The capture of Warsaw has not been accomplished ac cording to the Telegraph, and the de liberate withdrawal of the Russian s an encouraging feature of the sit The Russians have not ye been deeated or anything like it, says the Chronicle, which adds that the Russians are inflicting fearful losse on the attacking Germans.

SITUATION AT WARSAW CREATES EXCITEMENT.

PETROGRAD, August 2 An intimation that the Vistula line was to be abandoned by the Russians, and the beginning of the removal of factories, government institutions, and hospitals, has created intense excitement among all classes of the population of the Polish capital. It was feared that the military authori-ties might deem the evacuation of the city by the inhabitants a military necessity, and would destroy a great part of the city to prevent its use by the Germans as a base. Many wealth; residents have left for the interior including many of those who have re mained since their families went out. During the past fortnight stations and trains have become overcrowded. the discomfort of the number of pas sengers having been increased by th necessary military precautions. The streets which generally are thronged have become deserted. The restaurants and coffee houses are empty. The French and Belgian consuls left the capital in the early days of the German progress, turning their affairs over to the American Consul. FRENCH PAPERS ON THE WAR.






