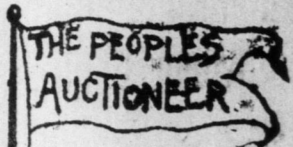

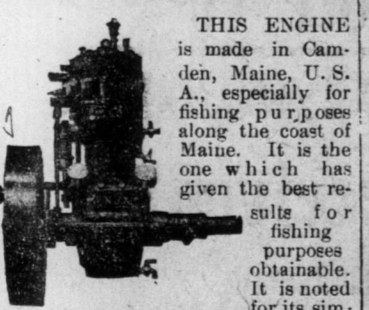

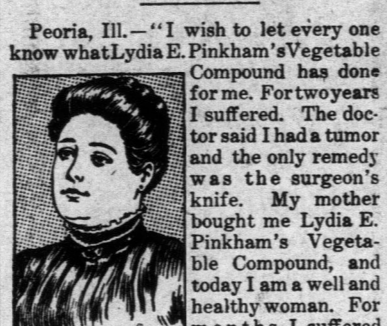
"Yes, ma'am," answered the girl, coloring slightly. "Brother George calls me Jenny, because he thinks Betsy old fashioned."

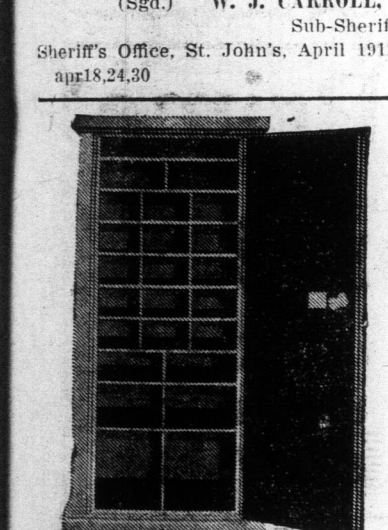

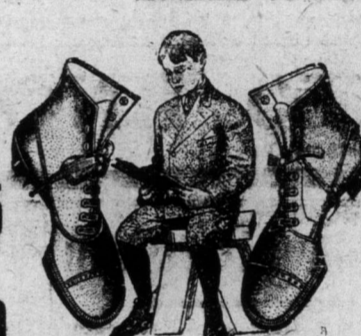

Able to Look After Himself.

In the Daily News this morning is published officially part of the debate of March 8th, in the House of Assembly. We are not mentioning the date of the debate to draw special attention to the fact that the publication is now nearly eight weeks behind the time when the speeches were made, but we wish to show up the attitude of the Minister of Justice.

We do not give the whole of the speech, but sufficient to draw attention to the fact that in debating the matter of the pay of the police, his main thought seemed to be what he himself was getting out of the Department of Justice and that he earned the rebuke Mr. Kent administered to him.

Hon. Minister of Justice.—As the hon. member for St. John's East has shown such anxiety this afternoon to have the salaries of the policemen increased, I would ask him to look at the other end of the Institution and give the benefit of some of his sympathy to the Head of the Department.

Mr. Kent.—He is able to look after himself.

Hon. Minister of Justice.—Nevertheless he is deserving of sympathy from the hon. gentleman, and the more so since the hon. gentleman opposite occupied the same position. If you go back twenty years you will find that the salary was \$2,400, while to-day it is only \$2,000, notwithstanding the increased cost of living. If the sympathy he has for the policemen is genuine, he ought to extend it to the Head of the Department and when we come in here next year he should be prepared to have this salary as well as some other salaries not only brought back to \$2,400, but have some reasonable advance made to make up for the increased cost of living.

MR. KENT. I did not mention the Head of the Department. I know no one here in this House better able to speak for himself, or, if occasion arises, to take care of himself. I know also that the Head of the Department is not depending on his salary. He is generally a lawyer of good standing and with a good private practice by which he is able to earn from private clients amounts to supplement his salary as Head of the Department. Besides this he may charge the Government with work done which does not come within the duties of his office, such as litigation which he conducts on behalf of the Government. Consequently I am not doing him any injustice in not pointing out that he is not being taken care of in this respect.

True, this young woman did not have command of a great ship, or some other great undertaking, but she did have charge of a child, and will she take care of her charge, sacrificing her life, and if not her life, probably her health for life.

Truly she proved herself a heroine; and which one of us does not admire her. What child is there today who listens to the story, how the young lady to save the child in her charge risked her life so that the life of the little one might be saved, but who in after years will tell their children, and their children's children, how Emily Day showed herself a

heroine equal to any that has passed in history.
If a fund is started to help show Miss Day that Newfoundland appreciates what she has done, I would like to be allowed to subscribe my mite.

Heating With Gas

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, April 29.
Mr. Dyke Acland, on behalf of the British Foreign Office, replying to questions, said to-day: "May I suggest that it is undesirable to make any more references to the imperfect and, possibly, inaccurate reports of the Senate Committee. The President of the Board of Trade is taking steps to obtain an authoritative report of the proceedings in case it may be of use in inquiry here. No complaints have been received by the Foreign Secretary of the detention of British subjects. The Senate Committee has statutory powers, and no treaty or convention is required to give the United States jurisdiction over British subjects while in United States territory. The position appears to be that the Senate Committee is within its rights in holding an enquiry and requiring the attendance of witnesses. In view of the fact that there has been considerable loss of American as well as British lives, it is not unreasonable that the American authorities should hold an enquiry with a view of considering what steps are desirable to secure the safety of trans-atlantic traffic. On the other hand, it would be undesirable that British subjects, who wish to return home, should be put to inconvenience by being detained for an unreasonable time. No official communication has been addressed to the United States Government on the subject."

NEW YORK, April 29.
A Washington despatch to the New York Times says that it became known to-day that the Senate Committee's dissatisfaction with its chairman, Senator Smith, had risen to such a point that yesterday several members discussed resigning. They felt that Chairman Smith is putting them in a false and ridiculous position before the world. The matter was first discussed on Friday. They decided they would wait till the week was out, and if no improvement was shown in Smith's methods, would visit him in a body and resign, telling him their reason. The disappointed Senator who participated in the discussion were Burton of Ohio, Borne of Oregon and Fletcher of Florida. None of the other Senators, however, is pleased with the chairman's course, and it is believed the resignation of any will be followed by all the others.

NEW YORK, April 29.
Lawrence Beasley says that the relative chances of escape for first class passengers is 62.6 per cent; second class, 39.6 per cent; steerage, 26 per cent; officers and crew, 22.3 per cent. These figures show that first class fares give more than double chances. Beasley is a Cambridge man and a Titanic survivor.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.
The Bazaar quarters at Damascus, were killed and many injured. The damage is estimated \$10,000,000. The fire began Friday midnight and lasted until Saturday night.

BIRMINGHAM, Alabama, April 29.
Eight miners were fatally burned and four are missing and believed killed at Murret to-day, owing to an explosion in the Roden Coal Co's mine. Rescue work is proceeding slowly, because of black damp.

Father Kelly officiating. The groom was supported by his brother, Mr. John Quigley, while Miss Minnie Baker, the bride's sister, acted as bridesmaid. The groom's present to the bride was a gold locket and chain and to the bridesmaid a gold brooch. After the ceremony was performed the newly wedded couple drove to No. 104 Duckworth Street, their future residence, where the wedding festivities were kept up. Mr. and Mrs. Quigley were the recipients of many costly presents, testifying to the popularity and esteem in which the young couple are held.

Football League.

The annual meeting of the Football League will be held likely to-morrow night. This will be a most important convention as we learn it is not at all unlikely that President Chaplin Secretary Higgins and Treasurer Ellis will resign, thus requiring a new executive to fill their places. These gentlemen have done splendid work for the encouragement of football in St. John's, in fact they are the pioneers of the game and their retirement should be marked by some act of appreciation.

Bonne Bay Requirements.


Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—In our preceding letters we made reference to the needs of this section of the District of St. Barbe generally. We now propose, with your permission, to deal particularly with matters more especially concerning Bonne Bay and the settlements on its shores. If we appear somewhat prolific of newspaper letters, we must ask your readers to bear in mind the fact that for several terms and under successive governments we have waited with apparently too much patience for our legislators to deal with the matters herein discussed, but they have never been broached in the House of Assembly by Government or Opposition. Hence our present appeals to the court of public opinion through the newspapers. An undertaking that would at once be a good stroke of business for the Government and supply a much-felt need of this community would be the establishment here of a branch of the Newfoundland Government Savings Bank. Such an institution would encourage economy on the part of our people who handle a great deal of hard cash in the fall and winter months, especially when the Americans buy about a hundred thousand dollars' worth of herring in this Bay. The work of the institution could be done by the local postmaster, or better still, by the Customs officer, whose work here apparently is so light that he migrates to his home in Trinity every winter. A local bank is considered on all hands, by business men and our people generally, to be a much needed public institution. It would be a paying proposition to the Government all round, and we can conceive of no tenable argument against its establishment here.

Every summer, Woody Point, the chief settlement of Bonne Bay, and the scene of its business operations, suffers from what almost amounts to a water famine. This occurs despite the fact that there are here several splendid streams within easy reach and providing an ample supply of fresh water for the town. But while the water is fresh it has unfortunately been polluted by the throwing therein of slops and by the building of privies on the banks of the streams. Now the Magistrate here—Mr. T. C. Duder—undertakes the duties of Health Officer, but he has made no effort at all to have this state of affairs remedied. He is aware of the pollution of our only source of water supply, for one of the above-named privies is within plain view of his own house, being built on the bank of a stream that flows through the heart of the settlement, and would, if not polluted and its waters properly conserved, supply the whole settlement. We trust that Mr. Duder's tardiness in moving in this matter is not caused by the dread of provoking the resentment of parties who make a convenience of this stream and probably regarding themselves as possessed of proprietary rights thereto. And some of them are highly placed. The Magistrate's failure to move in this matter is most reprehensible. As a result of this pollution of our only available source of pure water, we have to be content with the supply obtained from surface wells in the low marshy land of the Point, and at certain seasons of the year this subjects our people to the terrible danger of an epidemic of infectious disease.

A water supply could easily be obtained for the settlement from sources far removed from all possibility of contamination, and the people here are anxious to have the privilege of paying water rates and submitting to tax on coal that a plentiful supply of pure water may be available.

'Titanic' Disaster.

The Charge Against the Californian's Captain.

Senator Smith first read an affidavit made by Gill on Wednesday. In this statement Gill declared he was "actuated by a desire that no captain who refused or neglects to give aid to a vessel in distress should be able to hush up the matter."

He charged that several members of the crew whom he had urged to join with him in protesting against the conduct of the Californian's captain in disregarding the Titanic's rockets, refused because they feared "to lose their jobs."

He said he saw the Titanic very plainly. Gill said he was on his third voyage in the Californian. In the bright starlight night of Sunday, April 14, he said he came up on deck of the Californian at 11.56 p.m., as the vessel with engines stopped, was drifting amid floe ice. From the starboard rail Gill said he saw the broadside lights of a very large steamer, watched her for at least two minutes, and that those on the Californian's bridge, officer and lookout, could not have helped seeing her.

At midnight Gill continued, he went to his cabin, where he remarked at midnight to his mate Wm. Thomas, that he had seen a big vessel, apparently German, going along at full speed. He could not sleep and went back on deck to smoke a cigarette. Ten minutes later he saw a white rocket, ten miles off to starboard, which he first thought was a shooting star. A second rocket in the same place, seven minutes later, he saw distinctly and he remarked to himself "that must be a vessel in distress."

He did not notify the bridge of his business, he said it was not helped but again the rockets and he supposed they would pay attention. Gill swore that he then turned in, and at 6.40 a.m., was awakened with orders to turn out to render assistance, that the Titanic had gone down. The Californian then was proceeding at full speed, clear of the ice fields, but with plenty of icebergs about. He heard second officer J. C. Evans telling fourth officer Wootton that the third officer had reported rockets during his watch, and Gill said he knew then it must have been the Titanic he had seen.

Evans, according to the affidavit, said that the captain had been notified of the rockets by the apprentice officer, thought to have been named Gibson. The skipper ordered Morse signals to the distressed vessel sent up. Gibson again reported the rockets to the captain, who told Gibson to continue to Morse the distressed vessel until he got a reply. No reply was received.

Gill said the next remark he heard Evans make was "why in the devil did not wake up the wireless man."

The entire crew according to Gill, talked among themselves about the disregarding of the rockets. Mr. Stone, the second navigator, was on the Californian's bridge at the time of the rocket signals.

Gill's affidavit was listened to with intense interest by the committee.

Capt. Lord of the liner Californian, prepared to enter a sweeping denial of the statements by Gill, took the witness stand at 3.10 p.m.

Captain Stanley Lord, of the Californian said he had followed the sea for 20 years. He had the log of the Californian with him and read from the record. The entries included several references to icebergs.

"Did you try to get into communication with the Titanic on Sunday night?" asked Senator Smith.

"Yes, sir, about 10.15—that night, ship's time. We told him we were surrounded by ice and had stopped."

"Did the Titanic acknowledge that message?"

"Yes, sir. It told us to shut up—or 'keep out' or something like that."

"How far were the Californian and the Titanic apart when you sent your message to the Titanic telling her you were blocked in the ice?"

"From the position we had of the Titanic we were about 19½ miles apart."

"Did the Californian receive the Titanic's 'C.Q.D.' call?"

"No," said the captain, "but we got it from the Virginian about six o'clock the morning of the 15th."

"What is the speed of the Californian?"

"About eleven knots ordinarily," said the captain, "we made 13½ when we were going to the Titanic, we were driving all we could."

"When you told the Titanic you were surrounded by ice, how badly were you surrounded by ice?"

The witness said the field was about 25 miles long and several miles wide. The Californian, he said, was about a quarter mile from the edge of the floe.

"What did you notify the Titanic for?"

"As a matter of courtesy entirely. I didn't know where she was. As a matter of fact I thought she was 18 miles South of us."

"Do you know anything regarding the Titanic disaster of your own knowledge?"

"Nothing."

"Did you see any of her signals or anything of the ship herself?"

"No."

"Was the Titanic beyond your range of vision?"

"Yes, 19½ or 20 miles away."

"Low temperature of the water was no indication of the proximity of ice?"

Low temperature of the water was no indication of the proximity of ice? Captain Lord said. He added he had very little experience with ice.

"Would glasses in the crow's nest have aided in sighting ice?" asked the Senator.

"I think not. I tried it once and I don't believe I shall try it again. It was when I hoisted a man in a coal basket to the masthead to see if we could discover the Titanic."

"If you had received the Titanic's distress call Sunday evening after your communication with the Titanic how long would it have taken you to reach her?"

"At the very least, two hours, under the ice conditions."

Captain Lord said that if the operator had been on duty he would have caught the Titanic's signal. An operator on duty in the day, he said, was of more service than to remain on duty at night, because as there were so many one-operator ships that one got more information in the day than at night, when the other operators were asleep.

"Wouldn't it be better to have your operator awake when other eyes are closed?"

"It probably would."

"When I came on the bridge at 10.30 Sunday night," Captain Lord said, "the third officer there said he thought he saw a light. It was a peculiar light and we had been having trouble with the stars, mistaking them for lights. Finally a ship did come up and I asked the operator if he had heard anything, and he said he had had the Titanic, and given the ice message. Then this ship came up and lay within four to seven miles of us. She lay there all night, nearly but we couldn't hear from her. It was not the Titanic. I told the operator to call this ship again. She sent up several rockets but she would not answer. I have a faint recollection of hearing the cabin boy about 'four o'clock saying something about the ship still standing by. Soon after that she steamed away. This boat sent up several white rockets, but they were not distress signals."

"Captain Lord said that at the Californian's position, 19½ miles away from the Titanic, it would have been impossible to see either Morse signals or the distress signals."

"The first news that reached me of the disaster," said the officer, "was shortly after five o'clock Monday morning when the Frankfurt reported that the Titanic had sunk after hitting an iceberg."

At 4.10 that morning the Virginian sent word of the collision. Captain Lord said, following it by a second message, asking that word of the extent of the damage be sent to her. Captain Lord was then excused.

Cyril Evans, wireless operator of the Californian testified that he turned in at 11.25 on Sunday and never heard any distress signal from the Titanic.

"In the evening the Titanic called me up and we exchanged signals."

Said Evans: "I said 'here's a message for you about ice,' and he said he had heard me send it to other ships."

Evans read the message as follows:

"April 14,—5.35 p.m.—Californian to Captain Titanic, 42.3 N. 49.9 W.—passed three large bergs five miles southward of us. Regards."

He next communicated with the Titanic at 9.05, New York time, that same evening, Evans said. The captain said we were going to stop on account of ice. He told me to advise Titanic. I did and said:—

"Say, old man, we are surrounded by ice," and he said, shut up, I am working with Cape Race, and that I had jammed him."

"After that I heard him sending private messages to Cape Race."

Evans said he was awakened at 3.40 in the morning by the chief officer, who said he had seen rockets and wanted to get some information.

"I made ready and called, and the Frankfurt answered with the news of the sinking of the Titanic. The Virginian called before I left the key and furnished more information."

Evans said the Frankfurt operator had not told him of the receipt of a "C.Q.D." from the Titanic nor of a rebuff by the Titanic's wireless operator.

"Did anyone tell you about Captain Lord having been informed three times that night about a ship sending up rockets?" asked Senator Smith.

"I think Gibson, the apprentice, told me that the captain was being called and told about the rockets," said Evans.

"There was a lot of talk while we were on our way to the scene of the wreck. I heard the men say rockets had been sent up in the night and that the captain had been roused."

"The witness said the apprentice got out the Morse signals and tried to get his communication with the distressed vessel. No effort was made to use rockets on the Californian."

Valuables on Victims.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day.

Owing to the absence of any treaty with Britain covering the disposition of effects of American citizens who die on British ships on the high seas, it may probably be impossible for relatives of American victims of the Titanic disaster to obtain possession immediately of valuable found on the recovered bodies brought to Halifax. The property must be dealt with under the Canadian law, which probably means that it will be necessary for relatives and friends of the deceased to go to the Canadian courts to obtain the property to which they lay claim.

Better Rules for Wireless.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day.

After a discussion, intended to discover the needed reforms in the use of wireless telegraphy at sea, the Senate Committee investigating the Titanic disaster yesterday entered on the final stage of the inquiry. Today officers and crew of the sunken ship will be released and be free to return to their homes in England. At the same time (may) will be quizzed searchingly as to his ideas of regulations to make a repetition of the disaster impossible. Marconi, inventor of the wireless. Sammis, chief engineer of the American Marconi Company, wireless operators Bride and Cottam, a passenger named Hugh Woolner, England, fourth officer Boxhall of the Titanic were to-day's witnesses. Virtually all agreed that better regulations of wireless communication at sea was essential.

Reforms in China

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKING, To-Day.

In his first official address, Yuan Shi Kai made a special reference to the position of foreigners. Foreign powers in recent years, he said, had adopted a peaceful and just attitude, and had shown a desire for the interest of China which calls for gratitude. Chinese should learn under it and treat foreigners with friendship and candor, and should rejoice over the establishment of the Republic after a thousand years of despotism. Yuan emphasized the necessity of forming a firm foundation on which to base a policy of progress. The most important matter at present, he said, was finance. Foreign capital was essential to China and the Government was drafting principles of financial reform. Yuan recommended plans for lightening the burdens of the people, proper surveys of lands for new scale of taxation, for a unified system of currency and for standard weights and measures. Yuan said owing to the insufficiency of financial experts among Chinese, the employment of talented foreigners was necessary. He recommended the employment of foreigners at the Finance Ministry, so as to ensure a correct budget and proper accounting.

The Tailors Celebration.

Branch of the Journeymen Tailors' Union of America, was held in the British Hall last night, and it was pronounced one of the biggest and most enjoyable events of the season. Deputy Mayor Martin, Councillors Ryan and Mullaly and upwards of 300 prominent ladies and gentlemen were present. Dancing commenced at 9 p.m. and continued until midnight when the following programme was rendered:—

Each of these performers were enthusiastically cheered, and after the interval, Mr. M. J. Doyle, the Chairman of the Committee in charge of the function, made a very practical speech, in which he outlined the benefits of unionism in this city and appealed to the large gathering to support only those stores that were identified with the union.

daily ordinary occupation, in fact are not hindered at all in their work. The doctors say that it is a disease of the skin, caused by cold. We are very happy to learn that the disease is not serious, and that very ordinary precautions are sufficient to cure it.

In spite of all that the master, John E. Lake, can say—who calls for a constable in the name of humanity—it is not the small pox, and we hope that the slightly severe measures that have been taken at St. Pierre at this time against boats coming from Newfoundland will be abolished. Although being the first to demand strict precautions in the case of a real and characteristic epidemic, we would wish on the other hand that too useless severity be the cause of any loss to the commerce of St. Pierre. Now one knows that the time will soon be here when hundreds of boats will be coming here to do business—buy salt, get repairs done, etc.

We ought at this point to signalize that for several years, at about the same time, the boats of Fortune Bay are consigned and that a great deal of talk has been made on the subject of disease which are, if not imaginary, at least without importance. Our Consul at St. John's, who receives reports more or less authentic and interesting, immediately sends alarming messages to St. Pierre, which resulted in those strict precautions be-

ing taken here to prevent English boats coming to our port. We are convinced that there has been a great deal of bluff in these reports; our neighbors detest us cordially, we knew, and lose no opportunity of accusing us of injury. Will he have time to do so? or does the pursuit of his political affairs take up all his attention?

Act, Mr. Choacoe, act! the people of commerce have elected you for that purpose and not to make absurd discourses on the quays of St. Pierre. Otherwise throw up your job and allow some one to be put in your place who will be disposed to defend our interests when they are menaced.

A word in conclusion to Mr. John E. Lake. We sincerely hope Mr. John E. Lake will not have to suffer from smallpox, large pox, skin disease, breaking out, cold sores or other troublesome affections mentioned in his letter. We advise him, if he is afraid, to drink every morning and evening a good glass of first class rum, he is sure not to be sick. We would willingly send him a couple of gallons of good quality, but duty on this liquor is very heavy.

Tim Shannahan ON WET FISH AND DRY WOOD AND THEIR SALES.

Mrs. Tucker says that every one must have noticed how snail like our local fishermen slowly but surely creep up from the fish markets and soon get among the throng in order to effect a ready sale. The first day that the first fresh fish come in people go down and buy from the boat, in fact some people go out in boats to meet them. Then a few days later the fishermen reach the market, and the Council Inspector is on the scene with very shiny brass buttons. But the fisherman is not contented with his surroundings, he longs to be with the people. He can see his rows of fine fresh fish and he can also see gangs of citizens pass by the head of the cove, He's beginning to feel uneasy and he thinks that the people think "there's no fish in to-day." He's been told by the Councillors how much they spent on the market, but he fires it all overboard and makes the first step to mix among the throng. He's told by the Inspector that he must "stop in the market," but he defies all and soon we behold him behind two oars on which is displayed his catch.
