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





At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are

the best means to use to get the best

Fertilizers must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There

are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to

give the best returns, and is the most

valuable and economical source of

Nitrogen for agricultural purposes.

For vegetables, grass, and all leafy crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant

is making it's g. owth, as well as he-

fore sowing the seed.

If a liquid manure is preferred, a 1/4 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quan-

tity should not be exceeded.

It is a good plan to reduce the Sulphate to a fine powder, and mix with

four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful.

For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended:—

26 lbs. Fine bone meal.
10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia.
15 lbs. Sulphate of Potash.
21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA.

Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 43 square yards.
