, turn sulky, refuse to charge his opponents and endeavor to flee from them, he is branded as cowardly, is fattened, and in due time turned into beef.

Constable Fired at Five Times.

A WOMAN'S BRAVERY. (Daily Mail, Dec. 27th.)

A police constable endeavouring to arrest a suspected burglar in the Borough during the early morning yesterday found that the man was armed, and while pressing forward on his duty single-handed was fired at five times. Nevertheless he captured the man.

The prisoner, who gave the name Charles Arthur, and described himself as a labourer of no fixed abode, was charged before Mr. Plowden at Tower-bridge yesterday with attempting bur- glariously to break and enter the Vir- ginia Plant, Public-house, Great Dover Street, Borough, and with attempting to murder Police Constable George Haytred, 341M, and further with being in possession of house-breaking implements. The man limped into the dock and was accommodated with a seat, it being explained that he had

injured his foot while trying to escape from the public house.

Police Constable 341M said that at 1 a.m. yesterday he was on duty in Broad Street, Borough, when he heard a police whistle blown. He then saw the prisoner come from the structure adjoining the Virginia Plant and walk- ed towards him. The man commen- ced to run and the witness gave chase. After going about twelve yards the fugitive stopped, faced round, and fired a revolver at him.

Mr. Plowden: You were not hit, is that so? The Constable: No. How far off were you when he fired? About twelve yards. He then ran down Great Broad Street, but soon he stopped and fired again.

What distance off were you then? About seven yards. He again missed. You were in uniform? Yes. I was then almost upon him, and he fired a third shot. I caught him by his coat and right wrist, and he fired his re- volver for the fourth time. None of those shots touched you? No, sir.

The constable, continuing his narra-

tive, said he shouted for help. A woman—Frances Wright, of 51 Great Broad Street—ran towards him. He asked her to blow his whistle, and with great courage she managed to get possession of it. The prisoner was struggling most violently, and he had the loaded revolver in his hand. She not only did blow the whistle, but she struck the prisoner again and again in the face.

Miraculous Escape. The man contrived to release his right hand," the constable said, "and pressing the muzzle of the revolver against my forehead, he pulled the trigger. There was a click, but no shot—the revolver had got jammed."

The woman was still blowing the whistle and helping to hold the pris- oner. A sailor, Henry William Bar- ber, of 37 Pepler Road, came up, and the witness asked him to help. The sailor at once seized the struggling man, and between them they held him until the woman's whistling brought assistance. Eventually the police had the violence of the crowd.

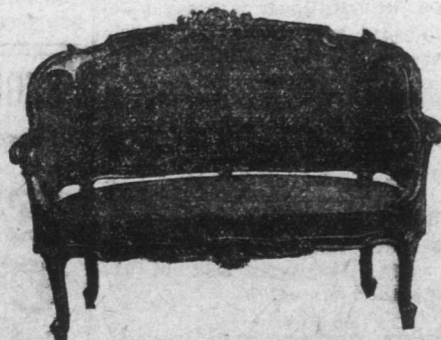
