If we appear somewhat prolific of newspaper ters, we must ask your bear in mind the fact that for several terms and under successive govern ments we have waited with apparent ly tco, much patience for our tors to deal with the matters herein discussed, but they have never been broached in the House of Assembly by Government or Opposition. Hence ou present appeals to the court of public opinion through the newspapers. An undertaking that would at once be a good stroke of business for the Government and supply a much-felt need of this community would be the establishment here of a branch of the Newfoundland Government Savings Hardware Bank. Such an institution would en courage economy on the part of ou people who handle a great deal of hard cash in the fall and, winter months, especially when the Ameri cans buy about a hundred thousan dollars' worth of herring in this Bay The work of the institution could b done by the local postmaster, or be ter still, by the Customs officer, whos work here apparently is so light that he migrates to his home in Trinity very winter. 
